This culturally significant artwork was Rivera's first mural painted in the United States. LHC joins local advocates in urging you to help preserve this important piece of local and national history.

One of Mexico's most famous artists, Diego Rivera was a leader of the Mexican Mural Movement of the 1920s and considered one of *los tres grandes* ("the three greats"), along with David Alfaro Siqueros and Jose Clemente Orozco. The three artists revolutionized art in post-revolutionary Mexico by painting largescale artworks on and within public buildings. *Los tres grandes* inspired and influenced the emergence of public art in the United States as well. In San Francisco, Rivera had the biggest presence, having painted three murals total. "The Allegory of California" was his first.

Located in the grand stairwell between the 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> floors of the City Club of San Francisco located at 155 Sansome Street, "The Allegory of California" is an early and excellent example of a monumental mural painted by master artist and world-renowned Mexican muralist, Diego Rivera, in the United States. This mural is more than worthy of landmark designation and we hope the City of San Francisco moves to protect it for future generations.
