I. INTRODUCTION

Attached is the Office of Citizen Complaints' statistical report for the 2015 third quarter. The OCC received an adjusted total of 172 complaints of police misconduct or failure to take action and closed 171 complaints in the third quarter. It sustained allegations of misconduct or failure to take action in eight complaints against San Francisco Police officers which is a 5% sustained rate. The OCC mediated 12 cases, which is a 7% mediation rate. From the beginning of the year through the end of the third quarter, the adjusted total of complaints received is 513, the total of complaints closed is 492, the total of complaints sustained is 35, and the total of mediations is 41. As of September 30, 2015 the sustained rate was 7% and the mediation rate was 8%.

II. ORGANIZATIONAL AND BUDGET MATTERS

A. Staffing

By the close of this period, 15 permanent line investigators staffed the OCC but only 13 of them had full caseloads during this quarter. Two permanent line investigators were acting senior investigators during the third quarter. One of the permanent line investigators acted as a senior investigator continuing to fill the vacancy created when Senior Investigator Erick Baltazar was promoted to the deputy director/chief of investigations position in August 2013. Another permanent line investigator acted as a senior investigator while a senior investigator was on a long term leave. By the close of the third quarter, there were five investigator vacancies; three line investigators and two senior investigators. The OCC's budget provided for

18 line investigators, four senior investigators and a deputy director/chief of investigations. By the close of the third quarter, 18¹ employees staffed the 23 budgeted investigator positions.

San Francisco City Charter section 4.127 provides a floor for investigators of one line investigator for every 150 police officers. With 2,195 sworn SFPD members during the third quarter, the floor was 15 line investigators.

B. Technology

During the third quarter, Chris Wisniewski, the Information Systems Business Analyst, began deployment of next generation template installations for all 40 existing workstations. He also started work on two next-generation media center audio/visual systems and engaged with the Department of Technology to upgrade the OCC's network. As always, he assisted investigators and other staff with technical aspects of their work and prepared statistical data for reports.

C. Training

During the third quarter of 2015, the OCC continued implementing its strategic plan for training its employees.

D. Budget

At the conclusion of its June budget hearings, the Board of Supervisors Budget and Finance Committee forwarded the proposed City and County of San Francisco 2015/2016 and 2016/2017 two year budget to the full Board of Supervisors for first reading at its July 14, 2015 meeting.² The Board of Supervisors finally adopted the budget on July 28, 2015 and Mayor Edwin Lee signed the budget document on July 29, 2015. The OCC's approved budget for fiscal year 2015/2016 is \$5,570,077 and for 2016/2017 is \$5,932,964.

III. INVESTIGATION OF CASES

A. Case Inventory

By the end of the 2015 third quarter, the OCC opened 175³ new cases, and closed 171 cases. During this period, the OCC opened one more case than it closed.

The OCC closed the quarter with 366 pending cases, which are 21 more pending cases than the close of the third quarter in 2014. By the end of the 2015 third quarter, there were 322 cases from 2015, 40 pending cases from 2014, two from 2013, and two cases from 2011. Between January 1, 2015, and September 30, 2015, the OCC opened 524 cases, closed 492 cases and sustained 35 cases.

B. Caseloads and Disposition of Cases

With only 13 investigators assigned full caseloads the third quarter of 2015 and 15 investigators assigned full caseloads the third quarter of 2014, caseloads were higher than best practices both years.⁴ In the third quarter of 2015, the caseload was 28 cases per investigator versus 22 cases per investigator in the third quarter of 2014. Comparing the third quarters of 2014 and 2015, the average number of days to close cases increased by 10% from 161 to 177. The OCC's goal is to conclude its investigations within 270 days. During the third quarter of 2015, OCC investigators closed 171 cases with 73% of them closing within 270 days and only seven of them, none of which had sustainable allegations, took more than a year to close. This differs by five percent from 2014 where of the 186 cases closed, 76% of them were closed within 270 days. The average number of days to close sustained cases in the third quarter showed improvement by decreasing by 7% from 306 days in 2014 to 284 days in 2015. In working to better manage the OCC's challenging caseload, the OCC is continuing to focus on closing sustainable cases sooner. However, with three less investigators in the third quarter of 2015 than the third quarter of 2014, reducing case closure time remained elusive.

C. Sustained Cases

The number of sustained cases in the third quarter of 2015, eight, is seven less than the 15 sustained cases the third quarter of 2014 and is a 5% sustained rate. In the third quarter of 2015, 38% or three of the sustained cases closed within nine months which was an improvement over the closure time in the third quarter of 2014 where only 20% of sustained case closures occurred within nine months. However, the challenge in the third quarter of 2014 was the large number of sustained cases, 15, that quarter. The yearly sustained rate as of September 30, 2015 is 7%, the same as the third quarter of 2014.

The ongoing impediments to prompt completion of sustained cases are attributable to at least four factors: 1) larger than best practices caseloads for investigators resulting in longer times to complete investigations, 2) several high profile and complex investigations, 3) active trial calendars for the two prosecuting attorneys who also serve as advice attorneys on sustained cases and sustainability

reviews and 4) increased policy work for the policy analyst attorney who also serves as an advice attorney on sustained cases and sustainability reviews.

During the third quarter of 2015, there were sustained allegations of neglect of duty in 7 of the 8 sustained complaints, or 88% of them. No complaint was sustained in whole or in part for neglect of duty for failure to collect traffic stop data.

The sustained allegations during the third quarter were as follows:

1. Unwarranted action:

In violation of DGO 6.09, Domestic Violence, wrongful arrest of the complainant who was the victim, not the dominant aggressor.

2. Conduct reflecting discredit:

In violation of DGO 2.01, General Rules of Conduct, Rule 14, an officer said to the complainant, "If you think you were driving, you were tweaking."

3. Neglect of duty:

- a. When a sergeant and two plain clothes officers took the complainant into custody, the sergeant took custody of the complainant's property.

The sergeant failed to properly process complainant's property in violation of DGO 6.15.

While the complainant's property was listed on a San Francisco Property Inventory Arrest Record, the officer who listed the items did not complete and sign a property receipt in duplicate and give the original form to the complainant and keep one copy. Instead, the blank receipt with carbon copies still attached was placed inside a manila envelope with the complainant's property. The manila envelope was not sealed and no officer wrote his name or star number on the envelope flap. The complainant's cash was placed in a cash inventory envelope. The form on the front of the cash envelope describing currency in words and numbers was left blank.

Upon release from jail, the complainant said one of his two diamond earrings, each worth \$3,000, was missing. An officer failed to comply with DGO 5.20's reporting requirements.

- b. An officer violated DGO 5.20 when he did not obtain an interpreter to explain to a LEP Spanish-speaking mother why he was taking her 13-year old daughter into custody.

The officer violated DGO 7.01 when he did not notify the mother of the process underway for her daughter, the reason for taking her daughter into custody, where she was going to be held, that she had been provided with the Miranda admonishment and that she was being taken to CARC.

The officer failed to call for a female officer.

The officer did not conduct a complete investigation in violation of DGOs 1.03 and 3.01.

The officer neglected his duties as a field training officer (FTO) in violation of DGO 1.03 and the Field Training Manual.

A sergeant violated DGO 1.04 by approving the incident report that facially showed an insufficient investigation and violations of DGO 7.01.

- c. An officer violated DGO 5.04 when he failed to prepare an incident report indicating the complainant had requested a private person's arrest.

The officer violated DGO 5.03 when he failed to issue a certificate of release when he handcuffed and then released the complainant.

- d. In violation of DGO 2.01, General Rules of Conduct, Rule 9, Misconduct and the Peace Officer Field Training Manual, Traffic Enforcement, an officer failed to include his name, star number and unit number on the citation he issued to the complainant.
- e. In violation of DGO 2.01, General Rules of Conduct, Rule 9, Misconduct, a sergeant failed to properly supervise an officer, resulting in the officer's wrongful arrest of the complainant.
- f. In violation of DGO 5.03, Investigative Detentions, an officer failed to include his signature, the time the complainant was detained and the time the complainant was released.

g. Domestic Violence Investigation and Arrest

In violation of DGO 5.20, Language Access, officers failed to obtain an interpreter for the LEP Spanish-speaking complainant.

In violation of DGO 6.09, Domestic Violence, the officers failed to properly investigate.

Officers failed to comply with DGO 7.04, Children of Arrested Parents, as they did not let the complainant explain to her children what was happening and who would care for them.

A sergeant failed to properly supervise.

Post Arrest

The sergeant who provided the DA with evidence resulting in complainant's exoneration did not complete the investigation by failing to prepare a report of the crime committed against her by her boyfriend. The sergeant also failed to provide services to the complainant as the victim of domestic violence.

Once the complainant was exonerated, an officer violated DGO 3.16 by failing to provide the complainant the incident report or explaining how public safety would be harmed if it were released.

An officer failed to comply with DGO 5.20's reporting requirements.

D. Sustained Findings for Failure to Collect Traffic Stop Data

While in the third quarter of 2015, no complaint was sustained for failure to collect traffic stop data; however, during the third quarter, one officer received an admonishment and retraining for failure to collect traffic stop data in a case the OCC sustained in the second quarter and Chief Suhr adjudicated in the third quarter of 2015.

The Chief of Police is imposing progressive discipline for officers who repeatedly fail to collect traffic stop data. The discipline generally begins with an admonishment for the first offense, but for repeated offenses, the Chief of Police has recommended that the OCC prepare charges for him to file with the Police Commission.

Dr. Lorie Fridell in her 2007 study on Fair and Impartial Policing in San Francisco discusses the importance of accurate data collection should a department

determine that it will collect traffic stop data.⁵ The Northeastern University Racial Profiling Data Collection Center cites several benefits of collecting stop data for both law enforcement and the community. The Center has found that collecting data about those who are stopped, searched, cited and arrested can⁶:

- Send a strong message to the community that the department is against racial profiling and that racial profiling is inconsistent with effective policing and equal protection
- Build trust and respect for the police in the communities they serve
- Provide departments with information about the types of stops being made by officers, the proportion of police time spent on high-discretion stops, and the results of such stops
- Help shape and develop training programs to educate officers about racial profiling and interactions with the community
- Enable the development of police and community dialogue to assess the quality and quantity of police-citizen encounters
- Allay community concerns about the activities of police
- Identify potential police misconduct and deter it when implemented as part of a comprehensive early warning system
- Retain autonomous officer discretion and allow for flexible responses in different situations

E. Chief of Police's Adjudication of OCC Sustained Cases

When the OCC Director forwards a sustained case to the Chief of Police, she can either recommend that the Chief of Police file charges with the Police Commission and, after meeting and conferring with the Police Chief the OCC Director can file charges on her own with the Police Commission if the Police Chief declines her request. Alternatively, the OCC Director can determine that a case warrants ten days or less of suspension. Sustained cases that the OCC Director determines would warrant no more than ten days of suspension are adjudicated by the Chief of Police. The Chief of Police determines whether or not to sustain the OCC's findings and what discipline to impose. During the third quarter, the Chief of Police adjudicated four OCC sustained cases as follows:⁷

1. **Neglect of Duty** – In violation of Department General Order 5.08, plainclothes officers in an unmarked vehicle made a traffic stop of the complainant that did not meet the exceptions to the prohibition against plainclothes officers making traffic stops. Those exceptions include the officer engaging in an activity related to an ongoing investigation or regulated vehicle enforcement, e.g., taxicabs, shuttle buses or limousines or when the officer witnesses an aggravated situation requiring immediate action to protect life or property, e.g., drunk driving. Moreover, even if the stop had met the exceptions, the officers failed to call for a marked backup unit. The officers also failed to collect traffic stop data.

Additionally, the officers initiated a pursuit of the complainant's vehicle when the complainant drove away from the officers after initially stopping. Pursuant to DGO 5.05 a pursuit can be justified when the individual is suspected of a felony or there is an articulable belief that the individual needs to be immediately apprehended because of the risk the individual poses to public safety. **The officers received admonishments and retraining for failure to contact Dispatch for a marked backup unit, for failure to notify Dispatch of the pursuit and for failure to collect traffic stop data.**

2. **Neglect of Duty** – In violation of Department Bulletin 14-0459, an officer failed to collect traffic stop data. **The officer received an admonishment and retraining.**
3. **Neglect of Duty** – While investigating graffiti vandalism allegedly caused by a 13-year old who was taken into custody, a Field Training Officer failed to comply with DGO 7.01, Juvenile Policies, 5.20, Language Access for Limited English Proficient persons, DGOs 1.03, 2.01 and 3.01, investigations, maintaining knowledge, and responsibilities, and the Field Training Officer manual for failing to remediate his recruit's unfamiliarity with various department general orders. A sergeant violated DGO 3.01 for failing to properly review and order remediation of deficiencies in the incident report and the conduct of the investigation. **The officer and sergeant each received an admonishment and retraining.**
4. **Conduct Reflecting Discredit** – In violation of Department General Order 2.01, Public Courtesy, an officer in expressing disbelief of complainant's explanation that the complainant double parked, not complainant's girlfriend who had slid into the driver's seat while complainant ran an errand, said to the complainant, "If you think you

were driving, you were tweaking.” During his interview, the officer acknowledged “tweaking” was a derogatory term for methamphetamine use but stated he did not mean it in a derogatory manner. **The officer was admonished and retrained.**

IV. COMPLAINTS OF NOTE

A. Detention of a Disabled Man with Prosthetic Leg

In the third quarter 2015, the OCC received numerous complaints regarding SFPD’s detention of a man with prosthetic leg. An 11-minute video of the incident was posted on numerous websites.

