President Walton and Members of the Board of Supervisors:

It is with great disappointment that I submit my veto of File Number 220446, the "fourplex" ordinance that was passed by a majority of the Board of Supervisors on Tuesday, June 28, 2022 and Tuesday, July 12, 2022. While I support the original intent of the ordinance to add new desperately needed housing options for San Franciscans struggling with the high cost of housing, especially for our middle-income families, after many amendments, this ordinance no longer achieves the goal intended to actually produce more housing. Instead, it is fair to say that this ordinance, as amended, will set back housing production.

As Mayor, from day one I have been a strong supporter of policies that create new housing opportunities for all San Franciscans and directly address our city's housing shortage and lack of affordability. Unfortunately, if enacted, this ordinance will accomplish neither goal. As I understand it, Board members received an independent report finding that the small-scale housing projects, as envisioned by this ordinance, are in many cases infeasible today because of high construction costs. Instead of cutting bureaucracy and reducing project costs, the Board added many new requirements and imposed new financial barriers that will make it even less likely for new housing to be built under the ordinance's provisions.

Even more importantly, this ordinance shirks the city's obligation to comply with state housing laws and do our part to address the state-wide housing shortage. Last year, the state legislature passed Senate Bill 9 (SB 9) to require the streamlined, ministerial approval of duplexes and lot splits in single-family residential zones. This ordinance eliminates single-family zoning to deliberately sidestep SB 9 and its streamlining provisions without offering any local process improvements in its place. Instead, we should be working closely with our partners at the state to use every available tool – including state housing laws – to support housing production in our city. Right now, certain jurisdictions across the state are finding creative ways to rid themselves of this obligation. San Francisco must not join them in this anti-housing effort of trying to circumvent our collective obligation to build more housing for our residents.

For the future of San Francisco, the Bay Area, and California, we must make serious changes to how we approve and build housing. This duty lies with local, state, and federal leaders. There are too many people being forced to live on our street. There are too many families who can't afford to stay in this city. There are too many workers commuting long distances, or simply leaving the Bay Area. We cannot keep putting forward the same restrictive policies, and we certainly cannot put forward local policies that block progressive state streamlining solutions. We need dramatic change if we are going to meet the obligations of our upcoming Housing Element, which is going to require over 80,000 new homes to be built over the next eight years.

I remain committed to supporting effective proposals that will result in new homes while abiding by state law, and I welcome the opportunity to work with the Board on another ordinance that addresses the concerns raised in this letter.

Today, July 21, 2022, the Mayor communicated her veto of the following matter:

File No. 220446 – Planning, Administrative, Subdivision Codes; Zoning Map - Density Exception in Residential Districts

Ordinance amending the Planning Code to rezone all Residential, One Family (RH-1) zoning districts, except for Residential, One Family, Detached (RH-1(D)) districts, to Residential, Two Family (RH-2) zoning districts; to rezone the RH-1(D) districts to a new class of residential district called Residential, Two Family, Detached (RH-2(D)) districts; and to provide a density limit exception to permit up to four dwelling units per lot, and up to six dwelling units per lot in Corner Lots, in all RH (Residential, House) zoning districts, subject to certain requirements, including among others the replacement of protected units; amending the Administrative Code to require new dwelling units constructed pursuant to the density limit exception to be subject to the rent increase limitations of the Rent Ordinance; amending the Subdivision Code to authorize a subdivider that is constructing new dwelling units pursuant to the density exception to submit an application for condominium conversion or a condominium map that includes the existing dwelling units and the new dwelling units that constitute the project; affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act; and making findings of consistency with the General Plan, and the eight priority policies of Planning Code, Section 101.1, and findings of public necessity, convenience, and welfare under Planning Code, Section 302.

Pursuant to Charter Section 2.106, the Board of Supervisors may override said veto if, within 30 days after such veto, not less than two-thirds of the Board of Supervisors shall vote in favor of such measure.

Supervisors Mandelman; Melgar BOARD OF SUPERVISORS Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. CEQA and Land Use Findings.

(a) The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this ordinance comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public Resources Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 220446 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board affirms this determination.

(b) On November 18, 2021, the Planning Commission, in Resolution No. 21031, adopted findings that the actions contemplated in this ordinance are consistent, on balance, with the City's General Plan and eight priority policies of Planning Code Section 101.1. The Board adopts these findings as its own. A copy of said Resolution is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 220446, and is incorporated herein by reference.

(c) Pursuant to Planning Code Section 302, this Board finds that these Planning Code amendments will serve the public necessity, convenience, and welfare for the reasons set forth in Planning Commission Resolution No. 21031, and the Board adopts such reasons as its own. A copy of said resolution is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 220446 and is incorporated herein by reference.

Section 2. Background and Findings.

(a) California faces a severe crisis of housing affordability and availability, prompting the Legislature to declare, in Section 65589.5 of the Government Code, that the state has "a housing supply and affordability crisis of historic proportions. The consequences of failing to effectively and aggressively confront this crisis are hurting millions of Californians, robbing future generations of a chance to call California home, stifling economic opportunities for

workers and businesses, worsening poverty and homelessness, and undermining the state's environmental and climate objectives."

(b) This crisis of housing affordability and availability is particularly severe in San Francisco. It is characterized by dramatic increases in rent and home sale prices over recent years and historic rates of underproduction of new housing units across income levels, particularly in the City's western neighborhoods and RH (Residential, House) zoning districts.

(c) According to the Planning Department's 2020 Housing Inventory, the cost of housing in San Francisco has increased dramatically since the Great Recession of 2008-2009, with the median sale price for a two-bedroom house more than tripling from 2011 to 2021, from \$493,000 to \$1,580,000. This includes a 9% increase from 2019 to 2020 alone, even in the face of the COVID-19 pandemic. The median rental price for a two-bedroom apartment saw similar although slightly smaller increases, nearly doubling from \$2,570 to \$4,500 per month, from 2011 to 2019, before declining in 2020 due to the pandemic.

(d) These housing cost trends come after decades of underproduction of housing in San Francisco, with only 600 net new units on average added per year from 1960 to 1990, compared with 37,000 per year in the Bay Area as a whole, and fewer than 1,000 net new units on average per year in San Francisco in the 1990s, before increasing to an average of roughly 2,500 per year from 2000 to 2019, according to the Planning Department's 2019 Housing Affordability Strategies Report.

(e) The City's Chief Economist has estimated that approximately 5,000 new marketrate housing units per year would be required to keep housing prices in San Francisco constant with inflation generally, rather than greatly exceeding general rates of inflation.

(f) Moreover, San Francisco will be challenged to meet increased Regional Housing Needs Allocation ("RHNA") goals in the upcoming 2023-2031 Housing Element cycle, which total 72,000 units over eight years, more than 2.5 times the goal of the previous eight-year

cycle. At the same time, relatively new State laws like Senate Bill 35 (2017) would limit San Francisco's local zoning control and discretion if the City does not meet these RHNA housing production goals.

(g) San Francisco's new housing production in recent years has been heavily concentrated in the eastern and southeastern parts of the City, with 90% of all new housing produced in just ten eastside and central neighborhoods, according to the Housing Affordability Strategies Report. These neighborhoods are home to many of the City's most established communities of color and communities most vulnerable to displacement pressures.

(h) Roughly 60% of San Francisco's developable land area is in the RH (Residential, House) zoning districts, concentrated primarily on the City's west side, with 38% of the City's developable land area zoned exclusively for single-family homes in RH-1 (Residential, House, One Family) and RH-1(D) (Residential, House, One Family, Detached Dwellings) zoning districts. In spite of the expansive geographic coverage of RH zoning districts throughout the City, only 10% of the total new housing units in 2020 were built in these districts.

(i) Neighborhoods zoned for RH encompass a wide variety of housing and building typologies, with a distinct historic pattern of taller, higher-density buildings often located on corner lots throughout residential neighborhoods in the City, which predate the advent of RH zoning, in the 1970s.

(j) The City's COVID-19 Economic Recovery Task Force included a recommendation in its October 2020 report to support construction of small multifamily buildings in low density areas to support "missing middle" housing opportunities.

(k) This ordinance allows the development of up to four units, and up to six units in Corner Lots, in all RH districts throughout the City (as shown on the Zoning Maps ZN 01 through ZN 14), at the heights currently specified in the City's Zoning Maps (Height Maps HT

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01 through HT 14). All parcels affected by this ordinance are considered urban infill sites under California Government Code Section 65913.5(e)(3). This Board therefore declares that this ordinance is enacted pursuant to California Government Code Section 65913.5.

(I) This Board acknowledges that new housing developments approved under this ordinance will be subject to the requirements of California Government Code Section 66300(d), such as the obligation to replace all existing or demolished protected units and protections for existing occupants, including, for lower income occupants of protected units, relocation benefits and a right of first refusal for a comparable unit available in the new housing development at an affordable rent or cost, as provided by state law.

(m) This Board finds that this ordinance is consistent with San Francisco's obligation to affirmatively further fair housing pursuant to California Government Code Section 8899.50, by increasing density in a manner that meaningfully addresses significant disparities in housing needs and access to opportunity. The ordinance achieves the increase in density by increasing the principally permitted residential density in areas subject to historically exclusionary density limits-, by providing an additional density exception for projects that comply with the requirements of Section 66300(d) of the California Government Code and enter into regulatory agreements with the City acknowledging that, in consideration for the density exception, the new units shall be subject to local rent control notwithstanding the Costa-Hawkins Rental Housing Act (California Civil Code Sections 1954.50 et seq.).

(n) This Board finds that it is in the public interest to encourage the production of a variety of unit types and sizes to accommodate people in different types of living conditions, including a mix of smaller units that can help young adults secure housing or seniors to downsize, and larger units that can help growing or multi-generational families stay adequately housed.

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1	(o) This Board finds that it is in the public interest to support San Francisco
2	homeowners in developing their properties while continuing to reside on the property as a key
3	means of building intergenerational wealth, particularly for first-generation or historically
4	marginalized homeowners. Because the regulatory and development process, combined with
5	escalating home prices and construction costs, presents specific challenges to homeowners
6	distinct from those faced by development and construction professionals, this ordinance
7	applies certain provisions to property owners who intend to continue residing on the property
8	after construction.
9	(p) This Board recognizes that additional development opportunities may lead to
10	speculative real estate investments that may seek to maximize profits by displacing current
11	residents, demolishing existing housing stock, building new units, and quickly selling those
12	units. To discourage prevent such speculation, demolition of existing units, and displacement
13	of current residents, this ordinance makes the benefit of the density exception available only
14	to persons who have owned their properties for five years prior to the date of their application
15	to obtain the exception, including the ownership duration of their Eligible Predecessor, as
16	defined herein person or entity from whom they may have inherited the lot.
17	(q) This Board recognizes the importance of facilitating opportunities for
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intergenerational transfer of wealth among members of a family through property ownership. <u>Therefore</u>, property owners who have inherited their property may be deemed eligible to seek <u>a density exception by applying the duration of ownership of their Eligible Predecessor person</u> or entity from whom they inherited the lot to their own duration of ownership, for the purposes <u>of satisfying this ordinance's ownership requirement</u>.

(pqr) This ordinance allows for a density exception where the project does not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of an historic resource, as defined. This Board recognizes that prior to submitting a development application, property owners may apply to

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the Planning Department for a pre-application Historic Resource Assessment to determine 1 whether a historic resource is present on the lot. To support homeowners in using this density 2 exception to develop their properties, this ordinance waives permit fees for the Historic 3 Resource Assessment under certain conditions. 4 5 Section 3. Article 2 of the Planning Code is hereby amended by revising Sections 207 6 and 209.1, to read as follows: 7 8 SEC. 207. DWELLING UNIT DENSITY LIMITS. 9 10 (c) Exceptions to Dwelling Unit Density Limits. An exception to the calculations 11 under this Section 207 shall be made in the following circumstances: 12 * * 13 (8) Residential Density Exception in RH Districts. 14 (A) Density Exception. Projects located in RH Districts that are not seeking or 15 receiving a density bonus under the provisions of Planning Code Sections 206.5 or 206.6 shall receive 16 an exception from residential density limits for up to four dwelling units per lot, excluding Corner Lots. 17 or up to six dwelling units per lot in Corner Lots, not inclusive of any Accessory Dwelling Units as 18 permitted under this Section 207, provided that the dwelling units meet the requirements set forth in 19 this subsection (c)(8). 20 (B) Eligibility. To receive the density exception authorized under this 21 subsection (c)(8), property owners must demonstrate that they have owned the lot for which 22 they are seeking the density exception for a minimum of five years prior to the time of the 23 submittal of their application. For the purposes of establishing eligibility to receive a density 24 exception according to this subsection (8)(B), a property owner who has inherited the subject 25

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1	lot, including any inheritance in or through a trust, from a blood, adoptive, or step family
2	relationship, specifically from a grandparent, parent, sibling, child, or grandchild, or the spouse

8	(BC) Eligibility of Historic Resources. To receive the density exception
9	authorized under this subsection (c)(8), a project must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the
10	Environmental Review Officer that it does not cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of
11	an historic resource as defined by California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Section 15064.5, as may be
12	amended from time to time. Permit fees for pre-application Historic Resource Assessments shall
13	be waived for property owners who apply to obtain a density exception under this subsection
14	(c)(8), if they sign an affidavit stating their intent to reside on the property for a period of three
15	years after the issuance of the Certificate of Final Completion and Occupancy for the new
16	dwelling units. Permit fees for Historic Resource Determinations shall not be waived.
17	(GD) Applicable Standards. Projects utilizing the density exception of this
18	subsection (c)(8) and that provide at least four dwelling units shall be subject to a minimum Rear Yard
19	requirement of the greater of 30% of lot depth or 15 feet. All other building standards shall apply in
20	accordance with the applicable zoning district as set forth in Section 209.1.
21	(DE) Unit Replacement Requirements. Projects utilizing the density exception
22	of this subsection (c)(8) shall comply with the requirements of Section 66300(d) of the California
22 23	of this subsection (c)(8) shall comply with the requirements of Section 66300(d) of the California Government Code, as may be amended from time to time, including but not limited to requirements to

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and to offer existing occupants of any protected units that are lower income households relocation 1 benefits and a right of first refusal for a comparable unit, as those terms are defined therein. 2 (EF) Applicability of Rent Ordinance; Regulatory Agreements. 3 Project sponsors of projects utilizing the density exception of this subsection (c)(8) shall enter 4 into a regulatory agreement with the City, subjecting the new units created pursuant to the 5 exception to the San Francisco Residential Rent Stabilization and Arbitration Ordinance 6 (Chapter 37 of the Administrative Code), as a condition of approval of the density exception 7 ("Regulatory Agreement"). At a minimum, the Regulatory Agreement shall contain the 8 following: (i) a statement that the new units created pursuant to the density exception are not 9 subject to the Costa-Hawkins Rental Housing Act (California Civil Code Sections 1954.50 et 10 seq.) because, under Section 1954.52(b), the property owner has entered into and agreed to 11 the terms of this agreement with the City in consideration of an exception from residential 12 density limits of up to four dwelling units per lot, or up to six units per lot in Corner Lots, or 13 other direct financial contribution or other form of assistance specified in California 14 Government Code Sections 65915 et seq.; (ii) a description of the exception of residential 15 density or other direct financial contribution or form of assistance provided to the property 16 owner; and (iii) a description of the remedies for breach of the agreement and other provisions 17 to ensure implementation and compliance with the agreement. The property owner and the 18 Planning Director (or the Director's designee), on behalf of the City, will execute the 19 Regulatory Agreement, which shall be reviewed and approved by the City Attorney's Office. 20 The Regulatory Agreement shall be executed prior to the City's issuance of the First 21 Construction Document for the project, as defined in Section 107A.13.1 of the San Francisco 22 Building Code. Following execution of the Regulatory Agreement by all parties and approval 23 by the City Attorney, the Regulatory Agreement or a memorandum thereof shall be recorded 24

1	to the title records in the Office of the Assessor-Recorder against the property and shall be

3	(FG) Unit Sizes. At least one of the dwelling units resulting from the

7	Language Access Goals. To help the City evaluate whether the implementation of Section

9	goals, each year the Planning Department, in consultation with other City departments
10	including the Department of Building Inspection, the Rent Board, and the Office of the
11	Assessor-Recorder, shall prepare a report addressing the characteristics and demographics
12	of the applicants to and participants in this program; the number of units permitted and
13	constructed through this program; the geographic distribution, affordability, and construction
14	costs of those units; and the number of tenants that vacated or were evicted from properties

16	Equity Report"). The Affordability and Equity Report shall be included and identified in the

22	density exception.
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SEC. 209.1. RH (RESIDENTIAL, HOUSE) DISTRICTS.

