EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Legislative Objective

The proposed resolution would retroactively approve 20 contracts to provide various behavioral health services, between the City and County of San Francisco, acting on behalf of the Department of Public Health (DPH), and 20 organizations, for a total amount of \$790,418,738, comprising (a) 19 nonprofit organizations for \$702,982,362 and (b) the Regents of the University of California for \$87,436,376. The proposed contracts have a term of five years and six months, from July 1, 2010 through December 31, 2015.

Key Points

In CY 2007, CY 2008, CY 2009 and CY 2010, DPH issued nine Requests for Proposals (RFP) and one Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to provide various behavioral health services for the Community Behavioral Health Services section of DPH. The 20 contracts under the proposed resolution with 20 organizations are the results of the nine RFPs and one RFQ, which include the Regents of the University of California and 19 nonprofits (Asian American Recovery Services, Alternative Family Services, Baker Places, Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, Central City Hospitality House, Community Awareness and Treatment Services, Community Vocational Enterprises, Conard House, Edgewood Center for Children & Families, Family Service Agency, Haight Ashbury Free Clinics, Hyde Street Community Service, Instituto Familiar de la Raza, Progress Foundation, Richmond Area Multi-Services, San Francisco Study Center, Seneca Center, Walden House, and Westside Community Services). In addition to the nine RFPs and RFQ, portions of the contracts with six contractors under the proposed resolution would also be awarded on a sole source basis. DPH currently has existing contracts with the 20 contractors, which will terminate on December 31, 2010. If the proposed resolution is approved, the proposed contracts would be retroactive to July 1, 2010 and would supersede the existing contracts.

Fiscal Impacts

- After various inquiries by the Budget and Legislative Analyst, the number of proposed contracts and final amounts of the proposed contracts were revised numerous times by DPH. The revised amount for 22 contracts between the DPH and 19 organizations is \$674,388,406, comprising (a) 18 nonprofit organizations for \$599,483,815 and (b) the Regents of the University of California for \$74,904,591 to provide various behavioral health services. The total amount of \$674,388,406 includes \$602,132,504 for the various behavioral health services under the 22 contracts and \$72,255,902 for a 12 percent contingency. The 22 contracts includes (a) three contracts with Regents of the University of California, (b) two contracts with Richmond Area Multi-Services, and (c) 17 separate contracts with the remaining 17 nonprofit organizations. The proposed resolution does not include a contract between DPH and Haight Ashbury Free Clinics, such that DPH will submit separate legislation for approval of the Haight Ashbury Free Clinics contract.
- Of the total amount of \$674,388,406, the proposed 22 contracts have (a) 12 percent contingencies totaling \$72,255,902, (b) sole source portions totaling \$15,401,866 and (c) other project portions totaling \$4,836,348. Excluding the 12 percent contingencies, proposed sole source programs and other special projects, the proposed 22 contracts reflect an overall annual decrease of 0.13 percent, or \$7,008, compared to existing contracts. Excluding the proposed sole source programs and other special projects, the proposed 22 contracts with the 12 percent contingencies reflect an overall annual increase of 13.35 percent, or \$744,094, compared to existing contracts.

