I am currently a docent at the Botanical Garden, and I was Executive Director of the San Francisco Botanical Garden Society from 2000 to 2011. I write to you in your capacity as President of the Board of Supervisors concerning legislation that is coming before you next week that would relinquish control of the Japanese Tea Garden and the Conservatory of Flowers in Golden Gate Park to the Botanical Society, who currently have control over the Strybing Arboretum (now called the Botanical Gardens). I am strongly opposed to this for the following reasons.

When I was a child, everything in Golden Gate Park was free, including the Conservatory of Flowers, the Japanese Tea Garden, and the Strybing Arboretum. That was the only way my working-class father was able to take his wife and four children to all of these places. There are now fees for the Conservatory and the Tea Garden, and Arboretum is free to only those who live in San Francisco (which is patently unfair).

The Botanical Society has indicated that they plan on raising fees on the above-mentioned attractions once they assume control. What are now prohibitive fees for some will become prohibitive for many more. An increase in fees will discourage people from visiting these attractions, and those who live out of the city (like our next door neighbors in Daly City) are not likely to come to the park at all.

I strongly support an elimination of all fees to each of these attractions, and this would include everyone, no matter where they live. Please do not allow the complete opposite of this to happen - an increase fees - by giving control to the Botanical Society.

My name is Jane Scurich. From 2007 to 2017, I was employed as the Director of Development at the Conservatory of Flowers (COF). For two years during the recession, I also served as the Director of Major Gifts at the San Francisco Parks Trust (SFPT), now known as the Parks Alliance, which provided me experience with both organizations. Although I retired in 2017, I have continued to support COF as a member of the Advisory Council since 2018. As a member of the San Francisco Garden Club I assisted in fundraising for the new plant nursery and the Celebration Garden.

Throughout my tenure at the COF, I encountered donor confusion due to the SFPT fiscal sponsorship of COF. It was very difficult for donors to understand the relationship and appreciate the philanthropic needs of COF. It is also very unusual for an organization as large and established as the Conservatory to operate with a fiscal sponsor, a relationship usually created for a new nonprofit or a small and very focused community organization.

During my years of service at COF, one topic that regularly arose from guest services at our staff meetings involved visitors inquiring about a multi-use ticket to all the gardens in the park. The U.S. Travel Association hosted their International Pow Wow in San Francisco sometime around 2010. Prior to the event and during the convention, many travel consolidators inquired about one ticket to visit all three gardens. The proposal before you for one ticket to visit the three gardens is an answer to a long-asked question.

I would like to add my support for the proposed lease and management agreement amendment (File 21-1305) that allows the Botanical Garden Society, which operates the Botanical Garden, to operate the Japanese Tea Garden and the Conservatory of Flowers. I also support the Mayor's proposed ordinance (File 21-1295) that would eliminate residential admission fees for the Japanese Tea Garden and the Conservatory of Flowers and continue to allow dynamic pricing for non-resident adult admission fees.

As a frequent traveler (although now limited due to Covid) to national and international botanical gardens and conservatories, I find the admission fees to our local gardens to be quite low. Some of my favorite gardens have much higher admission: Atlanta BG is \$22.95, NY BG \$28, Brooklyn BG \$18. I do not think the combined ticket price for the three gardens would be a deterrent to non-resident visitors.

This proposal offers so much for San Francisco: an opportunity to unite the three gardens under one leadership, eliminate redundances, bring national and international attention to these world class gardens, create a well-conceived case for support from major philanthropists, and offer free admission to the majestic Conservatory and Tea Garden for San Francisco residents!

An advantage to the Rec & Parks Department is the streamlining of reporting and supervision. Currently, the Director of the Conservatory and Botanical Garden, a Rec/Park employee, works collaboratively with the Executive Director of the BG. At the Conservatory, The Director oversees the horticultural employees of Rec/Park, and oversees development, event rental, guest services, operations, volunteer, and education departments, responsibilities that will be managed by SFBG Society.