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These Districts are intended to recognize, protect, conserve, and enhance areas characterized by dwellings in the form of houses <u>and small multi-family buildings</u>, usually with one, two, or three units with separate entrances, and limited scale in terms of building width and height, <u>and characterized by rear yards and a pattern of mid-block open spaces</u>. Such areas tend to have similarity of building styles and predominantly contain large units suitable for family occupancy, considerable open space, and limited nonresidential uses. The RH Districts are composed of *five separate* two three classes of districts, as follows:

RH-1(D) Districts: One-Family (Detached Dwellings). These Districts are characterized by lots of greater width and area than in other parts of the City, and by single-family houses with side yards. The structures are relatively large, but rarely exceed 35 feet in height. Ground level open space and landscaping at the front and rear are usually abundant. Much of the development has been in sizable tracts with similarities of building style and narrow streets following the contours of hills. In some cases private covenants have controlled the nature of development and helped to maintain the street areas.

RH-1 Districts: One-Family. These Districts are occupied almost entirely by single family houses on lots 25 feet in width, without side yards. Floor sizes and building styles vary, but tend to be uniform within tracts developed in distinct time periods. Though built on separate lots, the structures have the appearance of small-scale row housing, rarely exceeding 35 feet in height. Front setbacks are common, and ground level open space is generous. In most cases the single-family character of these Districts has been maintained for a considerable time.

RH-1(S) Districts: One-Family with Minor Second Unit. These Districts are similar in character to RH-1 Districts, except that a small second dwelling unit has been installed in many structures, usually by conversion of a ground-story space formerly part of the main unit or devoted to storage. The second unit remains subordinate to the owner's unit, and may house one or two persons

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Supervisors Mandelman; Melgar BOARD OF SUPERVISORS related to the owner or be rented to others. Despite these conversions, the structures retain the appearance of single family dwellings.

RH-2 (D) Districts: Two-Family (Detached Dwellings). These Districts are characterized by lots of greater width and area than in other parts of the City, and by one or two houses with side yards. The structures are relatively large, but rarely exceed 35 feet in height. Ground level open space and landscaping at the front and rear are usually abundant. Much of the development has been in sizable tracts with similarities of building style and narrow streets following the contours of hills. In some cases, private covenants have controlled the nature of development and helped to maintain the street areas.

RH-2 Districts: Two-Family. These Districts are devoted to one-family and two-family houses, with the latter commonly consisting of two large flats, one occupied by the owner and the other available for rental. Structures are finely scaled and usually do not exceed 25 feet in width or 40 feet in height. Building styles are often more varied than in *historically* single-family areas, but certain streets and tracts are quite uniform. Considerable ground-level open space is available, and it frequently is private for each unit. The Districts may have easy access to shopping facilities and transit lines. In some cases, Group Housing and institutions are found in these areas, although nonresidential uses tend to be quite limited.

RH-3 Districts: Three-Family. These Districts have many similarities to RH-2 Districts, but structures with three units are common in addition to one-family and two-family houses. The predominant form is large flats rather than apartments, with lots 25 feet wide, a fine or moderate scale, and separate entrances for each unit. Building styles tend to be varied but complementary to one another. Outdoor space is available at ground level, and also on decks and balconies for individual units. Nonresidential uses are more common in these areas than in RH-2 Districts.

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Section 5. Chapter 37 of tThe Administrative Code is hereby amended by revising Sections 10E.4, 37.2, and 37.3, to read as follows:

SEC. 10E.4. HOUSING ELEMENT PRODUCTION REPORTS AND HEARINGS.

(b) Planning Department Reports.

(3) Annual Housing Inventory Reports. The Planning Department shall 9 publish an annual Housing Inventory on April 1st of each year that contains at a minimum: 10 (A) an evaluation of how residential projects entitled or at any 11 other stage of the housing production process during the preceding calendar year contribute 12 to the City's quantified regional housing needs allocation for different household income levels 13 as determined in the General Plan's Housing Element, and including data on households 14 earning approximately 120% to 150% of area median income based on sponsors' disclosure 15 of unit pricing for market rate housing proposals and other available data; senior housing 16 units; and the number of efficiency, studio, one bedroom, two bedroom and three bedroom 17 and above units (when the ability to collect this data exists)-; 18 (B) how residential projects in the housing production process met 19 inclusionary housing requirements as on-site below-market-rate (BMR) units, off-site BMR 20

units, or payment of an in-lieu fee, including data tracking revenue generated from the Affordable Housing Fee under Planning Code Section 415 et seq.; and

(C) the number of residential projects at any stage of the housing production process during the preceding calendar year within the City's Planning Districts and Plan Areas for different housing income levels as determined in the General Plan's Housing

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Element, and including data on households earning approximately 120% to 150% of area median income based on sponsors' disclosure of unit pricing for market rate housing proposals and other available data; senior housing units; and the number of efficiency, studio, one bedroom, two bedroom and three bedroom and above units (when the ability to collect this data exists)-<u>; and</u>

(D) the contents of the Affordability and Equity Report as defined in Planning Code Section 207(c)(8).

SEC. 37.2. DEFINITIONS.

* * * *

(r) **Rental Units.** All residential dwelling units in the City and County of San Francisco together with the land and appurtenant buildings thereto, and all housing services, privileges, furnishings, and facilities supplied in connection with the use or occupancy thereof, including garage and parking facilities.

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The term "rental units" shall not include:

* * * *

(4) Except as provided in subsections (A)-(Đ<u>E</u>), dwelling units whose rents are controlled or regulated by any government unit, agency, or authority, excepting those unsubsidized and/or unassisted units which are insured by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development; provided, however, that units in unreinforced masonry buildings which have undergone seismic strengthening in accordance with Building Code Chapters 16B and 16C shall remain subject to the Rent Ordinances to the extent that the ordinance is not in conflict with the seismic strengthening bond program or with the program's loan agreements or with any regulations promulgated thereunder;

(E) The term "rental units" shall include any new dwelling units created pursuant to the density exception set forth in Section 207(c)(8) of the Planning Code.

SEC. 37.3. RENT LIMITATIONS.

(a) Rent Increase Limitations for Tenants in Occupancy. Landlords may impose rent increases upon tenants in occupancy only as provided below and as provided by subsections 37.3(d) and 37.3(g):

* * * *

(d) **Costa-Hawkins Rental Housing Act (Civil Code Sections 1954.50. et seq.).** Consistent with the Costa-Hawkins Rental Housing Act (Civil Code Sections 1954.50. et seq.) and regardless of whether otherwise provided under Chapter 37:

(1) Property Owner Rights to Establish Initial and All Subsequent Rental Rates for Separately Alienable Parcels.

(A) An owner or residential real property may establish the initial and all subsequent rental rates for a dwelling or a unit which is alienable separate from the title to any other dwelling unit or is a subdivided interest in a subdivision as specified in subdivision (b), (d), or (f) of Section 11004.5 of the California Business and Professions Code. The owner's right to establish subsequent rental rates under this paragraph shall not apply to a dwelling or unit where the preceding tenancy has been terminated by the owner by notice pursuant to California Civil Code Section 1946 or has been terminated upon a change in the terms of the tenancy noticed pursuant to California Civil Code Section 827; in such instances, the rent increase limitation provisions of Chapter 37 shall continue to apply for the duration of the new tenancy in that dwelling or unit.

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(D) An owner's right to establish subsequent rental rates under subsection 37.3(d)(1) shall not apply to a dwelling or unit that is a new dwelling unit created pursuant to the density exception set forth in Section 207(c)(8) of the Planning Code. (g) New Construction and Substantial Rehabilitation. (1) An owner of a residential dwelling or unit which is newly constructed and first received a certificate of occupancy after the effective date of Ordinance No. 276-79 (June 13, 1979), or which the Rent Board has certified has undergone a substantial rehabilitation, may establish the initial and all subsequent rental rates for that dwelling or unit, except: (A) where rent restrictions apply to the dwelling or unit under Sections 37.3(d) or 37.3(f); (B) where the dwelling or unit is a replacement unit under Section 37.9A(b); (C) as provided for certain categories of Accessory Dwelling Units under Section 37.2(r)(4)(D); and (D) as provided in a development agreement entered into by the City under Administrative Code Chapter 56-; and (E) as provided for certain categories of new dwelling units under Section 37.2(r)(4)(E). Section 56. Article 9 of the Subdivision Code is hereby amended by revising Sections 1396.2, 1396.4 and 1396.5 and adding Section 1396.6, to read as follows:

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SEC. 1396.2. PROHIBITION ON CONDOMINIUM CONVERSIONS FOR CERTAIN BUILDINGS.

(a) Notwithstanding any provisions in this Code to the contrary, including Section 1359, the Department of Public Works shall not sell residential condominium conversion lottery tickets to; shall not accept a residential condominium conversion subdivision application from; and shall deny a tentative subdivision or tentative parcel map for residential condominium conversion submitted by the owner(s) of a building that meets all of the following conditions:

(1) the building had two or more evictions with each eviction associated with a separate unit(s);

(2) issuance of each eviction notice occurred on or after May 1, 2005; and,

(3) issuance of the eviction notice(s) occurred pursuant to San Francisco

Administrative Code Sections 37.9(a)(8), 37.9(a)(10), or 37.9(a)(11), or 37.9(a)(13).

SEC. 1396.4. CONDOMINIUM CONVERSION FEE AND EXPEDITED CONVERSION PROGRAM.

* * * *

(b) Any building may be exempted from the annual lottery provisions of Section 1396 if the building owners for said building comply with <u>either: (1)</u> Section 1396.3 (g)(1) and all the requirements of this Section 1396.4 <u>or (2) all the requirements of Section 1396.6</u>.
Notwithstanding the foregoing <u>sentence</u>, no property or applicant subject to any of the prohibition<u>s</u> on conversions set forth in Section 1396.2, in particular a property with the eviction(s) set forth in Section 1396.2 (b), is eligible for the Expedited Conversion program under this Section 1396.4. Eligible buildings as set forth in this <u>subs</u>Section (b) may exercise their option to participate in this program according to the following requirements:

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SEC. 1396.5. SUSPENSION OF THE LOTTERY PENDING PRODUCTION OF REPLACEMENT UNITS FOR EXPEDITED CONVERSION UNITS.

* * * *

(c) <u>Except as otherwise authorized under Section 1396.6</u>, \underline{T} he Department shall not accept an application for the conversion of residential units under Section 1396 nor conduct a lottery under this Article prior to January 1, 2024. Thereafter, the lottery shall resume upon the earlier of the following: (1) the first February following the Mayor's Office of Housing <u>and</u> <u>Community Development</u> report pursuant to <u>S</u> ubsection (b) showing that the total number of Conversion Replacement Units produced in the City of San Francisco exceeded the total number of units converted as identified in the Department's report prepared pursuant to subsection (a); or (2) completion of the "Maximum Suspension Period" as defined below.

<u>1396.6. CONDOMINIUM CONVERSION ASSOCIATED WITH PROJECTS THAT</u> <u>UTILIZE THE RESIDENTIAL DENSITY EXCEPTION IN RH DISTRICTS TO CONSTRUCT</u> NEW DWELLING UNITS PURSUANT TO PLANNING CODE SECTION 207(C)(8).

(a) Findings. The findings of Planning Code Section 415.1 concerning the City's inclusionary affordable housing program are incorporated herein by reference and support the basis for charging the fee set forth herein as it relates to the conversion of dwelling units into condominiums.

(d) Decisions and Hearing on the Application.

(1) The applicant shall obtain a final and effective tentative map or tentative parcel map approval for the condominium subdivision or parcel map within one year of paying the fee specified in subsection (e). The Director of the Department of Public Works or the Director's designee is authorized to waive the time limits set forth in this subsection (d)(1) as it applies to a particular building due to extenuating or unique circumstances. Such waiver may be granted only after a public hearing and in no case shall the time limit extend beyond two years after submission of the application. (2) No less than 20 days prior to the Department's proposed decision on a tentative map or tentative parcel map, the Department shall publish the addresses of buildings being considered for approval and post such information on its website. During this time, any interested party may file a written objection to an application and submit information to the Department contesting the eligibility of a building. In addition, the Department may elect to hold a public hearing on said tentative map or tentative parcel map to consider the information presented by the public, other City department, or an

applicant. If the Department elects to hold such a hearing it shall post notice of such hearing and

(c) Any reference in the Municipal Code to RH-1, RH-1(D), or RH-1(S) districts that might remain, for example, due to inadvertence or delay in implementing subsection (a), or for any other reason, shall not be understood to contradict or be in conflict with this ordinance's abolition of said districts.

Section 89. No Conflict with Federal or State Law. Nothing in this ordinance shall be interpreted or applied so as to create any requirement, power, or duty in conflict with any federal or state law.

Section 910. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this ordinance, or any application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of a court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions or applications of the ordinance. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each and every section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, and word not declared invalid or unconstitutional without regard to whether any other portion of this ordinance or application thereof would be subsequently declared invalid or unconstitutional.

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Section <u>1011</u>. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

Section 11<u>12</u>. Scope of Ordinance. Except as stated in Sections 4 and 7 of this ordinance, in enacting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors intends to amend only those words, phrases, paragraphs, subsections, sections, articles, numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Municipal Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under the official title of the ordinance.