B. Officer-Involved Shootings

At the end of the third quarter 2015, the OCC concluded its investigation of an officer-involved shooting. Another officer-involved shooting complaint remained open at the end of the third quarter.

C. Single Room Occupancy Hotels

At the end of the third quarter 2015, the OCC continued to investigate two complaints filed in 2011 involving multiple officers regarding unlawful entries and searches of single room occupancy (SRO) hotel rooms. Other allegations in these complaints include unlawful search of persons, unlawful detentions and arrests, failure to properly process property including laptops and cameras, failure to investigate, failure to supervise and inappropriate behavior.

D. Complaint Regarding SFPD’s Crime Lab

At the end of the third quarter 2015, the OCC concluded its investigation of a complaint from a sexual assault victim who complained about SFPD’s failure to promptly process evidence. No allegations were sustained; however, the investigation revealed policy failures that resulted in several policy recommendations that are found in Appendix 18 of this report.

E. Wheelchair Incident

At the end of the third quarter 2015, the OCC continued to investigate a complaint regarding an alleged mistreatment of a physically disabled man in a wheelchair in Visitacion Valley. The interaction between the police and the disabled man was captured on video.

F. San Francisco Woman Shot and Killed by Her Ex-boyfriend

At the end of third quarter 2015, the OCC continued to investigate a complaint regarding a San Francisco woman who was shot and killed by her ex-boyfriend before he fatally turned the gun on himself. The woman was shot in her home from which other calls for help had been made prior to her murder.

G. San Francisco Deputy Public Defender's Arrest at the Hall of Justice

In the end of the third quarter 2015, the OCC continued to investigate complaints regarding an incident that occurred at the Hall of Justice between an officer and a San Francisco Deputy Public Defender Attorney.

H. Racist and Homophobic Text Messages by SFPD Officers

At the end of the third quarter 2015, the OCC continued to investigate a complaint regarding racist and homophobic text messages by members of the San Francisco Police Department.

I. Baby Bjorn Bicycle Incident

At the end of the third quarter 2015, the OCC continued to investigate a complaint regarding a man who filed a lawsuit accusing San Francisco police officers of wrongfully arresting the man and forcibly taking his 10-month-old son from him after stopping him for riding his bike with his child strapped to his chest in a Baby Bjorn.

J. Department General Order 8.10 Guideline for First Amendment Activities, Complaint

At the end of the third quarter, the OCC continued to investigate a complaint regarding a man questioned by a Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Agent and a member of the San Francisco Police Department regarding a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request that the man had filed concerning his recent travel issues.

K. Complaint Filed by a San Francisco Department Head against a Lieutenant

At the end of the third quarter, the OCC concluded its mediation of a complaint from a San Francisco Department Head regarding an alleged battery committed by an SFPD lieutenant during a meeting.

V. STATUS OF CURRENT OCC CASES – THE 'KEANE' REPORT

By the end of the 2015 third quarter, staff had completed intake on all its 2014 cases and had closed 95% of them, leaving 5% of the 2014 cases pending. At the end of the 2014 third quarter, staff had also completed intake on all its 2013 cases, and had closed 97% of them, leaving 3% of the 2013 cases pending.

VI. LEGAL UNIT

Four attorneys staff the OCC's Legal Unit under the supervision of Executive Director Joyce Hicks. Attorneys Ines Vargas Fraenkel and R. Manuel Fortes are the OCC's two trial attorneys but they also conduct sustainability reviews and review

sustained reports for form and legality, prepare legal opinions and manage records requests including subpoenas, Pitchess motions and Sunshine Ordinance and Public Records Act requests. Attorney Donna Salazar staffs the OCC's mediation and outreach programs and her work is outlined in sections VII and VIII of this report. Attorney Samara Marion conducts the OCC's policy work and also conducts sustainability reviews and reviews sustained reports for form and legality. Her policy work is outlined in section IX.

The OCC's trial attorneys prosecute police misconduct cases in matters investigated and determined by the OCC to be misconduct or failure to perform a required action. They present cases to the Police Chief when officers object to proposed discipline of up to ten days suspension. They present cases before the Police Commission when the proposed discipline is greater than ten days suspension up through termination.

During the third quarter, Attorney Manny Fortes appeared in four Chief's Hearings in two OCC Cases. All of the discipline imposed was sustained after the Chief's Hearings, including:

1. Three officers received disciplinary reprimands arising out of the arrest and injury of a minor.
2. One officer received a disciplinary reprimand for failure to prepare an incident report arising out of a pet owner dispute.

As part of their duties, the Legal Unit's two trial attorneys also review and edit sustained reports after a matter has been investigated and one or more allegations are deemed sustainable. During the third quarter, the Legal Unit reviewed, revised, and submitted three sustained reports, each of which involved one or more sustained allegations against one or more officers. They also provided legal opinions for three complaints.⁸ Additionally, they advised staff on a subpoena duces tecum.

VII. MEDIATION

In the third quarter of 2015, the OCC completed twelve mediations compared to nine in 2014. At the end of the third quarter 2015, the OCC had mediated 41 cases compared to 39 in 2014.

During the third quarter of 2015, 34 officers were considered for mediation. Seven of those officers or 20% were ineligible. Of the officers who were offered mediation, no officers declined compared to 4% during the same period in 2014. Of the 24 complainants offered mediation, 10 or 42% agreed to mediate.

During the third quarter of 2015, the Mediation Coordinator was contacted by a representative of the Los Angeles Sheriff's Independent Monitor's officer regarding instituting a mediation program there. In July, the Coordinator offered an orientation for ten new mediators enlarging the pool of volunteers who generously provide their services.

The Mediation Program continues to provide a forum for officers and civilians to have a frank discussion regarding the complaint, as well as serves as an educational experience for all participants.

VIII. OUTREACH

During the third quarter of 2015, the OCC engaged in the following activities:

Director Hicks and Attorney Marion met with the Executive Director of Justice Strategies to discuss the OCC's mission, procedures and policy work.

Throughout the third quarter Director Hicks continued meeting with the body worn camera working group initiated by San Francisco Police Commission President Suzy Loftus. Director Hicks attended the Police Commission hearing on body cameras on September 16, 2015, at the Korean Community Center. She opined in her presentation on body cameras that in limited circumstances, to preserve an officer's recollection of an event, the officer should give a statement first, then view the recording and provide a supplemental statement.⁹ Attorney Manny Fortes and Deputy

The draft DGO would permit an officer to review recording prior to an Internal Affairs Division interview and prior to an OCC interview, except under those early circumstances I've discussed." Director Hicks continued that the OCC "have concerns with this because an officer not intending to testify in matters he/she did not see, hear, or otherwise experience could be unconsciously influenced by viewing the recording in advance of the interview." Director Hicks then read quotes from the NY Attorney General.

Director Hicks stated that "the OCC recommends the following: In addition to the limitations already in the draft DGO around criminal investigations, officer-involved shootings, and in-custody deaths, there be additional language which provide when an officer is notified by OCC, Internal Affairs Division, or

Director Erick Baltazar also attended body worn camera working group meetings. Director Hicks attended Police Commission meetings on July 22, August 5 and August 19. Additionally, she presented the OCC's Second Quarter 2015 report at the Police Commission's September 9, 2015 meeting. Deputy Director Baltazar attended the July 8, 2015 Police Commission meeting in Director Hicks' absence.

Deputy Director Baltazar and Investigator Candace Miles-Threatt Carpenter gave presentations to one class of recruits and a group of cadets at the Police Academy.

OCC representatives staffed a table at the National Night Out festivities in the Western Addition. Senior Investigator McMahon, Mediation Coordinator Salazar, and Investigators Cole and Dolese visited the National Night Out observations in several other districts.

During this quarter, OCC staffed information booths at a Homeless Connect event as well as Back-to-School events in the Bayview and Western Addition neighborhoods.

Attorney Manny Fortes made a presentation regarding the functions of the OCC to a class at Santa Clara Law School. He also participated in a panel discussion regarding police interaction with youth at the Black Family Day event at Mission High School.

In August, the Mediation and Outreach Coordinator Salazar was contacted by the Denver Office of the Independent Monitor regarding the OCC Outreach Strategic Plan and activities. She also offered a presentation about the OCC to a group of seniors in the Bayview District and represented the OCC at the District Attorney's Summit Race and Justice.

the District Attorney, that the officer is subject to or witness in a misconduct investigation, the officer not be permitted to review the recordings in advance of the interview, but, after giving the statement, the officer should be permitted to review the video and offer a supplemental statement. And to avoid what some have referred to as the "gotcha" effect most importantly for fairness when determining truthfulness inconsistencies should be reviewed under the standard of intent and materiality. In non-disciplinary matters, in matters not involving in-custody deaths, officer-involved shootings, or criminal investigations, when an officer prepares a narrative of an incident in his/her own words, then the officer should first prepare it in his/her own words before viewing the video and then be permitted to prepare a supplemental." San Francisco Police Commission Minutes of 09.16.2015 meeting.

Throughout the third quarter, Director Hicks and Attorney Manny Fortes continued attending the San Francisco Bar Association's monthly Criminal Justice Task Force meetings. The Director and Attorney Fortes met regularly with the civilian oversight subcommittee and Attorney Fortes also met regularly with the data collection subcommittee.

IX. POLICY ANALYSIS

Policy work is an essential aspect of the Office of Citizen Complaint's mission. The San Francisco City Charter requires the OCC to present quarterly recommendations concerning SFPD's policies or practices that enhance police-community relations while ensuring effective police services. While traditionally policy attorney Samara Marion leads the OCC's policy work, throughout the third quarter, as more particularly described in section VIII of this report, Director Hicks led the OCC's body worn camera policy work as a member of the Body Camera Working Group and as a presenter to the San Francisco Police Commission on the adoption of a draft San Francisco Police Department General Order on Body Worn Cameras. Attorney Marion's policy work during the third quarter focused on language access, sexual assault protocols, and formulating recommendations based on the President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing.

Throughout the third quarter, the OCC continued its language access policy work. The OCC meets monthly with domestic violence and sexual assault service providers, language access advocates, city agencies, Police Commissioner Sonia Melara, and the Police Department, a practice the OCC initiated in 2012 to enhance language access services. Based on the OCC's recommendation in partnership with language access advocates, the Department issued a Priority "A" Department Bulletin that establishes a written procedure for translating statements from Limited English Proficient victims, witnesses and suspects. Pursuant to Department Bulletin 15-171, officers are now required to ensure that written statements and other documents in a foreign language are translated into English prior to filing an incident report and booking the document into evidence.

During the third quarter the OCC also made recommendations concerning the Department's sexual assault protocols. The OCC investigated a complaint from a sexual assault victim in which the evidence established that during a period of twenty-two months, the Department did not contact the victim, reassigned her case to a new inspector after the original inspector was transferred, or obtain the results of DNA testing until the victim complained. To enhance communication with sexual assault victims, the OCC recommends that the Department develop and implement a procedure that notifies sexual assault victims at least every 60 days on the status of their case.


To establish clear timelines for the testing of sexual assault forensic evidence, the OCC recommends that the Department develop and implement procedures that comply with the 2014 amendments to Penal Code §680, the “Sexual Assault Victims’ DNA Bill of Rights.” These procedures require crime labs receiving sexual assault forensic evidence on or after January 1, 2016, to process sexual assault forensic evidence, create DNA profiles when able, and upload qualifying DNA profiles into CODIS as soon as practically possible, but no later than 120 days after initially receiving the evidence. Alternately, a crime lab can transmit the sexual assault forensic evidence to another crime lab as soon as practically possible, but no later than 30 days after initially receiving the evidence for processing of the evidence for the presence of DNA. Additionally, the OCC recommends that annually, the Department present a written report to the Police Commission about its collection and testing of DNA evidence in sexual assault cases, including its compliance with the forensic evidence collection and processing deadlines of Penal Code §680.

In September, after reviewing the President Task Force’s Reports on 21st Century Policing, the Office of Citizen Complaints made recommendations to the San Francisco Police Department to strengthen police-community relations. The OCC’s nineteen recommendations cover a number of topics such as detention and consent procedures, training, use of force data, and searches of transgender individuals, to name a few. The OCC and SFPD are currently discussing these recommendations. “OCC’s Recommendations to Enhance Police-Community Relations in Response to the President’s Task Force on 21st Century Policing” is included in this quarterly report as Appendix 1.

X. CONCLUSION

Despite staffing constraints the OCC remained committed to its mission to investigate civilian complaints of police misconduct or failure to perform a duty promptly, fairly, and impartially.