Policy Analysis

- Based on the results of the RFP and RFQ processes, preliminary award letters, including the estimated contract amount, were sent to each of the contractors in late May and early June of 2010. The estimated contract amounts in the preliminary award letters were based on the amounts included in the Mayor's proposed FY 2010-2011 budget and amounts that DPH would request in subsequent fiscal years. According to DPH, the 19 contractors refused to enter into contract negotiations with DPH until after the FY 2010-2011 budget was approved, due to the possibility of DPH receiving additional funds through the Board of Supervisors addback process. The Board of Supervisors added back \$4,894,981 to these behavioral health contracts during the final FY 2010-2011 budget deliberations, DPH completed contract negotiations with the 19 contractors in late October of 2010 and DPH advises that the final versions of all 19 contracts will be submitted to the Board of Supervisors prior to the December 1, 2010 Budget and Finance Committee meeting.
- Portions of the six contracts with (a) Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, (c) Community Awareness and Treatment Services, (d) Community Vocational Enterprises, (e) Conard House, (f) Family Service Agency, and (j) Walden House are proposed to be awarded for 18 months on a sole source basis because (a) DPH has not conducted a competitive bidding process for specific services, (b) other specific services were included in a RFP, but no agencies submitted proposals and DPH needs to continue providing such services, (c) one agency received a low score on their proposal, which prevented DPH from awarding that contract based on the results of the RPF, but DPH chose to continue funding that agency because they have DPH's desired direct service model, and (d) specific services are funded with existing DPH grants and the contractor was included in the grant proposal submitted by DPH.
- During the Budget and Finance Committee meeting on October 22, 2008, the Budget and Finance Committee requested that DPH submit reports to the Board of Supervisors on the use of 12 percent contingencies in DPH service-based contracts. However, to date, DPH has not submitted any such follow-up reports to the Board of Supervisors. Since follow-up reports have not been submitted, the use of 12 percent contingencies in existing DPH service-based contracts is unknown and it is unknown how much of the 12 percent contingencies in the proposed contracts is actually warranted.

Recommendations

- Amend the proposed resolution to (a) state the revised total amount of \$602,132,504 for the proposed 22 contracts without the 12 percent contingency amount, awarded by DPH to the 19 contractors, and (b) identify the name of each contractor, the actual amount to be awarded under each contract and the length of the term of each contract.
- Since the Budget and Finance Committee requested that DPH submit reports to the Board of Supervisors on the use of the 12 percent contingencies, DPH should immediately submit such reports to the Board of Supervisors.
- Approve the proposed resolution, as amended, retroactively to July 1, 2010, for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$602,132,504 (\$674,388,406 less the 12 percent contingency of \$72,255,902).
- Since prior use of the 12 percent contingencies in existing DPH service-based contracts is unknown, the approval of the 12 percent contingency in each of the proposed 22 contracts, totaling \$72,255,902, is a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.

MANDATE STATEMENT/ BACKGROUND

Mandate Statement

In accordance with Charter Section 9.118(b), any contracts or agreements exceeding ten years and/or having expenditures greater than \$10,000,000 is subject to Board of Supervisors approval.

Background

Competitive Bid Process: In CY 2007, CY 2008, CY 2009 and CY 2010, the Department of Public Health (DPH) issued nine Requests for Proposals (RFP) and one Request for Qualifications² (RFQ) to provide various behavioral health services for the Community Behavioral Health Services (CBHS) section of DPH, which is detailed in Attachment I, compiled by the Budget and Legislative Analyst with information provided from Ms. Jacquie Hale, Office of Contract Management and Compliance Director of DPH. The 20 contracts under the proposed resolution with 20 organizations are the results of the nine RFPs and one RFQ, which include the Regents of the University of California and 19 nonprofits (Asian American Recovery Services, Alternative Family Services, Baker Places, Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, Central City Hospitality House, Community Awareness and Treatment Services, Community Vocational Enterprises, Conard House, Edgewood Center for Children & Families, Family Service Agency, Haight Ashbury Free Clinics, Hyde Street Community Service, Instituto Familiar de la Raza, Progress Foundation, Richmond Area Multi-Services, San Francisco Study Center, Seneca Center, Walden House, and Westside Community Services). In addition to the nine RFPs and RFQ, portions of the contracts with six contractors³ under the proposed resolution would also be awarded on a sole source basis (see Policy Analysis section below).

New RFP Contracting Procedures in DPH: According to Ms. Hale, in the fall of 2006, based on advice and direction from the City Attorney's Office and the Office of Contract Administration (OCA), DPH began to revise their contracting procedures.