WHEN IS THE ANNUAL STATEMENT DUE?

- March 1 Elected State Officers, Judges and Court Commissioners, State Board and Commission members listed in Government Code Section 87200
- April 1 Most other filers

WHERE DO I FILE?

Most people file the Form 700 with their agency. If you're not sure where to file your Form 700, contact your filing officer or the person who asked you to complete it.

ITEMS TO NOTE!

- The Form 700 is a public document.
- Only filers serving in active military duty may receive an extension on the filing deadline.
- You must also report interests held by your spouse or registered domestic partner.
- Your agency's conflict of interest code will help you to complete the Form 700. You are encouraged to get your conflict of interest code from the person who asked you to complete the Form 700.

NOTHING TO REPORT?

Mark the "No reportable interests" box on Part 4 of the Cover Page, and submit only the signed Cover Page. Please review each schedule carefully!

Schedule	Common Reportable Interests	Common Non-Reportable Interests
A-1: Investments	Stocks, including those held in an IRA or 401K. Each stock must be listed.	Insurance policies, government bonds, diversified mutual funds, funds similar to diversified mutual funds.
A-2: Business Entitites/Trusts	Business entities, sole proprietorships, partnerships, LLCs, corporations and trusts. (e.g., Form 1099 filers).	Savings and checking accounts, and annuities.
B: Real Property	Rental property in filer's jurisdiction, or within two miles of the boundaries of the jurisdiction.	A residence used exclusively as a personal residence (such as a home or vacation property).
C: Income	Non-governmental salaries. Note that filers are required to report only half of their spouse's or partner's salary.	Governmental salary (from school district, for example).
D: Gifts	Gifts from businesses, vendors, or other contractors (meals, tickets, etc.).	Gifts from family members.
E: Travel Payments	Travel payments from third parties (not your employer).	Travel paid by your government agency.

Note: Like reportable interests, non-reportable interests may also create conflicts of interest and could be grounds for disqualification from certain decisions.

What's New

Gift Limit Increase

The gift limit increased to **\$520** for calendar years **2021** and **2022**. The gift limit in 2020 was **\$500**.

Who must file:

- Elected and appointed officials and candidates listed in Government Code Section 87200
- Employees, appointed officials, and consultants filing pursuant to a conflict of interest code ("code filers").
 Obtain your disclosure categories, which describe the interests you must report, from your agency; they are not part of the Form 700
- Candidates running for local elective offices that are designated in a conflict of interest code (e.g., county sheriffs, city clerks, school board trustees, and water board members)

Exception:

- Candidates for a county central committee are not required to file the Form 700.
- Members of newly created boards and commissions not yet covered under a conflict of interest code
- Employees in newly created positions of existing agencies

Code Filers — State and Local Officials, Employees, and Consultants Designated in a Conflict of Interest

Code: File with your agency, board, or commission unless otherwise specified in your agency's code (e.g., Legislative staff files directly with FPPC). In most cases, the agency, board, or commission will retain the statements.

Members of Boards and Commissions of Newly Created Agencies: File with your newly created agency or with your agency's code reviewing body.

Employees in Newly Created Positions of Existing Agencies: File with your agency or with your agency's code reviewing body. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 3.) **Candidates:** File with your local elections office.

How to file:

The Form 700 is available at *www.fppc.ca.gov*. Form 700 schedules are also available in Excel format. All

statements must have an original "wet" signature or be duly authorized by your filing officer to file electronically under Government Code Section 87500.2.

When to file:

Annual Statements

March 1, 2021

- Elected State Officers
- Judges and Court Commissioners
- State Board and State Commission Members listed in Government Code Section 87200

⇒ April 1, 2021

- Most other filers

Individuals filing under conflict of interest codes in city and county jurisdictions should verify the annual filing date with their local filing officers.

Statements postmarked by the filing deadline are considered filed on time.

Statements of 30 pages or less may be emailed or faxed by the deadline as long as the originally signed paper version is sent by first class mail to the filing official within 24 hours.

Assuming Office and Leaving Office Statements

Most filers file within 30 days of assuming or leaving office or within 30 days of the effective date of a newly adopted or amended conflict of interest code.

Exception:

If you assumed office between October 1, 2020, and December 31, 2020, and filed an assuming office statement, you are not required to file an annual statement until March 1, 2022, or April 1, 2022, whichever is applicable. The annual statement will cover the day after you assumed office through December 31, 2021. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 6, for additional exceptions.

Candidate Statements

File no later than the final filing date for the declaration of candidacy or nomination documents. A candidate statement is not required if you filed an assuming office or annual statement for the same jurisdiction within 60 days before filing a declaration of candidacy or other nomination documents.

Late Statements

There is no provision for filing deadline extensions unless the filer is serving in active military duty. (See page 19 for information on penalties and fines.)

Amendments

Statements may be amended at any time. You are only required to amend the schedule that needs to be revised. It is not necessary to amend the entire filed form. Obtain amendment schedules at *www.fppc.ca.gov.*

Assuming Office Statement:

If you are a newly appointed official or are newly employed in a position designated, or that will be designated, in a state or local agency's conflict of interest code, your assuming office date is the date you were sworn in or otherwise authorized to serve in the position. If you are a newly elected official, your assuming office date is the date you were sworn in.

 Report: Investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the date you assumed the office or position must be reported. In addition, income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the 12 months prior to the date you assumed the office or position.

For positions subject to confirmation by the State Senate or the Commission on Judicial Appointments, your assuming office date is the date you were appointed or nominated to the position.

• Example: Maria Lopez was nominated by the Governor to serve on a state agency board that is subject to state Senate confirmation. The assuming office date is the date Maria's nomination is submitted to the Senate. Maria must report investments, interests in real property, and business positions she holds on that date, and income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the 12 months prior to that date.

If your office or position has been added to a newly adopted or newly amended conflict of interest code, use the effective date of the code or amendment, whichever is applicable.

 Report: Investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the effective date of the code or amendment must be reported. In addition, income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the 12 months prior to the effective date of the code or amendment.

Annual Statement:

Generally, the period covered is January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2020. If the period covered by the statement is different than January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2020, (for example, you assumed office between October 1, 2019, and December 31, 2019 or you are combining statements), you must specify the period covered.

• Investments, interests in real property, business positions held, and income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the period covered by the statement must be reported. Do not change the preprinted dates on Schedules A-1, A-2, and B unless you are required to report the acquisition or disposition of an interest that did not occur in 2020.

 If your disclosure category changes during a reporting period, disclose under the old category until the effective date of the conflict of interest code amendment and disclose under the new disclosure category through the end of the reporting period.

Leaving Office Statement:

Generally, the period covered is January 1, 2020, through the date you stopped performing the duties of your position. If the period covered differs from January 1, 2020, through the date you stopped performing the duties of your position (for example, you assumed office between October 1, 2019, and December 31, 2019, or you are combining statements), the period covered must be specified. The reporting period can cover parts of two calendar years.

• Report: Investments, interests in real property, business positions held, and income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the period covered by the statement. Do not change the preprinted dates on Schedules A-1, A-2, and B unless you are required to report the acquisition or disposition of an interest that did not occur in 2020.

Candidate Statement:

If you are filing a statement in connection with your candidacy for state or local office, investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the date of filing your declaration of candidacy must be reported. In addition, income (including loans, gifts, and travel payments) received during the 12 months <u>prior to</u> the date of filing your declaration of candidacy is reportable. Do not change the preprinted dates on Schedules A-1, A-2, and B.

Candidates running for local elective offices (e.g., county sheriffs, city clerks, school board trustees, or water district board members) must file candidate statements, as required by the conflict of interest code for the elected position. The code may be obtained from the agency of the elected position.

Amendments:

If you discover errors or omissions on any statement, file an amendment as soon as possible. You are only required to amend the schedule that needs to be revised; it is not necessary to refile the entire form. Obtain amendment schedules from the FPPC website at *www.fppc.ca.gov.*

Note: Once you file your statement, you may not withdraw it. All changes must be noted on amendment schedules.

Enter your name, mailing address, and daytime telephone number in the spaces provided. Because the Form 700 is a public document, you may list your business/office address instead of your home address.

Part 1. Office, Agency, or Court

- Enter the name of the office sought or held, or the agency or court. Consultants must enter the public agency name rather than their private firm's name. (Examples: State Assembly; Board of Supervisors; Office of the Mayor; Department of Finance; Hope County Superior Court)
- Indicate the name of your division, board, or district, if applicable. (Examples: Division of Waste Management; Board of Accountancy; District 45). Do not use acronyms.
- Enter your position title. (Examples: Director; Chief Counsel; City Council Member; Staff Services Analyst)
- If you hold multiple positions (i.e., a city council member who also is a member of a county board or commission), you may be required to file statements with each agency. To simplify your filing obligations, you may complete an expanded statement.
 - To do this, enter the name of the other agency(ies) with which you are required to file and your position title(s) in the space provided. **Do not use acronyms.** Attach an additional sheet if necessary. Complete one statement covering the disclosure requirements for all positions. Each copy must contain an original signature. Therefore, before signing the statement, make a copy for each agency. Sign each copy with an original signature and file with each agency.

If you assume or leave a position after a filing deadline, you must complete a separate statement. For example, a city council member who assumes a position with a county special district after the April annual filing deadline must file a separate assuming office statement. In subsequent years, the city council member may expand his or her annual filing to include both positions.

Example:

Brian Bourne is a city council member for the City of Lincoln and a board member for the Camp Far West Irrigation District – a multi-county agency that covers Placer and Yuba counties. Brian will complete one Form 700 using full disclosure (as required for the city position) and covering interests in both Placer and Yuba counties (as required for the multi-county position) and list both positions on the Cover Page. Before signing the statement, Brian will make a copy and sign both statements. One statement will be filed with City of Lincoln and the other will be filed with Camp Far West Irrigation District. Both will contain an original signature.

Part 2. Jurisdiction of Office

 Check the box indicating the jurisdiction of your agency and, if applicable, identify the jurisdiction. Judges, judicial candidates, and court commissioners have statewide jurisdiction. All other filers should review the Reference Pamphlet, page 13, to determine their jurisdiction.

- If your agency is a multi-county office, list each county in which your agency has jurisdiction.
- If your agency is not a state office, court, county office, city office, or multi-county office (e.g., school districts, special districts and JPAs), check the "other" box and enter the county or city in which the agency has jurisdiction.

Example:

This filer is a member of a water district board with jurisdiction in portions of Yuba and Sutter Counties.

Part 3. Type of Statement

Check at least one box. The period covered by a statement is determined by the type of statement you are filing. If you are completing a 2020 annual statement, **do not** change the pre-printed dates to reflect 2021. Your annual statement is used for reporting the **previous year's** economic interests. Economic interests for your annual filing covering January 1, 2021, through December 31, 2021, will be disclosed on your statement filed in 2022. See Reference Pamphlet, page 4.

Combining Statements: Certain types of statements may be combined. For example, if you leave office after January 1, but before the deadline for filing your annual statement, you may combine your annual and leaving office statements. File by the earliest deadline. Consult your filing officer or the FPPC.

Part 4. Schedule Summary

- Complete the Schedule Summary after you have reviewed each schedule to determine if you have reportable interests.
- Enter the total number of completed pages including the cover page and either check the box for each schedule you use to disclose interests; **or** if you have nothing to disclose on any schedule, check the "No reportable interests" box. Please **do not** attach any blank schedules.

Part 5. Verification

Complete the verification by signing the statement and entering the date signed. All statements must have an original "wet" signature or be duly authorized by your filing officer to file electronically under Government Code Section 87500.2. When you sign your statement, you are stating, under penalty of perjury, that it is true and correct. Only the filer has authority to sign the statement. An unsigned statement is not considered filed and you may be subject to late filing penalties.

Comments:

"Investment" means a financial interest in any business entity (including a consulting business or other independent contracting business) that is located in, doing business in, planning to do business in, or that has done business during the previous two years in your agency's jurisdiction in which you, your spouse or registered domestic partner, or your dependent children had a direct, indirect, or beneficial interest totaling \$2,000 or more at any time during the reporting period. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 13.)

Reportable investments include:

- Stocks, bonds, warrants, and options, including those held in margin or brokerage accounts and managed investment funds (See Reference Pamphlet, page 13.)
- Sole proprietorships
- Your own business or your spouse's or registered domestic partner's business (See Reference Pamphlet, page 8, for the definition of "business entity.")
- Your spouse's or registered domestic partner's investments even if they are legally separate property
- Partnerships (e.g., a law firm or family farm)
- Investments in reportable business entities held in a retirement account (See Reference Pamphlet, page 15.)
- If you, your spouse or registered domestic partner, and dependent children together had a 10% or greater ownership interest in a business entity or trust (including a living trust), you must disclose investments held by the business entity or trust. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 16, for more information on disclosing trusts.)
- Business trusts

You are not required to disclose:

- Government bonds, diversified mutual funds, certain funds similar to diversified mutual funds (such as exchange traded funds) and investments held in certain retirement accounts. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 13.) (Regulation 18237)
- Bank accounts, savings accounts, money market accounts and certificates of deposits
- Insurance policies
- Annuities
- Commodities
- Shares in a credit union
- Government bonds (including municipal bonds)
- Retirement accounts invested in non-reportable interests (e.g., insurance policies, mutual funds, or government bonds) (See Reference Pamphlet, page 15.)

Reminders

- Do you know your agency's jurisdiction?
- Did you hold investments at any time during the period covered by this statement?
- Code filers your disclosure categories may only require disclosure of specific investments.

- Government defined-benefit pension plans (such as CalPERS and CalSTRS plans)
- Certain interests held in a blind trust (See Reference Pamphlet, page 16.)

Use Schedule A-1 to report ownership of less than 10% (e.g., stock). Schedule C (Income) may also be required if the investment is not a stock or corporate bond. (See second example below.)

Use Schedule A-2 to report ownership of 10% or greater (e.g., a sole proprietorship).

To Complete Schedule A-1:

Do not attach brokerage or financial statements.

- Disclose the name of the business entity.
- Provide a general description of the business activity of the entity (e.g., pharmaceuticals, computers, automobile manufacturing, or communications).
- Check the box indicating the highest fair market value of your investment during the reporting period. If you are filing a candidate or an assuming office statement, indicate the fair market value on the filing date or the date you took office, respectively. (See page 20 for more information.)
- Identify the nature of your investment (e.g., stocks, warrants, options, or bonds).
- An acquired or disposed of date is only required if you initially acquired or entirely disposed of the investment interest during the reporting period. The date of a stock dividend reinvestment or partial disposal is not required. Generally, these dates will not apply if you are filing a candidate or an assuming office statement.

Examples:

Frank Byrd holds a state agency position. His conflict of interest code requires full disclosure of investments. Frank must disclose his stock holdings of \$2,000 or more in any company that is located in or does business in California, as well as those stocks held by his spouse or registered domestic partner and dependent children.