Recommendations to Enhance Police-Community Relations in Response to the President’s Task Force on 21st Century Policing

Introduction

Responding to nation-wide events about police-community relations, on December 18, 2014, President Barack Obama signed an Executive Order establishing the Task Force on 21st Century Policing. The President’s Task Force’s mission was to “examine how to foster strong, collaborative relationships between local law enforcement and the communities they protect and to make recommendations to the President on how police practices can promote effective crime reduction while building public trust.”¹ During January and February 2015, the President’s Task Force held seven sessions in Washington D.C., Phoenix, Arizona and Cincinnati, Ohio and received testimony and recommendations from over 100 law enforcement officers and executives, community members, civic leaders, advocates, researchers and academics. Releasing an interim and then final report in May 2015, the President’s Task Force on 21st Century Policing sets forth 59 recommendations and 92 action items in the following six areas to strengthen trust between law enforcement and the communities they serve:

- Building Trust and Legitimacy
- Policy and Oversight
- Technology and Media
- Community Policing and Crime Reduction
- Officer Training and Education
- Officer Safety and Wellness

After reviewing the President’s Task Force’s Interim and Final Reports, in September 2015, the Office of Citizen Complaints made recommendations to the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) to strengthen police-community relations. The OCC’s recommendations cover a number of topics such as detention and consent procedures, training, use of force data, and searches of transgender individuals, to name a few. The OCC’s recommendations are outlined below and include the President’s Task Force recommendations for reference. The OCC and SFPD are currently discussing these recommendations.

Recommendations

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 1.1 RECOMMENDATION: Law enforcement culture should embrace a guardian mindset to build public trust and legitimacy. Toward that end, police and sheriffs' departments should adopt procedural justice as the guiding principle for internal and external policies and practices to guide their interactions with the citizens they serve.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 2.11 RECOMMENDATION: Law enforcement agencies should adopt policies requiring officers to identify themselves by their full name, rank, and command (as applicable) and provide the information in writing to individuals they have stopped. In addition, policies should require officers to state the reason for the stop and the reason for the search if one is conducted.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 2.11.1 ACTION ITEM: One example of how to do this is for law enforcement officers to carry business cards containing their name, rank, command, and contact information that would enable individuals to offer suggestions or commendations or to file complaints with the appropriate individual, office, or board. These cards would be easily distributed in all encounters.

OCC Recommendation No.1: SFPD Should Incorporate Procedural Justice Language Into Its Department General Orders Such As DGOs 5.03 (Detentions), 5.17 (Biased Policing), and 2.01 (General Rules of Conduct) By Requiring Officers To Explain Why An Individual Has Been Detained Or Searched and Provide In Writing The Officer's Name, Contact Information, and the Complaint/Commendation Process.

The President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing emphasizes that "procedural justice" is essential to strengthening police-community relations. Procedural justice involves four central principles: 1) treating people with dignity and respect; 2) giving individuals "voice" during encounters; 3) being neutral and transparent in decision making; and 4) conveying trustworthy motives.² Procedural justice principles are at the heart of the President's Task Force's recommendations that police adopt policies requiring officers to explain why an individual has been detained or searched. Procedural justice also shapes the Task Force's recommendation that officers provide in writing their name and contact information that enables individuals to offer suggestions, commendations or to file a complaint.

The OCC recommends SFPD incorporates procedural justice language into its Department Bulletins and its Department General Orders so procedural justice concepts are

explicitly defined and included. For example, DGO 5.03 (Investigative Detentions) does not instruct officers to explain to the detained individual the reason for the police stop. DGO 5.17 (Policy Prohibiting Biased Policing) states officers "should" explain the reason for their detention though it does not require officers to do so. Although DGO 2.01(14) states, "when requested, officers shall promptly and politely provide their name, star number and assignment" this DGO requires the individual to ask for the officer's name, a request some individuals would find intimidating or not know they could make. None of these DGOs require during police encounters officers provide in writing their name and contact information that includes how to file a commendation or complaint.

The OCC suggests SFPD issue a Department Bulletin setting forth the legal standards for a detention, search, and consensual encounter and requires officers to state the reason for their stop and/or search as outlined in the Task Force's Recommendation 2.11. The OCC also suggests this Department Bulletin require officers to provide in writing their name and contact information that includes how to file a commendation or complaint as recommended by the President's Task Force. The Task Force suggested officers carry business cards with this information. The OCC recommends SFPD adopt the Task Force's suggestion or alternatively revise SFPD's "Protecting Our City, Knowing Our Rights"³ to include the OCC's contact information and a space for officers to write their name, rank, and contact information.

The issuance of a Department Bulletin outlining the above-mentioned procedures would incorporate procedural justice concepts by requiring officers to take the time to explain the reason for their actions and enabling community members to have a better understanding of their rights during such encounters. The OCC also recommends Department General Orders 5.17, 5.03, and 2.01 along with SFPD manuals and training materials be amended to incorporate these requirements and officers be provided training on these changes.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 1.3 RECOMMENDATION: Law enforcement agencies should establish a culture of transparency and accountability in order to build public trust and legitimacy. This will help ensure decision-making is understood and in accord with stated policy.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 1.3.1 ACTION ITEM: To embrace a culture of transparency, law enforcement agencies should make all departmental policies available for public review and regularly post on SFPD's website information about stops, summonses, arrest, reported crime, and other law enforcement data aggregated by demographics.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 2.2 RECOMMENDATION: Law enforcement agencies should have comprehensive policies on the use of force that include training, investigations,

prosecutions, data collection, and information sharing. These policies must be clear, concise, and openly available for public inspection.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 2.6 RECOMMENDATION: Law enforcement agencies should be encouraged to collect, maintain, and analyze demographic data on all detentions (stops, frisks, searches, summons and arrests). This data should be disaggregated by school and non-school contacts.

OCC Recommendation No.2: SFPD Should Design a Form To Collect Information on Use of Force Incidents Systematically and Electronically.

OCC Recommendation No.3: SFPD Should Post Monthly Its Use of Force Data On Its Website.

OCC Recommendation No.4: SFPD Should Analyze and Report Its Use of Force Data Annually to the Police Commission.

The OCC recommends SFPD provide comprehensive statistics and analysis concerning its use of force data—a practice it has done in prior years. (See for example, SFPD's 2002 Use of Force and Officer Assault Review; also see SFPD's study on Five Years of Officer-Involved Shootings (January 20, 2010).) The OCC recommends SFPD adopt a use of force form so such information is collected systematically and electronically in all cases. The OCC suggests on a monthly basis SFPD post on its website comprehensive use of force statistics and analysis. Statistics and analysis should include the type of force, the type and degree of officer and/or suspect injury, time of day, location of the incident/use of force, unit/station, officer demographics (age, gender, race, rank, number of years with SFPD, number of years as a police officer) and suspect demographics including race/ethnicity, age, gender, gender identity, primary language and other factors such as mental illness, cognitive impairment, developmental disability, drug and alcohol use/addiction and homelessness. The OCC recommends annually SFPD issue a comprehensive Use of Force report that is available to the public and presented to the Police Commission. The OCC suggests SFPD's 2002 "Use of Force and Officer Assault Review" report be used as an example of the type of data collection and analysis SFPD provide on its website and in its yearly report.

OCC Recommendation No.5: SFPD Should Re-Examine its Policies, Training and Evaluation of Force Incidents In Light of the California Supreme Court Decision Hayes v. San Diego (2013) 57 Cal.4th 622.

The OCC recommends SFPD re-examine its policies, training, and analysis of use of force incidents in light of the California Supreme Court decision Hayes v. San Diego (2013) 57 Cal.4th 622. In Hayes, the California Supreme Court ruled under California negligence law, the tactical conduct and decisions preceding an officer's use of deadly force are relevant considerations in determining whether the use of deadly force is reasonable. The OCC recommends in all cases involving deadly force SFPD evaluate the tactical conduct and decisions preceding an officer's use of deadly force and this analysis be included in any evaluation of the incident. The OCC also suggests SFPD revise its use of force policies and training to include consideration of the tactical conduct and decisions preceding an officer's use of deadly force.

OCC Recommendation No.6: SFPD Should Post Monthly its Data Concerning Car, Bicycle and Pedestrian Stops on its Website.

OCC Recommendation No.7: SFPD Should Analyze Its Data Concerning Car, Bicycle and Pedestrian Stops and Report Its Analysis of the Data Annually to the Police Commission.

SFPD currently collects data concerning car, bicycle and pedestrian stops. (See e.g. Department Bulletin 14-059, "Traffic Stop Data Collection Program"). To provide transparency, the OCC recommends SFPD post on a monthly basis its traffic stop data. The OCC also recommends SFPD annually analyze this data and provide its analysis of the data in a public report for presentation to the Police Commission.

OCC Recommendation No.8: Institute A Quarterly Meeting Between OCC and SFPD To Identify Training, Policy, and Procedure Recommendations Arising From Disciplinary Cases.

To address training, policy, and procedure issues discovered during the investigation and disciplinary process of police misconduct cases, the OCC recommends a quarterly meeting with the Chief, the Deputy Chief of Staff, Officer-in-Charge of Risk Management, the Police Academy Captain, the OCC Director and the OCC policy attorney to discuss the OCC's police misconduct cases of the previous quarter that resulted in a sustained, policy or training failure finding. The goal of this meeting is to evaluate whether any training, policy or procedure of SFPD needs to be revised, added or re-issued and if so, to make written recommendations that include the manner in which the recommendations can be implemented and a timeline for completion.

OCC Recommendation No.9: SFPD Should Post Its Department Bulletins On Its Website.

SFPD currently posts its Department General Orders online, a practice instituted in response to the OCC's 2007 recommendation. Because Department Bulletins often contain important policing procedures and policies, the OCC recommends Department Bulletins also be posted on SFPD's website.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 1.3.2 ACTION ITEM: When serious incidents occur, including those involving alleged police misconduct, agencies should communicate with citizens and the media swiftly, openly, and neutrally, respecting areas where the law requires confidentiality.

OCC Recommendation No.10: SFPD Should Institutionalize Its Practice of Holding a Community Meeting Following An Officer-Involved Shooting By Revising DGO 8.11.

After every officer-involved shooting, the Chief convenes a community meeting in the district where the shooting occurred. To institutionalize this important practice, the OCC recommends DGO 8.11 be amended to state within 10 days of an officer-involved shooting resulting in a fatality, the Chief of Police will notify the public and convene a meeting at a location within the affected community to provide whatever factual information SFPD can release and answer any questions and/or address concerns the public may have.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 1.5.3 ACTION ITEM: Law enforcement agencies should create opportunities in schools and communities for positive, non-enforcement interactions with police. Agencies should also publicize the beneficial outcomes and images of positive, trust-building partnerships and initiatives.

OCC Recommendation No.11: SFPD Should Partner With Youth Organizations To Make Presentations At Middle And High Schools On "Know Your Rights" For Youth.

The OCC recommends SFPD in partnership with youth organizations, such as the Youth Commission, make presentations at high schools and middle schools on "Know Your Rights" for youth. These informal presentations would foster a positive manner to interact with middle and high school students, provide students with the "Know Your Rights for Youth in San Francisco" brochure that youth advocacy groups, the OCC, the Youth Commission and SFPD coauthored and answer questions that youth may have about their rights, the law and policing.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 1.5.4 ACTION ITEM: Use of physical control equipment and techniques against vulnerable populations – including children, elderly persons, pregnant women, people with physical and mental disabilities, limited English proficiency, and others – can undermine public trust and should be used as a last resort. Law enforcement agencies should carefully consider and review their policies towards these populations and adopt policies if none are in place.

OCC Recommendation No.12: Provide More Resources To The CIT Program To Address Its Increased Training And Administrative Demands.

SFPD has been innovative in issuance of Department Bulletins on handling mental health crisis calls and the extensive work SFPD has done in partnership with the Mental Health Working Group to implement a Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) approach to mental health crisis calls for service. To enhance CIT's effectiveness, the OCC recommends SFPD dedicate more resources to address the increasing training and administrative demands of the CIT program. The OCC also recommends SFPD prioritize the collection of CIT data so information such as the types of service calls, dispatch time and outcomes can be analyzed to evaluate the program.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 1.9.2 ACTION ITEM: Law enforcement agencies should ensure reasonable and equitable language access for all persons who have encounters with police or who enter the criminal justice system.

OCC Recommendation No.13: SFPD Should Provide Interpreter Training to Bilingual Officers, Language Recertification For Bilingual Officers and Civilians, and Certification in Translation.

SFPD has been on the forefront of promoting language services by implementing a Department General Order on language services, having an extensive group of certified bilingual officers, and meeting with the OCC and language access stakeholders monthly to address language access concerns.

To further enhance language services, the OCC recommends SFPD provide interpreter training for its bilingual officers as required by DGO 5.20. For several years, the OCC and language access stakeholders have also recommended SFPD obtain assistance from SFPD or Human Resources to provide bilingual recertification of sworn officers and civilian employees every 2-3 years. Because language proficiency is a perishable skill, recertification is a best practice. Additionally, SFPD does not yet test officers on their ability to translate a written statement in a foreign language into English. Translation is a different skill than oral interpretation. SFPD need certified officer translators because Department Bulletin 15-171 requires the translation of foreign language statements and documents before the completion of an incident report.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE 1.6.1 ACTION ITEM: Research conducted to evaluate the effectiveness of crime fighting strategies should specifically look at the potential for collateral damage of any given strategy on community trust and legitimacy.

OCC Recommendation No.14: SFPD Should Include Input From The OCC and Civilian Complaints When Evaluating The Effectiveness of Crime Fighting Strategies.

The OCC recommends SFPD's tracking and evaluation of crime-fighting strategies also include the OCC's input and evaluation of complaints arising from these strategies. For example, the OCC has had several complaints concerning plainclothes units conducting traffic enforcement stops that did not qualify under Department General Order 5.08 as an ongoing investigation or an aggravated situation requiring immediate action to protect life or property. In addition to violating Department General Order 5.08, these strategies did not result in the discovery of contraband and undermined community trust because the traffic enforcement actions appeared arbitrary and petty.