Subject: Questions regarding the Gardens of Golden Gate Park proposal (File No. 211305)

As part of the Budget and Finance Committee deliberations, the Sierra Club SF Group would appreciate information on the following issues regarding the Gardens of Golden Gate Park proposal:

- 1. Will the raise in out-of-town fees cover the cost of free admission for residents? Please outline the projections for this. If not, what is the estimated loss for the first year? And also for subsequent years, once COVID is not a factor in people visiting San Francisco.
- 2. A quick review of a past budget found online seemed to indicate that the Tea Garden brings in four times as much revenue as the Botanical Garden. If this is the case, it seems that this lease is going to result in the Tea Garden paying for the Botanical Garden expenses. The Botanical Garden Society took over the management of the SFBG with claims that it could raise funding for the SFBG. Has that not been the case?
- 3. Despite the Tea Garden bringing in considerably more revenue, the lease still reserves the first funding for the Botanical Garden. There is no set-aside for the Tea Garden. Why is that? Shouldn't extensive funding be set aside for the Tea Garden?
- 4. What kind of changes would the SFBG Society be able to make in the Tea Garden? For instance, could they build new buildings in the Tea Garden, put up new advertising, change the plant palette? Would this lease allow the Botanical Garden Society to sublease the Tea House to a different entity of its choosing, such as Starbucks?
- 5. The lease says that the Department of Recreation and Park can make additional changes to the lease after the Supervisors vote. Do these changes have to go back to the Supervisors, or are they preapproved with this vote?
- 6. The Tea Garden is valued for its beauty and as a place of quiet contemplation. Will public be denied access to the Tea Garden due to private fundraising events? Will there be a limit to the number of times a year that the Tea Garden could be closed off to the public?
- 7. The original Botanic Garden lease is for 10 years, with the option for renewal -- that is a total of 20 years. Twenty years is a long time for valuable City parkland to be managed by an outside

organization. With this new lease, will the 20 years be extended or will the lease continue to function under the original 20-year agreement?

8. The pagoda in the Tea Garden is undergoing extensive and expensive renovation according to traditional building methods. The Botanical Garden Society is not an expert in either Japanese style gardens or architecture. How will the cultural and architectural integrity of the Japanese Tea Garden be preserved? Will funding be siphoned off of projects such as the pagoda or other restorations? Will voting positions be reserved on the SFBG Society Board for representatives of Japanese Culture and experts in Japanese gardens and architecture?

9. Exhibit E 1 d. states that:

"Expenditures from the Gardens of Golden Gate Park Improvement Fund will be used by City and SFBGS only for the payment of costs and expenses for maintenance, renovation and improvement of the Gardens of Golden Gate Park and will not be used for any other purpose unless the Parties otherwise agree in writing. Expenditures from the Gardens of Golden Gate Park Improvement Fund are intended to enhance the Gardens of Golden Gate Park and not to replace traditional sources or levels of City funding. Expenditures from the Gardens of Golden Gate Park Improvement Fund must be agreed upon by the Garden Director after consultation with the Executive Director and are subject to approval by the General Manager."

The proposal to combine management for the Gardens of Golden Gate Park is presented as solely to benefit those gardens. However, the above provision seems to allow the Recreation and Park Department to divert funds to other projects or uses without any public or BOS oversight.

I have volunteered at the Conservatory of Flowers in the San Francisco Botanical Garden for many years. I have helped with development and now serve on the Conservatory of Flowers Advisory Council. I have seen first-hand the importance of the Conservatory of Flowers to the Bay Area visitors, especially children and to the many visitors from around the world. You could say that it is the iconic "face" of the San Francisco Botanical Gardens.

The previous Director of the Botanical Garden, Matthew Stevens envisioned combining the Japanese Tea Garden, the Conservatory of Flowers, and the Botanical Garden. He worked toward that goal for several years. The three gardens are within walking distance of each other. Combining them under one umbrella would improve efficiencies and San Francisco would have one of the top gardens in the country. A merge would eliminate redundancies while allowing enhanced, combined educational and cultural experiences. Additionally, I believe, the three gardens together would also encourage greater philanthropic support for capital improvements for each garden.

I understand that fees would be eliminated for San Francisco residents. Needless to say, the combined gardens will need maintenance and enhancement funds. This could be done through Flex pricing for nonresident adult admissions only. It would not impact nonresident children, youth, or senior tickets.