Alice Lance is a city council member. She has a 4% interest, worth \$5,000, in a limited partnership located in the city. Alice must disclose the partnership on Schedule A-1 and income of \$500 or more received from the partnership on Schedule C.

A gift is anything of value for which you have not provided equal or greater consideration to the donor. A gift is reportable if its fair market value is \$50 or more. In addition, multiple gifts totaling \$50 or more received during the reporting period from a single source must be reported.

It is the acceptance of a gift, not the ultimate use to which it is put, that imposes your reporting obligation. Except as noted below, you must report a gift even if you never used it or if you gave it away to another person.

If the exact amount of a gift is unknown, you must make a good faith estimate of the item's fair market value. Listing the value of a gift as "over \$50" or "value unknown" is not adequate disclosure. In addition, if you received a gift through an intermediary, you must disclose the name, address, and business activity of both the donor and the intermediary. You may indicate an intermediary either in the "source" field after the name or in the "comments" section at the bottom of Schedule D.

Commonly reportable gifts include:

- · Tickets/passes to sporting or entertainment events
- Tickets/passes to amusement parks
- Parking passes not used for official agency business
- Food, beverages, and accommodations, including those provided in direct connection with your attendance at a convention, conference, meeting, social event, meal, or like gathering
- Rebates/discounts not made in the regular course of business to members of the public without regard to official status
- Wedding gifts (See Reference Pamphlet, page 16)
- An honorarium received prior to assuming office (You may report an honorarium as income on Schedule C, rather than as a gift on Schedule D, if you provided services of equal or greater value than the payment received. See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.)
- Transportation and lodging (See Schedule E.)
- Forgiveness of a loan received by you

Reminders

- Gifts from a single source are subject to a **\$500** limit in **2020**. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.)
- Code filers you only need to report gifts from reportable sources.

Gift Tracking Mobile Application

• FPPC has created a gift tracking app for mobile devices that helps filers track gifts and provides a quick and easy way to upload the information to the Form 700. Visit FPPC's website to download the app.

You are not required to disclose:

- Gifts that were not used and that, within 30 days after receipt, were returned to the donor or delivered to a charitable organization or government agency without being claimed by you as a charitable contribution for tax purposes
- Gifts from your spouse or registered domestic partner, child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, brother, sister, and certain other family members (See Regulation 18942 for a complete list.). The exception does not apply if the donor was acting as an agent or intermediary for a reportable source who was the true donor.
- Gifts of similar value exchanged between you and an individual, other than a lobbyist registered to lobby your state agency, on holidays, birthdays, or similar occasions
- Gifts of informational material provided to assist you in the performance of your official duties (e.g., books, pamphlets, reports, calendars, periodicals, or educational seminars)
- A monetary bequest or inheritance (However, inherited investments or real property may be reportable on other schedules.)
- Personalized plaques or trophies with an individual value of less than \$250
- Campaign contributions
- Up to two tickets, for your own use, to attend a fundraiser for a campaign committee or candidate, or to a fundraiser for an organization exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The ticket must be received from the organization or committee holding the fundraiser.
- Gifts given to members of your immediate family if the source has an established relationship with the family member and there is no evidence to suggest the donor had a purpose to influence you. (See Regulation 18943.)
- Free admission, food, and nominal items (such as a pen, pencil, mouse pad, note pad or similar item) available to all attendees, at the event at which the official makes a speech (as defined in Regulation 18950(b)(2)), so long as the admission is provided by the person who organizes the event.
- Any other payment not identified above, that would otherwise meet the definition of gift, where the payment is made by an individual who is not a lobbyist registered to lobby the official's state agency, where it is clear that the gift was made because of an existing personal or business relationship unrelated to the official's position and there is no evidence whatsoever at the time the gift is made to suggest the donor had a purpose to influence you.

To Complete Schedule D:

- Disclose the full name (not an acronym), address, and, if a business entity, the business activity of the source.
- Provide the date (month, day, and year) of receipt, and disclose the fair market value and description of the gift.

Comments:

Travel payments reportable on Schedule E include advances and reimbursements for travel and related expenses, including lodging and meals.

Gifts of travel may be subject to the gift limit. In addition, certain travel payments are reportable gifts, but are not subject to the gift limit. To avoid possible misinterpretation or the perception that you have received a gift in excess of the gift limit, you may wish to provide a specific description of the purpose of your travel. (See the FPPC fact sheet entitled "Limitations and Restrictions on Gifts, Honoraria, Travel, and Loans" to read about travel payments under section 89506(a).)

You are not required to disclose:

- Travel payments received from any state, local, or federal government agency for which you provided services equal or greater in value than the payments received, such as reimbursement for travel on agency business from your government agency employer.
- A payment for travel from another local, state, or federal government agency and related per diem expenses when the travel is for education, training or other inter-agency programs or purposes.
- Travel payments received from your employer in the normal course of your employment that are included in the income reported on Schedule C.
- A travel payment that was received from a nonprofit entity exempt from taxation under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) for which you provided equal or greater consideration, such as reimbursement for travel on business for a 501(c)(3) organization for which you are a board member.

Note: Certain travel payments may not be reportable if reported via email on Form 801 by your agency.

To Complete Schedule E:

- Disclose the full name (not an acronym) and address of the source of the travel payment.
- Identify the business activity if the source is a business entity.
- Check the box to identify the payment as a gift or income, report the amount, and disclose the date(s).
 - **Travel payments are gifts** if you did not provide services that were equal to or greater in value than the payments received. You must disclose gifts totaling \$50 or more from a single source during the period covered by the statement.

When reporting travel payments that are gifts, you must provide a description of the gift, the **date(s)** received, and the **travel destination**.

• **Travel payments are income** if you provided services that were equal to or greater in value than the

payments received. You must disclose income totaling \$500 or more from a single source during the period covered by the statement. You have the burden of proving the payments are income rather than gifts. When reporting travel payments as income, you must describe the services you provided in exchange for the payment. You are not required to disclose the date(s) for travel payments that are income.

Example:

City council member MaryClaire Chandler is the chair of a 501(c)(6) trade association, and the association pays for her travel to attend its meetings. Because MaryClaire is deemed

to be providing equal or greater consideration for the travel payment by virtue of serving on the board, this payment may be reported as income. Payments for MaryClaire to attend other events for which she is not providing services are likely considered gifts. Note that the same payment from a

501(c)(3) would NOT be reportable.

Example:

Mayor Kim travels to China on a trip organized by China Silicon Valley Business Development, a California nonprofit, 501(c)(6) organization. The Chengdu Municipal People's Government pays for Mayor Kim's airfare and travel costs,

as well as his meals and lodging during the trip. The trip's agenda shows that the trip's purpose is to promote job creation and economic activity in China and in Silicon Valley, so the trip is reasonably related to a governmental purpose. Thus, Mayor Kim must report the gift of travel,

but the gift is exempt from the gift limit. In this case, the travel payments are not subject to the gift limit because the source is a foreign government and because the travel is reasonably related to a governmental purpose. (Section 89506(a)(2).) Note that Mayor Kim could be disqualified from participating in or making decisions about The Chengdu Municipal People's Government for 12 months. Also note that if China Silicon Valley Business Development (a 501(c)(6) organization) paid for the travel costs rather than the governmental organization, the payments would be subject to the gift limits. (See the FPPC fact sheet, Limitations and Restrictions on Gifts, Honoraria, Travel and Loans, at www.fppc.ca.gov.) The Political Reform Act (Gov. Code Sections 81000-91014) requires most state and local government officials and employees to publicly disclose their personal assets and income. They also must disqualify themselves from participating in decisions that may affect their personal economic interests. The Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) is the state agency responsible for issuing the attached Statement of Economic Interests, Form 700, and for interpreting the law's provisions.

Gift Prohibition

Gifts received by most state and local officials, employees, and candidates are subject to a limit. In 2021-2022, the gift limit increased to \$520 from a single source during a calendar year. In 2019 and 2020, the gift limit was \$500 from a single source during a calendar year.

Additionally, state officials, state candidates, and certain state employees are subject to a \$10 limit per calendar month on gifts from lobbyists and lobbying firms registered with the Secretary of State. See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.

State and local officials and employees should check with their agency to determine if other restrictions apply.

Disqualification

Public officials are, under certain circumstances, required to disqualify themselves from making, participating in, or attempting to influence governmental decisions that will affect their economic interests. This may include interests they are not required to disclose. For example, a personal residence is often not reportable, but may be grounds for disqualification. Specific disqualification requirements apply to 87200 filers (e.g., city councilmembers, members of boards of supervisors, planning commissioners, etc.). These officials must publicly identify the economic interest that creates a conflict of interest and leave the room before a discussion or vote takes place at a public meeting. For more information, consult Government Code Section 87105, Regulation 18707, and the Guide to Recognizing Conflicts of Interest page at *www.fppc.ca.gov*.

Honorarium Ban

Most state and local officials, employees, and candidates are prohibited from accepting an honorarium for any speech given, article published, or attendance at a conference, convention, meeting, or like gathering. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.)

Loan Restrictions

Certain state and local officials are subject to restrictions

on loans. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 14.)

Post-Governmental Employment

There are restrictions on representing clients or employers before former agencies. The provisions apply to elected state officials, most state employees, local elected officials, county chief administrative officers, city managers, including the chief administrator of a city, and general managers or chief administrators of local special districts and JPAs. The FPPC website has fact sheets explaining the provisions.

Late Filing

The filing officer who retains originally-signed or electronically filed statements of economic interests may impose on an individual a fine for any statement that is filed late. The fine is \$10 per day up to a maximum of \$100. Late filing penalties may be reduced or waived under certain circumstances.

Persons who fail to timely file their Form 700 may be referred to the FPPC's Enforcement Division (and, in some cases, to the Attorney General or district attorney) for investigation and possible prosecution. In addition to the late filing penalties, a fine of up to \$5,000 per violation may be imposed.

Form 700 is a Public Document Public Access Must Be Provided

Statements of Economic Interests are public documents. The filing officer must permit any member of the public to inspect and receive a copy of any statement.

- Statements must be available as soon as possible during the agency's regular business hours, but in any event not later than the second business day after the statement is received. Access to the Form 700 is not subject to the Public Records Act procedures.
- No conditions may be placed on persons seeking access to the forms.
- No information or identification may be required from persons seeking access.
- Reproduction fees of no more than 10 cents per page may be charged.

General

- Q. What is the reporting period for disclosing interests on an assuming office statement or a candidate statement?
- A. On an assuming office statement, disclose all reportable investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the date you assumed office. In addition, you must disclose income (including loans, gifts and travel payments) received during the 12 months prior to the date you assumed office.

On a candidate statement, disclose all reportable investments, interests in real property, and business positions held on the date you file your declaration of candidacy. You must also disclose income (including loans, gifts and travel payments) received during the 12 months prior to the date you file your declaration of candidacy.

- Q. I hold two other board positions in addition to my position with the county. Must I file three statements of economic interests?
- A. Yes, three are required. However, you may complete one statement listing the county and the two boards on the Cover Page or an attachment as the agencies for which you will be filing. Report your economic interests using the largest jurisdiction and highest disclosure requirements assigned to you by the three agencies. Make two copies of the entire statement before signing it, sign each copy with an original signature, and distribute one original to the county and to each of the two boards. Remember to complete separate statements for positions that you leave or assume during the year.
- Q. I am a department head who recently began acting as city manager. Should I file as the city manager?
- A. Yes. File an assuming office statement as city manager. Persons serving as "acting," "interim," or "alternate" must file as if they hold the position because they are or may be performing the duties of the position.
- Q. My spouse and I are currently separated and in the process of obtaining a divorce. Must I still report my spouse's income, investments, and interests in real property?
- A. Yes. A public official must continue to report a spouse's economic interests until such time as dissolution of marriage proceedings is final. However, if a separate property agreement has been reached prior to that time, your estranged spouse's income may not have to be reported. Contact the FPPC for more information.

- Q. As a designated employee, I left one state agency to work for another state agency. Must I file a leaving office statement?
- A. Yes. You may also need to file an assuming office statement for the new agency.

Investment Disclosure

- Q. I have an investment interest in shares of stock in a company that does not have an office in my jurisdiction. Must I still disclose my investment interest in this company?
- A. Probably. The definition of "doing business in the jurisdiction" is not limited to whether the business has an office or physical location in your jurisdiction. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 13.)
- Q. My spouse and I have a living trust. The trust holds rental property in my jurisdiction, our primary residence, and investments in diversified mutual funds. I have full disclosure. How is this trust disclosed?
- A. Disclose the name of the trust, the rental property and its income on Schedule A-2. Your primary residence and investments in diversified mutual funds registered with the SEC are not reportable.
- Q. I am required to report all investments. I have an IRA that contains stocks through an account managed by a brokerage firm. Must I disclose these stocks even though they are held in an IRA and I did not decide which stocks to purchase?
- A. Yes. Disclose on Schedule A-1 or A-2 any stock worth \$2,000 or more in a business entity located in or doing business in your jurisdiction.
- Q. The value of my stock changed during the reporting period. How do I report the value of the stock?
- A. You are required to report the highest value that the stock reached during the reporting period. You may use your monthly statements to determine the highest value. You may also use the entity's website to determine the highest value. You are encouraged to keep a record of where you found the reported value. Note that for an assuming office statement, you must report the value of the stock on the date you assumed office.

Questions and Answers Continued

- Q. I am the sole owner of my business, an S-Corporation. I believe that the nature of the business is such that it cannot be said to have any "fair market value" because it has no assets. I operate the corporation under an agreement with a large insurance company. My contract does not have resale value because of its nature as a personal services contract. Must I report the fair market value for my business on Schedule A-2 of the Form 700?
- A. Yes. Even if there are no *tangible* assets, intangible assets, such as relationships with companies and clients are commonly sold to qualified professionals. The "fair market value" is often quantified for other purposes, such as marital dissolutions or estate planning. In addition, the IRS presumes that "personal services corporations" have a fair market value. A professional "book of business" and the associated goodwill that generates income are not without a determinable value. The Form 700 does not require a precise fair market value; it is only necessary to check a box indicating the broad range within which the value falls.
- Q. I own stock in IBM and must report this investment on Schedule A-1. I initially purchased this stock in the early 1990s; however, I am constantly buying and selling shares. Must I note these dates in the "Acquired" and "Disposed" fields?
- A. No. You must only report dates in the "Acquired" or "Disposed" fields when, during the reporting period, you initially purchase a reportable investment worth \$2,000 or more or when you dispose of the entire investment. You are not required to track the partial trading of an investment.
- Q. On last year's filing I reported stock in Encoe valued at \$2,000 \$10,000. Late last year the value of this stock fell below and remains at less than \$2,000. How should this be reported on this year's statement?
- A. You are not required to report an investment if the value was less than \$2,000 during the **entire** reporting period. However, because a disposed date is not required for stocks that fall below \$2,000, you may want to report the stock and note in the "comments" section that the value fell below \$2,000. This would be for informational purposes only; it is not a requirement.

