Mosser has been providing safe, quality housing and services for residents and retailers in San Francisco for more than sixty years—and for 30 years now in the Tenderloin. Every day we see concern from our residents or respond to situations with our teams that are unique to the street challenges of the Tenderloin. When the community has to fear for its safety every day to just walk to the corner and get a gallon of milk, there is a state of emergency. We appreciate the Mayor for calling it exactly that and drawing the needed attention to this. Debating the solution does not address this issue--taking tangible action does.

The best recent example is the deployment of Urban Alchemy. Their respectful ambassador approach is truly making a big difference for the streets they canvas. This is a tangible action that was deployed and is effective. So if we know that, let's double down on this right now. The current partial coverage (which is due to funding and staffing issues) is addressing some of the problem, but not doing it comprehensively enough.

Police presence is effective. It deters the bad actions and the bad actors. We have employed officers through 10B for months to help protect the community. It is unfortunate that police presence on the streets of the Tenderloin—where everyone knows it is terribly dangerous--has become a private party responsibility to help keep these streets safe. There is push back about the risk of a police state or inability to arrest ourselves out of this situation. However, no one is saying the solution is simply more police, but more police presence is required. Otherwise the drug dealers control the streets, as they do now. These are not petty drug dealers. They are serious and dangerous cartel(s). Is that the preferred alternative? If so, it is the current reality, and the Tenderloin residents simply deserve better. San Francisco deserves better. This activity brings down the entire city and the perception of the entire Bay Area.

This is not about curtailing the rights of the hot dog vendor and frankly that argument is insulting to the community that's struggling with the overwhelming impact of the constant intrusion of drugs, mental health, crime, and predatory behavior. Please let's not forget about the rights of the 10 thousand residents who call the Tenderloin their home. They deserve better. You need to do what's right by them.

We hope the state of emergency focuses on the real challenges with a coordinated solution that includes street ambassadors, enforcement, support services and housing options to fully help those challenged on the streets but also to address the rampant drug activity. To not allow this to proceed and take effect will only prolong the lingering sad record for this city and continue to show that San Francisco is turning its back on what has now become a public outcry.



I live in district 2. The mayor's state of emergency does not go far enough towards ending the crime and abuse of its citizens you, the governing class, has allowed and nurtured in San Francisco. However, at least it's an acknowledgement that not doing something may ultimately threaten the progressive stranglehold on power that has rendered the city a dangerous and lawless place. I live on Russian hill, not the tenderloin. In the past week I have personally witnessed a smash and grab, helped a family (3 young children) from Utah who had just suffered the same fate, observed the open use of crack cocaine on Polk street, and just

yesterday public masturbation there. These civic abuses are now so routine that it's just like the "wallpaper" in your house-it's just there. A few years ago my work took me twice weekly to the tenderloin. It was troublesome then, but tolerable. Before the pandemic I routinely accompanied my wife to shelters and SRO's to help feed those there. I saw a deterioration in the tenderloin then. - Deaths attributable to drug overdose in San Francisco have increased over 200% since 2018.
- Last year alone, over 700 individuals died from drug overdoses in San Francisco, which far exceeds the number of individuals, who sadly and unfortunately, lost their lives due to the COVID-19 pandemic in San Francisco.
- Emergency medical calls for service classified as calls for a "sick person" in the Tenderloin increased more than 150% between June and November of this year compared to the same period in 2020.
- There was a 38% increase to the City's Street Overdose Response Team between October and November of 2021 and a 44% increase in calls regarding drug overdose in the same period.
- Calls to 311 reporting issues concerning human waste, needles, and garbage on the streets and sidewalks have also significantly increased compared to this time last year.

We encourage you to support the Mayor's declaration of an emergency in the Tenderloin, and the related Proclamation. Allowing the Department of Emergency Management to respond to the Tenderloin's issues using their highly effective COVID-19 response model will support: Residents, Businesses, Employees, Visitors, our City's first responders; and those suffering and dying on City streets.

For the past twelve years I have lived in San Francisco and worked in the Mid-Market, Civic Center and Tenderloin areas. Today I urge you to ratify Mayor Breed's Declaration of Emergency for the Tenderloin – and indeed, for San Francisco.

Earlier this month, Heather Knight brilliantly reported on Laurie Steve's 3-month doomed effort to rescue her daughter Jessica from fentanyl's addiction on the streets of San Francisco.


"Jessica said her life might seem hard, but it's actually pretty carefree, and she offered a sweeping explanation of one reason why her mom would face such long odds trying to pull her out of San Francisco. "The city is way too easy for people with nothing to get by," she said. "That's why I'm still here nine years later. You get by with doing drugs and suffer no consequences. I like it here."