The nine Requests for Proposals include (a) Personal Assisted Employment Services Counseling and Pre-Vocational Services for Welfare-To-Work Indigent Individuals with Behavioral Héalth Issues (RFP 02-2007), (b) School-based Mental Health Partnership for SFUSD ED Special Education Students: Promoting Developmental Assets and School Engagement (RFP 05-2008), (c) Outpatient Opioid Replacement Treatment Services (RFP 06-2008), (d) Substance Abuse Services for Parolees Residing in the City and County of San Francisco (RFP 08-2008), (e) CalWORKs Counseling for Welfare-to-Work Families with Behavioral Health Issues (RFP 01-2009), (f) Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) (RFP 20-2009), (g) Child, Youth and Family System of Care and Adult and Older Adult Systems of Care Behavioral Health Services Mega-RFP (Mega-RFP) (RFP 23-2009), (h) Wellness Initiative High School-based Behavioral Health Services (RFP 02-2010), and (i) Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation Initiative (RFP 06-2010)

² The Request for Qualifications includes Community Programs: Fiscal Intermediary & Professional Consultant Services (RFQ 10-2009).

The six contractors with sole source portions of their proposed contracts include (a) Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, (b) Community Awareness and Treatment Services, (c) Community Vocational Enterprises, (d) Conard House, (e) Family Service Agency, and (f) Walden House.

Prior to 2006, in accordance with established Health Commission policy, DPH conducted RFPs for up to ten years, but then typically awarded multiple shorter-term contracts which were less than \$10,000,000 and thus not subject to approval by the Board of Supervisors.

However, in the fall of 2006, the City Attorney's Office and the Office of Contract Administration (OCA) advised DPH that (a) many of DPH's RFPs were "stale" or out-of-date since contract awards were not completed within one year of the issuance of the RFPs; (b) RFPs that stated the anticipated contract terms and amounts were not always consistent with the actual contract terms and amounts; and (c) DPH should not award multiple shorter-term contracts with a vendor, but award an initial contract and amend the initial contract if there are any modifications.

As a result of these findings, DPH began re-advertising RFPs for the majority of DPH contracts. While DPH conducted these RFP processes, in consultation with the Board of Supervisors Budget and Finance Committee, the City Attorney's Office, OCA, and the Controller's Office, DPH introduced (a) a resolution that ratified and approved three-year extensions of all existing DPH professional services contracts, which was approved by the Board of Supervisors on December 18, 2006 (File No. 06-1568), and (b) an ordinance that amended the City's Administrative Code by adding Section 21.42 to allow DPH to award sole source designations to professional services contracts for health, behavioral health and support services provided by non-profit organizations, until DPH could re-advertise such RFPs, which was also approved by the Board of Supervisors on December 18, 2006 (File No. 06-1569).

<u>Termination Date of Existing Contracts</u>: The Regents of the University of California and 19 nonprofit organizations have existing behavioral health services contracts with the City, which will terminate on December 31, 2010, as approved by the Board of Supervisors on June 10, 2009 (File No. 09-0499). If the proposed resolution is approved, the proposed contracts would be retroactive to July 1, 2010 and would supersede the existing contracts.

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed resolution would retroactively approve 20 contracts between the City and County of San Francisco, acting on behalf of the Department of Public Health (DPH), and 20 organizations, for a total amount of \$790,418,738, comprising (a) 19 nonprofit organizations for \$702,982,362 and (b) the Regents of the University of California for \$87,436,376 to provide various behavioral health services. The 19 nonprofit organizations include (a) Asian American Recovery Services, (b) Alternative Family Services, (c) Baker Places, (d) Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, (e) Central City Hospitality House, (f) Community Awareness and Treatment Services, (g) Community Vocational Enterprises, (h) Conard House, (i) Edgewood Center for Children & Families, (j) Family Service Agency, (k) Haight Ashbury Free Clinics, (l) Hyde Street Community Service, (m) Instituto Familiar de la Raza, (n) Progress Foundation, (o) Richmond Area Multi-Services, (p) San Francisco Study Center, (q) Seneca Center, (r) Walden

⁴ Sole source designations are services that are (a) unique to DPH, (b) consistent with the DPH mission and goals, and (c) require specialized knowledge, training, personnel, facilities or other resources that are provided by a limited number of non-profit contractors.

House, and (s) Westside Community Services. On June 1, 2010, the Health Commission authorized DPH to execute the subject contracts with 20 organizations.

