B. CURRENT PROGRAMS

1. Newsletter/Calendar/Information Services

For three years, the Arts Commission has been distributing a monthly E-newsletter to a list of 3,000. The newsletter features articles on SFAC programs -- from public art dedications and arts education news to grant deadlines, workshops, convenings, budget updates, new initiatives, staff changes and editorials. Newsletters are archived on our web site. (SFAC occasionally has also used this outreach list to support our sister organizations' own outreach efforts.) For grant applications, RFPs or RFQs for any SFAC program, public information sessions are held to answer questions. An SFAC staff member is also responsible for sending out all agency press releases, sometimes in conjunction with the Mayor's Office, and serves as our primary point of contact for press inquiries. In the last year, SFAC also began to use social networking sites (Facebook, Twitter, Flickr) and to produce podcasts ("Deep Roots"). Culture Wire, SFAC's 30-minute monthly cable show, presents SFAC stories in magazine or documentary format. Since Culture Wire began in 2008, it included a calendar section, though the format is changing in future episodes to become more evergreen and allow for distribution around California by other cable networks. The cross-program Communications and New Media Committee began to meet 24 months ago to ensure that all appropriate outlets were being used to keep our constituents informed of all opportunities and events and to coordinate internal and external communications.

2. Technical Assistance

The Cultural Equity grants program holds workshops on its 7 grant programs to answer application and review process questions. Program staff are also available during business hours to answer questions in person, by phone or email. All CEG Level II applicants meet for 2 hours with staff to prepare for these \$100,000 requests. Community Arts & Education offers workshops on all their initiatives--from Cultural Center board development to Art in Storefronts and the new SteetsSmarts/Where Art Lives anti-graffiti program. Additionally, within CAE, WritersCorps teachers meet monthly for an all-day training and technical assistance intensive. Street Artists offer public screenings and workshops for their licensees; Public Art holds technical assistance and site-based community workshops for all RFQs they post. SFAC and Grants for the Arts in conjunction with local funders launched the Creative Capacity Fund, the most significant technical assistance initiative launched for this community and which recently went statewide. Lastly, SFAC partners on public convenings to assist the field with critical issues. In January 2010, the Arts Commission in conjunction with other local funders presented a conference, "Dynamic Adaptability: A Conference on New Thinking and New Strategies for the Arts" which brought more than 400 attendees to the Herbst Theatre. Additionally, all SFAC staff are charged with offering assistance to anyone who reaches out to us for information or support.

3. Galleries/Exhibitions Accessible to the Public

Located in the heart of San Francisco's Civic Center, the SFAC Gallery is the commission's exhibition program and makes contemporary art accessible to broad audiences through curated exhibitions that both reflect our regional diversity and

position Bay Area visual art production within an international contemporary art landscape. Open 6 days a week, the gallery has four sites: 401 Van Ness Avenue (the main venue), 155 Grove Street (for sidewalk window installations), and City Hall's lower lobby and North Light Court. The Gallery's programs provide new and challenging opportunities for contemporary art to engage within a civic dialogue. Founded in 1970 and now celebrating its 40th anniversary, hundreds of artists are exhibited each year at the gallery's four locations. (In fact, as of December 2009, a total of 4033 artists were exhibited at the gallery in 451 exhibitions in the last 40 years.) Brown bag lunches, artists gallery programs. In 2008-2009 the gallery was able to launch the first exhibition in City Hall's grand Beaux Arts Rotunda. Internationally renowned sound pioneer Bill Fontana was commissioned to create an installation that sent laser thin sound waves spiraling paved the way for other arts groups to use the Rotunda for site-specific visual and performing art installations.

4. Percent for Art Ordinance/Art in Public Places Program

SFAC's Public Art Program, established in 1969, was one of the first in the nation. The public art ordinance provides for 2% of construction costs of civic buildings, transportation projects, parks and other structures such as bridges to be allocated for public art. It is administered by SFAC staff and overseen by the Commission's Visual Arts Committee. The PAP seeks to promote a diverse and stimulating cultural environment to enrich the lives of residents, visitors and employees. PAP encourages the creative interaction of artists, designers, City staff, elected officials and community members in order to develop art that is meaningful to the site and its community. Each project's lifespan--from design through completion--is approximately 3-7 years. PAP oversees project guideline and budget development in cooperation with architects, community advisors and other City agencies; curatorial research and coordination of artist selection including outreach to emerging artists and artists from underrepresented communities; contracts administration; installation; and coordination among all stakeholders. The PAP includes permanent and temporary projects and "Art on Market Street". The most visible and recent temporary projects include the Louise Bourgeois "Spider" on the Embarcadero, Manolo Valdes's "Ladies" series in Civic Center Plaza, and the soon-to-be-installed 15-ton, 3-story Zhang Huan "Three Heads, Six Arms" Buddha in honor of the Shanghai Sister City Celebration.

