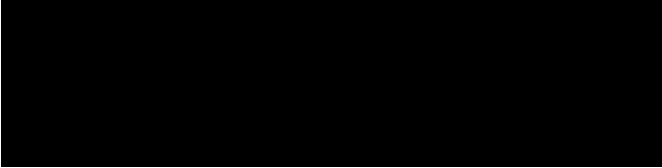



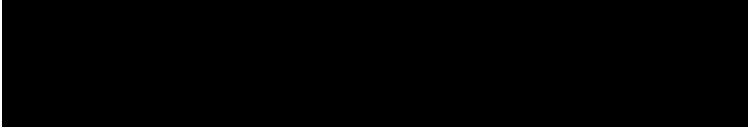

I was born and raised in a working-class, Puerto Rican family and community in Springfield, Massachusetts. Growing up, I saw every day the ways our economy failed low-wage workers and the inadequacy of our social safety net. Without enough money, the people I loved had to work twice as hard to make ends meet each month. Many times, they could not. Systemic racism, sexism, and other forms of oppression coupled with economic exclusion denied my family and neighbors the opportunity to become economically secure. These experiences are directly tied to the question of a guaranteed income - how do we design a system that gets money into the hands of the people who need it most, and helps dismantle the systems of exclusion that characterize our economy and plague our city and country? As a resident of the Mission, I also see daily how hard my neighbors work while barely being able to make ends meet in our city. I know that giving them cash would give them some breathing room to focus on the many other important aspects of our lives.

Business and/or professional experience:

I am the economic justice policy director for SPUR, a research nonprofit committed to building a thriving and equitable San Francisco. In this capacity I have researched and assessed various cash transfer and guaranteed income programs with a particular focus on how targeted cash transfers can help close the racial income gap and secure economic stability for low-income people. Prior to joining SPUR, I was the director of policy and research for the Insight Center, a national racial and economic justice public policy organization. At Insight I explored the various ways in which guaranteed income could help provide economic stability to Black workers in the American South. I also co-founded the Economic Justice Project at the Southern Poverty Law Center, where we confronted the systems that punished people because of their economic status. I have spent the past five years researching and developing Guaranteed Income (GI) policy, working to understand both the transformative potential that unconditional cash transfers can have in people's lives and the pitfalls that can arise if GI programs are not properly implemented. My work has centered on the social justice implications of GI, considering the impact for marginalized communities, and particularly communities of color.
Within San Francisco, I have advised on several upcoming or potential GI pilot programs, including the Abundant Birth Project and programs to provide unconditional cash transfers to the unhoused population in collaboration with the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing.

Business and/or professional experience:

I am a co-founder and co-director of the Universal Income Project, a nonprofit devoted to the expansion of economic security and human dignity through the implementation of a universal basic income in the United States. I lead the organization's policy research and program logistics work, providing support for programs being piloted and launched across the country. I am also the founder and CEO of ShareProgress, a social impact company providing software and services for nonprofit organizations.

I am a member of the Coordinating Committee for the California Poor People's Campaign, representing the Bay Area regional chapter. Seat 4 must be held by a person who has personally experienced poverty while living in San Francisco. I lived in and out of poverty in San Francisco from 1969-1975 and periodically 1987 until 2016. Right now I only have veteran compensation which is a third of what is deemed low income. I've worked for commission which doesn't always yield a living wage, and have been on welfare and food stamps. When I was homeless I was sent to shelters and lived in transitional housing. I would not be able to live in San Francisco if it were not for assistance I receive from being a veteran. I'm Black, Mexican, Aztec and White. I live in District 10, 51 years old, Female, disabled Veteran.

Business and/or professional experience:

I served 13 years in the military. While in the service I went six months without receiving dependent benefits because I was not married. At the time I only ate top ramen because that is all I could afford. I was a Sergeant at San Quentin for eight years. The salary was decent but I had an up front and personal view of how much poverty effected people and the direct correlation between crime and poverty. In 2012 I was arrested for marijuana, diagnosed with a deadly blood disease and lost my home. I ended up couch surfing, and kicked out of two apartments because I had a dog. During this time I also lived in a renovated garage but had to give that up because I could not afford the rent. I went to a Tech school but they did not offer internships to the women participants. After that I went to Salesforce training but I could not pass the certification. The only jobs that would hire me after being arrested for marijuana were delivery driver jobs which I did up to December of 2019. Even Uber would not hire me. Since the pandemic I have been to scared to deliver packages to people. I periodically apply to jobs, including City jobs, but no one will hire me.