2.3 RECOMMENDATION: Law enforcement agencies are encouraged to implement non-punitive peer review of critical incidents separate from criminal and administrative investigations.

OCC Recommendation No.15: SFPD Should Include The OCC In Its Development of a Non-Punitive Lessons Learned Approach to Reviewing Serious Incidents.

The OCC applauds SFPD for developing a non-punitive lessons learned approach to reviewing serious incidents. The OCC suggests it be included during the review process so that the OCC has an opportunity to contribute to training recommendations arising from these serious incidents.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 2.10 RECOMMENDATION: Law enforcement officers should be required to seek consent before a search and explain that a person has the right to refuse consent when there is no warrant or probable cause. Furthermore, officers should ideally obtain written acknowledgement that they have sought consent to a search in these circumstances.

OCC Recommendation No.16: SFPD Should Modify Its Written Consent to Search Policy to Include Consent Searches of the Person and the Person's Effects.

Pursuant to Department General Order 15-136 (Consent Searches of Private Residences), officers are required to obtain written consent when searching a residence. To comply with the President's Task Force Recommendation 2.10 that officers should be required to seek consent before a search and explain that a person has the right to refuse consent when there is no warrant or probable cause, the OCC recommends SFPD's written consent to search policy include

consent searches of the person and the person's effects in addition to its current policy on residential searches.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 2.11 RECOMMENDATION: Law enforcement agencies should establish search and seizure procedures related to LGBTQ and transgender populations and adopt as policy the recommendation from the President's HIV/AIDS Task Force to cease using the possession of condoms as the sole evidence of vice⁴.

OCC Recommendation No.17: SFPD Should Establish A Written Procedure For Searching Transgender Individuals.

The OCC recommends SFPD establish a written procedure for searching transgender individuals. Department Bulletin 13-258 provides many important procedures for police interactions with transgender individuals though it does not address how to search a transgender individual. DB 13-158 explains how to address transgender individuals appropriately, prohibits detentions based on one's appearance or gender identity alone, prohibits searches to determine a detainee's gender, prohibits detaining a transgender arrestee in a district station's holding cell, and requires notification to dispatch of the starting and ending mileage when an officer transports a transgender individual. However, Department Bulletin 13-158 does not address the procedure officers should follow if they need to conduct a search of a transgender individual. The OCC recommends in collaboration with transgender officers, community stakeholders, the OCC, and other relevant subject matter experts, SFPD develop a written policy for conducting a search of transgender individuals.

PRESIDENT'S TASK FORCE: 5.2 RECOMMENDATION: Law enforcement agencies should engage community members in the training process.

OCC Recommendation No.18: SFPD Should Incorporate Community Members Especially from African-American, Asian, Latino, Youth, Immigrant, Muslim, and LGBTQ Communities in the Development of Training Curriculum and as Presenters during Officer Training.

Community members from populations that have historically distrusted law enforcement have invaluable experiences and perspectives to share that will deepen officers' understanding of the various types of people and cultures they will encounter. As highlighted over a decade ago in Police Executive Research Forum's report *Racially Biased Policing: A Principled Response*, "[p]ersonal testimonials from minorities who have suffered from the effects of racial profiling or other forms of racial bias in policing can be effective in personalizing the problem and emphasizing the real harm caused to real people. Police personnel need to hear how racially biased actions can have profoundly damaging and long-lasting effects on citizens." (See

A well designed officer training seminar led by an experienced instructor that includes community members provides an ideal environment to discuss the stereotypes, misconceptions and biases we all have. The OCC suggests SFPD include community members—especially from African American, Asian, Latinos, youth, immigrant, Muslims and LGBTQ communities—in the development of training curriculum and also as participants and presenters during officer training.

OCC Recommendation No.19: SFPD Should Provide Recruits, Patrol Officers, Sergeants, and Field Training Officers Training Specific to Police Interactions with Youth.

The OCC recommends SFPD provide training designed to address police interactions with youth, including information about the juvenile brain, the impact of trauma on children and youth, and de-escalation tactics tailored to youth-police interactions. SFPD does not currently provide this type of training. When President Obama issued his Executive Order to create the 21st Century Policing Taskforce, he noted too many individuals, particularly young people of color, do not feel they are being treated fairly.⁵ Police training designed to provide officers an understanding of the experiences and challenges of youth—particularly youth of color—is imperative. The OCC suggests a core component of this curriculum involve scenario-based training in which recruits, patrol officers, sergeants, and field training officers are required to learn and practice de-escalation tactics to address common interactions between youth and law enforcement.

A.	Neglect of Duty	<p>In a sexual assault case, the complainant alleged the officer had failed to properly investigate her case and communicate with her about the status of the investigation. The evidence indicates during the first two months the officer assigned to the complainant’s case pursued several investigative leads. Initially the named officer made reasonable efforts to investigate the complainant’s case and to maintain contact with the complainant.</p> <p>The officer submitted the complainant’s sexual assault kit for testing approximately five weeks after the incident which predated the passage of San Francisco Administrative Code section 2A.89 entitled “Implementing the California Sexual Assault Victims’ DNA Bill of Rights.” Section 2A.89 required by March 1, 2011, the Police Chief implement procedures for collecting and testing DNA evidence in sexual assault cases, including the testing of DNA evidence obtained from a healthcare provider within not more than fourteen days of receipt. Subsequently, the officer collected a DNA sample but did not submit it for testing. Only after the complainant asked about the status of her case six months after the incident did another inspector submit the DNA evidence for testing. When the officer transferred to another unit, the complainant’s case was not reassigned to another investigator. For almost two years, there was no follow up on the results of the complainant’s sexual assault kit.</p> <p>The OCC recommends SFPD develop and implement procedures that comply with the 2014 amendments to Penal Code section 680, the “Sexual Assault Victims’ DNA Bill of Rights.” Under these procedures, sexual assault forensic evidence received by a law enforcement agency on or after January 1, 2016, should be submitted to the crime lab within 20 days after it is booked into evidence. Crime labs are also required to process sexual assault forensic evidence, create DNA profiles when able, and upload qualifying DNA profiles into CODIS as soon as practically possible, but no later than 120 days after initially receiving the evidence. Alternately, a crime lab can transmit the sexual assault forensic evidence to another crime lab as soon as practically possible but no later than 30 days after initially receiving the evidence for processing of the evidence for the presence of DNA. These procedures should also include the rights of sexual assault victims as set forth in Penal Code section 680.</p> <p>The OCC also recommends SFPD adopt a procedure to notify sexual assault victims at least every 60 days on case status including any change in the name and contact information of their investigator, whether a DNA profile of the assailant was obtained from the testing of the rape kit evidence or other crime scene evidence, whether the DNA profile of the assailant developed from the rape kit evidence or other crime scene evidence has been entered into SFPD of Justice Data Bank, and whether there is a match between the DNA profile developed from the rape kit evidence or other crime scene evidence and a DNA profile contained in SFPD of Justice Convicted Offender DNA Data Base provided that disclosure would not impede or compromise an ongoing investigation.</p> <p>The OCC also recommends SFPD present an annual written report to the Police Commission about its DNA evidence collection and testing in sexual assault cases, including its compliance with Penal Code section 680 forensic evidence processing and collection deadlines.</p>





Days to Close - Cases Closed Third Quarter 2015




Average Days to Close: 177, Median: 169

Days to Close - Cases Closed Third Quarter 2014








Status of OCC Cases - Year 2014




Status of OCC Cases - Year 2015





OCC Caseloads by Investigator as of 09/30/2015





OCC Caseloads by Investigator as of 09/30/2014





OCC Case Closures - Third Quarter 2015 by Investigator






OCC Weighted Closures - Third Quarter 2015 by Investigator

CASE COMPLEXITY WEIGHTED ON A 1 TO 5 SCALE


OCC Weighted Closures - Third Quarter 2014 by Investigator



State Senators from odd-numbered districts of the 40 senatorial districts of the State;


Members of the Assembly from each of the 80 assembly districts of the State; and

FY 2014-15 Annual Overtime Report

January 11, 2016

Administrative Code Section 18.13-1(a) requires the Controller to submit overtime reports to the Board of Supervisors at the time of the Six-month and Nine-month Budget Status Reports, and annually. The Controller is required to identify the five highest overtime user departments and report on the cause and potential mitigation for any excessive overtime spending, compliance with the maximum thresholds for overtime as a percentage of total hours worked, and compliance with the maximum total hours worked per week. This annual report addresses maximum hours worked per pay period, overtime budgets and actual expenditures, and includes an analysis of overtime use and recommendations to address overtime usage.

Highlights

During fiscal year (FY) 2014-15, overtime use by City departments increased by 4.1% from the prior year, from 2.9 million hours to 3.0 million hours, while overtime spending as percentage of citywide spending increased from 1.8% to 2.0%. City departments spent \$184.9 million on overtime, which is \$17.2 million or 10.3% more than revised overtime budgets, and \$12.0 million or 6.9% more than was spent in FY 2013-14. The spending increase is a result of annual wage growth and an increase in overtime hours. Overtime hours and overtime spending as percentage of citywide spending remained below the prior ten-year high in FY 2007-08 of 3.1 million hours, and 2.5% of spending.

The Controller's Office recommends a review of provisions in some Memoranda of Understanding (MOU) regarding use of seniority in overtime scheduling, which may reduce the concentration of overtime hours worked by small groups of employees. We also recommend management practices that might reduce overtime spending and improve overtime management, including: increased hiring in certain job classes; allocating overtime hours at the beginning of the year at the division or program level within departments; and evaluation of absenteeism and leave use to enforce attendance policies.

The five City departments that used the most overtime, the Municipal Transportation Agency, and the Fire, Police, Public Health, and Sheriff's departments, collectively account for 85% of Citywide overtime expenditures. Details of overtime spending for other departments are included in Appendix 1. Highlights of the top user departments include:

- **Sheriff's Department:** Between FY 2013-14 and FY 2014-15, overtime spending increased 41%, from \$10.5 million to \$14.8 million, overtime hours increased 37% from 0.16 million to 0.22 million, total department Full Time Equivalent positions (FTEs) decreased 1%, and the average jail population decreased 4%. Leave hours totaled 21% of total hours and compensatory-time hours worked amounted to over 20% of the total overtime hours used, the largest respective percentages of the departments highlighted in this report.

- **Municipal Transportation Agency (MTA):** Overtime expenditures over the past 10 years have grown from \$34.0 million in FY 2005-06 to \$56.3 million in FY 2014-15, an average annual growth rate of 5.7%. Transit job classifications accounted for 63% of overtime use in FY 2014-15, with maintenance job classifications accounting for 29%. Between FY 2013-14 and FY 2014-15 MTA increased its Transit Operator and Transit Supervisor job classes by 10% or 194 FTE and 12% or 21 FTE and reduced overtime use by 2% and 4%, respectively. MTA increased its Electronic Maintenance Technician and Electrical Transit System Mechanic job classes by 7% or 7 FTE and 0.5% or 1 FTE, and increased overtime use by 6% and 19%, respectively. Continued evaluation of absenteeism and emphasis on hiring within transit and maintenance job classifications, in addition to replacing its aging fleet, may lead to decreased overtime use at the MTA.
 - **Department of Public Health (DPH):** In FY 2014-15, the average overtime expenditure per FTE at Laguna Honda Hospital (LHH) was \$4,570 and \$2,387 per FTE at San Francisco General Hospital (SFGH). The department's average hourly overtime cost, excluding benefits, is the lowest of highlighted departments at \$49.36. Adjustments to MOU provisions that would expand options to schedule staff based on criteria in addition to seniority may reduce overtime expenditures. Additionally, increased hiring in those nursing and non-nursing healthcare job classes that have experienced high overtime may reduce overtime usage.
 - **Fire Department:** From the FY 2012-13 peak of \$43.8 million, overtime expenditures have decreased over the prior two fiscal years to \$38.3 million in FY 2014-15. Overtime use is the result of deliberate management decisions to meet minimum staffing requirements in a cost-effective manner. The Fire department has increased the number of firefighters by 7% or 52 FTE since FY 2012-13. As new classes of firefighters join the workforce and FTE levels increase, overtime usage is expected to decrease relative to existing service demand levels.
- Police Department:** Overtime expenditures have decreased by 20% since the ten year high of \$41.7 million in FY 2007-08, however they have increased to \$33.2 million or 20% between FY 2013-14 and FY 2014-15, primarily due to Bay Area sports postseason and celebratory parade events, dignitary visits, and San Francisco hosted events and conferences. In FY 2014-15 32% of overtime expenditures, or \$10.5 million, was reimbursed by third party payers.

Recommendations

Recommendations to decrease the use of overtime can be made both at the department level and within MOUs between the City and employee organizations. A combination of adjustments to seniority scheduling criteria and changes in management practices that lead to overtime can reduce overtime use and expenditures.

MOU Adjustments

MOUs between some employee organizations and the City affect the use of overtime, particularly in the areas of scheduling and in round-the-clock Departmental operations. The Controller's Office recommends that the Department of Human Resources identify ways to decrease use of overtime through changes to MOU provisions. These changes could include, but are not limited to, review of mandatory minimum staffing levels and adjustment of seniority scheduling provisions.

