14 Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

15 Section 1. Statement of Purpose. The sole purpose of this ordinance is to make
16 nonsubstantive changes in miscellaneous provisions of the Municipal Code. These changes
17 include, among other things, correction of incorrect citations, renumbering and re-lettering of
18 certain sections and subsections, correction or deletion of typographical errors, deletion of
19 sunsetted provisions, and inclusion of clarifying language to supply previously omitted
20 headings or references. This ordinance is not intended to effect any change in the meaning of
21 any code provision or otherwise work any substantive change. This ordinance shall be
22 interpreted so as to effectuate the purposes stated in this Section 1.

23 Section 2. The Administrative Code is hereby amended by renumbering Sections
24 2A.421 and 2.A422, and revising Sections 8.21-2, 10G.1, 20.7-8, 20.7-21, 20.7-26, 20.7-38,
25 and 82.3, to read as follows:

15 (c) Fees for Lost and Damaged Materials Owned by Other Libraries. The Library is
16 hereby authorized to collect fees for lost or damaged materials that its patrons have borrowed
17 from another library via interlibrary loan (ILL) in accordance with the following:

18 (1) in the case of lost or damaged materials borrowed from a member library of
19 the LINK+ library consortium, the Library may collect the replacement fee set by LINK+,
20 provided that the Library shall collect only the actual replacement cost of the item when
21 authorized to do so by the lending library:

22 (~~#~~2) for all other lost or damaged materials borrowed from another library via
23 ILL, the Library may charge a replacement fee in the amount that is required by the lending
24 library, which shall be either the fair market value of the lost item(s) or an amount set by the

5 at the time an annual fee for renewal of the permit or license associated with the permit is
6 collected, a surcharge in the amount specified shall be charged and collected for the following
7 categories of permits and fees.

22 Special Investigation Unit of the Department. Any aid granted under such circumstances shall
23 be offset against any future aid by deducting from current grants not more than 40% with an
24 administrative determination of Recipient Fraud and an administrative evaluation of the
25 Recipient's current ability to pay housing costs.

19 "Landfill" means a facility that (a) accepts for disposal in or on land non-hazardous
20 waste such as household, commercial, and industrial waste, and waste generated during
21 construction, remodeling, repair and demolition operations, and (#b) has a valid current solid
22 waste facilities permit from the California Department of Resources Recycling and Recover
23 (CalRecycle).

25 **SEC. 703. DUTIES OF THE DEPARTMENT OF THE ENVIRONMENT.**

1 (a) General Duties Under this Chapter. The Department of the Environment shall:

2 (1) Develop goals, criteria, and strategies for optimizing municipal green
3 building design, construction and operations and make policy recommendations regarding
4 requirements for municipal construction projects to the Board of Supervisors;

5 (2) Develop and oversee a training program in green building practices,
6 including design, construction, renovation, operation and reuse of buildings for City
7 department heads and architects, engineers, construction managers, building managers,
8 department managers and finance officers employed by the City in order to implement the
9 policies adopted by the Board of Supervisors;

10 (3) Chair the Task Force and coordinate City departments having responsibility
11 for compliance with the requirements of this Chapter. *The Task Force* shall assist the Director in
12 providing green building advice, assistance, outreach, and education to City departments;

14 **SEC. 705. LEED CERTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS FOR MUNICIPAL**
15 **CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS.**

16 Except as otherwise provided by the City's Charter,

17 * * * *

18 (e) Municipal construction projects Less Than 10,000 Gross Square Feet. For
19 municipal construction projects less than 10,000 gross square feet and for municipal
20 construction projects of any size not meeting the Minimum Program Requirements to be
21 eligible for LEED certification, the sponsoring City department, in consultation with a LEED AP
22 with specialty, shall prepare and submit a conceptual design phase LEED Scorecard to the
23 Department for informational and reporting purposes. The conceptual design phase LEED
24 Scorecard shall demonstrate the maximum LEED credits that are practicable for the project.
25 The sponsoring City department shall pursue these LEED credits throughout the design and

1 construction process. The sponsoring City department, in consultation with a LEED AP with
2 specialty, shall prepare and submit a final as-built LEED Scorecard to the Department
3 indicating all LEED credits that would be achieved if the project had been certified.

4 Documentation of LEED credits is not required for these projects. Municipal construction
5 projects less than 10,000 gross square feet are subject to all applicable local ordinances and
6 requirements, including but not limited to, Construction and Demolition Debris Management,
7 Recycling by Occupants, Construction Site Runoff Pollution Prevention, Stormwater Control,
8 and Water Efficient Irrigation, as well as the requirements of the California Green Building
9 Standards Code (CCR ~~File~~Title 24, Part 11).

11 **SEC. 706. LOCALLY-REQUIRED MEASURES FOR MUNICIPAL CONSTRUCTION**
12 **PROJECTS.**

14 (~~cb~~) Indoor Water Use Reduction. Municipal construction projects subject to a LEED
15 certification requirement shall demonstrate a minimum 30% reduction in the use of indoor
16 potable water, as calculated to meet and achieve LEED credit Indoor Water Use Reduction.

17 (~~de~~) Renewable Energy Efficiency, Better Roofs, and Energy Resilience.

18 * * * *

19 (~~ea~~) Commissioning. For each municipal construction project subject to a LEED
20 certification requirement, the design team shall demonstrate that the project achieves Option
21 1 of LEED credit Enhanced and Monitoring-Based Commissioning, in addition to LEED
22 prerequisite Fundamental Commissioning and Verification.

