



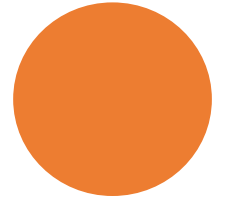
Summer Together Program Grants

The San Francisco village supporting our children, youth & families



Background

- The Department of Children Youth and Their Families (DCYF) initially partnered with San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) and community-based organizations (CBOs) on the Summer Together Program in 2021.
- With the success in 2021, DCYF continued to bring CBOs, nonprofits, businesses, and City departments together to offer in-person summer experiences for our highest need and hardest to reach youth in 2022.
- Summer Together 2022 provides opportunities for youth to engage, rebuild, and reestablish positive attitudes towards learning, relationship building, and social/emotional wellness.





Grants Supporting Summer Together 2022

- Crankstart is a family foundation based in San Francisco. They have supported San Francisco Summer Together since 2021.
- This year Crankstart provided a grant of \$15,937,000 outright to support San Francisco Summer Together and up to an additional \$7,000,000 will be matched dollar for dollar contingent upon DCYF raising up to \$7,000,000 from private donors by June 30,2022.
- David and Katherine deWilde contributed \$500,000 to San Francisco Summer Together 2022 as the match funds for the Crankstart grant.

Proposed Funding Plan

- To allocate Summer Together funding to community and school-based organizations to support summer programming that focuses on literacy and math support, academic supports, social/emotionally learning, behavioral and mental health support, career/college supports, and enrichment and physical activities.
- To provide over 25,000 summer slots to highest priority and hardest to reach youth which includes foster care, public housing/SRO, underhoused/homeless, low income Asian, African American, Latinx and Pacific Islander youth.

Summer Together 2022 will provide:

- Comprehensive wellness support for young people & their families
- Social and Emotional Learning support
- Literacy and Math support
- Project-based enrichment and physical activities
- High school credit recovery & college/career prep