In some MOUs, overtime hours are allocated to employees based on seniority, which can create a concentration of overtime among a relatively small number employees at the highest pay rates. Both the concentration of hours worked and the total cost could potentially be reduced if overtime hours were allocated among a wider pool of employees.

Management Practices

Among the five highest overtime-user departments, overtime use is concentrated in several job classes, including transit job classes, municipal maintenance job classes, public protection job classes, and nursing and non-nursing health care jobs. Increased hiring in these classes should result in reduced overtime usage in many cases.

Additionally, pre-planning overtime use at the beginning of the year, and engaging supervisors and staff at multiple levels, may also help reduce overtime usage. For example, the Police Department allocates its overtime budget to each of its four bureaus, and supervisors at multiple levels communicate with leadership regarding overtime use on a regular basis throughout the year. Allocation of the overtime budget by functional unit and/or location, and collaboratively engaging supervisors to help monitor usage, in conjunction with enhanced management of employee leave time including vacation leave, compensatory time leave, sick leave, and long term medical leave, allows the Department to proactively manage overtime use throughout the year.

Section I: Citywide Overtime Use

As shown in Figure 1, during FY 2014-15 departments spent \$184.9 million on overtime, which was \$12.0 million, or 6.9% above the prior year. Overtime hours increased 0.1 million, or 4.1% from the prior year, but were below the peak in FY 2007-08 by 0.1 million or 3.8%.

Figure 1. 10-Year History of Overtime Expenditures and Hours





Figure 2 presents two other ways to look at overtime trends that factor in changes in the overall size of the City's workforce and budget. FY 2014-15 overtime hours represented 4.8% of regular (straight-time) hours, which is a small increase from the prior year, however they remained below the ten-year peak in FY 2007-08 of 5.1%. Overtime spending in FY 2014-15 represented 2.0% of the \$9.47 billion total Citywide expenditures, representing a 0.1% increase from the prior five-year average, while remaining below the FY 2007-08 peak of 2.5%.

Section II: Overtime and Comp Time Use for Highest User Departments

As shown in Table 1, the five highest overtime user departments, MTA, Fire, Police, Public Health, and Sheriff, accounted for 85% of overtime dollars spent Citywide. Factors contributing to overtime use include:

- FTE attrition with increased service or demand levels
- 24-hour operations, minimum staffing requirements, and employee leave
- Labor contract provisions that can concentrate overtime use
- Unexpected events that exceeded available regular time or budgeted overtime

In many situations, use of overtime is a deliberate operational and budgetary choice departments make to maintain or increase service levels without increasing FTEs.

Table 1 shows expenditures for the five highest user departments in FY 2014-15. Additional departments are included in Appendix 1.

Table 2 shows total paid hours and leave hours by department in FY 2014-15. From FY 2013-14¹, citywide average leave hours per FTE declined by 1.1% while declining 2.8%, 1.4%, 1.0% within MTA, Police Department, and DPH respectively. The Sheriff's Department and Fire Department's average leave use per FTE increased 6.3% and 0.23% respectively from FY 2013-14. Leave hours may be correlated with overtime use.

Table 3 shows total department compensatory (comp) time earned and paid in FY 2014-15. Labor contract provisions provide some employees with a choice in how to receive credit for overtime hours worked. Employees in classifications eligible to receive overtime pay can also elect to receive comp time hours to be used and paid at a later date. Employees not eligible for overtime pay may only earn comp time. In FY 2014-15, comp time hours worked as a percentage of overtime hours worked were 2.9%, 7.3%, 9.3%, 10.6%, and 20.3% for MTA, Fire Department,

Police Department, DPH, and Sheriff respectively.

Depending on labor agreement provisions, a portion of comp time hours earned but unused at the end of one fiscal year may be carried forward for use in future years. This means that comp time hours paid within a fiscal year can be greater than hours earned in the same period, as was the case in FY 2014-15, in which 458,931 hours were paid, but only 441,589 hours earned. Some labor agreements require comp time balances to be paid out when employees promote to a higher rank, in order to reduce the future liability represented by large comp time balances. These hours are shown in the "Comp Time One-Time Payout Hours" column.

Within departments adhering to mandatory staffing levels, comp time leave use may contribute to an increase use of overtime as any use of leave may create a temporary staffing shortage. This shortage may require use of overtime hours to meet mandatory staffing levels.



A. Sheriff's Department

Over the past ten years, overtime spending in the Sheriff's Department has ranged from a low of \$5.8 million to a high of \$15.3 million. Between the peak in FY 2007-08 and FY 2014-15 overtime hours decreased 20%, from 0.28 million to 0.22 million, and spending declined by 3% from \$15.3 million to \$14.8 million. Between FY 2013-14 and FY 2014-15, overtime spending increased 41%, from \$10.5 million to \$14.8 million, and overtime hours increased 37% from 0.16 million to 0.22 million. Figure 3 shows overtime spending and hours within the department over the past 10 years.

Figure 3. 10-Year History of Sheriff's Department Overtime Expenditures and Hours






Figure 4. Jail Population and Overtime Use

As shown in Figure 4, between FY 2005-06 and FY 2007-08, the average annual jail population increased by 14% and overtime hours increased by 26%. Between FY 2007-08 and FY 2010-11, the average annual jail population decreased 18% and overtime hours decreased 63%. The above trend has not continued over the past four fiscal years, as the average jail population decreased 20% between FY 2011-12 and FY 2014-15 and overtime hours increased by 60%.

The department determines and adheres to its minimum staffing levels at all of the City's jails, and when staffing falls below the minimum, overtime hours are used to meet requirements. A likely driver of overtime within the department is use of leave time, specifically within the Deputy Sheriff and Senior Deputy Sheriff job classes, which collectively account for over 85% of the Sheriff's Department overtime use. Furthermore, comp time hours earned within the Deputy Sheriff and Senior Deputy Sheriff job classes totaled 19% of the overtime hours earned. While granting comp time rather than overtime can be less costly in the short term, subsequent staffing challenges may occur when the comp time hours earned are used.

The San Francisco Deputy Sheriffs' Association MOU with the City limits the number of comp time hours an employee may earn to 160 per fiscal year, and states employees may not accumulate a balance of comp time exceeding 160 hours. A review of balances as of October 30, 2015 showed that 88% of Deputy Sheriff employees are below the level of the FY earn cap.

Due to the Sheriff Department's minimum staffing model for Deputy Sheriff's and Senior Deputy Sheriff's, unplanned leave time such as sick leave and disability leave, appear to be a significant driver of the use of overtime. Within these job classes, time and one-half overtime hours represent 9.2% of regular hours worked, whereas disability leave and sick leave represent 4.5% and 4.7% respectively, or total 9.2% of regular hours worked. This includes the January 2015 expiration of the expanded Senior Sheriff Deputy vacation slot provision negotiated in the 2014 round of labor contract negotiations. The average vacation hours in the first half of FY 2014-15 was approximately 90 hours per pay period more than in the second half of FY 2014-15.

Staffing


Figure 5 shows the relationship between FTE count and overtime use. Review of the number of department FTEs and overtime use in the past decade does not indicate a strong correlation between staffing levels and overtime. Over the past 10 years, FTEs increased 6% while overtime hours increased 1%. However, between FY 2010-11 and FY 2014-15, FTEs decreased 7% and overtime use has increased 117%. As noted above, employee leave use appears to be more closely correlated with overtime than the number of FTEs.

As shown in Figure 6, overtime hours are concentrated among a relatively small number of Deputy Sheriff employees. Of the 634 Deputy Sheriff employees with regular time posted in FY 2014-15, 81 or 13% of Deputy Sheriffs accounted for 48% of the overtime hours used. If overtime hours had been allocated to each Deputy Sheriff employee in proportion, or as a weighted average, to regular time worked, FY 2014-15 maximum overtime hours per employee would have been 255. The Sheriff's Department reports this is a result of some Deputy Sheriffs voluntarily accepting overtime assignments which would have required another Deputy Sheriff to involuntarily accept the same overtime assignment.

Figure 6. FY 2014-15 Deputy Sheriff Overtime Hours Worked




Recommendations

The Controller's Office recommends the department continue to evaluate staff absenteeism and leave use, inmate population, and security risk levels to ensure staffing requirements are appropriate. Furthermore, the department should monitor comp time earned, used, and accrual and comply with applicable MOU comp time cap provisions, and discuss with DHR the possibility of establishing an employee level "hard cap" for overtime use.

B. Municipal Transportation Agency


As shown in Figure 7, MTA overtime expenditures have increased 65% over the past 10 years, rising from \$34 million in FY 2005-06 to \$56.3 million in FY 2014-15, and overtime hours have increased 37% from 0.8 million in FY 2005-06 to 1.1 million in FY 2014-15. Between FY 2013-14 and FY 2014-15, overtime expenditures increased 1% and overtime hours increased 0.3%.

As shown in Figure 8, during FY 2014-15, 92% of overtime within the Department occurred in the Transit and Maintenance groups. Issues specific to each group are discussed below.

- **Administrative Staff/Other:** Clerks, Fare Collection Receivers, Purchasers, etc.

Transit Group Overtime

63% of all overtime use is within the MTA's transit group; 55% occurred in the Transit Operator job class, with the remaining 8% in supporting transit classes, such as Train Controller, Station Agent, and Transit Supervisor. According to the department, factors that affect transit operator overtime usage include the length of the operator's scheduled route, operator shortages, labor contract (MOU) provisions, gaps in coverage created by employee absences, unforeseen circumstances such as heavy traffic or accidents, and special events. MTA has continued its efforts to hire and train both part- and full-time operators, and is expecting to hire 243 additional transit operators in FY 2015-16. The additional hires should help reduce the need for overtime caused by increased service levels and staff attrition.

Part-time operators have a lower number of guaranteed hours per shift (3.5) and can help meet service delivery goals without working overtime. However, part-time operators earn full-time benefits so their hourly cost is actually higher than the hourly cost of a full-time operator. In terms of only full-time operators covering shifts, overtime can be more cost-effective than to assign another full-time operator to complete a shift.

MTA reports that overtime is built into each operator's schedule in order to manage service costs effectively. Labor contract provisions guarantee full-time operators eight hours of pay per shift, so requiring an operator to work overtime is frequently less expensive than bringing in an employee for a short amount of time to complete a run. Tables 4A, 4B, and 4C illustrate this point, showing three ways to staff a bus line that runs 20 hours a day.

As indicated above, staffing option 1 uses two transit operators to complete the run with four hours of scheduled overtime and 22 total paid hours. Staffing option 2 uses three operators to complete the run with no overtime but 24 total paid hours. Staffing option 3 uses two full-time operators, one part-time operator, no overtime and 20 total paid hours. Due to high demand periods during the day, particularly during the morning and afternoon commute hours, MTA typically schedules available part-time operators to provide additional service during peak ridership hours instead of utilizing available part-time operators as shown in Table 3C. Given the labor contract requirement that operators be paid a minimum of 8 hours per shift, it can be less expensive to use overtime instead of additional full-time staff.

Maintenance Group Overtime

The maintenance group accounts for 29% of overtime hours within the MTA. The five largest overtime-using maintenance group job classes are Electrical Transit System Mechanic, Electronic Maintenance Tech, Automotive Mechanic, Automotive Service Worker, and Transit Car Cleaner, which cumulatively represent 50% of the maintenance group overtime use. For the Electrical Transit System Mechanic job class, which represents the highest use of overtime within the maintenance group, MTA reports that increases in overtime use is a result of increased service demands such as motor coach bus substitution and special events. This increased use requires additional fleet maintenance, while staffing changes resulting from promotions and attrition require newly hired staff be trained, resulting in increased overtime.

To reduce overtime use within this service area, MTA is continuing to hire more electrical and automotive mechanics. In addition, MTA has purchased new vehicles to replace its aging fleet, which should reduce some of the maintenance demands. In FY 2011-12, this service area used 320,000 overtime hours. This decreased in FY 2012-13 to 266,000 hours, however in FY 2013-14 overtime hours increased to 303,000 and to 320,000 hours in FY 2014-15.


Recommendations

The MTA would benefit from a review of voluntary and assigned overtime procedures. Less emphasis on seniority may reduce overtime expense and reduce the concentration of overtime hours among individuals. Evaluation of absenteeism and all types of employee leave may enhance an effective attendance policy. Finally, continued hiring and training for transit and maintenance job classes that have had the highest overtime usage will likely reduce overtime hours.

C. Department of Public Health


Figure 9. 10-Year History of DPH Overtime Expenditures and Hours

As shown in Figure 9, Department of Public Health (DPH) overtime use peaked in FY 2007-08 at \$17 million and 0.37 million hours followed by a sharp decline to \$8.9 million in FY 2009-10. Increases occurred annually from FY 2009-10 to FY 2012-13, when a decrease in overtime hours to 0.26 million and a decrease in overtime costs to \$11.9 million occurred in FY 2013-14. However in FY 2014-15, overtime hours increased 10% to 0.29 million and overtime costs increased 19% to \$14.2 million. The FY 2014-15 values represent a 17% decline in spending and a 23% decline in hours from the FY 2007-08 peak.

