What Do We Do?

- The Youth Defender Unit provides legal representation and social work advocacy to youth on diversion, probation, and in extended foster care (per AB 12)
- 330 youth served currently
- 400 youth projected to be served in 2023

Where Do We Serve Our Community?

How Do We Allocate Our Budget And Staff?

- \$3,785,162 (9% of total budget) allocated to serve youth on probation through the Youth Defender Unit and B'MAGIC/Mo'MAGIC programs
- Total number of staff allocated to 375 Woodside
 - Youth Defender Unit: 14 staff members
 - MAGIC Programs: 6 staff members
- Total budget for subcontracts, lists, and amounts awarded:
 - 3rd Street Youth Clinic and Clinic Food Security - \$72,250
 - Park and Recreation Program \$131,200
 - Contigo-Bayview Co-op Food Security -\$19,500
- One social worker vacancy
