


## **Family Shelter Reforms**

**Government Audit and Oversight Committee** | April 17, 2025



## Challenge

- ► Family homelessness is a crisis that impacts some of the most vulnerable people in our community.
  - 2024 Point in Time Count reflected a 94% increase in families experiencing homelessness since 2022, 32% of whom were unsheltered.
- ► In November 2024, there were more than 500 families on the shelter waitlist, families lingering in shelter, and vulnerable families on the streets unable to access scarce shelter resources.
- ► Changes to the family shelter system were needed to help ensure that we could meet the demand for homeless family services, including shelter.

#### **Opportunity: Safer Families Plan**

Investment of over \$50 million in the FY 24-26 budget to expand both shelter and housing options to provide shelter to ~600 families and house more than ~450 families through new investments and existing turnover.

## **Opportunity: Family Shelter Reform**

- ► In late 2023, non-profit providers asked HSH for tools to better engage families to support flow through the family system.
- ← From January June 2024, HSH conducted a Family System Paint Points

  Analysis to identify where reforms were needed to support better service and outcomes for families experiencing homelessness.
  - HSH staff workgroup facilitated by Controller's Office on family system of care;
  - 18 non-profit partners serving families with executive, middle and frontline staff participated in workshop facilitated by Controller's Office; and
  - Four focus groups with 40 families experiencing homelessness facilitated by Talent Poole.
- ► In November 2024, HSH engaged in a series of conversations and trainings with family providers to socialize the set of family shelter reforms and policies.
- → Based on input from this process, on **December 10, 2024** HSH issued family shelter reforms.

Family Shelter Reforms

#### Intended Impact

- Increase flow through the family system
- Reinforce the use of shelter for emergencies
- Improve coordination between multiple parts of the family homelessness response system
- Increase access for the most vulnerable families
- Reduce the family shelter waitlist to households who have no alternative places to stay

• \$50 million investment to significantly expand shelter and housing resources for families in the FY 24-25 budget.




## **Impact Analysis**

- Since the implementation of the family shelter reforms in December 2024, HSH has been closely monitoring and tracking data and system flow across the Family Homelessness Response System.
- While it is too early to understand the full impact of the policy in coordination with the new investments, we are seeing preliminary data moving in the right direction.
- Initial data from 4 months prior to the December 10th policy change vs. 4 months post shows:
  - 3 families have been denied extensions from 90-day shelter due to the length of stay policy.
  - The family shelter waitlist reflects a 39% decrease since November 2024.
  - Family housing referrals have increased 72% from Q4 2024 to Q1 2025.
  - Family shelter exits to housing have modestly increased from 21% to 25%.

## **Shelter Length of Stay (LOS) Policy**

- As of December 2024, the policy allows families to stay in shelter for 90 days as was the previous policy prior to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- However, the new version of the policy is more generous offering unlimited extensions if households are engaged and making concrete progress toward a permanent housing placement or exit.
  - **Providers** are authorized to approve up to three **30-day extensions** (**90 days total**) if a family is meeting regularly with their case manager, making concrete progress towards a housing placement / exit, and meets one of the four criteria for extensions.
  - HSH can authorize an unlimited amount of further extensions if a family is making progress but needs more time to access their permanent housing.
- Families must be **regularly meeting** with their **shelter case manager** to remain eligible for shelter.
- San Francisco's LOS policy offers longer stays and more flexibility than other major cities with high rates of homelessness.

#### **LOS Policies**

- Los Angeles: 90 days plus extensions
- **Denver:** 42 days plus extensions
- Salt Lake City: 30 days plus extensions
- Chicago: 120 days

#### **Criteria for Shelter Extensions**

- 1. Have a medical condition that is being treated
- 2. Have a pending shelter or transitional housing placement
- Have a pending permanent housing placement (rapid rehousing, PSH or self-resolution)
- 4. Have **housing barriers** outside of the client's direct and immediate control (i.e. immigration related barriers)



## Shelter Prioritization

## Shelter Prioritization Original Policy vs. Key Changes


#### **Original Policy**

- Created when First Friendship existed
  - Shelter with mats on the floor
- Prioritization is for a referral to Individual Room Shelter (non-congregate):
  - Experiencing Physical or Sexual Violence
  - Cumulative length of time both in congregate shelter (counted as 6/10 of a day) or verified unsheltered (counted as one day); calculated via ONE System logic.

#### **Key Change(s)**

- Prioritization for the following:
  - Current living situation (literally homeless)
  - Fleeing Violence (domestic violence, intimate partner violence, sex trafficking, etc.)
  - Disabled
  - Pregnant or perinatal families
- Weighted score for prioritization.

# Shelter Eligibility Original Policy vs. Key Changes

#### **Original Policy**

- Definition of Family
- Definition of homelessness
  - HUD categories: (1) literally homeless, (2) imminent risk of homelessness, and (4) fleeing/attempting to flee DV.
  - Connection to SF (for at least 7 days)
  - Living in a SRO or doubled up
- Family Individual Room Waitlist is for families interested in individual room shelter or transitional housing placement.


#### **Key Change(s)**

- Families living in SROs or doubled up will no longer be eligible for family shelter, unless being evicted or room is uninhabitable.
- Families living in shelters for 14 or more days with 24-hour access to amenities will no longer be on the waitlist.
- Adjusted family shelter waitlist eligibility:
  - Living in a place not meant for human habitation
  - Residing in shelter/hotel w/exit date of less than 14 days
  - Residing in a residence and being evicted w/in 14 days
  - Leaving an institution and was homeless prior
  - Fleeing domestic violence
  - Pregnant people or people reuniting with children transferring from shelter for adults without children
  - Families living in a shelter without 24-hour access to amenities

# Family Emergency Shelter Waitlist Breakdown November 2024: 505 Families




In HSH Family Shelter without 24 Hour Access to Beds/Amenities