23 (~~fe~~) Construction Debris Management. All municipal construction projects shall
24 demonstrate a minimum 75% diversion from landfill. For all municipal construction projects
25 subject to a LEED certification requirement, the LEED Project Administrator shall submit

1 documentation verifying that the project achieves LEED credit Construction and Demolition
2 Waste Management (75%; 2 points). The project must also satisfy the requirements of
3 Section 708.

4 (gf) Indoor Air Quality. For each municipal construction project subject to a LEED
5 certification requirement, the LEED Project Administrator shall submit documentation verifying
6 that the project achieves LEED credit Enhanced Indoor Air Quality Strategies (1 point), LEED
7 credit Construction Indoor Air Quality Management Plan (1 point), and LEED credit Indoor Air
8 Quality Assessment Option 2: Air Testing (2 points).

9 (hg) Low Emitting Materials. For each municipal construction project subject to a
10 LEED certification requirement, the LEED Project Administrator shall submit documentation
11 verifying that the project achieves LEED Low Emitting Materials (3 points).

12 (ih) Toxics Reduction and Pollution Prevention.

14 **SEC. 709. WATER CONSERVATION RETROFIT REQUIREMENTS.**

16 (c) Water Conservation Requirements for Water Closets (Toilets) and Urinals.

18 (3) The responsible City department shall ensure that all water closets in City-owned
19 facilities with a rated flush volume exceeding 1.6 gallons per flush are replaced with high-
20 efficiency water closets that use no more than 1.28 gallons per flush. All wall-mounted urinals
21 with a rated flush volume exceeding 1.0 gallon per flush shall be replaced with high-efficiency
22 urinals that use no more than 0.125 gallons per flush. All non-wall mounted urinals with a
23 rated flush volume exceeding 1.0 gallon per flush shall be replaced with high-efficiency urinals
24 that use no more than 0.5 gallons per flush.

13 Sections 1103.1 through 1103.1.1 and 1103.3 through 1103.14.10 are deleted from
14 the International Fire Code.

23 the City and County of San Francisco, except as provided in Section 19K.31010.2. All leases,
24 permits or agreements awarded by the City and County of San Francisco allowing any person

1 to use City property for retail purposes shall specifically provide that there shall be no sale of
2 tobacco products on such City property.

3 **SEC. 19K.31010.2. EXCEPTIONS.**

4 The prohibition against tobacco sales on property owned by or controlled by the City
5 in Section 19K.21010.1 shall not apply where its application would impair a lease, permit or use
6 agreement to which the City is a party on the effective date of this ordinance. The City shall
7 not enter into, renew, extend or materially amend a lease, permit or use agreement for the
8 use of City property after the effective date of this ordinance that does not incorporate the
9 prohibition set forth in Section 19K.21010.1.

10 The prohibition against tobacco sales on property owned by or controlled by the City
11 in Section 19K.21010.1 shall not apply to the passenger terminal complex at San Francisco
12 International Airport.

(j) If a Permittee has been conditionally granted a permit but has not obtained all of the permits required from other City departments within nine months from the date that the Entertainment Commission conditionally granted the permit, the conditionally granted permit shall expire by operation of law and be void. Notwithstanding the foregoing sentence, upon the Permittee's written request and a showing of good cause, the Commission may extend the aforementioned nine-month deadline for up to 24 months, subject to an additional extension or extensions totaling no more than 12 months beyond the aforementioned 24 months. In its discretion, the Commission may delegate to the Director, in whatever manner it deems appropriate, the power to extend the nine-month deadline.

(k) If the Permit is for a Plaza as identified in Administrative Code Chapter 94, the Permit shall state that it automatically expires upon termination or expiration of the Real Estate Division license for that Plaza or termination or expiration of the Public Works permit for that Plaza issued pursuant to Chapter 94 of the Administrative Code. If the permit is for a People Place as identified in Administrative Code Chapter 94A, the Permit shall state that it automatically expires upon termination or expiration of the People Place Permit issued pursuant to Chapter 94A of the Administrative Code.

23 with those allowed under the prior Permit, (3) the premises at issue complies with all existing
24 health, safety, and fire ordinances, and (4) a Temporary Permit is necessary to ensure
25 uninterrupted operations of a business at the premises. This Temporary Permit may not be

1 renewed as a Temporary Permit. The Entertainment Commission may establish additional
2 procedures and Temporary Permit criteria to help carry out the goals of this Section
3 1060.24(h).

14 Section 8. The Transportation Code, Division I, Section 7.3.56 is hereby amended by

18 For any person or entity to drive or operate any Taxi on the public street that is not
19 equipped with a Taximeter, is equipped with a Taximeter that is inaccurately fixing the fare to

LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Various Codes - Nonsubstantive Clean-Up Ordinance]

Ordinance amending the Administrative, Business and Tax Regulations, Environment, Fire, Health, Police, and Transportation Codes to make nonsubstantive changes that correct errors, such as incorrect citations, typographical errors, incorrect numbering or lettering, and omitted headings or references.

Existing Law

Several code provisions cumulatively contain errors, such as incorrect citations, typographical errors, incorrect numbering or lettering, and omitted headings or references.

Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance makes changes in various code provisions to correct the problems referenced above.

Background Information

The sole purpose of this ordinance is to make nonsubstantive changes in miscellaneous provisions of the Municipal Code. This ordinance is not intended to effect any change in the meaning of any code provision or otherwise work any substantive change

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