- Q. We have a Section 529 account set up to save money for our son's college education. Is this reportable?
- A. If the Section 529 account contains reportable interests (e.g., common stock valued at \$2,000 or more), those interests are reportable (not the actual Section 529 account). If the account contains solely mutual funds, then nothing is reported.

Income Disclosure

- Q. I reported a business entity on Schedule A-2. Clients of my business are located in several states. Must I report all clients from whom my pro rata share of income is \$10,000 or more on Schedule A-2, Part 3?
- A. No, only the clients located in or doing business on a regular basis in your jurisdiction must be disclosed.
- Q. I believe I am not required to disclose the names of clients from whom my pro rata share of income is \$10,000 or more on Schedule A-2 because of their right to privacy. Is there an exception for reporting clients' names?
- A. Regulation 18740 provides a procedure for requesting an exemption to allow a client's name not to be disclosed if disclosure of the name would violate a legally recognized privilege under California or Federal law. This regulation may be obtained from our website at *www.fppc.ca.gov.* (See Reference Pamphlet, page 14.)
- Q. I am sole owner of a private law practice that is not reportable based on my limited disclosure category. However, some of the sources of income to my law practice are from reportable sources. Do I have to disclose this income?
- A. Yes, even though the law practice is not reportable, reportable sources of income to the law practice of \$10,000 or more must be disclosed. This information would be disclosed on Schedule C with a note in the "comments" section indicating that the business entity is not a reportable investment. The note would be for informational purposes only; it is not a requirement.

- Q. I am the sole owner of my business. Where do I disclose my income on Schedule A-2 or Schedule C?
- A. Sources of income to a business in which you have an ownership interest of 10% or greater are disclosed on Schedule A-2. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 8.)
- Q. My husband is a partner in a four-person firm where all of his business is based on his own billings and collections from various clients. How do I report my community property interest in this business and the income generated in this manner?
- A. If your husband's investment in the firm is 10% or greater, disclose 100% of his share of the business on Schedule A-2, Part 1 and 50% of his income on Schedule A-2, Parts 2 and 3. For example, a client of your husband's must be a source of at least \$20,000 during the reporting period before the client's name is reported.
- Q. How do I disclose my spouse's or registered domestic partner's salary?
- A. Report the name of the employer as a source of income on Schedule C.
- Q. I am a doctor. For purposes of reporting \$10,000 sources of income on Schedule A-2, Part 3, are the patients or their insurance carriers considered sources of income?
- A. If your patients exercise sufficient control by selecting you instead of other doctors, then your patients, rather than their insurance carriers, are sources of income to you. (See Reference Pamphlet, page 14.)
- Q. I received a loan from my grandfather to purchase my home. Is this loan reportable?
- A. No. Loans received from family members are not reportable.
- Q. Many years ago, I loaned my parents several thousand dollars, which they paid back this year. Do I need to report this loan repayment on my Form 700?
- A. No. Payments received on a loan made to a family member are not reportable.

Real Property Disclosure

- Q. During this reporting period we switched our principal place of residence into a rental. I have full disclosure and the property is located in my agency's jurisdiction, so it is now reportable. Because I have not reported this property before, do I need to show an "acquired" date?
- A. No, you are not required to show an "acquired" date because you previously owned the property. However, you may want to note in the "comments" section that the property was not previously reported because it was used exclusively as your residence. This would be for informational purposes only; it is not a requirement.
- Q. I am a city manager, and I own a rental property located in an adjacent city, but one mile from the city limit. Do I need to report this property interest?
- A. Yes. You are required to report this property because it is located within 2 miles of the boundaries of the city you manage.
- Q. Must I report a home that I own as a personal residence for my daughter?
- A. You are not required to disclose a home used as a personal residence for a family member unless you receive income from it, such as rental income.
- Q. I am a co-signer on a loan for a rental property owned by a friend. Since I am listed on the deed of trust, do I need to report my friend's property as an interest in real property on my Form 700?
- A. No. Simply being a co-signer on a loan for property does not create a reportable interest in real property for you.

Gift Disclosure

- Q. If I received a reportable gift of two tickets to a concert valued at \$100 each, but gave the tickets to a friend because I could not attend the concert, do I have any reporting obligations?
- A. Yes. Since you accepted the gift and exercised discretion and control of the use of the tickets, you must disclose the gift on Schedule D.

- Q. Julia and Jared Benson, a married couple, want to give a piece of artwork to a county supervisor. Is each spouse considered a separate source for purposes of the gift limit and disclosure?
- A. Yes, each spouse may make a gift valued at the gift limit during a calendar year. For example, during 2020 the gift limit was \$500, so the Bensons may have given the supervisor artwork valued at no more than **\$1,000**. The supervisor must identify Jared and Julia Benson as the sources of the gift.
- Q. I am a Form 700 filer with full disclosure. Our agency holds a holiday raffle to raise funds for a local charity. I bought \$10 worth of raffle tickets and won a gift basket valued at \$120. The gift basket was donated by Doug Brewer, a citizen in our city. At the same event, I bought raffle tickets for, and won a quilt valued at \$70. The quilt was donated by a coworker. Are these reportable gifts?
- A. Because the gift basket was donated by an outside source (not an agency employee), you have received a reportable gift valued at \$110 (the value of the basket less the consideration paid). The source of the gift is Doug Brewer and the agency is disclosed as the intermediary. Because the quilt was donated by an employee of your agency, it is not a reportable gift.
- Q. My agency is responsible for disbursing grants. An applicant (501(c)(3) organization) met with agency employees to present its application. At this meeting, the applicant provided food and beverages. Would the food and beverages be considered gifts to the employees? These employees are designated in our agency's conflict of interest code and the applicant is a reportable source of income under the code.
- A. Yes. If the value of the food and beverages consumed by any one filer, plus any other gifts received from the same source during the reporting period total \$50 or more, the food and beverages would be reported using the fair market value and would be subject to the gift limit.

- Q. I received free admission to an educational conference related to my official duties. Part of the conference fees included a round of golf. Is the value of the golf considered informational material?
- A. No. The value of personal benefits, such as golf, attendance at a concert, or sporting event, are gifts subject to reporting and limits.







Green Infrastructure Grant Program:

Board of Supervisor's Update

April – June 2022

Program Summary

The San Francisco Public Utilities Commission's (SFPUC) Green Infrastructure Grant Program (Grant Program) is designed to encourage San Francisco property owners to design, build, and maintain performance-based green stormwater infrastructure (Green Infrastructure or GI), including but not limited to: permeable pavement, rainwater harvesting, rain gardens, and vegetated roofs. The goal of this program is to reduce the amount of stormwater runoff entering SFPUC's sewer system and improve system performance while also providing co-benefits such as non-potable reuse, groundwater recharge, and educational opportunities.

To receive funding under the Grant Program each project must:

- 1. Be located on a parcel that is connected to an SFPUC-owned and operated sewer system service area.
- 2. Manage stormwater runoff from a minimum impervious area of 0.5 acres.
- 3. Capture the 90th percentile storm (0.75-inch depth) with the proposed green infrastructure features.
- 4. Provide at least two (2) of the identified co-benefits from the program list, which can be found in the <u>Grantee Guidebook</u>.
- 5. Have a grant team that collectively demonstrates a history of successful project implementation and has previous experience designing, constructing, and/or maintaining green infrastructure.

Quarterly Highlights

During the second quarter of 2022, no new Green Infrastructure Grant applications were received and no new projects were awarded. One awarded project, St. Thomas More School completed project design during the second quarter. One awarded project, Lycee Francais SF Ortega Campus continued construction during the second quarter. One awarded project, St Anne of the Sunset Church and School began design during the second quarter.

On March 22nd, 2022 the SFPUC Commission approved proposed modifications to the Green Infrastructure Grant Program Guidelines to reflect compliance with the City Administrative Code Chapter 21G, revise grant team experience and co-benefit eligibility criteria, increase cap on planning and design costs, and revise other program requirements. On June 16th, 2022, the Board of Supervisors Government Audit and Oversight Committee recommended advancement of the Ordinance that governs the proposed program modifications. The SFPUC will seek full Board of Supervisors approval of the proposed modifications and an extension to the delegation of authority to the SFPUC General Manger to award grants during the third quarter of 2022.

Since the launch of the Green Infrastructure Grant Program in February 2019, the SFPUC has awarded grants to 11 projects with a total of approximately \$10,480,000 in funding. The following program summary statistics are as of June 30, 2022:







Background:

In September 2020, the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco (the "Board of Supervisors") adopted Ordinance No. 173-20 which authorized the issuance of Wastewater Revenue Refunding Bonds to refund any outstanding obligations of the Wastewater Enterprise. As authorized by Ordinance No. 173-20, the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (the "SFPUC") issued the Wastewater Revenue Bonds, 2022 Series B (Refunding) (the "2022 Series B Bonds"), on July 6, 2022 for the purposes of refunding \$149.790 million of outstanding SFPUC wastewater revenue bonds for debt service savings.

Per Ordinance No. 173-20, within 30 days of the issuance of refunding bonds, the SFPUC must file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors a savings report that reflects at least a three percent net present value debt service savings ("NPV Savings"), together with a copy of the final Official Statement for the refunding bonds.

The SFPUC has requested that Montague DeRose and Associates, LLC, who served as cofinancial advisor to the 2022 Series B Bonds, prepare this report for purposes of complying with the requirements set forth in Ordinance No. 173-20.

Bond Sale Savings Report:

As noted, the SFPUC priced \$137.080 million of 2022 Series B Bonds via negotiated sale on May 12, 2022. The 2022 Series B Bonds settled on July 6, 2022. Details of the 2022 Series B Bonds, including debt service savings, are noted in Table 1 below:

On behalf of The Freedom Project at the San Francisco Public Defender's office, I write to express strong support of Resolution File No. 220830 in support of the San Francisco District Attorney's Innocence Commission. Though it appears that a fully independent Innocence Commission should be explored urgently, so as to remove the partisanship and instability that accompanies frequent changes in leadership, in the meantime, we support the resolution urging the interim District Attorney to keep the Innocence Commission intact and to allow the SFDA's Post Conviction Unit to continue its related wrongful conviction and resentencing work.¹

Tragically, wrongful convictions happen everywhere—and California is no exception. Since the National Registry of Exonerations began tracking wrongful convictions in 1989, there have been more than 279 known wrongful convictions in California – causing innocent Californians to lose a total of 2,173 years of their lives, and costing taxpayers over \$221 million (according to a 2016 study). These wrongful convictions occurred as the real perpetrators of crime avoided responsibility and victims were denied justice. Wrongful convictions violate fundamental principles of justice, due process, and are an assault on our very humanity.

The Innocence Commission was established in September 2020 to effectuate the San Francisco District Attorney's duty to do justice by exonerating wrongfully convicted prisoners in San Francisco County. The Commission is a five-member panel of independent experts working *pro bono* and assisted by a paid staff attorney. The Commission reviews credible claims of wrongful conviction and submits a detailed recommendation to the District Attorney conveying its conclusions and recommendations. The District Attorney retains the authority to make the ultimate decision in each case, but must give the Commission's recommendation great weight.

Dear San Francisco Supervisors,

My name is Steve Vender. I am a private investigator who specializes in criminal and indigent defense, with twenty-seven years of experience. In 2018 I was appointed by the Superior Court to investigate a wrongful conviction in a homicide case. I've worked with attorney Mark Vermeulen on this case and continue to do so.

After a two-year in-depth investigation into this case, I did what the police should have done fifteen years ago. I solved a fifteen year old homicide. In a twenty page investigative report, including a four page addendum, I identified the real killer in this case and his co-conspirators. After extensively profiling the people involved in this case, I was able to offer what the prosecution never did during the trial in which our client was convicted, and that is a believable and convincing motive for the homicide.

My report eventually found its way to the Innocence Commission, where Lara Bazelon is the chairperson. After presenting our case to the Innocence Commission and sending them important witnesses who were never called by the defense to testify at our client's trial, the Innocence Commission was conducting its own investigation and was scheduled to interview our client who has been in county jail and state prison for the last fifteen years. He was convicted and sentenced to life in prison for a homicide that he most definitely did not commit. However, with the continued existence of the Innocence Commission in question, notwithstanding the new DA's early assurances of support, especially since DA Jenkins recently fired two Assistant District Attorneys who were the Commission's liaisons to the DA's office, I am writing to you today to strongly urge you to support the resolution before the Board, brought by Supervisors Preston and Ronen, to keep the Commission intact so that they can continue their valuable work.

We have filed a Habeas Petition in this case, but we won't get a decision until sometime in late August. The petition has four claims: Actual Innocence, Prosecutorial Misconduct, and two extensively documented claims of Ineffective Assistance of Counsel. It is our hope that after interviewing our client, the Innocence Commission would write their own report and provide a strong recommendation for vacating our client's conviction and releasing him from state prison. A positive recommendation from the Innocence Commission will carry great weight.

The Innocence Commission is unique and absolutely essential in establishing how innocent people are convicted and sent to prison for life. Therefore, I am urging that you vote for the resolution that would put the Board of Supervisors on record as supporting the continued existence of the Commission so that they can continue to address the great wrongs done to people who were innocent of the crimes for which they were charged and wrongly convicted. I realize that the resolution is non-binding, but your unanimous support of this resolution will contribute to helping correct wrongful convictions in pursuit of the true justice we all seek from our criminal justice system.

As the Dean of the University of San Francisco School of Law, I am writing to express my strong support of Resolution File No. 220830 in support of the San Francisco District Attorney's Innocence Commission. This resolution urges the interim District Attorney to keep the Innocence Commission intact and to allow the SFDA's Post Conviction Unit to continue its related wrongful conviction and resentencing work.

Wrongful convictions are a significant problem in the United States—and California is no exception. Since the National Registry of Exonerations began tracking wrongful convictions in 1989, there have been more than 279 known wrongful convictions in California – causing innocent Californians to lose a total of 2,173 years of their lives, and costing California tax-payers over \$221 million (according to a 2016 study). These wrongful convictions occurred as the real perpetrators of crime avoided consequences for their actions and victims were denied justice. Wrongful convictions undermine our criminal legal system and violate fundamental principles of justice and due process.

USF School of Law has been honored to support the Innocence Commission's work through the District Attorney's partnership with the Racial Justice Clinic and Professor Bazelon. The work of undoing wrongful convictions is deeply aligned with the Racial Justice Clinic's mission to serve clients who have been affected by racial discrimination. Wrongful convictions harm communities of color and the Black community in particular. According to the National Registry of Exonerations, Black people constitute approximately 13% of the American population, but represent 49% of the exonerations in the United States. The NRE's 2017 report revealed that Black people are seven times more likely to be wrongfully convicted of murder, and twelve times more likely to be wrongfully convicted of drug possession than white people.