She set out to save her daughter from fentanyl. She had no idea what she would face on the streets of San Francisco

While the question of compelling resistant drug users into treatment remains open, a first step, and a much-needed step, is facilitating access to long-term substance abuse treatment to those who are ready for it, or who can be persuaded into readiness through compassion and care. Ratifying Mayor Breed's Declaration will allow the City's Department of Emergency Management to implement a 24-hour linkage site that will aim to do just that.

In an era when synthetic drugs such as fentanyl and P2P meth have become incredibly deadly due to their combined potency, toxicity, cheap price and totally endless supply, it is naïve to think that going after the drug dealers and the supply side of drugs will ever be sufficient to solve the health crisis of substance abuse. Those who still think so should read Sam Quinones's latest book "The least of us: True tales of America and Hope in the Time of Fentanyl and Meth".



Quinones supports law enforcement efforts to stop the illegal fentanyl and meth drug trade, and calls for more cooperation between US and Mexico. But he also portrays how addiction recoveries, even severe ones, are possible with renewed focus on drug-afflicted individuals and communities.

San Francisco does have some existing resources offering substance abuse treatment, but navigating through them is complex and there hasn't been yet an effort to truly coordinate and increase access. I believe that the City's Department of Emergency Management can and should lead that effort, but in order to act with the necessary urgency that our community deserves, DEM needs the Board of Supervisors to ratify the Mayor's Declaration of Emergency for the Tenderloin.

I'll conclude with an excerpt from Quinones book: "We used to believe people needed to hit rock bottom before seeking treatment. That's an[...] idea made obsolete by [...] the current synthetic drug supply. It belongs to an era when drugs of choice were merciful. [...] Today, rock bottom is death."

This rock bottom of death is the emergency we are facing now in the streets of San Francisco.

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

Dear President Walton and Honorable Members of the Board of Supervisors,

On behalf of the San Francisco Partnership, an organization of the City's leading employers that supports an equitable, resilient, and vibrant economy shared by all people working and living in San Francisco, we ask you to support the proposed Declaration of a Local Emergency which will help address the worsening health conditions in the Tenderloin.

As you are all well aware, there is a humanitarian crisis occurring on the streets in the Tenderloin that only continues to worsen. It is vital that the entire City apparatus, including the Board of Supervisors, work together to address this emergency immediately. The Proclamation points out that the number of people who have died of drug overdoes has increased by more than 200% since 2018 and now totals more than 15 people a week. This daily tragedy shouldn't be allowed to continue in our City.

In fact, in 2020, more than 700 people died from drug overdoses, more than the number of people who COVID-19 has killed in San Francisco. Given the commendable cooperation, focus, and resources from City Hall to address the viral pandemic, it seems only appropriate for the Board of Supervisors to mount a similar effort to address the carnage happening every day in plain sight in the Tenderloin. This emergency declaration is the first step.

This Proclamation would allow the Department of Emergency Management to better coordinate and augment their responses in the Tenderloin, similar to its COVID-19 response. If

passed, this Proclamation will require City departments to unite their operations in the Tenderloin for the first time under an emergency command, significantly reducing the timeline to provide essential social services. It also allows San Francisco to become eligible for potential reimbursement if a State or Federal Declaration supports this effort.

This crisis cannot go unaddressed any longer. We urge the Board of Supervisors to now take action and support the Declaration of Emergency the people need.





As a resident manager living in the Tenderloin I have watched the situation go from bad to worse. Most of the tenants I support are elderly and afraid to leave the building. Those who are able to leave often have to return without reaching their destination due to streets crowded with dealers who intimidate, scare, and provoke the elderly.

All of the women I know who live and work in the neighborhood convey their fear to step foot in the Tenderloin because avoiding the harassment and cat-calls by drug dealers is unavoidable. And it's not just the catcalls. Just a few months ago, in broad daylight, a woman was sucker-punched in the back of the head and knocked to the ground by a dealer. She conveyed her fear of not knowing what was going to happen next. Was this a kidnapping or attempted rape? Fortunately the perpetrator walked away without causing any more harm. But now the victim is subject to seeing the perpetrator randomly throughout the neighborhood, greeted with winks and catcalls, having to relive the experience daily.

And as you all know, a young girl was recently placed in the ICU by an individual suffering from a mental health crisis. Additionally, with children walking by I often share the sight of adults defecating and relieving their bowels in the sidewalk and always within sight of a porta potties or pit-stop.

Some have said that this Emergency Declaration is unjustified. Saying that this is unjustified discounts and ignores the traumatic experiences of those who are most vulnerable. Women, children, the elderly, and those in need of mental health support would not be subject to these very real and unavoidable scenarios in a just world.