However, after various inquiries by the Budget and Legislative Analyst, the number of proposed contracts and the amounts of each of the proposed contracts were revised numerous times by DPH (see Policy Analysis section below for details). Based on the final revisions, the proposed resolution would retroactively approve 22 contracts between the DPH and 19 organizations, for a revised total amount of \$674,388,406, which comprises (a) \$599,483,815 for 18 nonprofit organizations and (b) \$74,904,591 for the Regents of the University of California. According to Ms. Hale, the proposed resolution will not include the contract with Haight Ashbury Free Clinics because Haight Ashbury Free Clinics did not submit the contract documents by the deadline imposed by DPH. DPH will submit separate legislation for approval of the Haight Ashbury Free Clinic contract in December of 2010. As detailed in Attachment II, compiled by the Budget and Legislative Analyst with budgetary information provided from Ms. Michelle Ruggels, Director of Operations of DPH, the 22 contracts include three contracts with the Regents of the University of California, two contracts with Richmond Area Multi-Services, and 17 separate contracts with the remaining 17 nonprofit organizations. The total amount of \$674,388,406 includes \$602,132,504 for the various behavioral health services under the 22 contracts and \$72,255,902 for a 12 percent contingency. The Budget and Legislative Analyst recommends amending the proposed resolution to retroactively approve, to July 1, 2010, 22 contracts less the 12 percent contingency amount of \$72,255,902, awarded by DPH to the 19 contractors, for a total amount of \$602,132,504 (see Policy Analysis section below for details).

Term Period: All 22 proposed contracts have a term of five years and six months, from July 1, 2010 through December 31, 2015. If the proposed resolution is approved, the 22 proposed contracts would be retroactively approved to July 1, 2010 and supersede the existing contracts with the same 19 organizations, which currently terminate on December 31, 2010. According to Ms. Hale, the existing contracts were extended through December 31, 2010 to ensure that DPH could continue to provide the various behavioral health services until the proposed new 22 contracts are approved.

Funding Breakdown of the Proposed 22 Contracts: As shown in Table 1 below, the proposed 22 contracts total \$674,388,406 comprising (a) \$198,444,905 in General Funds, (b) \$101,551,530 in State Realignment and State General Funds, (c) \$212,973,401 in Federal Medi-Cal and Other Federal Sources funds, (d) \$89,162,669 in work orders, grants and other State funds, and (e) \$72,255,902 to cover potential contract contingencies of 12 percent, which do not have a designated funding source.

According to Ms. Anne Okubo, Deputy Financial Officer of the DPH, DPH included a 12 percent contingency for each of the proposed 22 contracts based on a recommendation from the Citywide Non-Profit Contracting Task Force⁵. Ms. Okubo advises that the contingency portion

⁵ The Citywide Non-Profit Contracting Task Force was created in October 2001 to improve the City's non-profit contracting procedures. On September 26, 2002, the Task Force issued a report to the Board of Supervisors stating that departments should implement policies and procedures to streamline internal contract processes using best practices models from comparable cities. On October 20, 2005, the Task Force issued a progress report to the Board of Supervisors stating that in an effort to streamline the contracting process to allow flexibility in funding changes, the DPH made a change in their internal contracting processes to include contingencies in service contract budgets

of the contract would only be used if (a) additional funding was received (i.e. through the Board of Supervisors' addback process) or (b) DPH reallocated funds from one existing contract to another existing contract (i.e. one contractor is underperforming and their funding could be shifted to another contractor who could provide additional services).

FISCAL ANALYSIS

Breakdown of 22 Contract Budgets by Fiscal Year

An estimated budget breakdown of the 22 contracts totaling \$674,388,406 is summarized in Attachment II. As shown in Attachment II, the estimated budget breakdown of the 22 contracts includes:

- (a) funding for each of the 19 programs each fiscal year for the five-year and six-month period of the contract (from July 1, 2010 through December 31, 2015);
- (b) funding for each of the six sole source programs for an 18-month period⁶ (from July 1, 2010 through December 31, 2011); and
- (c) funding for each of the three other special projects, including (i) wraparound services⁷ in the Edgewood Center for Children and Families and Instituto Familiar de la Raza contracts that would only be funded for a six-month period⁸ (from July 1, 2010 through December 31, 2010), and (ii) the Bakers Place High Users of Multiple Systems program⁹ under the Bakers Place contract that would be funded for a four year six-month period (from July 1, 2011 through December 31, 2015).