The Innocence Commission model is a first-in-the-nation approach to efficiently and fairly investigating potential wrongful conviction cases and is a cost-effective way to effectuate the district attorneys' duty to prevent and rectify the conviction of innocent persons. The Commission is tasked with evaluating cases where an incarcerated person alleges that they have been wrongfully convicted—either because they can establish that they are factually innocent, or because a due process violation renders their incarceration unconstitutional. If the Commission, after evaluating all of the available evidence and conducting any necessary re-investigation, votes by a majority to vacate the conviction, the Commission prepares a findings of fact and conclusions of law memorandum that serves as the basis to seek to vacate the conviction or provide other relief. Although the district attorney retains the final decision-making power on each case, they afford great weight to the determination of the Commission.

The members of the Innocence Commission—Judge LaDoris Cordell (Ret.), Deputy Public Defender Jacque Wilson, Dr. Michael Meade, and Professor Lara Bazelon (Chair)—represent key perspectives in the criminal legal system, and bring to their work a diversity of professional experience as well as diversity across race, ethnicity, and gender. The makeup of the Commission and the collective experience of its current members has been a key part of its success.

The Commission's structure is designed to address the main challenges that prevent so many Conviction Integrity Units from fairly and efficiently reviewing alleged wrongful conviction cases. For instance, the assistant DAs assigned to typical CIUs must often undertake the unenviable task of evaluating and passing judgment on the work of colleagues and predecessors in their own offices as well as the police, with whom they must work every day. The Commission's independence from the DA's office and the composition of its membership are key features that alleviate this common problem. This feature, like the Innocence Commission's other practices and policies, is based on best practices gleaned from the innocence community, including Innocence Project co-founder Barry Scheck, and the Quattrone Center for the Fair Administration of Justice. As a result, the Commission has been able to conduct collaborative investigations that are both efficient and thorough.

The Innocence Commission has established that it is effective. In April of this year, the work of the Innocence Commission led to the exoneration of Joaquin Ciria who spent 32 years in prison for a crime he did not commit. His was the first collaborative exoneration in San Francisco history. I am so proud that USF students in the Racial Justice Clinic had the opportunity to support the work of the Innocence Commission and to see real justice in action.



As Mr. Ciria reminded us at an event celebrating his exoneration, there are others still wrongfully incarcerated who are seeking justice. The work of the Innocence Commission must be allowed to continue. I urge you to support Resolution File No. 220830 in support of the San Francisco District Attorney's Innocence Commission.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this bill is to require the Department of Justice (DOJ) to establish a grant program for the purpose of creating, supporting, or expanding vertical prosecution units for the prosecutions of hate crimes.

Existing law states that the Legislature finds and declares that it is the right of every person, regardless of actual or perceived race or ethnicity, religion, gender, gender identity, gender expression, nationality, disability, sexual orientation, or association with a person or group with these actual or perceived characteristics, to be secure and protected from fear, intimidation, and physical harm caused by the activities of violent groups and individuals. (Pen. Code, § 11410.)

Existing law defines "hate crime" as any criminal act committed, in whole or in part, because of one or more of the following actual or perceived characteristics of the victim:

- Disability;
- Gender;

- Nationality;
- Race or ethnicity;
- Religion;
- Sexual orientation; and,
- Association with a person or group with one or more of these actual or perceived characteristics. (Pen. Code, § 422.55, subd. (a).)

Existing law defines "association with a person or group with these actual or perceived characteristics" as including advocacy for, identification with, or being on the ground owned or rented by, or adjacent to, any of the following: a community center, educational facility, family, individual, office, meeting hall, place of worship, private institution, public agency, library, or other entity, group, or person that has, or is identified with people who have, one or more of those characteristics listed in the definition of "hate crime." (Pen. Code, § 422.56, subd. (a).)

Existing law defines "in whole or in part because of" to mean that the bias motivation must be a cause in fact of the offense, whether or not other causes also exist. When multiple concurrent motives exist, the prohibited bias must be a substantial factor in bringing about the particular result. There is no requirement that the bias be a main factor, or that the crime would not have been committed but for the actual or perceived characteristic. (Pen. Code, § 422.56, subd. (d).)

Existing law provides that "victim" includes, but is not limited to, a community center, educational facility, entity, family, group, individual, office, meeting hall, person, place of worship, private institution, public agency, library, or other victim or intended victim of the offense. (Pen. Code, § 422.56, subd. (i).)

Existing law provides that it is a hate crime to violate or interfere with the exercise of civil rights, or knowingly deface, destroy, or damage property because of actual or perceived characteristics of the victim that fit the hate crime definition. (Pen. Code, § 422.6, subds. (a) and (b).)

Existing law provides that a conviction for violating or interfering with the civil rights of another on the basis of actual or perceived characteristics of the victim that fit the hate crime definition shall be punished by imprisonment in a county jail not to exceed one year, or by a fine not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000), or by both the above imprisonment and fine, and the court shall order the defendant to perform a minimum of community service, not to exceed 400 hours, to be performed over a period not to exceed 350 days, during a time other than their hours of employment or school attendance. (Pen. Code, § 422.6, subd. (c).)

Existing law makes any other crime that is not punishable by imprisonment in the state prison punishable as an alternate felony-misdemeanor, "wobbler," if the crime is committed against the person or property of another for the purpose of intimidating or interfering with that other person's free exercise or enjoyment of any right secured to him or her by the Constitution or laws of this state or by the Constitution or laws of the United States under any of the following circumstances, which shall be charged in the accusatory pleading:

- The crime against the person of another either includes the present ability to commit a violent injury or causes actual physical injury;
- The crime against property causes damage in excess of nine hundred fifty dollars (\$950); or,

• The person charged with a crime under this section has been convicted previously of a hate crime or conspiracy to commit a hate crime, as specified. (Pen. Code, § 422.7.)

Existing law allows a court to impose a hate crime enhancement to add a term of one, two, or three years in state prison, at the court's discretion. (Pen. Code, § 422.75.)

Existing law specifies that except when the hate crime enhancement is imposed, the fact that a person committed a felony or attempted to commit a felony that is a hate crime shall be considered a circumstance in aggravation of the crime in imposing one of three terms specified in statute. (Pen. Code, § 422.76.)

Existing law authorizes each state law enforcement agency to adopt a hate crime policy. (Pen. Code, § 422.87, subd. (a).)

Existing law requires, subject to funding, the Attorney General to direct local law enforcement agencies to report to the DOJ information relative to hate crimes. (Pen. Code, §13023

This bill establishes the Hate crime Vertical Prosecution Pilot Grant Program (HCVP) to be administered by DOJ.

This bill requires DOJ, beginning January 1, 2023 and subject to an appropriation of funds by the Legislature, to award grants to prosecutorial agencies for the purpose of creating, supporting, or expanding vertical prosecution units for the prosecution of hate crimes. These units shall be primarily focused on better serving hate crime victims and achieving just, equitable, and appropriate resolutions to hate crime cases.

This bill provides that one-time HCVP grants shall be made on a competitive basis to selected applicants in a manner and in an amount determined by DOJ.

This bill requires DOJ to do all of the following to administer the grant program:

- Specify the form of the application and information required to be submitted by each applicant;
- Specify the criteria DOJ shall consider in selecting grant awardees; and,
- Select the number of awards to be granted.

This bill states that DOJ may use no more than 5 percent of the funds appropriated for HCVP for the costs of administering the program.

This bill prohibits grant awardees from using grant funds to supplant existing spending for vertical prosecutions of hate crimes.

This bill requires, by no later than July 1, 2028, each grant recipient to prepare and submit a report to DOJ, in a form prescribed by DOJ, that includes any relevant data requested by DOJ.

This bill requires, by not later than January 1, 2029, DOJ to prepare and submit a report to the Legislature summarizing the data provided by grant recipients and analyzing the effectiveness of vertical prosecution programs in better serving hate crime victims and achieving just, equitable,

and appropriate resolutions to hate crime cases, and making policy recommendations to the Legislature.

This bill states that DOJ shall make evaluations of the grant program available to the public.

This bill provides the following definitions:

- "Prosecutorial agency" means "a district attorney, city attorney, or other governmental entity responsible for the prosecution of crimes within a local jurisdiction."
- "Vertical prosecution" refers to having the same individual prosecutor assigned to a case from the initial criminal investigation through the sentencing of the offender.

This bill contains a sunset date of July 1, 2029.

COMMENTS

1. Need for This Bill

According to the author of this bill:

Anti-Asian rhetoric surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic has led to a dramatic spike in verbal and physical assaults against Asian Americans. According to the latest report from Stop AAPI Hate, over 10,000 anti-Asian hate incidents have occurred nationwide between March 2020 and December 2021 with over 4,000 of those occurring in California.

The California Attorney General's Office recommends prosecuting hate crimes vertically – meaning a single prosecutor handles a case from start to finish – to both promote accurate and consistent prosecution and provide continuity for the victim.

This bill establishes a pilot grant program for District Attorney offices to create or expand vertical prosecution units for hate crimes. In addition to assigning a single prosecutor to each hate crime case, these units will also connect victims with victim advocates.

2. Hate Crimes

Hate crimes are generally defined as crimes that are "committed not out of animosity toward the victim as an individual, but out of hostility toward the group to which the victim belongs." (Pendo, *Recognizing Violence Against Women: Gender and the Hate Crimes Statistics Act* (1994) 17 Harv. Women's L.J. 157, 159.) Looking at a more specific definition, a hate crime is defined as "a crime in which the defendant intentionally selects a victim because of the *actual or perceived* race, color, religion, national origin, ethnicity, gender, disability, or sexual orientation of any person." (*Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994*, Pub. L. 103-322, 108 Stat. 1796 Section 280003 (1994) emphasis added (codified in part at 28 U.S.C. Section 994 (1994).)

According to Los Angeles County's 2019 Hate Crime Report, hate crimes have been rising incrementally in the last several years. (<u>https://www.nbclosangeles.com/news/local/la-county-</u>

report-hate-crimes-increase/2448765/ [as of June 20, 2022].) In 2019, the county had 524 reported hate crimes, compared to 523 in 2018. "This is the largest number reported since 2009. For the past 6 years, hate crimes have been trending upwards and since 2013 there has been a 36% rise." (<u>https://hrc.lacounty.gov/wp-content/uploads/2020/10/2019-Hate-Crime-Report.pdf</u> at p. 8 [as of June 20, 2022].)

With the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic, there has been a rise in hate crimes targeting Asian Americans, in particular. In Los Angeles County, anti-Asian hate crimes increased by 76% in 2020. In 10 of 44 reported cases in Los Angeles County, the suspect explicitly blamed the victims for COVID-19. (https://www.latimes.com/california/story/2021-10-20/l-a-county-sees-significant-increase-in-anti-asian-hate-crimes [as of June 20, 2022].)

DOJ's annual hate crime report found a 31% increase in hate crimes in California, from 1,015 to 1,330 in 2020, fueled mainly by a jump in crimes targeting Black people. While hate crimes involving racial bias overall increased 67.3 percent, hate crimes targeting Black increased 87.7% from the previous year. (DOJ, Hate Crime in CA 2020, <u>https://data-openjustice.doj.ca.gov/sites/default/files/2021-06/Hate%20Crime%20In%20CA%202020.pdf</u> [as of June 20, 2022].)

3. Vertical Prosecution

"Vertical Prosecution" refers to a method in which a prosecutor is assigned to the case from the initial point of referral to the completion of the prosecution. Many argue this method of prosecution results in continuity and improved prosecution success, as well as benefits for crime victims, such as allowing prosecutors to build a rapport with victims by remaining with the case from intake to sentencing, which ensures that victims do not have to tell their story repeatedly to prosecutors at various stages of the case. The prosecutor may develop ongoing relationships with community organizations and be able to connect victims to appropriate resources.

It appears that several county prosecutors' offices have special units to prosecute hate crimes through vertical prosecution, including Sacramento County and San Diego County. This bill would establish, subject to an appropriation of funds by the Legislature, a vertical prosecution grant program to be administered by DOJ to award one-time grants to prosecutorial agencies for the purpose of creating, supporting, or expanding vertical prosecution units for the prosecution of hate crimes.

4. Grant Programs Administered by DOJ

DOJ administers several grant programs. For example, the Sexual Assault Evidence Submission Grant Program which was established in 2019 when the Legislature passed the budget act appropriating \$2 million in grant funding to assist local law enforcement agencies with the process of submitting and testing sexual assault forensic evidence. Grant funds were not designed to sustain a project but were intended to supplement existing funds in order to help agencies submit and test sexual assault evidence. Agencies who were interested in applying for funds requested an amount based on their need. Funds were available from the 2019-2020 state budget with a grant period beginning July 1, 2020, and ending June 30, 2022. (See https://oag.ca.gov/saesg [as of June 21, 2022].)

AB 557 (Muratsuchi)

Also, the Tobacco Grant Program, established in 2017 to provide annual funds to local law enforcement agencies, including prosecutors, county sheriffs, and city and school police departments throughout California to reduce illegal sales and marketing of cigarettes and tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, to minors. Funding for the Tobacco Grant Program was a result of the passage of the California Healthcare, Research and Prevention Tobacco Tax Act of 2016 (Proposition 56) increasing taxes on cigarettes and other tobacco products by \$2.00 starting in April 2017. The initiative allocates a portion of annual revenue to the California Department of Justice. (See https://oag.ca.gov/tobaccogrants [as of June 21, 2022].)

This bill would establish the HCVP grant program, subject to appropriation by the Legislature, to be administered by DOJ. The grants are to be made on a competitive basis to selected applicants in a manner and in an amount determined by DOJ. The bill would also require DOJ to provide a report to the Legislature summarizing the data provided by grant recipients and analyzing the effectiveness of vertical prosecution programs in better serving hate crime victims and achieving just, equitable, and appropriate resolutions to hate crime cases, and making policy recommendations to the Legislature. This bill's provisions would sunset on July 1, 2029.

I am writing to express my strong support of AB 557 (Muratsuchi), which establishes a pilot program for district attorney's offices to create or expand vertical prosecution units for hate crimes. In addition to assigning a single prosecutor to each hate crime case, these units will also connect victims with victim advocates.

Recent data from the Department of Justice shows that over 1,300 hate crimes were reported in California in 2020 and over 1,700 were reported in 2021. According to Stop AAPI Hate, over 10,000 anti-Asian hate incidents have occurred nationwide between February 2020 and December 2021 with 4,000 of those occurring in California.

The California Attorney General's Office recommends prosecuting hate crimes vertically – meaning a single prosecutor handles a case from start to finish – to both promote accurate and consistent prosecution and provide continuity for the victim.

We must reaffirm that California is committed to protecting victims of hate crimes.

Dear Residents:

We wanted to provide you with a progress update to the repair work at 33 Tehama. The massive water intrusion on June 3rd caused damage to portions of the building's electrical systems, elevators, life safety, and communications systems, as well as to walls, corridors, lighting, ceilings, and flooring throughout common areas and certain residences. The repairs are significant, and the building is currently not habitable.

