At its in-person meeting on Monday, October 20, 2025 the Youth Commission discussed BOS File No. 950991:

- 1. The Youth Commission recognizes the importance of prioritizing public safety in areas near parks, playgrounds, and schools.
- 2. The Youth Commission affirms that parks, playgrounds, and schools are outlets of public spaces that families and youth rely on.
- The Youth Commission acknowledges several concerns regarding the implementation of the proposed resolution, particularly regarding the role of the SFPD, potential over-policing, and the impact on youth.
- 4. The Youth Commission put together the following questions and considerations for the hearing on the proposed resolution:
 - How will the SFPD decide which parks, playgrounds, or schools to prioritize, and what criteria will be used?
 - How are officers being trained to engage with youth, especially those experiencing substance use challenges?
 - Could increased police presence push drug activity into other neighborhoods, and what measures will prevent this displacement?
 - Are there alternative programs, such as 311 or mental health-focused interventions, that could complement or replace law enforcement involvement?

- How can the plan include long-term sustainability and avoid being a temporary solution?
- How will the SFPD collaborate with the Youth Commission to ensure youth-centered approaches are incorporated in plan development?
- What preventative measures will be taken to restrict youth access to drugs near public spaces?
- How will the plan balance public safety with avoiding disproportionate impacts on certain neighborhoods?
- How will the City and SFPD conduct outreach to ensure youth and families are informed about the new policy and resources available?
- 5. The Youth Commission notes support from the community, with 23 letters submitted in favor of the legislation, and urges the SFPD to submit new standards and collaborate closely with youth-focused organizations during plan development.








The Issue on the Ground


- Drug use and paraphernalia near schools and parks create safety and sanitation hazards for children, families, and staff.
- Calls for service typically fall under H&S §§ 11350, 11377, 11550, and 11364, representing simple possession or use.
- Sales-related offenses (H&S §§ 11351-11352, 11378 and 11379) are a small fraction of total incidents citywide. Enhanced penalties apply for sales within school zones under state law.
- Operationally, these calls often compete with higher-priority incidents.
- RPD Park Rangers may issue infractions and cite for violations of the Park Code only.

Calls for Service: Narcotics and Suspicious Persons Within 250 Feet of Parks, Playgrounds and Schools





Incidents Occurring Within 250 Feet of Parks, Playgrounds and Schools





How a Call for Service Proceeds





Operational Barriers

- Most drug-related cases are misdemeanors; custodial arrest limited to continuing offense or felony.
- Each call requires significant administrative time for reports, evidence, BWC uploads, required data entries, transport to jail and medical triage.
- Some incidents appear dangerous but do not meet arrest thresholds;
 officers must manage that distinction.
- Citywide call volume remains high, and DEM assigns call priority.
- Citations often lead to no-shows and bench warrants, repeating the cycle.

DMACC: Concentrated Enforcement and Interagency Coordination

- The Drug Market Agency Coordination Center (DMACC) unites SFPD, SFSO, DA, DPH, DEM and community partners to address open-air drug markets in the Tenderloin and SoMa.
- DMACC conducts targeted, resource-intensive operations focused on specific hot spots.





Department Perspective

- Our goal is safety for students, families, and neighbors.
- SFPD responds and enforces within existing law; each case involves multiple steps.
- Concerns around schools and parks are recognized and taken seriously by command staff.
- Progress depends on continued cooperation with schools, City departments, and community partners.

Renschler and Chief Daniel Hahn:

San Francisco can't agree on much, but we can

agree that we have a drug crisis. That

acknowledgment alone is progress. But now, we

must match it with action.

Nearly 30% of our members identified open-air drug markets and overdoses as the top public safety issue the next Chief of Police must address. The mandate is clear: we need a top-down approach to eliminate drugs from our streets, starting with enforcement of existing laws.

Supervisor Sherrill's resolution, which urges the San Francisco Police Department to develop and implement a comprehensive plan to respond to drug use, visible narcotics activity, or suspected drug trafficking within 250 feet of any park, playground, or school, is a necessary and urgent step.

We urge you to vote yes on the "Prioritize Public Safety Response to Drug Activity Near Parks, Playgrounds, and Schools Resolution".

If San Franciscans no longer want drug laws enforced, then the proper process is to change those laws. But until then, it is the City's obligation to enforce them. The lack of enforcement has eroded public trust and put children and families at risk in spaces that should be sanctuaries.

We now have a new beginning and a fresh opportunity to create a culture of support for the police to carry out the will of the people by enforcing the laws San Franciscans have collectively agreed to live under. This is an all-hands-on-deck moment. We need alignment among our elected officials and the recruitment services tasked with selecting the next Chief of Police, so that the City's leadership is united in carrying out the will of the people.
