14	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

16	Section 1. The Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Chapter 96F,
17	consisting of Sections 96F.1 and 96F.2, to read as follows:
18	CHAPTER 96F: COMMUNITY POLICING PLANS
19	SEC. 96F.1. COMMUNITY POLICING PLANS; FOOT AND BIKE PATROLS.
20	(a) Creation of District Station Community Policing Plans. The Police Department
21	("SFPD") shall create a Community Policing Plan ("CPP") for each police district station that shall
22	be publicly available and posted on SFPD's website and on each station's website.
23	(b) Community Policing Plans. The Police Department shall finalize the CPPs no later
24	than January 1, 2023, and review and update them on an annual basis by January 1 of each year. The
25	purpose of CPPs are to foster collaboration and open communication between police officers and

1	community members, including neighborhood associations and groups, small businesses, merchant
2	groups, non-profits, school groups, and neighborhood leaders. The CPPs shall:
3	(1) Support a culture and practice of policing that reflects the values of protection and
4	promotion of the dignity of all people, and, especially, the most vulnerable in the community.
5	(2) Foster an environment where requests for service and information from SFPD are
6	handled in a timely and transparent manner.
7	(3) Support community engagement and positive interactions and relationships between
8	SFPD and the community.
9	(4) Promote collaboration with groups as described in this section (b), above, to identify
10	problems as well as solutions that will produce meaningful results for the community, and incorporate
11	information learned from the Community Process in subsection (d).
12	(5) Deploy foot and bike patrol officers, as specified in subsection (c), at each district
13	station.
14	(c) Community Policing Strategies. SFPD shall create community policing strategies that
15	address deployment of foot and bike patrols, quality of life issues, and community language access
16	needs as follows:
17	(1) Foot and Bike Patrols. SFPD shall (A) adopt a foot and bike patrol strategy that
18	will deploy foot and bike patrol officers at every district station to effectively reduce crime and
19	strengthen the SFPD's partnership and trust with the community, and (B) develop a formula for
20	designating the foot and bike patrol streets and boundaries based on the reporting of crime, high
21	volume foot traffic, crime prevention, and community input.
22	(2) Quality of Life Issues. SFPD shall develop a strategy for proactive problem solving
23	on quality of life issues, nuisances, and crime prevention. In the face of these concerns, SFPD
24	community policing strategies shall create a sense of community where members of the community feel
25	safe and secure.

1	(3) Language Access Needs. SFPD shall incorporate a strategy tailored to address the	
2	distinct language access needs of communities served by each district station.	
3	(d) Community Process. SFPD shall create a public process for eliciting community input	
4	for the CPPs from community members, including neighborhood associations and groups, small	
5	businesses, merchant groups, non-profits, school groups, and neighborhood leaders that provide direct	
6	services to San Francisco residents in their respective district stations before adoption of the CPPs.	
7	SFPD shall consider and incorporate, to the extent possible, community feedback that includes a pro-	
8	active problem-solving approach in designing CPPs.	
9	SEC. 96F.2. UNDERTAKING FOR THE GENERAL WELFARE.	
10	In enacting and implementing this Chapter 96F, the City is assuming an undertaking only to	
11	promote the general welfare. It is not assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an	
12	obligation for breach of which it is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach	
13	proximately caused injury.	
14		
15	Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after	
16	enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the	
17	ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board	
18	of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

# **LEGISLATIVE DIGEST**

[Administrative Code - Community Policing Plans and Foot and Bike Patrols]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to require the Police Department to create a Community Policing Plan ("CPP") at each district police station, that, among other strategies, incorporates a foot and bike patrol deployment, and also includes a community process for eliciting input; and to require the public posting of the CPPs with a yearly update.

### **Existing Law**

Currently, there is no local ordinance that requires the Police Department to create CPPs for each district station.

## Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance would require the Police Department to create CPPs for each district station that, among other strategies, incorporates a foot and bike patrol deployment, and also includes a community process. This ordinance would require SFPD to publicly post CPPs and update them annually.

#### Background Information

As part of the United States Department of Justice Reform Recommendations, SFPD developed a Community Policing Strategic Plan in 2018 that is publicly available at https://www.sanfranciscopolice.org/your-sfpd/policies/community-policing-strategic-plan.