We have since discovered substantial water damage to the elevator shaft serving the fire safety elevators of the building. The elevator repair vendors do not have an estimated date of work completion at this time. Through a number of conversations with repair and engineering professionals, we currently believe that this process will not be completed until late 2022 or even early 2023. The scheduling could also be impacted by factors such as ongoing supply chain issues as well as labor shortages. Finally, the San Francisco Fire Department will not allow re-occupancy of the building until we complete repair of the damage to the fire safety elevator shaft. Consequently, we cannot provide any succinct time estimate for re-occupancy at this juncture other than the general time period of late 2022/early 2023, which will extend our timeline for re-occupancy past our initially projected commencement date of August 1, 2022. This means that, as of today's estimates, you will not be able to re-occupa 33 Tehama until late 2022 at the earliest.

The forced evacuation on June 3, 2022 entitles all displaced residents the right to return to their homes on the same terms and conditions of their lease that existed on June 3rd once the building is habitable. We certainly hope that all or many of you will return to the building when this is possible. Since the forced evacuation on June 3, and in an attempt to maintain operations as close to normal as possible, we were able to provide our residents with some form of temporary housing assistance by way of per diem payments, hotel accommodations or rent credit, as well as payments for some incidentals. However, due to the extended repair and re-occupancy timeline, we are unable to continue providing such assistance. As such, effective at the end of the day on August 17, 2022, this assistance will terminate. Because there was no eviction sought by management, and because the displacement on June 3 was forced by a disaster that happened without warning, we have satisfied any and all legal obligations with respect to such payments. In addition, no payments of rent starting on August 18, 2022 and thereafter shall be payable or accepted, meaning your obligation to pay rent starting August 18, 2022 and thereafter is entirely suspended until and unless, in accordance with Section 12.19 of the San Francisco Rent Board Rules and Regulations (detailed below), you elect to come back to the community.

We understand this is upsetting news. Our top priority continues to be repairing the building damage in order to provide re-occupancy as quickly as possible. We hope that all of you elect to return once the job is done. However, you still have the option to terminate your lease without penalty at any time between now and the expiration

of the re-offer notification period, which notification will be issued in a separate written invitation to re-occupy the property. Please note, if you do not let us know of your election to move out on or before August 17, 2022 (as further discussed below), available move-out times will be limited due to building damage repair work.

In particular, we want to emphasize that all displaced residents have the absolute right under San Francisco law to return to the building once the repair and restoration processes are completed. San Francisco Rent Board Rules and Regulations Section 12.19 mandates the following course of conduct:

"(a) If a tenant is forced to vacate her/his due to fire or other disaster, the landlord shall, within 30 days of completion of repairs to the unit, offer the same unit to that tenant under the same terms and conditions as existed prior to her/his displacement. The landlord's offer shall be sent to the address provided by the tenant. If the tenant has not provided an address, the offer shall be sent to the unit from which the tenant was displaced and to any other address of the tenant of which the landlord has actual knowledge, including electronic mail (e-mail) addresses.

(b) The tenant shall have 30 days from receipt of the landlord's offer to notify the landlord of acceptance or rejection of the offer and, if accepted, shall reoccupy the unit within 45 days of receipt of the landlord's offer.

(c) However, the cost of capital improvements which are necessary before rerenting a unit which was damaged or destroyed as set forth in subsection (a) above, which cost was not reimbursed by insurance proceeds or by any other means (such as a satisfied judgment) may be passed through to the tenant by utilization of the capital improvement petition process as set forth in Part 7 above. Any rent increase under this section would require that a notice be served upon the tenant(s) pursuant to Civil Code Section 827.

(d) The landlord who attempts to rerent a unit, but refuses to allow a tenant to return to her/his home under this section shall have wrongfully endeavored to recover or wrongfully recovered said tenant's rental unit in violation of Section 37.9 of the Ordinance and shall be liable to the displaced tenants for actual and punitive damages as provided by Ordinance Section 37.9(f). This remedy shall be in addition to any other remedy available to the tenant under the Rent Ordinance."

Regardless of whether you choose to terminate your lease or intend to re-occupy your apartment home once your apartment is ready for re-occupancy, and in order to expedite building damage repair, you will no longer have daily access to your residence after August 17, 2022 other than for scheduled move-outs. If you do intend to move out of your apartment, you must email <u>33Tehama@33Tehama.com</u> and let your Resident Ambassador know on or before August 17, 2022 in order to schedule a move-out time. If you would like to re-occupy your apartment once your apartment is ready, and would like to leave your personal belongings in your apartment in the meantime, you may do so, but please be aware that there will be no access to your apartment as of August 18, 2022. In addition, while we will do everything we can reasonably do to ensure the safety of personal property left behind, there is a risk of theft and damage, so please consider removing any items of value before August 17, 2022. To that end, we will not provide any warranty that your property will be free

from theft or damage during the period of displacement.

We know this is a lot of information at one time. In summary, as of August 17, 2022:

- Incidental per diems will cease
- Housing Accommodation programs and accommodations per diems will cease
- No rent will be payable starting August 18, 2022 unless and until you re-occupy your apartment, should you choose to return
- You will need to provide a Notice to Vacate if you choose to terminate your lease Notices for move-outs must be received no later than August 17, 2022 to ensure availability of move-out slots

Additional information:

- Parking, pet rent, trash fees, and water utilities will also be suspended during this time period. We are still working with PG&E to transfer all accounts back to the 33 Tehama main account, but have not been successful to-date.
- Please note: vehicles may not be stored on the premises starting August 18, 2022 and up until your apartment is ready for re-occupancy and parking fees will be suspended.
- Starting today, July 18, 2022, elevator reservations will be available seven days a week from 8:00am to 8:00pm. Elevators can be booked in two-hour time slots per bedroom. Please contact your Resident Ambassador to schedule an elevator booking.
- Other than scheduled move-outs, you will no longer have daily access to the building after August 17, 2022. This includes no access to apartments, mail or packages. Please consider filing a temporary change of address with the post office.

We will provide you with additional updates as soon as we have them. Thank you for your attention to this urgent matter. Resolution to propose that the City and County of San Francisco provide and install secure and enclosed bike parking modules – similar to those at BART and Caltrain stations – throughout San Francisco to encourage biking by protecting people's bikes at home, at work, and while shopping.

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Bicycle Advisory Committee's (SFBAC's) purview includes decreasing reliance on automobiles, which has positive benefits for our health and that of the environment.

WHEREAS, The SFBAC's powers and duties include developing plans for bicycle related improvements and making recommendations to the Board of Supervisors.

WHEREAS, Cyclists are four times more likely than car drivers to be victims of vehicle theft. Approximately 4,000 bikes are reported stolen per year in San Francisco. A DOJ guideline says that for every theft reported to the police, four more go unreported. The single most effective tool in discouraging bike theft is secure bike parking facilities.

WHEREAS, In 2019, 4,479 cars were stolen in San Francisco, 3,699 or 82.6% were recovered. Bike owners recover only 2.5% of stolen bikes.

WHEREAS, Many factors reduce urban transportation by bicycle, including bicycle theft and lack of bicycle storage. Studies show that fear of bicycle theft discourages bicycle use. A McGill University study shows that 7% of bicycle theft victims never replace their bicycle.

WHEREAS, Because transportation is a system, we must make essential and visible changes to the infrastructure to enable people to easily change their transportation choices and behaviors.

WHEREAS, San Francisco is dedicated to reaching net zero emissions. According to the San Francisco Climate Action Plan, the transportation sector accounts for 47% of San Francisco's greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. Providing safe, inexpensive bike and e-bike parking will encourage bicycle use and help reduce the city's GHG emissions, and help the city reach its goal of 80% low/no-emissions trips by 2030.

WHEREAS, Although bicycles and e-bikes are a large investment for many people in a population-dense city such as San Francisco, not all people have access to a safe place to store their bikes at home, at work or while shopping.

WHEREAS, San Francisco has subsidized the use of automobiles with the creation of free and paid on-street and garage parking in all neighborhoods. San Francisco now needs to subsidize the use of bicycles with the creation of secure parking for bicycles and e-bikes in all neighborhoods. Currently, the only secure bicycle parking for the public in San Francisco exists at BART and Caltrain stations and six parking garages with SFMTA bike lockers (Ellis/O'Farrell, 5th/Mission, Sutter/Stockton, Japan Center, Moscone Garage, Ulloa Lot), which is inadequate for the increased amount of bicycle use.

WHEREAS, San Francisco has less than eight years to reach its climate goal of 80% low to no emissions trips by 2030. In addition, one third of San Francisco residents do not own a car.

Therefore, city government now has the duty to move to a more equitable allocation of public space and expenditure that accounts for a low-carbon future.

WHEREAS, Low-income pricing can be built into the payment system. For example, if the Bike Link card is adopted, the charges are currently 3 to 5 cents per hour. The pricing can be adapted to meet the needs of lower-income users.

WHEREAS, Safe bicycle infrastructure leads to more bicycle use. Cities like Paris have responded to increased bicycle use by investing in secure bicycle parking. According to SFMTA, since 2006, travel by bicycle has increased by 184%. The coronavirus pandemic fueled a surge in bicycle ownership and use in cities nationwide, including San Francisco. Now with gas prices reaching nearly \$7/gallon, according to KRON, demand for bicycles for commuting continues to increase. San Francisco needs to respond to the growing demand and use of bicycles for transportation with secure bicycle parking for residents. Therefore, be it

RESOLVED, The SFBAC advocates for the City and County of San Francisco to include secure bicycle storage as part of its transportation strategy by creating safe and secure bicycle parking throughout the city, on the street, in parking lots, in residential areas, in shopping districts, and downtown.

Dear Mayor Breed, Supervisor Ronen, MTA Board, and MTA Staff,

On Wednesday, we held a vigil at 16th St. & South Van Ness to honor and remember our neighbor, Rene Kelly, who was struck and killed there by a driver on June 21st. This year alone, at least 18 people have been killed by traffic violence within San Francisco. Is this what Vision Zero looks like? South Van Ness is a dangerous corridor prioritized for cars and cars alone. According to the SFMTA website, South Van Ness Avenue has one of the worst KSI (killed or seriously injured) rates of any street on the High Injury Network in San Francisco. The top three collision causes along South Van Ness Avenue are red light violations, speeding, and violation of left turn right-of-way. Despite the road diet being completed earlier this year (<u>https://www.sfmta.com/projects/south-van-nessavenue-quick-build-project</u>), this avenue still clearly presents a high risk to pedestrians. We demand the following infrastructure improvements to calm traffic and make crossing less hazardous:

- Add bulb-outs at intersections to reduce pedestrian crossing distance

- Add median refuge islands in the crosswalks across South Van Ness

- Narrow all lanes on South Van Ness to slow drivers and calm trafficWe are asking you to honor your previous commitments to Vision Zero and go beyond the insufficient quick build by implementing these improvements that neighbors asked for and that were rejected initially. Every day these measures are not taken, more pedestrians are put at risk from traffic violence. Please communicate publicly what is being done on the permanent improvement of South Van Ness, and when we can expect these improvements to be completed.

Hello Mayor Breed and City Leaders,

Your apparent decision to abandon Slow Lake and other Slow Streets is puzzling to me, because it goes against previous unanimous votes for its permanence, a clear majority of neighbors' wishes, and the data from the California Street road diet project that came out this week indicating that the nearby project improved safety without increasing congestion (even with the addition of Slow Lake), just the kind of changes we need to make.

My questions is how we can achieve Vision Zero, Climate Action, sustainability, building positive community, and keeping families in our city without a connected network of Slow Streets that

includes Slow Lake Street. The Vision Zero and Climate Action Plan commitments written and adopted by the City of San Francisco specifically call out this network and adapting street space to be car-free and car-light to achieve them. We need bold vision and fearless leadership to reach our commitments, and you all must lead us.

Thank you for writing.

I would very much like to access a meeting through a single device - my desktop. Unfortunately, in order to comment one has to use a phone! It's a bug in the system - unless it is designed specifically to make public participation difficult. Another bug, or an intentionally bad feature, is inability of members of the public to see who else is "attending". All one sees is the list of panelists and his/her own name. At a recent meeting several people I know were "attending" - nobody knew that there was anybody else watching/listening.

As for the instructions for public comment - I cannot dial fast enough (the phone #, a lengthy

code, and *3) to be able to "raise my hand" in the allotted time (plus I didn't keep the hearing notice nearby, and the text on the screen disappeared before I was able to enter the code). What is wrong with a process akin to Zoom's when you can "raise your hand" by clicking a button?

Keeping another device (a phone) on all the time with a "raised hand" - in a separate room! - presents other barriers to being able to participate.

Dr. Iyer advised me that the system used is mandated by the city and the complaints should be addressed to the Board of Supervisors. I'll send a complaint when/if I figure out a somewhat efficient way to do it, since I'm under the impression that the emails sent to BoS by mere mortals are generally ignored. I'm CCing the supervisors here, nevertheless.

Also, how can I listen to the recording of the meeting? Please let me know.

Dear Mayor and Board of Supervisors,

I am writing to you to inform you of conditions at one of the city's shelter-inplace hotels. I hope for a response before next Monday at which time I will provide this information to the media.

I was told that 'The Good Hotel' was one of the 'good' hotels. I shudder to think what the rest are like.

District 6 City-run roach castle 'The Good Hotel' is located at 112 Seventh Street, SF CA 94103 (Site 4; Manager is Patrick Cagler)

Here are just some of the issue (won't go into the smelly and stained carpets etc):

1. Coackroaches, spiders and bugs crawling on people in their rooms

- 4 weeks waiting for an exterminator
- Roaches crawling on you while you sitting in bed reading
- Roaches crawling on the table while you eat

- Roaches crawling over you while you sleep, waking you. How would you like to have this happen to you? If this happened to the Mayor how quickly would this issue be addressed?

- Roaches etc coming in through walls, floor, under the toilet

- Extermination on conducted in individual room so roaches move to the next room. Roaches are mobile! While not do a complete extermination?

- Using toilet paper to clean up bug guts is not acceptable to staff (Trina) who told me you only get one large roll/month! So, you are expected to ration your toilet paper and are left to make hard choices. Neither option is sanitary or healthy!

- Complained many times to staff while being ignored! Told the manager that the roaches trigger the motion detection light in the bathroom (open sink area to the room

2. Abusive staff:

- Lack of respect
- Yelling

- Staff having to open your room treat you like a nuisance.Sometimes they are asleep (was the case Sunday at 11am) at the table in the office in room 201. Woman was none too please I woke up her to be let into my room.

- Staff also complain about the same people that are abusive to clients but I am told, by several staff members, management and ECS just sweeps it under the carpet. Not surprisingly!

- I got yelled at for daring to take utensil set out of a box next to the food as the bin that usually contains them was empty. When I complaint to another staffer about the woman's behavior, he just shrugged and told me 'yeah, she is that way', which clearly demonstrate that staff is aware of abusive behavior and just shrugs it off. Guess they all think it is acceptable to abuse people. This reminds me of the <u>Stanford Prison Experiment</u>.

- Management and supervisor's claim they no nothing is laughable as staff feel completely entitled to behave any way they want as there are clearly no conduct expectations or consequences.

