1 [Accept and Expend Grant - FY2010 Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program and
2 Amend Annual Salary Ordinance, FY2010-2011 - \$3,570,000]

3 Ordinance authorizing the Department of Emergency Management, on behalf of the
4 City and County San Francisco, serving as the primary grantee for the Regional
5 Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program Bay Area Site and as fiscal agent for the
6 Urban Area Security Initiative Approval Authority, to retroactively accept and expend
7 Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program grant funds in the amount of
8 \$3,570,000 from the United States Department of Homeland Security, through the
9 California Emergency Management Agency, and to provide \$181,478 as San
10 Francisco's portion of required matching funds; and amending Ordinance No. 191-10
11 (Annual Salary Ordinance, FY2010-2011) to reflect the addition of one grant-funded
12 position (.75 FTE) in Class 5293 Planner IV in the Department of Emergency
13 Management.

18 Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

19 Section 1. Findings.

20 (a) Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program (RCPGP). The United States
21 Department of Homeland Security (DHS) has several Homeland Security Grant Programs,
22 including the RCPGP. The RCPGP is a component of a coordinated federal effort to enhance
23 emergency planning and strengthen the Nation's overall level of preparedness. It is designed
24 to support Tier I and designated Tier II Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) Urban Areas
25 (designated by DHS) as they address all threats and hazards in collaboration with federal,

1 state, and local partners. DHS distributes RCPGP grant funds to recipient jurisdictions in
2 California through the California Emergency Management Agency (CalEMA), which
3 administers the RCPGP within the State.

4 (b) Bay Area Site. The Bay Area Urban Area is a Tier I UASI Urban Area comprised of
5 the City and County of San Francisco, the Cities of Oakland and San Jose, and the Counties
6 of Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Napa, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Solano, and
7 Sonoma. For purposes of the RCPGP, the Bay Area Urban Area jurisdictions, together with
8 the Counties of Monterey and San Benito, collectively comprise the "Bay Area Site."

9 (c) Methodology for allocating funds; San Francisco as primary grantee and fiscal
10 agent. A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) entered between the City and County of
11 San Francisco, the Cities of Oakland and San Jose, and the Counties of Alameda and Santa
12 Clara, established the UASI Approval Authority as the regional body responsible for decisions
13 related to application, allocation and distribution of UASI grant funds. Under that MOU, San
14 Francisco serves as the primary grantee and fiscal agent for the UASI Approval Authority, and
15 receives and distributes UASI grant funds for the Bay Area Urban Area, per decisions of the
16 Approval Authority. Based on action by the Approval Authority, that UASI governance
17 structure was extended to the RCPGP. Therefore, San Francisco also serves as the primary
18 grantee and fiscal agent for purposes of receiving and distributing RCPGP funds, per direction
19 of the Approval Authority.

20 (d) Regional Catastrophic Planning Team Requirement. For the RCPGP, DHS
21 requires each Site receiving funds to establish a Regional Catastrophic Planning Team
22 (RCPT) to act as an executive steering committee, provide overall governance and coordinate
23 development and implementation of all RCPGP initiatives within the Site, and ensure
24 compliance with RCPGP program requirements. The RCPT is comprised of representatives
25

1 from various local governmental agencies within the RCPGP Bay Area Site. The UASI
2 Approval Authority receives recommendations from the RCPT in making its decisions
3 regarding allocation and distribution of RCPGP grant funds within the Bay Area Site.

4 (e) Fiscal Year 2010 RCPGP Award; Use of RCPGP funds. The Bay Area Site
5 received a fiscal year 2010 RCPGP grant award of \$4,760,000, comprised of \$3,570,000 in
6 federal funds and a required 25% local match of \$1,190,000. Regionally, funds from this
7 award will be used to fund: (1) development of regional recovery plans; (2) trainings and
8 exercises to test completed plans; and (3) development of regional public outreach and
9 messaging campaigns.

10 (f) Performance Period. The performance period for the FY2010 RCPGP grant is from
11 September 20, 2010 to April 30, 2013.

12 (g) The City and County of San Francisco has participated in federal and state
13 homeland security grant programs since their inception, and deems participation in those
14 programs as vital to the continued well-being of its citizens.

15 (h) The City and County of San Francisco intends to use a portion of its share of the
16 RCPGP funds to fund existing grant-funded positions within the City and County. In addition,
17 San Francisco will use its RCPGP funds to add one .75 FTE Class 5293 Planner IV position in
18 the Department of Emergency Management. A spreadsheet reflecting the Department,
19 Program, Index Code, Classification, Job Title, and Compensation Schedule for this position
20 is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 101121, which is
21 hereby declared to be a part of this ordinance as if set forth fully herein.