DPH reports that a significant factor behind the sharp decline in spending in FY 2008-09 was the decline in Laguna Honda Hospital's census, from 1,150 beds to 780 beds, in preparation for moving into a smaller new facility. This freed up employees to backfill other positions throughout the department, reducing the need for overtime, which reached a ten-year low in FY 2009-10. From FY 2009-10 to FY 2014-15 overtime spending and hours increased 60% and 40%, respectively. DPH attributes this increase primarily to significant staffing vacancies, particularly at Laguna Honda Hospital (LHH), and increased levels of employee leave and staff training requiring backfill with overtime. Additionally, DPH explains that due to operational changes, including a reduction of staffed beds at LHH in FY 2009-10, an increase in available staff occurred which significantly reduced overtime use, particularly at San Francisco General Hospital (SFGH) in FY 2009-10. However, since FY 2009-10 SFGH overtime has increased as the available staff relative to department operations has decreased. DPH has advised that overtime in the most recent fiscal years more accurately reflect operational requirements at current service levels.

Figure 10 provides a view of DPH overtime by employee classification group.

Non-Nursing Healthcare: Anesthetists, Pharmacists, X-Ray Laboratory Aides, Surgical Procedures Technician, etc.


Crafts/Custodial/Food Service: Storekeepers, Cooks, Porters, Carpenters, etc.

The four highest overtime using job classes at DPH are Patient Care Assistant, Licensed Vocational Nurse, Nursing Assistant, and Food Services Worker which respectively represent 22%, 12%, 9%, and 9% of total department FY 2014-15 overtime hours. Patient Care Assistants, Nursing Assistants, and Licensed Vocational Nurses provide 24 hour a day care and have legal and/or labor agreement-mandated staff to patient ratios, whereas Food Service Workers provide patient and staff meals at the hospitals. Other high user job classes include Registered Nurses, Porters, Eligibility Workers, and Home Health Aides. DPH reports that Home Health Aides and Registered Nurses have minimum staffing requirements while Eligibility Workers are critical to allowing maximum coverage for patients and services. DPH reports the main issues affecting overtime use within these classes are the ability to hire additional employees and employee leave usage.

Most overtime within DPH is used at San Francisco General Hospital (SFGH) and Laguna Honda Hospital (LHH). Figure 11 shows overtime dollars in each hospital over the prior ten years.

Over the prior five years, overtime expenditures at LHH has been higher than at SFGH, although SFGH is a larger institution. The patient census at SFGH fluctuates more than at LHH, and to compensate SFGH keeps a large pool of as-needed nurses, known as Special Duty Nurses who are per diem, or P103's, that can be utilized to help control overtime use. DPH has increased the pool of as-needed nurses at LHH to help reduce overtime use at that facility. In FY 2014-15, P103 salaries accounted for \$50 million or 7.8% of DPH's total salaries paid.

Table 5 shows that while the total number of FTE at LHH is approximately half that of SFGH, average overtime spending per FTE is approximately two times higher. DPH reports that this is due to LHH's staffing model, which utilizes more Patient Care Assistants, Licensed Vocational Nurses, and Home Health Aides than Registered Nurses. Special Duty Nurses who are per diem, or P103's, can be utilized to maintain minimum staffing coverage for Registered Nurses, however there is not a similar as-needed staffing system for Patient Care Assistants, Licensed Vocational Nurses, and Home Health Aides. Due to higher availability and utilization of per diem staff at SFGH, overtime expense per FTE is higher at LHH.

Recommendations

A review of those MOU provisions that require seniority scheduling may lead to decreased overtime expenditures in the Department of Public Health. Additionally, increased hiring of nursing and non-nursing healthcare staff in conjunction with evaluation of absenteeism and all types of employee leave may enhance an effective attendance policy and may lower overtime usage. Further, allocating overtime at the beginning of each year by functional or geographic area, and collaboration among staff from multiple levels to monitor overtime, may also may also reduce overtime usage.

D. Fire Department





Figure 13: Fire Department Staffing Levels and Overtime

As shown below in Figure 12, overtime spending and hours at the Fire Department increased from FY 2005-06 to FY 2012-13. Figure 13 shows the decline in full-time employees from 1,684 in FY 2005-06 to 1,417 in FY 2012-13. From FY 2012-13 to FY 2014-15, full-time employees increased 6%, overtime hours decreased 11% and overtime expenditures decreased \$5.5 million or 13%. Of the Fire Department's total FY 2014-15 overtime use, Fire Suppression and Emergency Medical classifications accounted for 80% and 20% respectively.

Figure 12. 10-Year History of Fire Department Overtime Expenditures and Hours

The Fire Department reports that the decrease in FTE in recent years is the deliberate result of analysis showing that reliance on overtime to meet minimum staffing requirements would be more cost effective than hiring additional employees. In FY 2014-15 the average hourly rate of an H-2 firefighter, including benefits, averaged approximately \$57 while the average hourly overtime rate, including benefits, averaged approximately \$63. Although this \$6 difference may appear to indicate reliance on overtime is more expensive, the Fire Department includes operational factors, such as efficiency ratios in staffing decisions. For example, during FY 2014-15 the H-2 Firefighter job class accounted for approximately 295,000 overtime hours. If these hours were staffed at straight time, it would require approximately 147 additional full time Firefighters, assuming a 25% relief factor. The additional H-2 Firefighters, assuming cost at an average FY 2014-15 rate, would cost approximately \$21 million, or \$4 million more than the FY 2014-15 H-2 overtime expense. A FY 2014-15 staffing increase of approximately 120 additional firefighters and an relief factor of approximately 2% would have provided a theoretical break even point, spending the same amount on straight time staff as was used on overtime expense.

As the multi-year hiring plan included in the City's Five Year Financial Plan for FY 2015-16 through 2019-20 is implemented and new classes of firefighters join the workforce, overtime usage is expected to decrease assuming existing service demand levels. This is primarily because the number of Fire Academy class graduates is expected to exceed the number of retirements and other staff attrition, thus adding to the Fire Department's active workforce and replacing overtime expense with straight time expense.


Recommendations

Implementation of the hiring plan will likely result in decreased overtime assuming existing service demand levels.

E. Police Department

As shown in Figure 14, the Police Department has reduced overtime spending and hours significantly since FY 2007-08 when usage peaked at \$41.7 million and 0.57 million hours. Between FY 2007-08 and FY 2013-14, overtime spending and hours decreased by 34% and 46%, respectively. However, between FY 2013-15 and FY 2014-15, both overtime dollars and hours have increased 20% and 15%, respectively.

Figure 14. 10-Year History of Police Department Overtime Expenditures and Hours




Significant factors that contribute to the Police Department's overtime use are grants and services provided to other City departments as well as to non-city entities, Bay Area sports postseason and celebratory parade events, dignitary visits, and San Francisco hosted events and conferences. General Fund operations accounted for \$19.3 million or 58% of total Police Department overtime expenditures, while external funding from non-city entities for special events accounted for \$10.5 million or 32%, and grants and direct charge services provided to other City departments accounted for \$3.5 million or 10% of total Police Department overtime expenditures in FY 2014-15. Special events included, but were not limited to, sporting events, film and television production, and construction security.

Staffing

Review of the number of FTE and overtime use does not indicate a strong correlation between staffing levels and overtime in the Police Department. Figure 15 shows FTEs and overtime hours over the past 10 years. Between the overtime usage peak in FY 2007-08 and FY 2014-15 overtime hours and department FTE have declined 38% and 4%, respectively. However, between FY 2010-11 and FY 2014-15, FTEs decreased 1% while overtime hours increased by 28%.

Police Department Overtime Monitoring

The Police Department has reduced its overtime use in recent years through management oversight. The Police Department allocates an overtime budget to each of the four bureaus within the Department in the beginning of the year. A biweekly report is run by budget staff, which shows overtime usage by employee and is reviewed by bureau Deputy Chiefs and the Chief of Police. This method of overtime review has helped the Department reduce overtime costs and stay within budget.

Recommendations

The Police Department’s practice of allocating the overtime budget by the Field Operations, Special Operations, Chief of Staff, and Administration bureaus is a useful tool to allocate and assess overtime usage within the Department, and the Controller recommends the continued use of this method of managing overtime.

Appendix 2. Maximum Permissible Overtime Per Employee

Per Administrative Code section 18.13-1, City employees are not permitted to work more than 25% of their regularly scheduled hours as overtime. In FY 2014-15, a standard full-time employee worked 2,088 regular hours and the overtime default limit for the year was a maximum of 522 hours. In addition to the employee exemptions defined below, employees who worked fewer than 209 regular hours, or approximately 10% of the full time equivalent of 2,088 hours, and/or where the department received external funding from non-city entities for special events, are excluded. Table A shows that as of June 30, 2015, 781 non-exempted employees exceeded the overtime default limit, by working more than 25% of their regularly scheduled hours as overtime. This represents a 38% decrease in non-exempt employees exceeding the overtime default limit compared to FY2013-14.

Employee Exemption:

The Administrative Code allows for DHR and MTA to offer overtime default limit exemptions to departments for specific positions and/or job classes. During FY 2014-15, DHR extended the overtime default limit for public safety dispatchers in the Emergency Communications Department, select Juvenile Probation Department staff, and certain Fire Department and Sheriff's Department staff within specific involuntary draft circumstances. These departments report that in all but a relative limited number of cases, each employee exceeding the default limit did so due to involuntary draft considerations. DHR advised the Fire Department that "under no circumstances should any employee work more than 1,100 (overtime) hours during the fiscal year." Despite this limitation, 32 Fire Department members exceeded the 1,100 hour limit. Although a similar limitation was not communicated to the Sheriff's Department, 18 of the department's members posted overtime hours in excess of 1,100, which represents an average of over 21 hours worked per week or over 50% of the regular 40-hour workweek over the course of the year.

MTA has granted exemptions to eleven job classes, including transit operators and mechanics in prior years but did not grant exemptions in FY 2014-15.

Maximum Number of Hours Worked Per Pay Period

Administrative Code section 18.13-1(a) requires that employees work no more than 72 hours per week, or 144 hours in a pay period, with the exception of uniformed Fire Department employees, who do not work a standard 40 hour work week. Table B reflects the number of employees and pay periods where hours worked, including paid leaves, exceeded 144 hours in a pay period. Some departments report that retroactive postings that had been incorrectly posted as regular hours worked are included in the Table B. If all retroactive labor posting were coded correctly, these occurrences would likely be fewer than reported below. The Controller recommends that departments continue to improve time coding practices to enhance the accuracy of hours reported.

In FY 2014-15, 358 unique employees exceeded the 144 hour pay period limit within 26 of 27 pay periods, averaging 15 hours above the limit in 687 total occurrences.

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OPEN LETTER TO THE COMMUNITY

Dear Friends,

Minute by minute, day by day, the San Francisco we call home is changing. Our neighborhoods and neighbors, our public gathering places, the number of young people in the city, and the opportunities and prospects we face when preparing to pursue our educational, career, family-building, and social change goals. What are the implications of these changes on the lives of young San Franciscans and how can we best ensure the wellbeing of young people in our city? As a result of our reflection on these questions, we came up with 13 budget and policy priorities for 2015-2016.

In a world constantly evolving through crises and opportunities, we believe our advocacy and policy priorities contribute to a vision of just progress for San Francisco. Some of these include: opening the #Vote16SF conversation to the City to discuss making San Francisco the first major city to expand voting rights to sixteen and seventeen year olds; including in the Mayor's Budget funding for a fee assistance pilot program for immigrant youth eligible for DACA; steadfastly continuing to urge the Police Department to train its officers on effective interaction with youth grounded in mutual respect; working with Larkin Street Youth Advisory Board to declare a Year of Recognizing Homeless Youth; and in collaboration with Project WHAT, advocating for policies that lower the parent visiting age in county jails to 16 in order to maintain family unity. We have also diligently followed up on the Children, Youth, and Families Oversight and Advisory Committee and the Our Children, Our Families Council, conducting an application process and making recommendations for the appointments on the youth seats of these critical oversight bodies. To help ensure that our work is guided by direct feedback from the youth of San Francisco, we have participated in community meetings, designed and facilitated youth town halls, sat and shared information on youth panels, invited youth to join us in meetings with elected officials, and more. We have enjoyed the insight and presence of members of the public who joined us at our 18 full Youth Commission meetings; 17 Executive committee meetings; 16 Immigration & Employment committee meetings; 17 Housing, Environment, and City Services committee meetings; and 20 Youth Justice Committee meetings. The youth and community members who came to our meetings provided perspective that helped guide our responses on twenty pieces of legislation referred from the Board of Supervisors. The Youth Commission would not be what it is without our allies and the student leaders and advocates who call San Francisco home!

Whether we are teenagers who are preparing for the responsibilities of adulthood, TAY who are transitioning to college or work, or young people who are raising children ourselves, we know that the diversity and insight of San Francisco's young people give us strength. With commitment to creating the spaces that allow youth to contribute to the betterment of our city and gratitude in our hearts, we extend our thanks for your partnership, support, and unwavering faith in the power of young people to make change.

ABOUT US

The San Francisco Youth Commission is a body of seventeen young individuals appointed by the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor of San Francisco. Under Section 4.124 of the City Charter, we are responsible for advising the Board and Mayor on the *“effects of legislative policies, needs, assessments, priorities, programs, and budgets concerning the children and youth of San Francisco.”*

History

In 1995, community members lobbied City Hall to develop a resolution that would create a Youth Commission in San Francisco. This piece of legislation originally failed at the Board of Supervisors. Then-Supervisor Angela Alioto subsequently sponsored a Charter Amendment that put the question of whether or not to create the Youth Commission to the voters of San Francisco. In turn, Proposition F won 60% of the votes on the November 1995 ballot, and the Youth Commission was created! The first class of commissioners was sworn into office in April 1996. We are currently in our 19th year of existence!