- Why is management not trained? Supervisor (Leticia Smith) said she was trained by HR. Why are they all unaware that abusive behavior is illegal. No wonder this place is run like a slum where people treated like trash! I am not surprised that the police were called last week because a client was suicidal.

- How is abuse a positive encouragement for people trying to get back on their feet?

Last night (after I formally complaint to the manager about abusive staff in the morning) when I went down to the lobby at 6 pm, a male client came in after me. He said somethings calmly to one of the two female members that were in the lobby. He talked quietly so I did pay attention to him. One of the women screamed form across the room 'Go back to your room or I'll write you up. I don't like your energy'. So, staff not liking your 'energy' is an infraction? Talk about abuse of power displayed by the staffer over a client. This is how people here are treated. Anyone surprised at the continuing misery in SF and City Hall's complicity? These people do this in the name of the city! Why is this allowed and why is there ZERO oversight of conduct? This is 101 on how to create a hostile environment. As the second staffer in the lobby just ignored her co-worker screaming at the client this is clearly considered acceptable behavior and has been normalized by management's failure to be accountable for the conduct of staff. I would love to tell you the female staffer's name but when I asked the manager, Patrick Cagler, for her name her refused to give it to me, clearly trying to obstruct my efforts at holding staff (and him) accountable for their abusive behavior. For the record, the woman is African American, slender with very long hair and worked at 6pm on 7/18/2022 at The Good Hotel. The manager has clearly decided that rather than addressing issues of abuse and roaches at the hotel he would rather obstruct any effort at remedying them.

3. Lack of communication:

- I spoke repeatedly to various staff member about the cockroach issue which they supposedly documented. According to the supervisor Leticia Smith they were supposed to tell me the procedure of getting pest control out here but I was told only told they had to call and exterminator, did not know they only do that once a month!! Guess the city could not care less if you cannot sleep when roaches are crawling all over you at night and you are supposed to suck it up.

- There is to be a lack of communication between staff and management and across different shift. According to Terri (Saturday staff) who went to talk to maintenance, they did not know anything about roach issues in my room (after almost 4 weeks of my continuing complaints). No accountability of management and staff.

4. Lack of competent management:

- Supervisor Latisha Smith told me staffer Trina is just loud. Being loudly told by Trina 'how dare you use TP to clean up cockroaches' is not abusive? At any decibel level? Trina told me to get some spray (told her I was allergic) and not use TP to clean up cockroaches. I guess ECS think one should kill roaches with a spray, not bother to clean them up and just step on the dead ones. Utterly disgusting and revolting.

5. Food:

- You will find that the majority of food is uneaten in the trash bins. One bite was enough for people to find it inedible. How bad do you think for homeless people to dump free food into the trash? I am told the food was decent before, but they switched vendors. I never thought you could mess up hot dogs or spaghetti. By comparison, it makes hospital food look like gourmet food (at least that includes vegetables). I think two days ago, there was breaded pork with the outside blackened, yet the center was pink.

- Nobody would take today's vomit-inducing breakfast. You can tell because staff tells you that you can have not one, not two, but three of them. When I said that it was disgusting, they laughingly agreed. That says it all.

- One does not expect food from The French Laundry but it should be at least be edible.

Remedial action:

1. Survey to be sent to all clients AND staff by an outside company (zero involvement of City Hal or ECS) collected in a locked box as to ECS management, abuse and bullying by staff of not just clients but other staff members. Evaluation of management team. Results should be made public (unredacted).

2. Pest control should be contacted immediately when a complaint is logged. I heard from another client there are beg bugs in his room and he has been waiting for ECS and the city to do something about it!

3. Training courses (external to ECS) for BOTH management and staff regarding abusive behavior.

4. There needs to be accountability by the Department of Homelessness and supportive housing as well as ECS.

5. There should be unannounced inspections of sites so staff cannot sweep things under the carpet.

6. As manager Robert Cagler is refusing to give the names of staff members to hold them accountable for their actions, all staff should be required to wear name tags. As he is unwilling to engage in efforts to remedy what needs to be addressed and rather obstruct those efforts, he should be replaced with someone able and willing to do so.

<u>PLEASE NOTE:</u> If there is any retaliatory behavior towards me because I dared to file complaints, I will take legal action against the city of San Francisco as well as ECS.

On behalf of California Common Cause, we are proud to support the proposed charter amendment to be submitted to the voters that would amend the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco to change the election cycle for the offices of Mayor, Sheriff, District Attorney, City Attorney and Treasurer so that these offices will be elected in even-numbered years. Please accept this letter to reflect our support of the measure.

In 2015 California Common Cause was the lead supporter of SB 415, the California Voter Participation Rights Act which sought to remedy the persistent problem of low voter turnout in critically important local elections, which often happened on off-cycle dates.¹ SB 415 added a mandate to the elections code that cities consolidate local elections with state and federal elections if those off-cycle elections resulted in turnout that was 25 percent or more lower than voter turnout for the previous four statewide general elections.²

In support of SB 415, California Common Cause cited a Public Policy Institute of California (PPIC) survey of 350 California cities that found that simply moving an election to be synchronized with the even-year state elections can result in a 21-36 percent boost in voter turnout for municipal and other local elections.³ However, the impact was much more profound:

In 2021, we conducted a study of elections that occurred between 2012-2020 and found that 54 cities that moved their off-cycle elections to even years between 2016-2020 tripled their voter participation in municipal elections. The average off-cycle registered voter turnout in these cities, prior to their switch, was 25.54%. The average on-cycle registered voter turnout, after their switch, was 75.81%.⁴ The study showed that the increase in votes cast significantly outpaced growth in voter registration.

Our research makes clear that consolidating elections with statewide elections will help more voters participate in important local elections that impact the well-being of the city.

Asian Americans Advancing Justice - Asian Law Caucus wishes to express its support for the Voter Participation Act. Our Voting Rights team has analyzed the proposal and studied existing research on the topic. We believe that the proposed changes would lead to meaningful improvements in voter participation, civic engagement, and inclusive democracy in the city.

Consolidating local elections to even-year schedules would significantly increase voter turnout in future municipal elections. A recent study by California Common Cause found that when dozens of cities switched their elections from "off-cycle" to "on-cycle" after the passage of SB 415, voter turnout in municipal elections tripled, rising from an average of approximately 25% to 75%.¹ San Francisco would likely see similarly large gains if the Voter Participation Act were implemented. Turnout in odd-year municipal elections hovers at just 40-45%. By shifting San Francisco's municipal elections to even years only, the city would reduce voter fatigue and boost voter engagement significantly.

Just as importantly, this reform would result in voter turnouts that are not only larger in size, but also more fully representative of San Francisco's population. Research shows that in even years, turnout is more diverse and includes more voters who are working class, young, limited English proficient, and racial/ethnic minorities.² In odd-year elections, these communities often get left out. The Voter Participation Act would be a big step forward in building a more inclusive democracy in San Francisco.

We acknowledge that synchronizing the election calendar to an even-year schedule would have impacts on upcoming citywide races, including the mayoral race, as well as certain bond measures. However, we believe that the tremendous gains to voter participation and democratic inclusion for years to come will outweigh these relatively short-term drawbacks.

Law enforcement officials must be able to make San Francisco safer with enhanced access to thirdparty video surveillance cameras; including live monitoring, with safeguards that include: the right of the owner or operator of the cameras to refuse any request for access, a mandate for there to be written requests for access that are auditable upon demand, training for command level staff as well as any officer who would have access to video, and explicit prohibitions against using temporary live video access to target anyone for exercising their First Amendment rights.

The downtown core, including Mid Market, is disproportionately affected by illegal activity from organized crime rings which fuels drug dealing, retail theft, stolen goods resale, other property crimes, assaults, and homicides – all of which are prevalent in our District.

Current legislation supports access to recorded video footage to investigate after-the-fact crime incidents, which is reflected in the historical footage requests our District receives to investigate homicides and violent assaults. However, there is clearly a missed opportunity to investigate the more pernicious organized crime around drug dealing and all aspects of property crime, for which the ability to conduct live monitoring would greatly help. This is especially important in the post-pandemic era when our City streets are under siege by organized crime, and when the growing deficit of law enforcement personnel constrains the ability to investigate and deter organized crime.

In 2020, jewelry stores, pharmacies and other stores were ransacked by a mob of people overnight. In the past few years, many active crimes happened in Chinatown and the Westside. People's home got invaded while they are at home sleeping. Live video could have helped the police stop the crimes in action, save lives and property.

Currently, the police are barred from accessing or monitoring even temporarily, live video that is owned or operated by third parties unless there are "exigent circumstances" -- this is defined as circumstances that involve an imminent danger of serious physical injury or death.

If this standard is not met, the police cannot access live video even on a temporary basis. This intentional blinding of law enforcement does not make sense and it does not make us safer.



I understand there is a meeting of the Board of Supervisors Land Use & Transportation Committee on Monday, July 18th. I will not be able to attend, so wanted to reach out to you folks and provide comments in advance of the meeting.

I live at 280 Clipper St, San Francisco, CA 94114 (District 8). I have lived at this location for 26 years (since 1994), and in SF for 28 years (since 1994).

The climate crisis is real and present - not just some remote future concern. We need to act boldly and decisively now - both to reduce emissions rapidly, and to adapt and build resilience. As you know, buildings are one of the biggest contributors to emissions, especially through their use of fossil fuels for heating, hot water, cooking, etc. Electrifying buildings, while in parallel decarbonizing the electricity sector, is one of the most important things we need to do. Driving this market transformation at the speed and scale required by the climate crisis will necessitate a combination of public and private funding. We need you - our Supervisors and city officials - to figure out how to provide the public funding now.



- The recent horrifying anti-climate actions of the Supreme Court and Senator Joe Manchin make it all the more obvious that we can't depend on the feds right now. It's up to us.

President Walton and Supervisors:

I write regarding the proposed extension legislation, File #220703, Item #29 on the agenda for July 19, 2021 of the Board of Supervisors, which would authorize the Human Services Agency (HSA) to once again extend their hotel booking agreements.

I reside next to two of the current hotels and have witnessed the complete lack of support to the neighborhood's public safety and cleanliness. The security provided for the hotels by HSA, highlighted by the HSH spokesperson at the Budget & Finance Committee hearing last week as 24/7, is limited to 'on-site'. 'On-site' means the security does not, and refuses to, attend to any matters outside of the perimeter of the hotel's land, even when it's directly at the entryways.

Fentanyl drug dealers continue to congregate outside of these hotels' perimeters, preying on the homeless residents inside. The dealers are surrounding these hotels because they now have easy City-supported access to them. Neighborhood residents and businesses are simply told to 'call the police' or other City departments while HSA and the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) do nothing about the drug markets and remarkably unsafe conditions generated in the neighborhood.

The recent addition, referenced by HSH staff at the Budget & Finance hearing last week, of 'street ambassadors who patrol areas around the SIP hotels... to create a new sense of neighborhood safety' are not in fact working on public safety for the neighborhood. They are providing outreach to those on the street; they are not security ambassadors. Outreach to people on the street is indeed a noble activity, however, it does not address the need for security and public safety measures those of us in the neighborhood have been calling for regarding the safety of the neighborhood itself.

Further, the dealers have food delivered directly outside these hotels, by their own caterers, which they share with the City's sheltered individuals in order to entice them to buy/use. These food deliveries, and additional paraphernalia by all of those now congregating around the hotels, lead to large piles of trash all over the neighborhood-- which HSA and HSH also do nothing about.

In the specific case of my neighborhood's Americania hotel, HSA continued to allow open-air drug markets to operate over the last year on the actual City-run property of the hotel via the parking spaces on Minna. Only recently, given our neighborhood's public outcry, did HSA then 'resolve' the situation by building a fence to block the parking spaces. The drug dealers

still operate, and have their meals catered, directly in front of the fence. The fence only serves to keep the dealers and their operations off the City-run property directly.

These comments and concerns expressed are not regarding the issue of homelessness generally or the individuals experiencing it. I write to speak to the ongoing lack of attention by the City, through these HSA contracts, to the surrounding neighborhoods they are entering.

I urge the Board, and the City, to address the public safety concerns of the neighborhoods where these contracts are held, or not extend the contracts. I also urge the City to take responsibility for the physical, financial, and emotional damages they have made to the residents, businesses, and neighborhoods surrounding the City-contracted hotels.

Dear Mayor Breed,

I am writing on behalf of the members of the California Retailers Association in strong support of your sponsored legislation that would give law enforcement limited, temporary authority to use video footage to help deter, investigate, and solve crimes. We view this as another tool in the toolbox for retailers and law enforcement to combat retail theft in San Francisco.

Currently, police are barred from accessing or monitoring, even temporarily, live video that is owned or operated by third parties unless there are "exigent circumstances" -- this is defined as circumstances that involve an imminent danger of serious physical injury or death and if this standard is not met, the police cannot access live video even on a temporary basis. This intentional blinding of law enforcement does not make sense and it does not make retail employees or customers safer. I am concerned that under current law, SFPD is barred from accessing any live video to solve or prevent retail crimes except if there is imminent danger of serious injury or death. This leaves neighborhoods across the city vulnerable to organized criminal activity, such as mass looting, gun violence, drug dealing, retail theft, and burglaries - many of the things we have witnessed in the city over the past several years. We encourage the Board of Supervisors to consider your sponsored legislation, that would give law enforcement limited, temporary authority to use video footage to help deter, investigate, and solve crimes.

I am aware of the discussions around possible amendments to this legislation to remove the ability to monitor private cameras as part of an active criminal investigations. CRA strongly supports the proposed legislation to move forward, as written, without amendments. The original language provides guardrails and transparency to ensure this information is not used for purposes not outlined in the legislation but will quickly become a valuable tool for retail and law enforcement to work together to protect retail employees and customers who live, work and shop in San Francisco.

Retailers have witness organized crime in San Francisco, whether it's mass looting in Union Square, drug dealing rings in the Tenderloin, retail theft in Chinatown or brazen home burglaries on the Westside -- these are all criminal activities that law enforcement can address more effectively if they have access to information that third parties, such as retailers, can provide to help deter and combat criminal activity.

Retailers support the strong guardrails, included in this legislation, to prevent the misuse of this technology including the right of the owner or operator to refuse any request for access, a mandate for written requests for access that are auditable upon demand, training for command level staff as well as any officer who would have access to video, and explicitly barring using video to target anyone for exercising their First Amendment rights.

In addition, we believe this legislation can also allow video footage to be used as evidence to exonerate individuals who may be wrongly accused and help police and prosecutors ensure that they are holding the correct persons responsible.

San Francisco retail employees and consumers want to be safe when shopping in stores, eating in restaurants or using the unique venues that San Francisco is famous for. The California Retailers Association is ready to collaborate with all individuals looking for solutions to retail theft/ORC and we applaud you for this bold step to protect the diverse communities in San Francisco.

Thank you for your leadership on this issue. I look forward to collaborating with you and members of the Board of Supervisors on innovative ways to combat retail theft so we can protect San Francisco's employees, customers and the communities they live and work in.
