16 the passage of Proposition 13 in 1978, which restricted the amount of State funding schools  
17 receive from property taxes; and

18 WHEREAS, Across the State of California, school districts are facing budget shortfalls  
19 due to declining enrollment, underfunding, and rising operation costs; and

20 WHEREAS, Federal funding for public education is continuously at risk especially  
21 under this current Administration; and

22 WHEREAS, Last February, the California Teachers Association (CTA) representing  
23 nearly 80,000 educators initiated a statewide “We Can’t Wait” campaign to demand fully  
24 staffed classrooms; smaller class sizes and caseloads; competitive wages and benefits to  
25 recruit and retain educators; and stability and safety for school communities; and

2           respective school districts over contract negotiations, including San Francisco Unified School  
3           District (SFUSD); and

5           a strike in an initial vote with over 99.3% approval from members, which demonstrated the  
6           urgency in their demands for covered dependent healthcare benefits; fair wage increases,  
7           reasonable workloads; support for paraeducators; smaller class sizes; shelter and housing for  
8           students and families; and resources for immigrant families; and

9           WHEREAS, The Governor's 2026-2027 budget proposal maintains public education  
10          funding and increased one-time investments, but withholds \$5.6 billion in Prop 98 funding as a  
11          contingency; and

12          WHEREAS, In December 2025, seven of the largest public school districts, including  
13          SFUSD, sent a letter to the Governor with recommendations on the State budget including the  
14          full funding of the Proposition 98 guarantee and increased investments in special education
