Thank you for checking in. I checked in with our ccdc cbprc etc family, we actually would like to see Hilton to reopen the bridge for public open space use and not outdoor dining.

I walked by there since the first weeks of shelter in place, the gate always locked to my disappointment. Hilton closed it during a time when we need open space most. This has been the time where we need social distancing space given we have limited open space and with our overcrowded housing and vulnerable population. A reopened bridge would be good for local residents or visitors who migut go to Portsmouth Square and the bridge and to sit and eat there.

We also do not believe Chinatown Restaurants would benefit for many reasons. We are trying to support Chinatown restaurants in different way, the focus now is helping restaurants like Far East etc on Grant Avenue and closing of Waverly Place for outdoor dining. And also promoting more outdoor dining in front of Chinatown eateries. I had asked merchants about outdoor dining and doing something on a closed Grant Avenue, they said it's not practical because all the restaurants only hiring back 2-4 staffs, it's a luxury to send staffs away and I can see a logistic problem in cooking and prepping for them to handle more than their storefront.

Again, we only have so little precious open park space, Hilton needs to reopen the gate and the bridge space back to the public, sro residents, seniors, families and visitors to use the park plaza and the bridge and if they choose they can eat there. I also wonder if Hilton is bringing their own indoor businesses and or Fidi businesses there and that would displace our residents in need of open space.

Captain Lazar:

Would like to report to you that while the Chinese Cultural Center and their artist are paving the bridge with some artwork to prepare for the celebration of the finale of the Central Subway Temporary Art Programs for the Chinatown Station scheduled for this Friday morning at 10 AM (invitation to you in a separate email), some skate boarders had come over and tried to harass them and their volunteers. Even when CCC tried to explain to them what they are doing so the bridge is closed for public in the meantime they threatened to come and "toast" the artwork.

Can you please have more frequent patrol of that area while at the park, and increase the patrol frequency there. The bridge doesn't belong exclusively to the skate boarders and they have intruded a bridge walkway meant for pedestrians and visitors to the Hilton, especially to the Chinese Cultural Center, which is the original intension of the bridge. How can some bullies come in and make such a disturbing remark.

For your information, there were also skate boarders who invaded the lower level children play area at Portsmouth recently. I talked to them and requested them to go somewhere else as this is designated for small children, and their uninvited activity will cause disruption to the children and especially their safety. I believe they left shortly after I talked to them. However, this recent incident at the bridge does heighten our concern of the use of the park and its surrounding areas.

Please do something about it, and tell us what can we do to help.

P.S. According to CCC, the bridge is owned by the hotel but even their security has been harassed by the skate boarders. We do need your help.
