URGING THE CALIFORNIA STATE LEGISLATURE AND GOVERNOR DAVIS TO APPROVE

STATE SENATE BILL 218, ENHANCING PROTECTIONS FOR VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC

VIOLENCE AND INCREASING PENALTIES FOR OFFENDERS.

WHEREAS, According to United States Department of Justice, a woman is battered every 12 seconds and 4 million women require police or medical help every year across the country because they are victims of domestic violence; and,

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Police Department gets close to 10,000 domestic violence calls annually; and,

WHEREAS, In 1997-1998, the San Francisco Commission on the Status of Women's domestic violence programs provided services to 2,300 women who spoke languages other than English, 14% of the total number of women served during that time period; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 218, introduced by Senator Hilda Solis, changes existing law to allow courts to issue unofficial translations of domestic violence court orders or documents in a language other than English and requires the Judicial Council to make specified court orders and forms relating to domestic violence available in other languages by July 1, 2001; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 218 requires courts to order restrained batterers to participate in a batterer's treatment program that has been approved by the probation department; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 218 requires courts to order restrained batterers to relinquish any firearm in that person's immediate possession or control without having to prove that the person is likely to use the firearm; and,

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 218 provides additional protections to victims of domestic violence including, but not limited to: extending the life of an advisory council that oversees administration of a grant program to battered women's shelters; punishing as contempt of court, the willful disobedience of a court order made at the request of a person alleging domestic violence; increasing the punishment for repeat domestic violence offenders; making a knowing violation of a protective order issued by another state a crime in California; requiring peace officers to arrest batterers who are subject to a restraining order, when they respond to a call alleging a violation of the order and have probable cause to believe the person is violating the order; authorizing disclosure of privileged information to a domestic violence death review team to assist local agencies in identifying and reviewing domestic violence deaths; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors endorses Senate Bill 218, and urges the state legislature and Governor to approve the bill; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution be forwarded to his Honor, the Mayor, with a request that he transmit copies to the delegation from San Francisco in the State Legislature, as well as

Governor Davis, with a request that they take all action necessary to pass Senate Bill 218.