Of the total \$674,388,406 for the subject 22 contracts, \$116,121,546 was previously approved by the Board of Supervisors in the DPH FY 2010-2011 budget. The remaining \$558,266,860 for the subsequent years plus the contingency would be subject to Board of Supervisors approval in future DPH annual budgets.

Comparison with FY 2009-2010 Annual Contract Amounts

The Budget and Legislative Analyst calculated and compared the annual amounts of each existing and proposed contract, excluding the 12 percent contingencies, proposed sole source programs and other special projects identified above. As shown in Table 2 below, the proposed 22 contracts reflect an overall decrease of 0.13 percent, or \$7,008, per year.

As shown in Table 2 above, four of the proposed nonprofits' annual costs would increase significantly, (i.e. Central City Hospitality House by 21.93 percent, Community Vocational Enterprises by 19.66 percent, Edgewood Center for Children & Families by 14.38 percent, and San Francisco Study Center by 15.30 percent), while two proposed nonprofits' annual costs would decrease significantly (i.e., Community Awareness and Treatment Centers by 40.20 percent and Richmond Area Multi-Services by 22.44 percent). According to Ms. Hale, the four nonprofits' significant annual cost increases are due to:

(a) the addition of Mental Health Services Act Prevention and Early Intervention services 10 in the Central City Hospitability House contract;

- (b) increases in Mental Health Vocational Services and Vocational Rehabilitation Services¹¹ in the Community Vocational Enterprises contract;
- (c) increases in Behavioral Health Outpatient Mental Health Services¹², Community-based Day Treatment Services¹³, Residentially-Based Day Treatment Intensive and Day Rehabilitative Services¹⁴ and Therapeutic Behavioral Services¹⁵ in the Edgewood Center for Children & Families contract; and
- (d) increases in Peer and Intern Employment modality services¹⁶ in the San Francisco Study Center contract.

The Budget and Legislative Analyst also calculated and compared the annual sole source amounts of the existing and proposed contracts. As shown in Table 3 below, the proposed sole source portions, without the proposed 12 percent contingency, reflect an overall increase of 19.52 percent, or an increase of \$279,441 per year.

As shown in Table 3 below, the sole source annual costs in four contracts are proposed to increase significantly, including (a) Bayview Hunters Point Foundation for Community Improvement by 23.44 percent, (b) the Community Vocational Enterprises by 16.87 percent and (c) Conard House by 360.01 percent and (d) Walden House by 13.98 percent. According to Ms. Hale, the four nonprofits' significant sole source annual cost increases are due to:

- (a) increases in Administrative Services Organization services ¹⁷ of the Bayview Hunters Point Foundation for Community Improvement contract;
- (b) increases in Mental Health Vocational Services And Vocational Rehabilitation Services and Peer and Intern Employment modality services in the Community Vocational Enterprises contract; and
- (c) increase in Representative Payee services 18 in the Conard House contract, which was transferred from the Human Services Agency to DPH so that DPH can draw down Federal Short Doyle/Medi-Cal funds 19; and

Behavioral Health Outpatient Mental Health services provide medication support, mental health, assessment, collateral, therapy, and targeted case management services to eligible San Francisco children, youth and their families in office settings, schools, and in the client's natural community.

13 Community-based Day Treatment Services provide specialized treatment and educational activities to children with severe emotional and learning difficulties, which helps them return to full-time community living.

Residentially-Based Day Treatment Intensive and Day Rehabilitative Services provide specialized treatment and educational activities to children residing in residential treatment group homes or a Community Treatment Facility.

Therapeutic Behavioral Services is a short-term, intensive, behavioral intervention available to certain mental

health system children who are eligible for Medi-Cal.

BUDGET AND LEGISLATIVE ANALYST

Mental Health Vocational Services and Vocational Rehabilitation Services provide vocational orientation and exploration, employment assessments, job search and placement assistance, vocational training, and job coaching, counseling and guidance to transitional age youth, adults and older adults who are receiving behavioral health services through DPH's Community Behavioral Health Services transitional residential treatment, supportive housing, intensive care management, peer recovery centers, or outpatient services.