22 (i) Grant Match. The RCPGP requires a 25 percent match from recipient jurisdictions,
23 either in non-federal funds or in kind services. The total required matching amount for the
24 FY10 RCPGP award is \$1,190,000. Each recipient must provide a portion of the match,
25

1 based on its share of the total grant allocation. San Francisco must provide a match of
2 \$181,478, which represents its portion of the required match based on its allocation of the
3 total grant award. The Department of Emergency Management's Fiscal Year 2010-2011
4 budget includes funds to fulfill the RCPGP match requirement.

5
6 Section 2. Authorization to Accept and Expend Grant Funds.

7 (a) The Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Department of Emergency
8 Management to retroactively accept and expend, on behalf of the City and County of San
9 Francisco as the primary RCPGP grantee of the Bay Area Site and as the fiscal agent for the
10 UASI Approval Authority, \$3,570,000 in RCPGP grant funds from the DHS, through the
11 CalEMA; and to provide \$181,478 in matching funds, which represents San Francisco's share
12 of the \$1,190,000 required grant match.

13 (b) The grant does not include any provisions for indirect costs, and indirect costs are
14 hereby waived.

15 (c) The Executive Director of the Department of Emergency Management, or designee,
16 is authorized to furnish whatever additional information or assurances the DHS or CalEMA
17 may request in connection with this grant, to execute any and all agreements or other
18 documents, and to take any other steps necessary to accept, distribute and expend the grant
19 funds.

21 Section 3. Grant Funded Positions; Amendment to FY 2010-2011 Annual Salary
22 Ordinance. The hereinafter designated section and items of Ordinance No. 191-10 (Annual
23 Salary Ordinance, FY 2010-2011) are hereby amended to add one position at the Department
24 of Emergency Management (DEM) as follows:

LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Accept and Expend FY 10 Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program and Amend Annual Salary Ordinance, FY 2010-2011]

Ordinance authorizing the Department of Emergency Management, on behalf of the City and County San Francisco, serving as the primary grantee for the RCPGP Bay Area Site and as fiscal agent for the UASI Approval Authority, to retroactively accept and expend Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program (RCPGP) grant funds in the amount of \$3,570,000 from the United States Department of Homeland Security, through the California Emergency Management Agency, and to provide \$181,478 as San Francisco's portion of required matching funds; and amending Ordinance No. 191-10 (Annual Salary Ordinance, FY 2010-2011) to reflect the addition of one grant-funded position (.75 FTE) in Class 5293 Planner IV in the Department of Emergency Management.

Background Information

The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program (RCPGP) is an important component of a larger, coordinated federal effort to enhance emergency planning and strengthen the Nation's overall level of preparedness. The goal of the RCPGP is to support an integrated planning system that enables regional all-hazard planning for catastrophic events and the development of necessary plans, protocols, and procedures to manage a catastrophic event. Under the RCPGP, DHS provides 75% of the amount of the grant and recipients must contribute a grant match of 25% (either cash or in kind services) toward the total award. In California, DHS distributes RCPGP funds through the California Department of Emergency Management (CalEMA).

The City and County of San Francisco, together with its regional partners the Cities of Oakland and San Jose and the Counties of Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Monterey, Napa, San Benito, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Solano, and Sonoma (collectively with San Francisco, the "RCPGP Bay Area Site"), applied for RCPGP funds and received a total grant award of \$4,760,000. That amount is comprised of \$3,570,000 in funds from DHS and \$1,190,000 from the recipient jurisdictions for the required 25 percent match. San Francisco must provide a match of \$181,478, which represents its portion of the required match based on its allocation of the total grant award. The Fiscal Year 2010-2011 budget for the Department of Emergency Management (DEM) includes funds to fulfill San Francisco's match requirement.

The UASI Approval Authority is responsible for decisions regarding application, allocation and distribution of RCPGP grant funds. Under an agreement with other jurisdictions in the Bay Area Site, San Francisco is the primary grantee and fiscal agent for purposes of receiving and distributing RCPGP funds, per direction of the UASI Approval Authority. RCPGP grant funds from this award will be used to fund: (1) development of regional recovery plans; (2) regional training and exercises; and (3) public outreach. San Francisco intends to use its share of the RCPGP funds to continue existing positions, specifically one Class 0931 Manager III and two Class 5291 Planner III grant-funded positions within the DEM; this Fiscal Year, the grant funds will

be used to add one Class 5293 Planner IV position (.75 FTE). The remaining grant funds will be used to fund these positions in Fiscal Year 2011-2012.

The grant period is from September 20, 2010 to April 30, 2013.

Proposed Ordinance

The proposed ordinance authorizes the DEM, on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco, as the primary grantee of RCPGP funds and as the fiscal agent for the UASI Approval Authority, to accept and expend RCPGP grant funds of \$3,570,000 from the DHS, through the CalEMA. The proposed ordinance authorizes the City to provide a cash match of \$181,478, which represents its proportionate share of the matching funds required under the grant program. The grant does not include any provisions for indirect costs, and the proposed ordinance waives indirect costs. Finally, the proposed ordinance authorizes the DEM Executive Director to take any additional steps necessary to accept, distribute and expend the grant funds.