Touring/Presenting

The Summer & the Symphony POPS Concert Series is one of two presenting programs of the SFAC (not including the gallery exhibitions—see above). This annual program is coordinated with the SF Symphony and has changed from being a summer-only partnership to year-round. This music festival presents popular acts (such as Bernadette Peters, K.D. Lang, Johnny Matthis) and a range of classical programs under a joint marketing and promotional umbrella. Also part of this series is the free July performance by the symphony in Dolores Park which thousands attend each year. WritersCorps also poetry and prose at a minimum of six events each year. Venues include public libraries (branches and the Main Library), Intersection for the Arts, Bill Graham Civic Auditorium (as part of the annual Martin Luther King, Jr. Day celebration), and more recently

through their "Claim the Block" series at local museums in the Yerba Buena Cultural District -- the Contemporary Jewish Museum, MoAD, Yerba Buena Center for the Arts, Zeum and others. All these events are free and open to the public (some with museum admission). Budget constraints have put on hold some of the out-of-state travel WritersCorps would normally do--such as the National Poetry Slam competition in Washington, DC. Also, the Street Artists Program licenses visual artists to "present" their items for sale in designated spaces citywide.

6. Fairs/Festivals (sponsored by applicant)

SFAC supports -- but does not act as the organizing sponsor for -- neighborhood festivals that have a cultural component that strengthens community ties through the Fairs and Festivals grants program. Typically, 10-15 grants of \$3,000 are awarded, and this year \$36,000 was awarded to 12 festival organizations. Budget cuts have temporarily put that program on hold for FY 2010-2011, however. There are also festivals supported by our Cultural Equity Grants program (such as the Pilipino Parole Festival, the Festival of Altars at SomARTS, the Queer Arts Festival and the Asian Pacific Islander Festival, among many others). Lastly, the Arts Education Program does sponsor in conjunction with the Arts Providers Alliance of San Francisco the annual Arts Education Resource Fair in September or October. This event serves as a way to connect educators and SFUSD administrators with the providers who offer arts programs and services to schools.

7. Conferences (sponsored by applicant)

SFAC has increased its hosting or co-hosting of conferences and convenings in recent years, partly due to special anniversaries, but also as technical assistance to the field. From the three weeks of programming in 2008 to celebrate the Neighborhood Arts Program's 40th Anniversary to the 2009 "Arts and the Economic Recession" all-day summit at Yerba Buena Center for the Arts to the 2010 "Dynamic Adaptability: A Conference on New Thinking and New Strategies for the Arts", the Arts Commission seeks to serve the needs of our constituents and to address critical issues within the field. The aforementioned Arts Education Resource Fair is another annual convening of the arts and education communities. It also serves as a backdrop for lectures or professional development activities. This May, the Arts Education Program will launch Art Impact, a conversation between an educator and a individual who attributes involvement in the arts to their personal and professional success. Held at the de Young's Koret Auditorium, the featured speaker is Vernon Davis of the 49ers and will be followed by a fundraiser at Morton's The Steakhouse. Funds will be used to establish an arts scholarship fund for SFUSD high school seniors.

8. Arts in Education (Maximum:3,000 characters)

The SFAC's Arts Education Program supports the City's arts education efforts and serves as a resource hub for the field to advance arts learning during and after school. An active partner with the San Francisco Unified School District, the Arts Providers Alliance of San Francisco (for which we serve as lead administrator) and other community arts organizations, the Arts Education Program also develops in-school arts education programs and curriculum, and serves as a neutral advocate for the many local arts organizations and their curriculum. "Inside/Out: A Guide to Arts and Arts Education

