The following actions are taken by SFPD sworn officers when they are dispatched to a call or on-view an incident or person needing assistance.


- Assessment conducted (detention or diversion)
- Forms completed and advisement to subject given
- Police supervisor is summoned to scene when force is used
- Officers follow the transport to the hospital for mental health evaluation
- Details are provided to ER and hospital staff
- Follow up administrative work
 - book 5150 form/ write report,
 - contact CIT/CCS

MENTAL HEALTH DETENTION INCIDENTS

SFPD has seen a reduction of mental health detentions as a result of internal Department efforts and the City's alternative teams. Our officers are trauma informed and are engaged with the individual needs of each subject they encounter.



- Integrated medical database
- Robust collaborative data tracking system
- Cross agency training: PES/SFPD/SFSO/DPH
- Identify additional treatment/diversion/acute crisis treatment facilities