Civic Activities:

I am an activist. My first protest was in supporting the freedom of Mumia Abu-Jamal in 2007. Since than I became heavily involved with environmental racism, art preservation, and hiring of Black contractors. I am a member of Beds 4 Bayview and set up the first safe sleeping site in San Francisco and fought for the homeless in D10 to get COVID-19 testing which resulted in the largest amount of people being tested in San Francisco.

My father's family immigrated to San Francisco in 1946, moving to 3rd and Jerrold in Bayview Hunters Point. My mother and I were born in San Francisco. I was born and raised in the Mission, and lived half my life in the Bayview, where I raised my children. We only left the Bayview 6 years ago when we were displaced from our home we rented there. We now live in the barrio of South San Francisco, but still spend most days in the Mission or the Bayview. My father and I graduated from Mission High School and my mother graduated from Galileo HS.
I grew up in poverty, though I have never felt a lack for anything. While I know well the government commodity foods in a can, I have never known hunger. My wife grew up poor in the Mission; we met at Mission HS. Together, we are the firsts in our families to go to college, firsts to buy a house in our families, first to emerge from poverty. Unfortunately, many of my loved ones and relatives are still poor. My two sisters and brother are all currently surviving on disability checks.
For San Francisco, and for poor folks in SF, I would be willing to serve on this new advisory body. However: if there are strong candidates who have lived in poverty and still live in poverty, I would support their candidacy, first. I know it is a privilege to serve in this way, but I also know it's easier to serve on voluntary bodies when one has privilege, as I currently do. If there is someone currently living in poverty who understands poverty in SF who wants to serve, I think their candidacy should be considered and supported.

Business and/or professional experience:

My first jobs were as a tutor to school aged children in low-income communities of color, and since then, my entire career has been in service of low-income communities of color. I have worked the last 15 years to leverage UCSF resources in service of advancing health and economic equity in SF communities. Prior to that, I worked in community-based organizations serving SF and the SFUSD in service to low-income communities of color for decades. I have been a street outreach worker for the Mayor's Gang Prevention Program in the early 90's when street violence was at an all time high. I worked for years in Juvenile hall as an outreach worker, case manager, and teacher of poetry and art. I have directed non-profit programs serving children and families failed by our school system.

I have served on the boards of directors for the Mission Cultural Center, Central American Resource Center (CARECENSF) for years, and am currently transitioning out of service on the SF Soda Tax Committee.

I have served my community in the role of Aztec Dancer and Drummer, for countless ceremonies, funerals, street memorials, and more.

I currently volunteer with food distribution efforts for Third Baptist Church, delivering meals to mostly black elders who are homebound in SF, and food distribution efforts at the Mission Hub and with Excelsior Strong. I volunteer for community testing and other COVID response efforts, and have done all of these activities almost weekly since the beginning of the pandemic.

My name is Norel Knowles. I am a 20 year old African American gay man. I attended John O'Connell High School, Downtown High School, Five Keys Charter School where I got my GED.

Just before I was born, my mother was homeless and had lived in shelter and temporary motel housing. I was born and raised on Treasure Island. I feel like Treasure Island is a gem. It is one of the few places inside SF where you know everyone on your block, you can knock on your neighbor's door and ask for sugar, or have a conversation right before you go inside your own house. We are the treasure of Treasure Island! Because I am an African American gay man, I feel like I look out for the interests of all these different groups. Because I know how it feels to be a double minority, I also like to look out for other groups. I also love talking about situations that happen in America and how maybe race/ethnicity, sexual orientation, age, gender and gender identity play a part in how we experience life differently than others.