Resources for Children and Teens in San Francisco" continues to be distributed districtwide each year. A new edition will be released in 2011 in partnership with the Arts Education Funders Collaborative. Through our role spearheading and co-chairing the advisory committee of the SFUSD Arts Education Master Plan, SFAC ensures that the district and City remain focused on the goal of providing high-quality arts education for every student in every school every day. Next year we are prioritizing an assessment of the plan's implementation to date. In partnership with the SFUSD and the APASF, the Arts Education Program continues to provide professional development for teaching artists. Recent topics have included "Understanding the Goals of 21st Century Skills", "Cultural Competency in Arts Education", "SFUSD's Balanced Scorecard" and "Effective Arts Education Evaluation Methodology". The new speaker series, "Art Impact", provides a platform to explore the impact of arts education through the lens of high-profile individuals who have a background in the arts, but are not currently working in the field. The series kicks off with San Francisco 49ers Tight End Vernon Davis, who much to the surprise of his fans, is an avid admirer of Renaissance art and is an accomplished visual artist. New programs this year include "StreetSmARTS" and "Where Art Lives" both of which are a partnership with the Department of Public Works. The programs seek to thwart graffiti in the urban landscape, to educate students and the community at-large on the distinction between sanctioned public / urban art and vandalism, and to encourage the creation of more artwork on public and private property to help reduce incidents of graffiti. Where Art Lives is an elementary school visual arts classroom curriculum teaching 4th and 5th grade students about urban art and murals. Taught by accomplished urban artists, the program introduces students to an arts vocabulary and the skills to design and create murals on their school campuses. Where Art Lives currently serves more than 100 students in 6 schools: Jean Parker; John Muir; Martin Luther King, Jr.; Paul Revere; McKinley and Bret Harte. StreetSmARTS connects established artists with private property owners to create vibrant murals. This year, 10 murals have been painted throughout the city. Both programs will expand in FY 2011.

9. Regranting (Maximum:3,000 characters)

Each year, the SFAC grants between \$4-5 million dollars to arts organizations, individual artists, cultural centers and non-profit organizations incorporating the arts into their programs. The City and County's General Funds are used for a small percentage of grants, but the Hotel Tax comprises the majority of our grant funds. In FY 2009, there were 116 organizations and 37 individuals funded through one of eight programs. Grant sizes range from \$3,000 to \$100,000 and are all determined through a public peer review panel system. Grant programs include: Cultural Equity Initiative Level I (a capacity building grant); Cultural Equity Initiative Level II (a \$100,000 capacity building grant available only to Level I grantees); Organizational Project Grants; Individual Artists Grants; Creative Space Grants; Arts and Communities: Innovative Partnerships (a collaboration between a non-profit and an arts organization or individual artist addressing specific community needs); Native American Cultural Traditions Grants; and grants to our four Community Cultural Centers (Mission Cultural Center, Bayview Opera House, African American Art and Culture Complex and SomARTS) and two "virtual centers" (Queer Cultural Center and Asian Pacific Islander Cultural Center). Every review panel for each grant program is open to the public, so that applicants can listen in (without comment) on the assessment of their proposals. This serves as a technical assistance or professional development opportunity for applicants, as well as to ensure a completely transparent process. In FY 2009, a total of \$4.9 million was made through

Arts Commission grants. What follows is the specific grant totals for each area of funding in FY 2009: Arts and Communities: Innovative Partnerships (\$347,550); Creative Spaces (\$120,000); Cultural Equity Level 1 (\$385,450); Cultural Equity Level II (\$300,000); Individual Artist Commissions (\$260,440); Native American Arts & Cultural Traditions Grants (\$106,000); Organizational Project Grants (\$525,000); Neighborhood Festival Grants (\$42,000); Programs in the Community (\$162,188); African American Art and Culture Complex (\$491,919); Asian Pacific Islander Cultural Center (\$98,429); Bayview Opera House (\$319,611); Mission Cultural Center (\$539,671); Queer Cultural Center (\$98,429); SomARTS (\$603,763).