I am writing to urge you to vote for the Mayor's "Proclamation of Local Emergency – Drug Overdoses in the Tenderloin" (File No. 211320) this Thursday. The residents of the Tenderloin are living with crime, drug use, drug dealing, and dangerous conditions. Those unhoused in the Tenderloin also endure unsafe, unhealthy, and deteriorating conditions. As a specific example, Shorenstein is an owner of an apartment building located at 50 Jones Street where in December 2020, stray bullets fired on Jones Street entered one of our apartment units. In February 2021, a shooting on Jones Street pierced the pant leg of an unarmed Epic security guard who was working for our property. In June and July of this year, two individuals tragically lost their lives as a result of gun violence, each time within sight of our front door. And just two weeks ago, a bullet pierced our window and was lodged in the wall of our residential lobby. This bullet was three feet away from where our concierge and security officer sit, and four feet away from our property manager's office.

Frankly, we believe the City of San Francisco has fallen short in its responsibility to its residents. We are tremendously grateful to the efforts of our local police precinct, but the SFPD Tenderloin Station is stretched thin. Captain Canning has reiterated that our block is a top priority; however, with the 18 officers he has on duty to cover a 50-block area, he simply does not have the resources to adequately police the neighborhood. We were encouraged to hear of the Mid-Market Vibrancy and Safety Plan announced earlier this year. This plan called for \$11 million in funding, but ultimately the City only allocated \$5 million, leaving a plan that could only be partially executed. As a result, 50 Jones and the surrounding blocks have been excluded from the Urban Alchemy ambassador plan. Not only have we never had a single ambassador deployed on our block, but the success of the program in other areas has steered additional criminal activity to our block. Our residents and employees no longer feel safe living, working, and raising families in this city. We are worried about the effect further violence will have on the mental and physical wellbeing of the members of our community.





Dear Supervisor Matt Haney,

We are writing to you today as local business leaders, concerned citizens and representatives of 1000's of our community residents who live and work in the SOMA and Tenderloin neighborhoods. Our company headquarters and largest multi-family apartment communities are in your district and the conditions on our streets has become untenable.

The impact of the COVID pandemic has only exasperated an environment reeling from the explosion of fentanyl and opioid related drug use and sales.

Our residents and staff are struggling daily to survive in a community overwhelmed by drug-dens, organized dealer circuits, open drug use and daily overdoses—often times on our doorstep and within feet of where we live and work. There are on-going tent encampments with rampant illicit activity outside our properties and staff and residents are increasingly afraid to walk through a growing number of the surrounding streets.

Additionally, crime is on the rise. Just in the past several weeks one of our buildings was shot at, our largest maintenance shop burglarized, and multiple dumpsters set on fire. There has been a major uptick in vehicle break-ins, bicycle and package theft and a resident was recently assaulted in front of the Orpheum Theater and decided to move out of the neighborhood. We can no longer blindly accept or condone the third-world conditions we have been forced to live and work in on our community day and night.

We implore you Mr. Haney and all of your fellow Supervisors to adopt the Emergency Proclamation proposed by Mayor Breed so that we can finally make a lasting change to our neighborhoods and improve safety and basic quality of life conditions for our residents and staff in the Tenderloin and SOMA. Many of us have been touched deeply by drug addiction and homelessness that confounds simple solutions. In my case, 34 years ago I held a childhood friend's baby in my arms the week after he was born to a financially secure family in New Jersey. Today that baby, now a grown man, lives on the streets of San Francsico addicted to drugs and homeless. He came here because he knew he could get drugs and get by. His mom spent six months here searching for him but he won't go home and into rehab in New Jersey. We have made it too easy for him here.

There are many varied and tragic stories like this affecting our city. Emily Cohen, Interim Director of Strategy and External Affairs, SF Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing, has told us that for every unhoused individual she is able to house, two take their place.

Yes, we desperately need more affordable housing (I've watched several dozen market rate units in Dogpatch sit empty for 18 months now). We also need more street crisis teams. But this is not the only need. We must draw a line so our city can be safe and livable for all of us.

Last week I watched three people shoot up in a bus shelter on Market street as I waited for a ride with my teenage daughter. In my 25 years as a resident of this incredible city I have never see such a dire situation on our streets. We are looking to you, our Supervisors, to authorize faster and more effective action to address this crisis. Treat this disaster like the emergency it is. Your neglect of the neighborhood is appalling. The Tenderloin is full of children, seniors, recent immigrants, and working poor. Do they deserve to live with this situation? NO! I am writing in support of Mayor Breed's recent announcement to clean up the Tenderloin. It is the first ray of SF sunshine to escape City Hall in months!

