Policy Components

A plan for how departmental programs will provide drug treatment and harm reduction programs and services

the department will **post and make accessible** – syringe access and disposal services and schedule of overdose prevention and naloxone distribution services

An **onsite overdose response** policy

staff who work with people who use drugs receive **training in overdose prevention strategies**

grantees will implement overdose prevention policies

Interdepartmental Collaborative Process

- DPH, HSH, HSA, and DEM committed to a collective and collaborative approach to overdose prevention.
 - Adopted a set of guiding principles and shared policy components

- Departments assess and draft policies

Winter 2021

- Departments circulate Departmental Overdose Prevention Policies for internal adoption
- Launched resource webpage to support HSH, HSA, and DEM
- Submit 2021 Departmental Overdose Prevention Policies to Board of Supervisors

Existing Work: DPH's Commitment to Overdose Prevention

- Clients served across DPH include people who use drugs who may be at risk of overdose
- Long history of providing direct treatment services and supporting harm reduction as an effective strategy for overdose prevention
 - Health Commission Resolution
 - Existing contract requirements for BHS, CHEP HIV/HCV



San Francisco Health Network

Direct health services that DPH provides to thousands of insured and uninsured residents of San Francisco, including those most socially and medically vulnerable.

• **Behavioral Health Services** - Largest provider of mental health and substance use prevention, early intervention, and treatment services in SF.



Population Health Division

Engage in core public health functions such as outreach and community engagement, health inspections, communicable disease surveillance, research, and public health preparedness and planning.

DPH's Overdose Prevention Policy Development: Internal Process

 Met with DPH leadership across 13 Divisions/Branches to review legislation and current practices

- Conducted a DPH-wide assessment
 - Understand existing efforts across divisions, identify areas for improvement and resource needs
- Developed a DPH-wide Policy
 - Overdose prevention resource SFgov webpage
 - Overdose prevention training requirements
 - Established procedures in the event of an onsite overdose

HSH's Overdose Prevention Policy

- ► 2021 Overdose Prevention Policy Development:
 - Surveyed program teams from our six core service components to identify:
 - Existing work related to overdose prevention and harm reduction.
 - Areas where policy catalyzes expansion of overdose prevention services.
 - Drew on shared framework principles with input from DPH, DEM, and HSA.
- Submitted HSH 2021 Overdose Prevention Policy with supplemental report in December 2021.

Approach: HSH *includes*, rather than *excludes*, substance users from services.



Existing Work: Overdose Prevention

∽Housing:

- Housing First approach.
- Training.
- Harm reduction and overdose response policies.
- Post harm reduction and drug treatment information.
- Partnership with DPH and DOPE –
 overdose prevention in
 PSH: naloxone dispensers,
 "brave buttons".

∽Outreach (SFHOT):

- Naloxone and training.
- **Coordinated Entry (CE) & Problem** Solving:
 - Harm reduction approach.

∽Adult and TAY Shelters:

- Harm reduction & overdose prevention policies
- Naloxone, sharps containers.
- Trainings



Future Approaches and Changes

- ► Integrate HSH's 2021 Overdose Prevention Policy into service provider agreements on a rolling basis.
- **► Develop protocols** for each Homelessness Response System core component.
- ► Roll out trainings for staff and providers.
- →Identify fiscal/other resources needed to support implementation.
- **►** Explore opportunities for further interdepartmental collaboration.

Interdepartmental Partnership

- Shelter-in-Place Hotels
 - ✓ Partnered with DPH, HSH, SF AIDS Foundation, and the DOPE Project
 - Trained CBOs on Harm Reduction, OD prevention & response
 - Stocked naloxone, safer consumption supplies, fentanyl test strips
- Shared Citywide Framework of Principles
 - City + CBO partners = a system of comprehensive services
 - ✓ Need new & creative strategies to engage, motivate, and intervene
 - Culturally competent, non-judgmental services
 - Strategies to reduce harm
 - Relapse are expected, not "failure of treatment".
 - ✓ Input and feedback from community/consumers





SFSHA: Existing Work: Prevention & Treatment

- Trained staff at 1235 Mission St, our primary service center for CAAP, on how to identify an overdose and administer naloxone
- Trained team of DAS nurses who support clients with higher acuity needs and visit clients in their homes
- Refer clients to trusted partners for drug treatment and harm reduction services
- RAMS is onsite at some of our service centers to provide on-site drug and alcohol counseling










SFHSA: Future Approaches and Changes


- Training:
 - Always someone onsite to respond at all SFHSA's service sites
 - 。 All 2,400 HSA staff will be strongly encouraged to take training
 - All CBO partners will be strongly encouraged to have staff train
- Linkage to Drug Treatment and Harm Reduction Services
- Public postings and communications
- System to track use of naloxone and overdose incidents











HSOC Overdose Prevention Policy

Policy Development and Key Components



HSOC Policy Development

 2021: DEM participated in interdepartmental working group to establish shared principles.

 HSOC is a team of participating departments that each have overdose reversal trainings and tracking procedures.

 DEM, in partnership with HSOC partner departments, is responsible for ensuring HSOC has structures in place to support staff who respond to overdoses.



Four Key Policy Components

19

(1) During operations, HSOC will provide relevant referrals.

(2) HSOC shares information about naloxone, drug treatment, abstinence based recovery services, and harm reduction services.

(3) Overdose Prevention Training is required for HSOC staff.

(4) Follow onsite reversal and response protocols with naloxone easily accessible.
