MAYOR NEWSOM BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

[Petitions for City Parcels to Form the Proposed Civic Center Community Benefit District]

Resolution authorizing the Mayor to cast petitions in the affirmative for formation of the proposed Civic Center Community Benefit District, to sign on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco as the owner of certain parcels of real property that would be subject to assessment in the proposed property and business improvement district to be named the Civic Center Community Benefit District.

WHEREAS, The Property and Business Improvement Law of 1994 (California Streets and Highways Code Sections 36600 et seq.) as augmented by Article 15 of the San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code, authorizes formation of business and property improvement assessment districts; and,

WHEREAS, Pursuant to petitions filed by property and business owners in various parts of the City, following public hearing and balloting, the Board of Supervisors has previously established eleven such assessment districts in various areas of San Francisco; and,

WHEREAS, The Civic Center Community Benefit District Steering Committee has now asked that the City and County of San Francisco sign petitions for parcels it owns in the Civic Center area, requesting that Board of Supervisors adopt a Resolution declaring the intention of the Board of Supervisors to establish a property-based business improvement district (community benefit district) to be known as the "Civic Center Community Benefit District" and order the levy and collection of a multi-year assessment on identified parcels in the district, with all appropriate notices, hearing and balloting to follow; and,

WHEREAS, Article XIIID, Section 4 of the California Constitution provides that parcels within an assessment district that are owned or used by any government agency, the State of California or the United States shall not be exempt from assessment unless the agency can

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demonstrate by clear and convincing evidence that those publicly owned parcels in fact receive no special benefit; and,

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco owns certain parcels of real property within the proposed assessment district, the details of which are set forth in a spreadsheet entitled "Proposed Assessments for City Owned Parcels in the Proposed Civic Center Community Benefit District " on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. __101201___, which is hereby declared to be a part of this Resolution as if set forth fully herein; and,

WHEREAS, The City owns additional real property within the proposed assessment district that is subject to the exclusive jurisdiction and control of certain City departments, such as the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, the War Memorial Board of Trustees, and the Asian Art Museum Commission (the "Other Property"); and,

WHEREAS, The City-owned parcels (not including the Other Property) are listed as follows, showing the street address for each, Assessor's lot and block number, name/description of building, proposed assessment amount for each, and the percent of the total proposed assessments for the District that each parcel would be assessed (which is the corresponding weight to be afforded the City's signature on the petition to establish the Civic Center CBD):






Dear Budget & Finance Committee Members:

Per your request at the Budget and Finance Committee meeting on September 29, 2010, we are pleased to provide you with an update on the status of the petition phase for the proposed Civic Center Community Benefit District (CBD). Since September 15th, the Civic Center Community Benefit District (CBD) Steering Committee has collected petitions representing 21.24% weighted support to establish the Civic Center Community Benefit District, these petitions represent 30% weighted support among the privately held and state owned parcels in the proposed district. The steering committee has received a total of 3.55% petitions against the formation of the Civic Center CBD to date. A petition collection summary is attached for your review. Petitions will continue to be collected until at least 30% weighted support is achieved.

The proposed Civic Center CBD is a unique public private partnership. A cross section of the private sector has weighed in during the petition phase in support of the formation of the proposed district; from larger commercial buildings (Fox Plaza, Opera Plaza, Paston Companies "AAA" buildings, Honda Dealership) to private arts organizations (SF Jazz, Ballet Admin. & Conservatory of Music) as well as restaurant properties (Caffe Della Stella, Hayes St. Grill and Absinthe, Chevy's), and residential properties (The Argenta, Mercy Affordable Housing). The Civic Center Steering Committee comprised of both private and public representation developed the Management Plan over the past 18 months.

Last Thursday on October 7th, the San Francisco Library Commission, the Recreation & Park Commission and the City Hall Preservation Advisory Commission all approved resolutions in support of the Civic Center Community Benefit District. On Thursday October 14th, the War Memorial Board of Trustees will