I am a long-time resident of District 8, and also a retired UCSF Professor of Psychiatry, running a non-profit for the benefit of families living with autism—in the Flood Building—on the edge of the Tenderloin. Some of our pattients report being uncomfortable with the neighborhood, as do my staff.

I took BART to work from my home in Noe Valley for 8 years pre-pandemic—but now still in my car—as my couple of forays to Powell BART have been a bit too scarey. I park in the basement of Ellis O'Farrell—where (in the last two months) I have seen the same homeless couple sleeping or changing clothes several times (sad for them), but also a guy who I thought might follow me to my car—there, instead, to self-inject some drug... On another occasion, I arrived to my car to see a drug deal--dealer, his protector, and customer, hovering near my car—so I kind of waited for them to finish—though still moving toward my car—so I looked like a parking customer and not a narc... One of the women in my office had the back window of her Tesla broken out in Ellis OFarrell—nothing taken—nothing to take. Others of my staff only park in upper levels—they deem 'safer.'

I drive home on Ellis to Jones where there are frequently drug deals going down at the last light before Market Street, and on several occasions I waved pleasantly—hoping to indicate I was waiting for the light to change, not drugs. As a mental health professional, I can say that easily over 75% of these people need mental health and or drug treatment. Living on the street is not a good choice for them or for us.

In the last couple of weeks I have been so pleased to see more police on the beat, to see encampments like Mission and 7th cleaned up, and to see cops demonstrating a change in the City's tune. The human detritus of San Francisco has left me, a 30+ year resdident of Noe Valley—considering whether it is time to leave. Anyone who thinks this is a 'homelessness' problem and not a crime, drug, and mental health problem live in La-La Land. Chesa Boudin belongs in La-La Land, not San Francisco!

Please help Mayor Breed continue to implement her plans to clean us SF!

It has become increasingly difficult and exponentially more dangerous for us to do business in the Tenderloin. There are frequent shootings, fights involving deadly weapons, and other dangerous behaviors happening at the front door of the hotel and its surrounding area on a daily basis. Guests are scared to arrive at the hotel and many leave before even checking in because of all the negative activity surrounding the hotel. Our colleagues are terrified to come to work. They do it because they need to provide for their families, but many end up leaving because the stress of having to make their way to the hotel never knowing what could happen is not worth it to them and they end up taking other jobs that are safer, often outside the City. Many of our colleagues have had to endure multiple active shooter lockdowns at the hotel because of the shootings directly across the street. One of these is too many. Can you imagine multiple in a year's time? This is the City of San Francisco and we are located two blocks from City Hall. This condition is simply unacceptable and something must be done. Whatever the City has been doing to date hasn't been working and addressing this crisis is long overdue. The safety of law abiding citizens, guests, and colleagues must finally be taken into account and prioritized.

In addition to having to live in constant fear just to come to work or just to visit San Francisco, the hotel is being permanently damaged from all the negative reviews on social media and other online platforms as a result of all the criminal activity in the neighborhood. Since 2015, The Healing WELL is and has been a place of healing and sanctuary for many in our Tenderloin neighborhood seeking a respite from the realities just outside our doors. It is ironic that The Healing WELL, the neighborhood center that offers programming and promotes relationships to help people cope in healthy ways with the trauma and stress they experience, is being rendered inaccessible by the increasingly dangerous, triggering and discouraging conditions on the street. The Mayor's Declaration of this State of Emergency is long-overdue. For decades, our community members, from children to the elderly, housed and unhoused, have been traumatized because of the City's neglect and short-sighted policies which have led to violence and death, and unsafe and unsanitary conditions on the streets.

What is different now is that we are facing an intense public health crisis because of drug overdoses. As such, we need a public health response.

On behalf of the Phoenix Hotel and Chambers eat + drink, I am writing in support of the State of Emergency that Mayor Breed has declared in the Tenderloin.

As the managing partner of both venues, I am in the neighborhood every day. To be sure, the Tenderloin has always been a little gritty but over the past 2 years the streets and sidewalks have devolved into a place where people are killing themselves and each other on a daily basis. The lack of attention to the neighborhood over the past 2 years has created a situation where only those engaged in illegal behavior can exist. For business owners and families, it is now unsafe, unhealthy and simply unfit.

Two weeks ago the gas at the hotel was turned off by PG&E because drug users broke a valve, creating a hazardous situation. They would not come and repair the valve because they felt unsafe around the people in the neighborhood and what would certainly be a health hazard to them. This left my guests of both the hotel and restaurant without gas - no food service and no hot water, simply because the streets are too unsafe for basic critical services to be maintained.