(d) the addition of grant funds for the Second Chance Act Prisoner Reentry Initiative²⁰ and Integrated Services for Mentally Ill Parolee-Clients²¹ in the Walden House contract, which are solely awarded to Walden House since Walden House was included in the proposal submitted by DPH (see Policy Analysis section below for details).

POLICY ANALYSIS

DPH's Negotiation Process for the Subject 22 Contracts

Ms. Hale advises that, based on the results of the RFP and RFQ processes, preliminary award letters were sent to each of the contractors in late May and early June of 2010, which included the types of awarded service under the proposed contract and the estimated contract award amount. The contract amounts on the preliminary award letters were based on the amounts included in the Mayor's proposed FY 2010-2011 budget and amounts that DPH would request in subsequent fiscal years. Ms. Hale advises that the 19 contractors refused to enter into contract negotiations with DPH until after the FY 2010-2011 budget was approved, due to the possibility of DPH receiving additional funds through the Board of Supervisors addback process for the

various behavioral health services contracts. According to Mr. Joe Nurisso, Budget and Revenue Analyst in the Controller's Office, the Board of Supervisors added back \$4,894,981 to the behavioral health contracts during the final FY 2010-2011 budget deliberations, which was approved by the Board of Supervisors on July 27, 2010 (File No. 10-0701).

According to Ms. Hale, DPH conducts two types of negotiations with each of the 19 contractors. First, DPH conducts initial contract negotiations to determine the scope of work and specific services to be provided by the contractor for a not-to-exceed contractual amount. Then, DPH annually negotiates with each contractor to determine the level of services needed and the contract rates to be paid based on actual amounts that are appropriated in the DPH's annual budget. Ms. Hale advises that DPH completed contract negotiations with the 19 contractors in late October of 2010 and the final versions of all 19 contracts will be submitted to the Board of Supervisors prior to the December 1, 2010 Budget and Finance Committee meeting. As noted above, all of the existing contracts expire on December 31, 2010.

12 Percent Contingency Included in Existing and Proposed Contracts

According to Ms. Okubo, DPH has added a 12 percent contingency to all existing DPH service-based contracts in an effort to streamline the contracting process, which would allow flexibility in funding changes (see Footnote 5 above). Ms. Okubo advises that DPH has used a 12 percent contingency for various existing DPH service-based contracts when DPH has (a) received additional funding and (b) needed to reallocate funds from one contract to another contract. However, Ms. Okubo advises that DPH has not tracked the increased amounts of such contracts or the number of times that a 12 percent contingency has been used. During the Budget and Finance Committee meeting on October 22, 2008, the Budget and Finance Committee requested that DPH submit reports to the Board of Supervisors on the use of such 12 percent contingencies. Ms. Okubo advises that, to date, DPH has not submitted any such follow-up reports to the Board of Supervisors on how the 12 percent contingencies are being used.

For the proposed 22 contracts, the Budget and Legislative Analyst calculated and compared the annual amounts of each existing and proposed contract with the 12 percent contingencies. As shown in Table 4 below, the proposed 22 contracts, with the 12 percent contingencies, reflect an overall annual increase of 13.35 percent or an increase of \$744,094 per year. Since (a) to date, DPH has not submitted any follow-up reports to the Board of Supervisors on use of 12 percent contingencies, (b) the use of 12 percent contingencies in the existing DPH service-based contracts is unknown and therefore, (c) it is unknown how much of the 12 percent contingencies in the proposed contracts is actually warranted, the Budget and Legislative Analyst considers inclusion of a 12 percent contingency in each of the proposed 22 contracts, totaling \$72,255,902 (see Table 1 above), to be a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.

To keep the analysis consistent, the Budget and Legislative Analyst did not include FY 2009-2010 amounts of services that are categorized as an 18-month sole source and other projects in the proposed 22 contracts.