Purpose & Duties

The Youth Commission also has the duty to provide the Board and Mayor with “comment and recommendation” on all proposed laws “that primarily affect the children and youth” of San Francisco. We are charged with identifying the “unmet needs” of youth through a variety of methods. These include researching existing government and private programs and sources of funding for such programming, holding public forums and working with existing youth groups and advocacy organizations. Each year, the commission provides the following: comment and recommendations on pieces of proposed legislation referred to the commission; resolutions and motions that formally articulate our positions and requests on various youth-related issues; and a set of policy priorities to guide the City’s annual budget process as it relates to young people.

YOUTH JUSTICE COMMITTEE REPORT

This was a very busy year on youth justice priorities as issues concerning youth-police relations and systemic racism in law enforcement were thrust onto the national stage with the killing of an 18 year old African American teenager, Michael Brown, in Ferguson, MO, and following the release of new reports detailing the extent of disproportionate minority contact across San Francisco's criminal justice system. In an effort to plug more deeply into national conversations, the Youth Justice committee sponsored the Youth Commission's membership in the Dignity in Schools Campaign and the Community Justice Network for Youth.

Youth-police relations: The Youth Justice committee started off the term by diving straight into advocacy in October by giving input into new police department domestic violence protocols, working to ensure that enhanced collaboration between law enforcement and Child Protective Services in non-arrest and non-abuse circumstances would not lead to unnecessary investigations of families. Committee members authored a resolution of commendation recognizing the implementation of training on new police department protocols for making arrests of parents in the presence of children. Committee members conveyed feedback on a pilot training on childhood trauma for police officers and continued to advocate for the inclusion of de-escalation and scenario-based approaches to training officers on youth-police relations. In Spring, committee members organized a remote demonstration for Chief Suhr from national trainers working on youth-police relations. Committee members met with SFUSD officials and the SRO coordinator and continued to monitor the rate of on-campus arrests this school year, noting a notable decline in on-campus arrests since the implementation of the SFUSD-SFPD MOU in 2014, but that on campus arrests continue to disproportionately affect black and Latino students. Youth Justice committee members attended hearings on the implementation of a police body camera pilot program, as well as townhalls on youth-police relations following the killing of Michael Brown and the Ferguson, MO uprisings.

Children of Incarcerated Parents: Youth Justice committee members continued momentum from the June 2014 Board of Supervisors Neighborhood Services and Safety committee hearing on the needs of youth with incarcerated parents by continuing their partnership with Project WHAT. In Spring, they worked with Project WHAT and Sheriff Mirkarimi to lower the county jail visiting age so that 16 and 17 year olds can visit their incarcerated parent, and will continue to assist with outreach for this new policy in the coming year.

Juvenile Justice: Committee members met with Chief Probation officer of the Juvenile Probation Department, Allen Nance, in February to inquire into recreation yard access for youth detained at Juvenile Hall and confirmed that the juvenile hall recreation yard is now in regular use. Commissioner Edelhart represented the Youth Commission on the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council.

Victories:

We successfully advocated for 16 and 17 year olds to be able to make unaccompanied visits to their parents incarcerated in SF County Jails. On-campus arrests significantly declined following the passage of the SFUSD-SFPD MOU in 2014. The Juvenile Hall recreation yard is not in regular use.

YOUTH EMPLOYMENT & IMMIGRATION COMMITTEE CHAIR'S REPORT

DACA Application Fees Grants. After passing resolution 1415-02 [Offer Grants Covering Application Fees for San Francisco DACA Applicants], we searched for sponsors and were extremely grateful to have the sponsorship of Supervisor Norman Yee, and many others. We worked closely with his office to collaborate with Mayor Lee before budget season. This was something we wanted to continue advocating for. It is such a struggle for a young person to come up with \$465 to pay for DACA. We explored alternative methods of providing assistance to DACA applicants, and invited a group of stakeholders, including young DACA recipients, to get their feedback. This ultimately provided helpful information to Supervisor Yee's office and the Mayor, who announced funding for a fee assistance pilot program for immigrant youth and families eligible for DACA and Pathways to Citizenship.

Community Benefit Agreements. This year, the Youth Commission's Immigration and Employment Committee was committed to addressing youth employment and engagement through the Central Market Community Benefit Agreements. A Community Benefit Agreement (CBA) is a binding contract any company residing in the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area, whose annual payroll expense exceeds one million dollars, can enter with the City Administrator in order to receive a 1.5% payroll expense tax exclusion. Community Benefit Agreements may include commitments to engage in community activities and participate in workforce development opportunities in the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area. Our committee met with the City Administrator's Office, toured Twitter, Zendesk, and Spotify, and facilitated a Youth Town Hall in June of 2015 at Spotify in collaboration with the companies. We worked with the companies to design workshops where youth could learn about and begin to engage in a meaningful way the work that the companies do. Youth participants also shared their concerns and spaces where they felt like they could get involved. We hope ideas generated at the town hall and event itself can serve as a useful model for future efforts to involve youth in community benefit agreements.

Victories:

Through our advocacy and collaboration with Supervisor Yee's office, Mayor Ed Lee announced funding in his budget proposal for a fee assistance pilot program for immigrant youth and families eligible for DACA and Pathways to Citizenship.

On June 11, 2015 we held a youth town hall on youth and Community Benefit Agreements, and passed a report at the Youth Commission on the event and its findings. We connected D6 youth to the companies residing in the Mid-Market/Tenderloin Area, giving youth the opportunity to learn from and interact with the neighbors they never see. We educated youth about CBAs throughout the day with a formal presentation that included a wall-to-wall timeline and handouts.

We found out that most youth want more interpersonal contact with employees of the companies engaged in CBAs. Such suggestions included more internships, but they also included seeing more of the employees in their communities actually connecting with District 6 residents. Many youth called for increased awareness of CBAs. They were interested in participating in the process early on, but didn't know how. Thus, they recommended invitations to attend various meetings, hearings at the Citizens Advisory Council, etc.

This year the Housing, Environment, and City Services committee tackled many challenges affecting youth in San Francisco:

Park Equity. On March 5, 2015 at the Public Safety and Neighborhood Services hearing on the Children's Outdoor Bill of Rights, Youth Commissioners, along with many youth community members, spoke about their concerns and hopes for San Francisco parks: the need for more park monitors to improve park safety; extended lighting hours; increased non-reservation-based playfield access; and a general commitment to teen access in our parks. This hearing, along with recent park incidents involving shootings and lack of playfield access, galvanized the Housing, Environment, and City Services committee to write a resolution regarding park equity.

Transitional Aged Youth (TAY) Housing. In 2005, the Youth Commission adopted a resolution calling on the then-Mayor Gavin Newsom to create a task force that would propose methods to better serve TAY in San Francisco. The task force proposed a TAY Housing Plan which was to create 400 additional units for TAY by 2015. This priority was re-affirmed by a recommendation in the TAYSF Policy Priorities for Transitional Age Youth 2014-16 document released in Spring 2014, which called for plans to continue the pipeline of housing for TAY to meet or exceed the 400 unit goal by 2015. This year the Housing, Environment, and City Services committee continued to work with city leaders so that the TAY Housing Plan is completed.

Year of Recognizing Homeless Youth. This past year, the committee worked closely with the Larkin Street Youth Advisory Board to bring awareness to the City of the prevalent issue of youth homelessness. They were able to pass a resolution at the Full Youth Commission and begin conversations with elected officials.

Victories:

The committee passed a resolution urging the Board of Supervisors to urge the Recreation and Park department to conduct an equity analysis on their parks and playgrounds. They also passed a resolution in conjunction with Larkin Street designating 2016 as the year of recognizing homeless youth.

Other priorities the committee invested time and support include: Advising the development of an evaluation to measure the quality and effectiveness of TAY housing and services; Advising the full youth commission on housing-related legislation referred from the Board of Supervisors; Extending Free MUNI for Special Education students.

OUTREACH, EVENTS, AND OTHER HIGHLIGHTS

On August 14th 2014, we attended the **Bernal Heights Neighborhood Center's Youth Summit: Poetic Justice Event**. The youth at Bernal Heights put on summits every year and we are always inspired by their ability to examine their environment and translate their analysis into creative messages and artistic expression everyone can connect with. Some of the topics include youth justice issues, various struggles of prejudice, and the capacity of youth to make change.

On October 14th 2014, we held a **2014 Young Voters Forum** where about 60 young people packed into Balboa High School's Green Room to learn more about the different ballot measures that would impact youth. Our community partners included Peer Resources, Transitional Age Youth San Francisco, Student Advisory Council, Youth Leadership Institute, Coleman Advocates, and the Youth Warriors. We expected and were impressed by the level of thoughtfulness youth participants spoke on the ballot measures: Children and Youth Fund, Sugary Beverages, "Anti-Speculation Tax, and the Minimum Wage Increase. While we were able to help the participants learn about the various proposals on the ballot, they really helped us confirm the ability and desire of young people to civically engage in decisions that impact them, even when they are too young to be allowed to vote.

On February 13th 2015, Commissioner Precious Listana held a **District 6 Youth Town Hall** where she gathered feedback from over 50 young people. With the help of District 6 Supervisor Jane Kim, the TL Boys and Girls Club, and her fellow commissioners, Precious facilitated an interactive event where youth from the district shared their perspectives on what youth in the community need. Officers, representatives from tech companies, and community members accompanied and listened to the youth responses. Each group of youth were able to present the discussions and reflections that were had, and Commissioner Listana generated a report from it for the Supervisor's office to consider.

On March 18th 2015, we served as youth leaders and facilitators for the **annual Youth Advocacy Day** organized by the Youth Warriors and the Youth Empowerment Fund of DCYF. About 200 youth were meeting with officials across city offices in the Civic Center area, asking questions and sharing their perspectives on topics related to the Environment, Public Safety, Transportation, and other city services.

On April 13th 2015, the YC Immigration and Employment Committee organized a DACA Convener with District 7 Supervisor Norman Yee's office. Stakeholders, including youth receiving DACA, service providers, the San Francisco Unified School District, the Office of Civic Engagement and Immigrant Affairs all sat at a table to discuss some options to support our undocumented brothers and sisters who have come to our sanctuary city. Jen Low, legislative aide of Supervisor Norman Yee, helped commissioners in facilitating the conversations and sharing the options. This ultimately influenced Mayor Lee to announce a commitment of \$10 million in funding over two years to support San Francisco's immigrant community, and for a fee assistance pilot program for immigrant youth and families eligible for the DACA program and the Pathways to Citizenship.

Other highlights:

On February 11th 2015, we spoke at the **Human Trafficking Poster** event hosted by the Department on the Status of Women.

On March 18th, 2015 we spoke at a **Radio Show KOIT with Brent Carey** about expanding voting rights to 16 and 17 year olds. #Vote16SF is a priority commissioners are excited to bring to the attention of the San Francisco community.


On April 11th, 2015 we supported **14 Black Poppies' Where do You Belong** event at the Emerald gallery.

Over the course of the 2014-15 term, we held **tours of City Hall for INSPIRE, Newdoor Ventures, Guardian Scholars, Sonoma Junior Human Rights Commissioners, Tomodachi group, Istanbul Youth Assembly, the Jewish Community High School** and many more organization!!!

Outside of City Hall, we interacted with a number of youth serving organizations and their young people. We made visits to **Alice Fong Yu, Paul Revere Elementary School, Peer Resources Youth Council, the Student Advisory Council of SFUSD, the Vietnamese Youth Development Center, Larkin Street Youth Services, University of San Francisco, the Oakland and Richmond Youth Commissions, Coleman Advocates**, and many others!

Throughout the year we participated in many **community resource fairs** at the invitation of the schools and organizations including; **June Jordan School for Equity, International Studies Academy, Wallenberg High School, James Denman Middle School and the OMI Beacon Center, First Graduate, and Mo Magic**. Through these interactions, we were able to gain insight on issues facing the youth from youth themselves.

We are grateful to all our City and community partners for the opportunity to hear from you, and share the work of the Youth Commission.











TO ALL INTERESTED AND AFFECTED PARTIES:

At its February 11, 2016, meeting, the Fish and Game Commission (Commission) will determine which options to include in its notice of proposed changes to the Klamath River Basin sport fishing regulations for 2016.

In April 2015, the Commission adopted changes to the Klamath River Basin sport fishing regulations, including seasons, bag limits, possession limit, a prohibition on catch and release fishing of legally caught salmon in the Klamath River spit area, and closures to all fishing in the Klamath River between June 15 and September 14 from 500 feet above to 1/2 mile downstream of the mouth of Blue Creek and from September 15 to December 31 within 500 feet of the mouth of Blue Creek.

The Commission is interested in receiving your specific recommendations concerning the fishing closures at the mouth of Blue Creek or any other specific recommendations concerning Klamath River Basin sport fishing. You may submit your recommendation in writing to the letterhead address or to FGC@fgc.ca.gov, and are not required to use the Commission's regulation change petition form. **Written recommendations are requested by 5:00 p.m. on January 28, 2016, but must be received by noon on February 5, 2016.**

While the Commission will also accept recommendations presented in person at its February 11, 2016, meeting, early submittal of recommendations is most effective.