We struggle on a daily basis to literally get our doors open because of the threats from the violent drug dealers. We can not open until we have the active help from police to just clear the front entrance. Consider the appeal of this to our valued guests.

I can't tell you how much the city's blind eye has affected the business that once flourished in the neighborhood The countless reviews from hotel guests speak for themselves.

• The area is really down ridden with homeless and junkies

• This hotel is in a terrible neighborhood. Going out anywhere was a challenge due to MANY drugged out individuals carpeting the sidewalk along with thick litter. I'm glad I survived. Restaurant was closed.

• The hotel is very trendy, very nice, very stylish but of course in a rather dangerous area. Indeed, the tramps take crack at the exit of the parking lot. But the hotel is well worth it and once we are inside there is no danger.

• Inside property was nice and good people running place! - "But" there is no reason this outside property / area can't be improved and no reason why local people should put up with this homeless mess. Has open drug use and people dealing drugs right outside property. Homeless need to be relocated & drug (death) dealers thrown in jail- period. No excuse for this mess. Community leaders / people need to improve & move homeless to shelters in areas

away from city. Force your gov leaders to spend "your" tax money in a more productive way!



Addressing the crisis that is happening in the Tenderloin is critical to the future of our city and to the people who are dying on our streets daily from drug overdoses. This declaration will enable the waiving of certain laws to quickly address the crisis as part of the Mayor's Tenderloin Emergency Intervention Plan. There is an health emergency in the Tenderloin, and it needs to be addressed as such.

On a daily basis, I have guest come to stay and then depart because the conditions of our streets are littered with trash and drugs, drug dealers and even dead people on the streets from daily overdoses. The amount of trash that our CBD teams pick up daily is unbelievable and they cannot keep up. Today, I walked outside my hotel at 4pm and a drug dealer/addict was sitting outside my business front door with a bag of drugs and 100 needles on the ground as his bag had broken and spilled out all over the sidewalk. What do you think my guests thought as they walked by this scene? On the corner of 8<sup>th</sup> and market there are dealers there every day selling drugs, the police come by and they scurry away but as soon as the police leave they return. The amount of urine and feces on all the streets from humans and dogs is uncontrollable. Why do we allow homeless to have pets with them? Are the pets safe, vaccinated as well. One bite to a guest and who knows how much the city will pay in lawsuits.

I lived here before and moved back 6 months ago and cannot believe how bad the conditions in SF have become!!! I am uncertain if I will stay as the situation has become so tragically awful and unsafe.

Again, we ask that you vote to support the Mayor's Proclamation of a Local Emergency in the Tenderloin. Please save the city of San Francisco as it is almost too late at this point and it will take years to recover.

On behalf of Hotel Del Sol, I am writing in support of the State of Emergency that Mayor Breed has declared in the Tenderloin.

Addressing the crisis that is happening in the Tenderloin is critical to the future of our city and to the people who are dying on our streets daily from drug overdoses. This declaration will enable the waiving of certain laws to quickly address the crisis as part of the Mayor's Tenderloin Emergency Intervention Plan. There is a health emergency in the Tenderloin, and it needs to be addressed as such. This year alone we have had an overdose on the property, people shooting up in our parking lot, breaking into the property, breaking into cars so many times that we have stopped counting, and the most disturbing incident happened a couple of weeks ago when a mentally ill person assaulted an employee and a guest at the property in the middle of the night. The employee is still in treatment, spend over a week at SF General ICU, and nearly lost his life, the guest walked away with a black eye and other lacerations. The incident was

caught on tape, police arrested the individual, and our DA let him leave with an ankle bracelet, a 150 ft restraining order, and the promise to check in every 4 days with a social worker. The man has been diagnosed as bipolar 20 years ago, and that makes it OK to nearly kill someone and be let back into the community so that someone else may get hurt or killed? Our staff is frightened, we have to spend an enormous amount on additional security to appease the fears... The guests who witnessed this will undoubtedly tell their friends and associates about these San Francisco experiences. I would go to the media with this story, but no one wants more bad publicity in our industry, we want solutions that work. While this incident did not occur in the Tenderloin it is part of the same problem that is creating the untenable situation we have in the heart of our City.



### Dear Board of Supervisors,

It was 35 years ago (Dec 31, 1986) that I bought a nearly-bankrupt pay-by-the-hour motel at the corner of Larkin & Eddy Streets and renamed it The Phoenix. Back then, this particular area of the Tenderloin was a welcome spot for new Asian immigrants, arriving LGBTQ residents to the city, and it was a safe spot for fixed-income seniors. I did what I could to be a positive influence, joining the Board of Glide Memorial Church for a decade and becoming an active supporter of the Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corporation. In fact, The Phoenix has raised approximately \$10 million for TNDC's Afterschool Program over the past 30 years by conceiving and hosting the Celebrity Pool Toss and has done its best to be a catalyst for neighborhood improvements.

