1 [Urging the City Develop Streetscape and Landscape Maintenance Standards] 2 Resolution urging the Controller's City Services Auditor and the Department of Public 3 Works to develop objective streetscape and landscape maintenance standards; and 4 finding that well-maintained streetscapes and landscape assets are integral to support 5 small businesses and economic development on commercial corridors. 6 7 WHEREAS, San Francisco Public Works ("Public Works") is one of the city's largest 8 and most complex municipal operations, with a workforce of nearly 1,800 employees and an 9 annual operating budget of \$453 million, the department manages a capital project portfolio 10 11 valued at over \$3 billion, as one of San Francisco's oldest City departments, it remains among the most forward-thinking; and 12 WHEREAS, Public Works serves every neighborhood in San Francisco, and one of 13 their core responsibilities is to maintain and green the public right-of-way; and 14 WHEREAS, In November 2003, San Francisco voters approved Proposition C, which 15 created the role of a City Services Auditor within the Office of the Controller; and 16 WHEREAS, Proposition C tasked the City Services Auditor to collect data and measure 17 the condition of streets, sidewalks, the urban environment, and landscape, as well as parks 18 and recreational facilities; and 19 WHEREAS, The City Services Auditor is responsible for assessing the need for city 20 services, monitoring performance of city services, and helping city departments make 21 transparent, data-driven decisions in policy development and operational management; and 22 WHEREAS, The City Services Auditor, in collaboration with Public Works, developed 23

objective measures of the cleanliness and condition of city streets and sidewalks maintained

by Public Works, which were last updated in 2018; and

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1	WHEREAS, The scope of the city's street and sidewalk maintenance standards
2	includes Public Works' responsiveness to 311 service requests, and evaluating specific
3	instances of street and sidewalk litter, dumping, graffiti, feces, needles, odors, as well as other
4	health hazards and sidewalk cleanliness issues;
5	WHEREAS, In November 2016, San Francisco voters passed Proposition E, to ensure
6	Public Works received dedicated funding to help maintain San Francisco's street trees and
7	urban forest; and
8	WHEREAS, The City Services Auditor and Public Works have not formally defined or
9	established benchmark maintenance standards for trees, landscaping and planting areas,
10	irrigation infrastructure, street furniture, seating, and decorative elements that are planned and
11	incorporated in any major streetscape improvement project; and
12	WHEREAS, Public Works is also responsible for managing hundreds of acres of open
13	spaces, naturalized areas, landscaped medians, and pocket parks; and
14	WHEREAS, The City Services Auditor and Public Works have not formally defined or
15	established benchmark maintenance standards for existing open spaces, naturalized areas,
16	landscaped medians, and pocket parks; and
17	WHEREAS, Well-maintained streetscapes enhance the vibrancy and economic vitality
18	of San Francisco's commercial corridors, while promoting neighborhood identity and pride;
19	now, therefore, be it
20	RESOLVED, The San Francisco Board of Supervisors finds well-maintained
21	streetscapes and landscape assets are integral to support small businesses and economic
22	development on commercial corridors; and, be it
23	FURTHER RESOLVED, The Board of Supervisors urges Public Works and the City
24	Services Auditor to develop objective streetscape and landscape maintenance standards to

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1	support data-driven operational decisions and help align availability resources to maximize
2	efficiency and impact.
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