I recently became financially independent from my parent and no longer live with her. I am now responsible for paying for rent, paying for all my food, if I need to go to the doctor, transportation into the city from Treasure Island, internet and so much more.

One of my life goals is to become a District Supervisor in San Francisco. As much as I talk about how sometimes the government should pass certain policies, as a District Supervisor, I would get to put my words into action. Fun facts about me - I love gaming! I love chess! And, I love cooking.

Business and/or professional experience:

Since I was in 9th grade, I have worked with MyPath as a youth leader. Now, it's been about 6 years I've been with them. The top four things I've done with MyPath are: 1) Teaching and advocating for all San Francisco youth to have our own bank accounts - and to share financial education information with them. The financial education I have gotten feels like a privilege because not many people in my circumstances have this. I know it shouldn't be a privilege but it is. 2) In 2018, I got to go to New Mexico to make a presentation to other youth organizers around the country about how where you live impacts what decisions you make financially and what financial services you have access to. 3) In 2019, I got to make a presentation to the SF Youth Commission about our campaign for youth financial access and the importance of young people being able to get our own bank accounts, so no matter what our parenting situation looks like, we can be financially independent and manage our own money. 4) In Dec 2020, I along with one other Youth POWER member (see below) got to do a presentation to 110 San Francisco youth (over Zoom) about credit and how young adults can use credit to their advantage.

Civic Activities:

I am part of MyPath's Youth POWER (Policy Organizers for Wealth and Economic Rights). We focus on economics when it comes to youth and young adults. We are currently creating a Bill of Rights called Youth RYTS (Real Youth Troubles and Solutions) where we not only talk about some of the economic problems youth have, we found and pitch certain solutions to fix those problems. One of our recommendations is for young adults, especially those of us from BIPOC communities (Black, Indigenous, People of Color), should have a guaranteed income, and also a financial mentor who can help guide us as we receive that money so we can make the most of it and plan our finances. I feel like even if it was for a limited amount of time, guaranteed income can really help young adults become financially secure because being a young adult, is financially exhausting. When it comes to looking for a job - jobs are almost always minimum wage for youth.

Board Qualifications:

The Guaranteed Income Advisory Group (the “Advisory Group”) was established to advise the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and appropriate City departments, commissions, boards, groups, agencies, and the public regarding the Guaranteed Income (also known as Universal Basic Income) Program. The Guaranteed Income Program is an income-distribution program that provides individuals with a fixed amount of money each month to cover basic living expenses to prevent people from becoming poor or remaining in poverty, and consequently to promote a more just society.

The Advisory Group shall consist of eleven voting members, appointed as follows:

- > Seats 1, 2, and 3 shall each be held by a person with expertise in economics, finance, political science, or public policy, and with experience researching and analyzing Guaranteed Income programs, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
- > Seat 4 shall be held by a person who has personally experienced poverty while living in San Francisco, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
- > Seat 5 shall be held by a person under the age of 24 at the time of appointment who has personally experienced poverty, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
- > Seats 6, 7 and 8 shall each be held by a person with professional experience serving low-income individuals, families, or youth, and with training and expertise in social, racial, or gender equity, intersectional problem-solving, or cultural humility, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.
- > Seat 9 shall be held by an employee of the Office of the Treasurer and Tax Collector,

appointed by the Treasurer.

> Seat 10 shall be held by an employee of the San Francisco Human Rights Commission (“HRC”), appointed by the Executive Director of HRC.

> Seat 11 shall be held by an employee of the Human Services Agency (“HSA”), appointed by the Executive Director of HSA.

Seats 1 through 8 may not be held by employees of the City and County of San Francisco.

Members shall serve indefinite terms unless removed by the appointing authority.

The Office of the Treasurer and Tax Collector shall provide administrative and clerical support for the Advisory Group.

Reports: By no later than December 1, 2021, the Advisory Group shall submit to the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor a final report summarizing its research, findings, and recommendations on the topics set forth in subsection (a), and any additional findings and recommendations that the Advisory Group concludes advances its goals and fulfills its duties.

Sunset: The Advisory Group shall terminate on January 23, 2023, unless extended by ordinance.