The Department of Fish and Wildlife (Department) is also holding a public meeting on this subject on January 12, 2016, from 5:30 to 7:30 p.m. at the Del Norte County Board of Supervisors Chambers, in Crescent City, CA. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that, pursuant to the provisions of Section 2074.2 of the Fish and Game Code, the California Fish and Game Commission, at its December 10, 2015, meeting in San Diego, California, accepted for consideration the petition submitted to list the tricolored blackbird as an endangered species. Pursuant to subdivision (e)(2) of Section 2074.2 of the Fish and Game Code, the Commission determined that the amount of information contained in the petition, when considered in light of the Department of Fish and Wildlife's written report, the comments received, and the remainder of the administrative record, would lead a reasonable person to conclude there is a substantial possibility the requested listing could occur.

Based on that finding and the acceptance of the petition, the Commission is also providing notice that the aforementioned species is a candidate species as defined by Section 2068 of the Fish and Game Code.

Within one year of the date of publication of this notice of findings, the Department of Fish and Wildlife shall submit a written report, pursuant to Section 2074.6 of the Fish and Game Code, indicating whether the petitioned action is warranted. **TITLE 14. Fish and Game Commission
Notice of Proposed Changes in Regulations**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Fish and Game Commission (Commission), pursuant to the authority vested by Sections 200, 202, 203, 3960, 3960.2 and 3960.4 of the Fish and Game Code and to implement, interpret or make specific Sections 200, 202, 203, 203.1, 207, 3960, 3960.2, 3960.4 and 4756 of said Code, proposes to amend sections 265, 353, 360, 361, 362, 363, 364, and 364.1; and add section 708.18 Title 14, California Code of Regulations (CCR), relating to Mammal regulations for the 2016-2017 seasons.

Informative Digest/Policy Statement Overview

265

Amend Section 265, Title 14, CCR, by deleting subsections (d)(1) and (d)(2). The current regulations prohibit the use of treeing switches and GPS collar equipment for dogs used in the taking of mammals. Recent changes to statutes have restricted the use of dogs by hunters to only the taking of wild pigs and deer. The prohibition on the use of treeing switches is therefore unnecessary. Allowing the use of GPS collar equipment will improve a hunter's ability to find and retrieve downed game and lost dogs.

353

Amend Section 353, Title 14, California Code of Regulations (CCR), Methods Authorized for Taking Big Game. The purpose of the proposed amendments is to specifically require compliance with sections 353 and 250.1 when taking big game, and to clarify which cartridges may be used by defining "softnose or expanding projectile."

The current regulations in Section 353, Title 14, CCR, provide method of take restrictions for big game using centerfire cartridges in rifles, pistols and revolvers. The projectiles used in these firearms are required to be "softnose or expanding." However, these words are not defined in the regulation. While "softnose or expanding" is commonly accepted from the standpoint of bullet design and trade industry terminology, some have suggested that it could include frangible bullets. The lack of distinction between projectile types is confusing to hunters and difficult to interpret by law enforcement. Furthermore, frangible bullets are not an efficient and effective means to take big game.

The proposed regulation changes are as follows:

- 1) Add clause to subsection 353(a) specifically making it unlawful to use methods of take or projectiles for big game other than what is authorized in Sections 250.1 and 353;
- 2) Add a new subsection 353(b)(1) to define "softnose or expanding projectile" based upon design and common accepted terminology of mushrooming, bullet diameter increase and bullet weight retention; and
- 3) Add a new subsection 353(b)(2) to clarify that "frangible" bullets are not softnose or expanding projectiles.

Existing regulations provide for the number of deer hunting tags in the Additional Hunts. The proposed action provides a range of tag numbers for each hunt from which a final number will be determined, based on the post-winter status of each deer herd. These ranges are necessary at this time because the final number of tags cannot be determined until spring herd data are collected in March/April. Because various environmental factors such as severe winter conditions can adversely affect herd recruitment and over-winter adult survival, the final recommended quotas may fall below the current proposed range into the "Low Kill" alternative identified in the most recent Environmental Document Regarding Deer Hunting.

Existing regulations for Additional Hunts G-8 (Fort Hunter Liggett Antlerless Deer Hunt) and J-10 (Fort Hunter Liggett Apprentice Either-Sex Deer Hunt) provide for hunting to begin on October 3 and continue for two (2) consecutive days and reopen on October 10 and continue for three (3) consecutive days, inclusive of the Columbus Day holiday, in order to accommodate for Base operations and other hunt opportunities. The proposal would modify the season to account for the annual calendar shift and move the seasons one week later to eliminate conflicts with elk hunting during the first week of October. The proposal would change the season dates to open on October 8 and October 15, for 3 and 2 consecutive days respectively, and include the Columbus Day holiday, in order to accommodate for Base operations.

Minor editorial changes are necessary to provide consistency in subsection numbering, spelling, grammar, and clarification.

Because various environmental factors such as severe winter conditions can adversely affect herd recruitment and over-winter adult survival, the final recommended quotas may fall below the current proposed range into the "Low Kill" alternative identified in the most recent Environmental Document Regarding Deer Hunting.

The current regulation in Section 362, T14, CCR, provides for limited hunting of Nelson bighorn rams in specified areas of the State. The proposed amendments are intended to adjust the number of hunting tags for the 2016 season based on the Department's annual estimate of the population in each of the nine hunt zones. The Department's final recommendations will ensure that the take will be no more than 15 percent of the mature rams estimated in each zone in accordance with Fish and Game Code Section 4902.

Preliminarily, the tag numbers are presented as ranges (e.g., [0 -3]) in the table in subsection 362(d) of the amended Regulatory Text. Final tag quotas for each zone will be identified and recommended to the Fish and Game Commission at the April 14, 2016, adoption hearing.

363

Amend Section 363, Pronghorn Antelope, Title 14, California Code of Regulations (CCR).

In accordance with management goals and objectives, and in order to maintain hunting quality, tag quotas for Pronghorn Antelope hunts need to be adjusted annually. Current regulations specify the number of pronghorn antelope hunting tags for the 2015 season. This proposed regulatory action will amend subsection 363(m) providing the number of tags for hunting in 2016.

Preliminarily, the tag numbers are presented as ranges (e.g., [0-3]) in the table in subsection 363(m) of the amended Regulatory Text. Final tag quotas for each zone will be identified and recommended to the Fish and Game Commission at the April 14, 2016, adoption hearing.

Other minor changes to the regulatory text to reduce redundancy, improve accuracy and clarity are proposed.

364

Existing regulations in Section 364, Title 14, CCR, specify elk license tag quotas for each hunt. In order to achieve elk herd management goals and objectives and maintain hunting quality, it is periodically necessary to adjust quotas, seasons, hunt areas and other criteria, in response to dynamic environmental

and biological conditions. The proposed amendments to Section 364 will establish 2016 tag quotas within each hunt adjusting for annual fluctuations in population number, season dates and tag distribution.

The complete amended text is found in the amended Regulatory Text of Section 364 with the Initial Statement of Reasons.

Proposed Amendments:

- The current Elk Hunt regulations in Title 14, Section 364, are overly long and the format makes it difficult to navigate to find pertinent hunting information. The Department of Fish and Wildlife (Department) is recommending placing a substantial amount of information from Section 364 in a Table to improve the hunting regulations and make them more user-friendly.
- In order to achieve appropriate harvest levels and maintain hunting quality it is necessary to annually adjust quotas (total number of tags) in response to dynamic environmental and biological conditions. Section 364 regulations specify elk license tag quotas for each hunt in accordance with management goals and objectives.
- Remove, Amend, and Establish New Hunt Areas. The Department is recommending changes to the Hunt Areas as described in amended subsections 364(a)(1) through (d)(20).
- Add New Opportunities for Specialized Hunts. The Department makes many different specialized hunts available to the public including Archery, Muzzleloader, and Apprentice hunts. Because of the new areas added, some new opportunities will be made available.
- Modify Season Dates and Hunt Periods. The Department makes many different times and seasons of the year available to the public. In order to provide opportunity for hunters, the Department modifies the calendar day for the start of individual hunts and the number of days of hunting. The new Table sets forth the recommended days for each hunt.
- Modifications to Hunt Area Special Conditions.
- Current regulations require a hunter orientation in certain hunt areas prior to hunting. This requirement is not necessary in most areas since all pertinent information is sent to the successful tag purchaser (hunter) along with their tag. Tag holders are also provided contact numbers for local Department employees to answer any additional questions. Where required, the Special Conditions appear in regulation with the hunt area description. Special Conditions for hunting on military installations appear in new subsections (p) Fort Hunter Liggett Special Conditions; and, (q) Camp Roberts Special Conditions.

Minor Editorial Changes are proposed to improve clarity and reduce redundancy.

364.1

Current regulations in Section 364.1, SHARE Elk Hunts, T14, CCR, specify elk tag quotas for each hunt area. In order to achieve elk herd management goals and objectives and maintain hunting quality, it is periodically necessary to adjust quotas in response to dynamic environmental and biological conditions. In conjunction with proposed amendments to Section 364, Elk, which will delete, amend and add hunt areas, it is necessary to similarly amend Section 364.1 for consistency.

Preliminary tag quota ranges are indicated pending final 2016 tag allocations in accordance with elk management goals and objectives. Survey data collected between October 2015, and March 2016, will be the basis for the final tag numbers recommended to the Commission at the April 2016 adoption hearing. The quota ranges for 2016 elk tags are indicated in the proposed Regulatory Text.

Other minor editorial changes and renumbering have also been made.

The complete Table and text is found in the attached proposed Regulatory Text of Section 364.1.

708.18

Existing regulations in Section 708, T14, CCR specify procedures and conditions for returning or exchanging big game tags and refunding tag fees but do not identify similar procedures to allow the return of big game fund raising tags sold by qualifying non-governmental organizations at auction.

This proposal would add Subsection 708.18 to establish regulations which allow the return of the purchase price for fund raising tags. The new provisions set forth a few possible circumstances beyond the control of the holder under which, by example, the tag holder may not be able to use the FRT. These include, but are not limited to, illness, military deployment, and hunt area closure (i.e., fire, etc.). However, the request to return the tag must be made in writing to the Department, at least ten business days before the start of the season. If possible, the returned FRT will be made available for purchase by the next highest bidder(s).

363	The management plans specify objective levels for the herds. These ratios are maintained and managed in part by annually modifying the number of tags. The final values for the license tag numbers will be based upon findings from the population surveys.
364 - 364.1	The proposed regulations will contribute to the sustainable management of elk populations in California. Existing elk herd management goals specify objective levels for the proportion of bulls in the herds. These ratios are maintained and managed in part by annually modifying the number of tags. The final values for the license tag numbers will be based upon findings from annual harvest and herd composition counts where appropriate.
708.18	The Commission anticipates benefits to the health and welfare of California residents and benefits to the State's environment because the proposed regulations assist the Department in the sustainable management of California's natural resources.

The refund process, and subsequent re-sale of the tag, assures hunters that the money spent is worthwhile and without risk.



These rentals can offer a unique experience for visitors, as well as a supplemental stream of income for hosts. Some San Franciscans continue to express serious concern that short-term rentals exacerbate San Francisco's high housing prices and negatively impact neighborhood character if they are poorly operated.

While hundreds of hosts have registered with OSTR and are successfully operating short-term rentals, there are a substantial number that remain out of compliance with this nearly year-old law. Through the City's enforcement actions, we have assessed over \$475,000 in penalties against hosts of illegal short-term rentals. In several cases, hosts were listing multiple units within the same building, effectively converting rent-controlled housing stock into illegal hotels. We will continue to enforce against illegal rentals, both in response to complaints from neighbors as well as through proactive enforcement initiated by City staff. Hosts are subject to penalties of \$484 per day for first-time violations, up to \$1,452 per day for repeated violations. In addition to penalties, we require that hosts remove their listings from all hosting platform websites and provide proof that they have cancelled all future reservations.

It is in everyone's interest for our short-term rental program to operate effectively, and we strongly believe that hosting platforms can be effective partners in ensuring that short-term rentals operate within the current rules. Proper compliance with the program also provides a better experience for hosts and guests, knowing that reservations are secure with a legally-registered rental. We are asking major hosting platforms to work with us in the following ways:





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

You state, "...the proposed project would reduce travel times by up to 15 minutes and increase reliability by 20%.

This statement is **not** accurate!

Table 10-2 shows, estimates for year 2020 on Transit Performance. The No-Build Alternative shows the figure at 53:50

and the Alternative 3.2C Hybrid at 44:45. In fact, the **current** 38R schedule proves that **current** Inbound PEAK transit times are 38 to 45 minutes, with buses running every 4-minutes. For the Outbound 38R, PEAK travel times are 48 to 50 minutes, with the 50-minute times only occupying a 45-minute window.

The buses run every 4 minutes during **current peak times** and every 5 or 6 minutes up until 7:00PM. I find it difficult to comprehend, "...improvement in reliability of 20%".

Maybe you aren't up to speed on the Draft EIR/EIS. You appear unaware of the **current** 38R bus travel times and how the overwhelming majority of 38R travel times far exceed the "hoped for 2020 projections".

I look forward to a retraction of Eric Mar's statements with updates of the facts as presented here.