But, I'm afraid The Phoenix and the TL are no longer rising from their ashes. In my 35 years of trying to be a positive influence, I've never seen the kind of unhealthy and unsafe situation we now find in the TL. Just this past week, I walked from Polk to Larkin on Eddy and saw four drug deals in process along with one person who was clearly overdosing and needing medical help - all on one block. I saw a worried Vietnamese-American mother walk her son to the other side of the street because of feeling harassed. And, I ran into Vivian Quach, who has worked with me at this location for 35 years, saying that she feels very unsafe coming to work. There is a health emergency in the Tenderloin, and it needs to be addressed as such.

My concern isn't just this corner at the gateway to the Tenderloin. I'm also a small owner of the Petite Auberge and White Swan hotels on the 800 block of Bush Street where we've seen a sizable growth in street drug activity over the past more than 20 years we've owned those hotels.

We are at the end of our rope. Our employees and customers no longer feel comfortable coming here and there are countless drug overdoses ruining lives of those who are addicted. I ask that you vote to support the Mayor's Proclamation of a Local Emergency in the Tenderloin.

Dear Board of Supervisors,

It was 35 years ago (Dec 31, 1986) that I bought a nearly-bankrupt pay-by-thehour motel at the corner of Larkin & Eddy Streets and renamed it The Phoenix. Back then, this particular area of the Tenderloin was a welcome spot for new Asian immigrants, arriving LGBTQ residents to the city, and it was a safe spot for fixed-income seniors. I did what I could to be a positive influence, joining the Board of Glide Memorial Church for a decade and becoming an active supporter of the Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corporation. In fact, The Phoenix has raised approximately \$10 million for TNDC's Afterschool Program over the past 30 years by conceiving and hosting the Celebrity Pool Toss and has done its best to be a catalyst for neighborhood improvements.

But, I'm afraid The Phoenix and the TL are no longer rising from their ashes. In my 35 years of trying to be a positive influence, I've never seen the kind of unhealthy and unsafe situation we now find in the TL. Just this past week, I walked from Polk to Larkin on Eddy and saw four drug deals in process along with one person who was clearly overdosing and needing medical help - all on one block. I saw a worried Vietnamese-American mother walk her son to the other side of the street because of feeling harassed. And, I ran into Vivian Quach, who has worked with me at this location for 35 years, saying that she feels very unsafe coming to work. There is a health emergency in the Tenderloin, and it needs to be addressed as such.

My concern isn't just this corner at the gateway to the Tenderloin. I'm also a small owner of the Petite Auberge and White Swan hotels on the 800 block of Bush Street where we've seen a sizable growth in street drug activity over the past more than 20 years we've owned those hotels.

We are at the end of our rope. Our employees and customers no longer feel comfortable coming here and there are countless drug overdoses ruining lives of

those who are addicted. I ask that you vote to support the Mayor's Proclamation of a Local Emergency in the Tenderloin.

### Hi there!

I have been a resident in San Francisco since 2005. I live in District 8 (29th and Dolores) and work in District 6 (near 7th and Folsom).

I work for a medical device manufacturer and have been required to go into work throughout the pandemic. I've taken the 14 bus to and from work almost every day for the past 1.5 years.

Like so many others, I've seen the neighborhood near my work fall into dramatic despair during the pandemic. Every day, as I walk from 7th and Mission (where my bus stop is) to 7th and Folsom, I routinely see at least 3 or 4 people completely sprawled out on the sidewalk, face-planted into the concrete. These people don't look passed out - they look dead. There are even more who are meandering about or lurched up against buildings, their minds clearly overtaken by the drugs they are on, with open flesh wounds on their legs, arms and even faces, sometimes muttering to themselves, and sometimes yelling at others as they walk by. There are always piles of feces, and always at least a few broken needles on the sidewalk. There is always at least one very large pile of trash spilled all over the street. There is rampant drug dealing in the neighborhood; it happens openly in plain view near the bus stop (people refer to this as an "open air drug market"). When I write this, I feel like one of those Twitter trolls who loves to stick it to San Francisco for being a terrible place to live. But I am not one of those people - I love living in San Francisco and have always appreciated the city's attempts to take care of people who have fallen on hard times. What I'm writing now is simply a direct, objective account of what I see every day. It is sad.

