The finished height of the existing building would be approximately 21 feet to the midpoint of the pitched roof. The finished height of the addition at the rear would be approximately 30 feet to the top of the sloped roof. The project would modify the front façade of the existing building to accommodate a new entrance and a nine-foot-wide garage opening. The approximately 3,250 sq. ft. project site, (Assessor's Block 3619, Lot 077), is located on the east side of Chattanooga Street, on the block bounded by Church, 21st, Dolores and 22nd Streets. The site is within an RH-2 (Residential, House, Two-Family) Use District and a 40-X Height and Bulk District. Board procedures do not permit: 1) persons in the audience to vocally express support or opposition to statements by Supervisors or by other persons testifying; 2) ringing and use of cell phones, pagers and similar sound-producing electronic devices, (Violators may be removed from the meeting room.) 3) signs to be brought into the meeting or displayed in the room; and 4)standing in the Legislative Chamber.
