Small Kitchen, Big Tastes

Chef-owner Dennis Leary's creative cooking thrives at tiny Canteen

omeday I want to write a book titled "The Mind of a Chef." As Michael Ruhlman did in "Soul of a Chef," I'd do case studies, and my main subject would be Dennis Leary.

The question I'd like answered is, "What makes a chef, a former Chronicle Rising Star, leave the comfortable kitchen of the high-profile Rubicon restaurant and slave seven days a week in his own 20-seat diner that's open for breakfast, lunch and dinner?"

Just about any time you walk in the door of Canteen, you'll see the slim, strawberry blond chef behind the lime-green Formica counter, moving like a whirling dervish as he whips up a sauce, sends his assistant to the cooler next door for green tomatoes for the crab salad, meticulously applies the final drizzle of caraway vinaigrette to the salmon, and artfully chops the steak tartare.

His tiny kitchen is like an artist's studio. He transforms ingredients into creations that satisfy his professional sensibilities. His only help comes from one assistant, one dishwasher and one waiter, who handle the entire dining room, including the seven-seat counter that fronts the diamond-embossed stainless steel wall and galley. Pine bookshelves top the row of wood booths opposite the counter, and Leary has created an informal lending library (the chef was an English literature major at Wheaton

College). His favorite author is James Joyce, which may explain his egalitarian leanings.

Leary controls the entire dining experience, choosing what people read and what they listen to,


which is why you might find heavy metal playing over the sound system in the morning, reggae at lunch and classic Beatles at night.

Although the muted gray walls, cork floors and bare filament bulbs hanging over the counter lend a modern aura, the space, in the Commodore Hotel, retains the bones of a coffee shop. At breakfast the compact menu includes an exceptional corned beef hash (\$8.75) featuring generous dices of meat, pota-

toes and stewy onions flecked with fresh parsley, all of which serve as a nest for quivering poached eggs. A smoked salmon omelet (\$7.75) has a runny center filled with cream cheese, lemon, chives and fennel; oatmeal with stewed apricots and bananas (\$5) is so steamy and creamy that no additional milk or sugar is required.

Leary does all the shopping, cooking and baking; on one morning the waitress warned us, "We had a problem with the oven, so the coffee cake won't be out for another 40 minutes; you'll probably be through by the time it's done." I had wanted to try it, but it gives me something to look forward to on another morning.

The lunch menu is limited to a handful of dishes, including a soup such as artichoke (\$5); asparagus topped with bacon and a poached egg (\$7); chicken salad filled with juicy pieces of shredded meat and pine nuts, golden raisins and capers (\$8.95); and several sandwiches, including barbecued beef on a soft roll slathered with mayonnaise (\$12.95), a combination that starts out mild but packs a wallop of spice as the sweetness of the sauce dissipates.



Fixing up the House of Shields

Here's a toast to the House of Shields, an old-time bar that has just been fixed up to be as good as

The House of Shields is a San Francisco classic with one of the best locations in the city — 39 New Montgomery St., in the Sharon Building, right across the street from the Palace Hotel, a class act in its own right,

The House of Shields was celebrated among experts in the fine art of drinking establishments. Chronicle columnist Charles McCabe once called it "the finest saloon in town, bar none." Another McCabe column praising the House of Shields was framed by the owners in a place of honor on the barroom wall, until it became yellowed with age.

Diving in

Alas, over the years, the House of Shields had become neglected, like an old house. Not to put too fine a point on it, it was a dump, a dive bar. Dark and gloomy, it was avoided by the better class of drinkers. You could cuddle with vour sweetie in a dark corner booth some rainy Tuesday night and no one would notice.

"Let us say that the place was in a state of disrepair," said Dennis Leary, the new operator. Leary is a chef and owner of three other places, including the Sentinel sandwich shop in the old cigar store next door to the House of

Leary took over the House of Shields last year and shut it down for six months or so and spent a ton of money - he won't say how much — restoring it to its former glory. It reopened just before

When Leary took charge, the place was in such bad condition that some of the fixtures had a pating of ancient dirt so thick they had to be disassembled, cleaned

and put back together.

The grand back bar — one of the glories of a good saloon — was cleaned and polished so that it gleamed. Years of grime and grease and old smoke were removed from the walnut walls.

Underneath the barroom floor were vintage ceramic tiles, and they were buffed and scrubbed until they glistened

The place is still dark, but it is a warm darkness. "All good saloons are dark brown," McCabe observed on a December morning more than 50 years ago, back when an honest drink cost 50

Leary said the House of Shields interested him because he is fond of historic places. "It's special, one of a kind," he said. "How many bars are there like this in the city?"

Like many an old place, the House of Shields, which dates from 1908, does come with a history, not all of it tuned to modern tastes. It was probably the last San Francisco bar to cater to men only. Women were not allowed until

But that's part of the bad old days; now, two female bartenders greet customers at cocktail hour. One is Christina Ruiz, who has just joined the staff. She is welcoming and enthusiastic. The place, she said, "is beautiful. It's a

One of the better traditions of the joint is still alive and well. There are no clocks and no television sets in the House of Shields and no plans for any. The late

in bars. "I'm running a saloon, not a theater," he said.

As for clocks, Shields once had a sign that said, "Enter these por-tals and forget time and care." There used to be music at the

House of Shields, but no acts are scheduled just now. "That's a may-be," bar manager Eric Passetti said. "I don't rule it out."

It's got personality

Bars all have personalities: There are neighborhood bars, gay bars, leather bars, Irish pubs, cocktail lounges where men go to pick up women, waterfront bars, places that cater to tourists, bars that open at 6 a.m., sports bars, all

The House of Shields is an afterwork bar, a place to stop on the way home. It comes in two waves. There is another spurt of business late at night, when restaurant people getting off work stop by

Banzo Taylor, who works around the comer, dropped by the other afternoon with a co-worker after a long day. "We," he said, "are here to drown our sorrows."


