- In FY 21-22, CBOs projected to serve 3,091 youth and TAY
  - As of April 2022, there were 2,071 actual youth and TAY served

# **Family Based Services Recommendation**



- Currently, DCYF and JPD are funding a community-based, licensed, foster-family agency program.
  - This program (Alterative Family Services) provides emergency and long-term placements for youth ordered to out-of-home placement by the SF Juvenile Court. There are a total of 7 licensed, intensive foster-care beds available for SF youth.
- DCYF, in partnership with JPD, will also **release an RFP** to expand family support investments for justice-involved youth and their families, which includes:
  - Support for families navigating the juvenile court process
  - Provide family treatment and/or family wellness activities
  - Support for parenting teens and TAY



DCYF recognizes how complicated it is to navigate through our many different government systems and that youth and families would benefit from having additional help.

However, we would like more detail and information on the concept of the Well-Being Advocates.

- 1. Feasibility of the role and responsibilities (24/7; trainings restoration and healing; and ability to establish clear lines of authority)
- 2. Access to a pool of flexible funding (currently DCYF funds CBOs which have individual fiscal agency practices that we do not govern)
- 3. Other elements would need to be in place before the position(s) are established, such as the Well Being Committee, agreement on a universal assessment, agreement that supports would be utilized by Judges, clear understanding of the role and management structure of the Committee and staffing including the Well- Being Data Coordinator





## **Shared Leadership Recommendation**





With a deep commitment to advancing equity and healing trauma, DCYF values partnership and collaboration with our families, youth, young adults, CBO partners, City Departments, and educational institutions.

We prioritize children, youth, transitional age youth and families' voices in setting funding priorities and build our knowledge and presence in neighborhoods across San Francisco that are based on an equity framework.