Over the past year I've also had a medical condition that has required me to see a doctor whose office is near Taylor and Geary. There's no need for me to detail what that walk is like - I'm sure you've all been in that area and seen how abysmal it is. Suffice to say, I oftentimes have no option but to walk down the middle of the street because there is no place whatsoever to walk on the sidewalk.

There were always issues in this neighborhood. When I first moved to the city in 2005, I would occasionally go out in the Tenderloin and SOMA and even back then it wasn't the safest. But it wasn't \*nearly\* this bad. Today, you wonder how a city could have regressed this much over 15 years. The business owners in the neighborhood (who I've made it a point to patronize throughout the pandemic) are completely baffled as to how things have gotten so bad. They have lost business and feel demoralized when they hear that people won't come to the neighborhood because they don't want to deal with the bleak situation on the ground. Speaking on behalf of my co-workers who were not required to come into work during the pandemic, several of them \*would\* like to come back occasionally, but don't feel like dealing with the neighborhood. This is probably happening at many other workplaces whose offices are located in the area, and the implication of this is that local businesses suffer due to lack of

foot traffic.

People say the major cause of everything I've described above is the drugs (which, based on my observations, I would plainly agree with) but why does our city leadership not care about this problem? City leadership appears to have made no attempt over the last 1.5 years, or if it has, whatever was tried has not remotely worked, and it is clear that no one is assessing the futility of those efforts and considering new options to affect change.

I feel so bad for the people who live in this area, and for the businesses who have set up shop here. They are stuck, beholden to a point of view that the troubles of those who are forced to sell and use drugs are strictly more important to consider than the struggles of people trying to run a business or raise their families. There are maybe dozens of people selling drugs, and thousands of people who are forced to live in bleak circumstances because of it.

I implore you to take action, and as of right now the only pragmatic action I've heard from city leadership is the state of emergency proposal to rid the neighborhood of the drugs. It seems as if Matt Haney and the residents of District 6 are supportive of change, and seeing as how it is those people who are directly affected, I hope the rest of the BOS will acknowledge what the people who voted for Matt Haney want him to do.

As someone who lived in downtown Chicago for 11 years I have never experienced such traumatic living conditions as I have in San Francisco and the level of being on guard required just to walk around the city. I finally moved to the top of Nob Hill and while it is better it is still incredibly unsafe. People should not have to live like this. I don't know how much longer I can actually live in San Francisco even though this has been the city I have dreamt of living in since I was in college. Just the drive in from the airport to my home, whether it is me or someone coming to visit me, is some of the most horrendous living conditions that someone will ever see in their lifetime. Last year I went to India told people I would be shocked and devastated by the living conditions there if I did not live in San Francisco and see something similar on a daily basis.

I appreciate you are all busy, so I won't burden you with the almost daily degradations me and my family experience at the hands of drug addicts, derelicts and the mentally ill, but I will provide continued updates of more egregious examples. I trust that is helpful in finding solutions to the increasingly apocalyptic conditions on our

streets.

I was enjoying a coffee while my daughters shared a pastry at our local coffee shop this morning. What should have been a nice, relaxing, weekend morning bonding experience quickly turned into anything but that when a deranged man entered the shop and menaced every patron (many of whom were kids) in a threatening manner before laughing and walking out after about 5 minutes. Although this type of scary behavior has become normalized and not different from our common experiences, both of my daughters feared for their safety, and wanted to leave.

It is easy to point to cost of living as the reason San Francisco has the lowest percentage of kids of any city in the country, but subjecting one's kids to the uncivilized behavior that we accept on our streets is an important reason families are abandoning the City in droves. My wife and I are nearing that point.

I also appreciate that many or all of you inherited this mess, but it is worsening on your watch. I haven't heard from a single one of you about a single plan to address the hellish conditions on our streets.

What are the plans to get this situation under control? Does the City really want to continue to lose productive families due to an inability and lack of political will to provide safe and civilized streets? Ben Holl

My family and I are nearing a breaking point over the uncivilized street behavior that is so common and accepted and it has become the new norm. What is the status of getting standards in place to curb this behavior, or at least enforcing those that currently exist?

On my bike ride to work this morning, I was accosted by an unstable woman on Market and 7th who demanded I give her my bike so she could "attend to an emergency." She literally tried to push me off my bike and take it. We struggled over my bike for about a minute, before I was able to free myself and ride off. I did not

call the police, but instead continued to work, because I know nothing of significance would happen to this woman, and I would simply end up wasting more of my time. Another of countless, almost daily examples of not quote as startling, but still upsetting events occurred when I was recently leaving the AMC Van Ness with my family following a showing of the animated youth film "Coco." Within a block of the theatre we literally walked past 3 people with needles in their arms. Why do we accept this?