10. Other (Maximum:3,000 characters)

Other important activities and initiatives not previously mentioned include the Art in Storefronts program, a project that brings together innovative public art installations and the economic development and revitalization of blighted neighborhoods. Launched in summer 2009, Art in Storefronts commissions artists or artist teams to install visual, new media, sound and interactive art in vacant storefronts. Currently focusing on storefronts in the Mid Market area, Mission District, Bayview and Chinatown, the program will expand to new neighborhoods next year. Art in Storefront received significant media attention, culminating with an article in both the New York Times and Time magazine in October 2009. This year, the 3rd annual Mayor's Art Award honored Carlos Santana, and it was no surprise when several hundred turned out for the event, which also honors all the artists who received grants, commissions or who exhibited with the Arts Commission this year. A recent commission of public art--the last memorial sculpture by Maya Lin at the California Academy of Sciences in Golden Gate Park--received much critical acclaim, as did a number of recent temporary installations by Manolo Valdes, Patrick Dougherty and Louise Bourgeois. These successes helped pave the way for the Arts Commission's most ambitious temporary public art installation: a 15-ton, 3-story sculpture by the renown Chinese artist, Zhang Huan. The 2008 "Three Heads Six Arms" Buddha is currently being shipped in 6 containers to California from Shanghai and will be dedicated and unveiled on May 12th in Civic Center Plaza, opposite City Hall. This is the largest sculpture by this contemporary artist, and he selected the location for its debut as part of the Shanghai Sister City Celebration this year. An artist lecture at the Asian Art Museum, interviews and dinner reception will all be part of the week's festivities as this colossal sculpture transforms the Civic Center urban landscape. Outreach to the Chinese American community and monolingual tours will all be part of the year-long installation. The San Francisco Arts Commission was also invited to submit a proposal to the National Endowment for the Arts Mayor's Institute on City Design grant initiative. While successfully getting beyond the Statement of Interest phase may not be significant news, it does signal the Arts Commission's leadership role in working with numerous City agencies to transform the Mid Market corridor into a major cultural district, and our efforts to support the cultural community's Mid Market development and the economic vitality of the City will continue in the coming years.

C. YEAR IN REVIEW

For the past 12 months (a) briefly describe any significant administrative or programmatic changes; (b) list accomplishments.

There were numerous administrative programmatic changes along with major accomplishments this past year. Unfortunately, due to the City and State budget crisis, our long-time Deputy Director was laid off in May 2009. The termination of this position had a significant impact on the agency, and a restructuring followed. A management team was formed to help fill the gaps left with the absence of a Deputy Director. Program Directors now report to the Director of Programs who is part of this senior management team and which also includes the Director of Grants and Human Resources; Finance Director and the Director of Cultural Affairs. Other administrative changes include the departure of the Arts Education Manager, Dia Penning, in 2009 and the hiring of Tyra Fennell for this position this year. Other administrative changes included the departure of a Public Art staff person and a Cultural Equity staff person, but both positions have been refilled. The City continues to struggle with reduced funding and earned revenue, so in addition to 12 days of furloughs being instituted this year and next, we expect a significant number of layoffs within the City. That said, all accounts this far indicate the Arts Commission will see no significant if any layoffs before the new fiscal year starts. In spite of the City's financial challenges, the Arts Commission has many new high-visibility initiatives that have brought a renewed attention to the agency. Many of these accomplishments have been addressed thoroughly in previous sections, but are also listed briefly here: the Art in Storefronts Program; Culture Wire (the SFAC's cable television program which spotlights exciting programs of the Arts Commission and the city's cultural happenings); Maya Lin's, Zhang Huan's, Manolo Valdes's, Louise Bourgeois's and Patrick Dougherty's temporary public art installations; Where Art Lives curriculum and the StreetsmARTS anti graffiti initiative; the SFAC Gallery's exhibitions over the last year including 10x10x10 and the Passport fundraiser and exhibition--both of which received significant press attention; and the WritersCorps 15th anniversary celebrations and exhibition. This past year, the Street Artists program secured new spaces in the Castro district so more artisans may sell their wares to a new audience. After approximately 10 years of planning, SF General Hospital's public art commissions have begun to be installed; Laguna Honda Hospital also culminated a multi-year public art initiative last year. Lastly, the TransBay Terminal development project has yielded funds for world-renowned public art to be installed during the construction phase in 2012. The collections program will be launching ArtCare this year, an effort to raise private funds to help with the restoration and maintenance of the City's 3,000-piece collection valued at \$86 million. A recent partnership with the San Francisco Examiner has yielded significatn coverage of arts and culture in the city, not only for the Arts Commission, but for many local non-profit arts organizations.