Pursuant to Administrative Code §10.170-1(b), the ordinance also amends the Annual Salary Ordinance, FY2010-2011, to reflect the addition of one grant-funded position at the DEM, by adding one 0.75 FTE Class 5293 Planner IV at DEM.

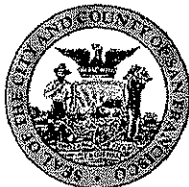

Re: **Ordinance to Accept and Expend 2010 Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program (RCPGP) Award**

The Department of Emergency Management is pleased to present the following Grant Report in summary of the above-referenced item submitted by the Department of Emergency Management.

Legislation For Approval:

The proposed ordinance seeks the Board of Supervisors' approval for the acceptance (retroactive) and expenditure of \$4,760,000 (federal share \$3,570,000, applicant share \$1,190,000) from the United States Department of Homeland Security (DHS), through the California Emergency Management Agency (CalEMA), to support an integrated planning system for the development of necessary plans, protocols, and procedures to manage a catastrophic event. It further seeks to amend the Annual Salary Ordinance for Fiscal Year 2010-2011 to add one (1) FTE.

Departments:

Department of Emergency Management (DEM). Expenditures benefiting San Francisco, the cities of Oakland and San Jose and the Counties of Alameda, Contra Costa, Marin, Monterey, Napa, San Benito, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, Solano, and Sonoma.

DEM serves as the fiscal agent for the Bay Area UASI, which is administering the grant for the Bay Area region. DEM would be authorized to accept and expend these grant funds on behalf of the 12 Bay Area counties and 3 core cities of San Francisco, San Jose, and Oakland, and to receive grant reimbursements for expenses incurred on behalf of the region.

As the Fiscal Agent, DEM is responsible for administering the grant, ensuring that the grant funds are spent according to the grant guidelines,

and ensuring that each of the Bay Area counties and cities that may receive a portion of these grant funds adhere to the grant eligibility and financial guidelines.

Each sub-recipient county or city that participates in this grant will be required to enter into a grant MOU with DEM that outlines their obligation under the grant allocation, including requirements for match, contracting and procurement, record keeping, and adherence to federal grant assurances.

Amount: \$3,570,000

Grant Period: September 20, 2010 through April 30, 2013

Retroactivity: The Accept and Expend Legislation requests retroactive approval because the Federal Grant period commenced before the legislation was introduced. No grant funds will be encumbered or expended until the Board of Supervisors approves the Accept and Expend legislation.

Source of funds: U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) through the California Emergency Management Agency (CalEMA)

Required Match: 25 % (\$1,190,000). San Francisco's proportionate share of the grant match is \$181,478. The other counties and cities will provide the proportionate share of the grant match, either in kind or cash prior to their requests for reimbursement being granted by the fiscal agent

Indirect Costs: The proposed resolution waives indirect costs, because the grant program does not allow the charging of indirect costs.

Description: The proposed ordinance authorizes the Department of Emergency Management (DEM) to accept and expend \$3,570,000 in federal grant funding from the FY 2010 Regional Catastrophic Preparedness Grant Program (Grant Number #2010-CA-T0-0002, OES ID#075-95017), issued by DHS, through CalEMA. The grant requires a 25 percent applicant match in the amount of \$1,190,000 to fund the development of necessary plans, protocols, and procedures to manage a catastrophic event.

Budget: The summary budget by activity for the subject grant is as follows:

(1) **Contracts/Consultants:** \$2,055,400

Contractors will be engaged to develop plans and procedures for a region wide regional Long Term Recovery Framework, a regional Transportation Management Strategy, a regional Restoration of Lifelines plan, a regional Training plan to be integrated into UASI Training plans, and to develop and implement regional public communication and outreach messaging in conjunction with Citizen Corp Programs. Contractors must be qualified to develop these plans for the entire 12 county region.

(2) Personnel: \$621,144

The budgeted amount has been allocated for the purpose of hiring personnel within the 12 Bay Area Counties to assist in the development of the plans and procedures. The planned personnel are allocated as follows: San Francisco – two continuing planners, one continuing grants manager, and one new regional logistics planner; City of Oakland – one continuing planner; Alameda County - one continuing planner; Marin County – one continuing planner.

With respect to San Francisco, the proposed amendment to the Annual Salary Ordinance proposes one planner position.

(3) Exercises: \$714,956

The budgeted amount has been allocated for the purpose of conducting exercises to test the validity of plans developed during the FY 07/08 and FY 09 RCPGP Grant cycles. Funding in the amount of \$212,606 has been allocated to pay for overtime expenses and \$502,350 has been allocated to for the purpose of exercise development.

(4) Management and Administration: \$178,500

Management and Administration expenses include UASI line item office expenses, grants management, Controller's Accounting, City Attorney, office and equipment maintenance and leases. The amount budgeted reflects 5% of the cash grant, which is the maximum allowable under the guidelines.

(g) Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of paragraphs (a), (b), (c), (d), (e), and (f).