I was born in San Francisco, and it has been home for a large part of my life. But these are not complaints rooted in nostalgia, and instead a plea for simple decency and safety. My wife and I had the good fortune of buying a home before that became an option solely for the uber-wealthy. We are not millionaires. For now, we are raising our two school age daughters here, and are in the public school system. I chose to start a business here in 2015, and we have been trying our best to continue to make living here work. We also vote in every election.

But we are rethinking all of these choices (other than choosing to vote), in large part because of the uncivilized behavior on our streets. It is unrelenting, and often threatening. It is not okay both the behavior and allowing it to become an accepted norm. For those who oppose establishing or

enforcing standards, I would ask where the humanity and compassion is in that. It is sad but telling that our streets have digressed to this point. I read the article in the Chronicle last weekend about tourists making similar complaints, but I am sure you are aware that this is a conversation regularly had among your constituents and very productive San Francisco residents. I know the people II frequently have this discussion with to be open minded, forward thinking, compassionate people, but who, like myself, are starting to conclude the City makes policy decisions that are hostile to members of the community who are trying to raise families here in favor of those who clearly have

needs, but can also be abusive and engage in behaviors that exhaust any capacity to help and that is simply unacceptable under any civilized standard.

Please let me what real plans are in place to make real change to curb the bad behaviour on our streets.





When that 90 days is up, maybe there'll be a clear view forward out of this mess, starting with medical care and housing.



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#### Hello All,

As you consider whether or not to ratify the emergency declaration for the Tenderloin, I would like you to consider the opinions and experiences of residents and urge you to approve it. I understand that on Thursday you will be hearing from many organizations and people outside of the Tenderloin, but because it is a Thursday at 2:00pm and the day before Christmas Eve it will be very difficult for many residents to join, particularly those with children who are home from school or those who are working and cannot take time out of their day.

This morning when HOT went to the 300 block of Hyde to do engagement, every single person refused services. We know that of the 110 people on that block, about half are people dealing drugs. Imagine for just one second living on that block (either housed or unhoused). Imagine trying to go to the grocery store, the laundromat, or walk your kids to school or the playground in those conditions. It is nearly, if not completely, impassable and the dealers constantly harass and intimidate people trying to walk through.

Because of this, the majority of residents we work and speak with strongly support the emergency declaration, and in fact they even asked for it. This is <u>the link</u> to the letter to the mayor that was read at a rally for community safety that over <u>200 Tenderloin</u> residents joined. I have also attached the nearly 400 signatures that were collected before delivering the letter. Two weeks ago the mayor met with over 50 residents from CCDC, CCSRO, La Voz Latina, TNDC, and private apartments. There were parents from TCS, Redding, and Glide's childcare center. These are people begging the city to improve their living conditions.

When you weigh your decision, please remember the residents of the Tenderloin. 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

To the SF Board of Supervisors,

I am a UCSF trained psychiatric nurse practitioner and a professor at the UCSF School of Nursing. I write to you representing only my own views on this matter.

The state of San Francisco's streets is deplorable. We have long mistook tolerance and compassion for neglect. Equally, we have mistaken behaviors of desperation as willful criminal behavior. I see drug addiction, homelessness, and public poverty not as crimes, but as systemic, public health problems that require systematic, health-focus approaches. We cannot arrest our way out of this problem, nor can we continue to allow people who are so sick that they are not able to care for their most basic needs to cynically slip through the cracks of a fragmented and ineffective public psychiatry system.

I am urging you to vote for Mayor London Breed's Declaration of Emergency (File No. 211320).

The humanitarian crisis in the Tenderloin has gone on long enough and it is time to try a new approach. The Mayor's Declaration of Emergency for the COVID-19 Pandemic likely saved thousands of lives in our city and now we must take quick and decisive action to prevent continued suffering and overdose deaths in the Tenderloin.

The Emergency Proclamation will enable the City to have a more effective emergency response, with public health, behavioral health, social, or housing services. The Proclamation requires the Controller's office to report to the Board on the City's use of funds to support the emergency response. The state of emergency will only last 90 days, and the Board retains the ability to terminate the state of emergency early.

The residents of the Tenderloin are living with crime, drug use, drug dealing, and dangerous conditions. Those unhoused in the Tenderloin also endure unsafe, unhealthy, and deteriorating conditions. If you vote against this Declaration, you are sending a clear message to the citizens of San Francisco that you care more about ideology, drug dealers, and lawlessness than you do families and our most vulnerable citizens who are suffering from drug addiction and living on the streets. We are listening.

The solutions that the City is currently implementing are not working so I urge you to vote YES on the Mayor's Proclamation of a Local Emergency -- Drug Overdoses in the Tenderloin on Thursday.