D. PROJECTED YEAR

For fiscal year 2010-11 briefly describe: (a) any anticipated administrative or programmatic changes (b) organizational and programmatic goals and their relevance to your strategic plan.

The Arts Commission has been complying with the Mayor's Office on a series of requests for 2010-2011 budget cuts. With a 30% reduction in our General Fund allocation, the Arts Commission has had to make difficult choices about scaling back programs and staff. There will be less funding to give out in grants in 2010-2011 as was the case in the current fiscal year. While the four Neighborhood Cultural Centers that are part of the Community Arts & Education Program remained exempt from cuts in their general operating and facilities grants this year, it is unlikely that they will not be targeted in the coming fiscal year for a reduction in their allocation. To date, the Director of Cultural Affairs has managed to avoid any staff layoffs going into the next year, but as the Mayor's Office and Labor Unions are currently in negotiations, the next year remains uncertain. Virtually all of SFAC staff received layoff notices in March, with the understanding that most or all would be rehired at part-time hours (37.5 hours/week). This plan may be off the table, but again, the impact of these reducations on program and staff is not clear. It is certain that additional furlough days will be mandated, but this will have no significant impact on programming. Last year, the Arts Commission initiated a strategic planning process with the assistance of the City's Human Resources Department. Now that the first phase of the plan has been completed (identifying goals for the next three fiscal years for each program), the next phase of applying measurements and resource allocations to each of the strategic initiatives is at hand. With the uncertainty of our department's 2010-2011 capacity, it will be even more critical to complete this next phase of the Strategic Plan. Overall, the agency's mission remains the same as do the priorities -- visibility, communications and strengthening the infrastructure and stability of San Francisco's cultural community. The following is a list of goals outlined in the Arts Commission's Strategic Plan: Goal I. Promote the arts as an essential component of city life; Goal II. Provide access to the arts for all communities; Goal III. Improve the quality and efficiency of internal operations, services and work products; Goal IV. Maintain financial stability for all Arts Commission programs; Goal V. Secure permanent and code-compliant facilities for all programs and operations of the Arts Commission. Strategies, objectives and three-year deliverables are associated with each of these five major goals.

The City and County of San Francisco for the third year in a row faces a significant shortfall in its budget. A total of \$522 million needs to be cut from the City's General Fund (which is normally approximately \$2 million) in order to begin the fiscal year in July 2010 with a balanced budget, as legislated by law. As a result, all City agencies have been asked to present a budget with a 30% reduction. The Mayor must submit a balanced budget for the City and County to the Board of Supervisors (including all City departments) on June 1, 2010. This affects the Arts Commission as follows: Due to the City's \$522 million budget deficit forecast for the upcoming FY 2010-11, Mayor Gavin Newsom has instructed all City departments to cut 30% from all General Fund allocations. The Arts Commission's mandated 30% budget cut for FY 2010-11 requires a significant reduction in this agency's budget totaling \$1,020,562 from our General Fund allocation. When compared with the current FY 2009-10, General Fund expenditures will be reduced for several Arts Commission programs as follows: Administration: \$29,681 Cultural Centers: \$352,267 Cultural Equity Grants: \$269,413 Art Enhancement (Supplementary Projects): \$393,579 WritersCorps Program: \$71,000. These reductions total \$1,020,562 as mentioned above for FY 2010-11. Also, this projected reduction in General Fund dollars from current year (FY 2009-10) to next year (FY 2010-11) constitutes a 16.57% reduction in total. Looking back from FY 2008 to the current fiscal year, the Cultural Equity Grants Program had a 3-year reduction in funds totaling \$996,000 and the Community Arts & Education Program had a reduction in funds totaling \$203,000 (not including cuts to cultural centers which is part of the Community Arts & Education Program). In kind support comes from a variety of places and is on a per-project basis. The most significant in-kind donation this year came from Matson Navigation Company and the Waterfront Container Leasing Company, Inc. which are assisting with the shipping of the Zhang Huan Buddha from Shanghai. Valued at over \$100,000, this in-kind support made this ambitious project feasible. Other in-kind donations have come from the SF Examiner which sponsored and coordinated all the hospitality costs for the 2010 Mayor's Art Award honoring Carlos Santana. This was valued at approximately \$20,000. The SFAC Gallery regularly secures in-kind support in the form of printing and hospitality for exhibition openings. There are also many volunteers who support the administrative functions of the SFAC's eight programs.