Reasons for the Sole Source Portions under six of the 22 Proposed Contracts

According to Ms. Ruggels, portions of the six contracts with (a) Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, (c) Community Awareness and Treatment Services, (d) Community Vocational Enterprises, (e) Conard House, (f) Family Service Agency, and (j) Walden House are proposed to be awarded for 18 months on a sole source basis. Ms. Ruggels advises that portions of the six contracts are awarded on a sole source basis because (a) DPH has not conducted a competitive bidding process for specific services, (b) other specific services were included in the Mega-RFP (RFP 23-2009), but no agencies submitted proposals and DPH needs to continue providing such services, (c) one agency received a low score on their proposal under the Mega-RFP, which prevented DPH from awarding that contract based on the results of the RPF, but DPH chose to continue funding that agency because they have DPH's desired direct service model, and (d)

specific services are funded with existing DPH grants and the contractor was included in the grant proposal submitted by DPH.

According to Ms. Ruggels, DPH has not conducted a competitive bidding process, and is instead requesting a sole source award, of the following programs and services under the listed contracts:

- (a) The Administrative Services Organization portion of the proposed Bayview Hunters Point contract,
- (b) The Medical Respite²³, San Francisco Homeless Outreach Team (SF HOT)²⁴ and Mobile Assistance Patrol (MAP)²⁵ portions of the proposed Community Awareness and Treatment Services contract,
- (c) The Industrial Maintenance Enterprise program²⁶ portion of the proposed Community Vocational Enterprises contract,
- (d) The Representative Payee Services portion of the proposed Conard House contract,
- (e) The Behavioral Health Outpatient Mental Health Services and Administrative Services Organizations portions of the proposed Family Services Agency contract, and
- (f) The Administrative Services Organization, Project Homeless Connect²⁷, HIV Care Coordination²⁸, and Representative Payee Services portions of the proposed Walden House contract, and

Ms. Ruggels advises that DPH will conduct a competitive bidding process for all of these services in FY 2010-2011. Once DPH determines the winning proposals to provide such services, DPH will submit subsequent legislation to the Board of Supervisors requesting approval of the recommended contracts.

According to Ms. Ruggels, outpatient services for dually-diagnosed mentally ill clients with developmental disorders which is currently provided under the proposed Bayview Hunters Point Foundation contract was included in the Mega RFP, but neither the Bayview Hunters Point Foundation nor other agencies submitted a proposal for such services. Since DPH needs to continue providing such outpatient services, DPH is proposing to fund the Bayview Hunters Point Foundation for an additional 18 months until another RFP is issued.

Ms. Ruggels advises that DPH awarded the Peer and Intern Employment program on a sole source basis to Community Vocational Enterprise even though they did not score above 70

points on their proposal because Community Vocational Enterprise provides DPH's desired direct service model. Ms. Ruggels advises that both Community Vocational Enterprises and San Francisco Study Center submitted proposals for the Peer and Intern Employment program under the Mega-RFP. San Francisco Study Center's proposal did not include the DPH's desired direct service model, but scored above 70 points. According to Ms. Ruggels, since the service model delivered by Community Vocational Enterprises has been an effective program in the past, DPH chose to retain both models and fund both Community Vocational Enterprises and San Francisco Study Center. Therefore, the Peer and Intern Employment program of the proposed Community Vocational Enterprises contract was awarded on sole-source basis and will have a term of 18 months until DPH conducts another RFP. The San Francisco Study Center will be funded for their Peer and Intern Employment program for the entire five year five month term of the contract.

Finally, according to Ms. Ruggels, the Second Chance Act Prisoner Reentry Initiative and Integrated Services for Mentally Ill Parolee-Clients programs in the subject Walden House contract are proposed to be awarded on a sole source basis because these two programs are funded with two grants from the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (CDCR) and one grant from the Department of Justice (DOJ) that were approved by the Board of Supervisors on June 10, 2009, July 10, 2009 and January 12, 2012, respectively (File Nos. 09-0638, 09-0797 and 09-1440). Walden House was included in the proposals submitted by DPH to the CDCR and DOJ. Walden House will therefore receive funding from (a) the CDCR for two years of the contract, from July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2012 and (b) the DOJ for one year of the contract, from July 1, 2010 through June 30, 2011.

The Final Amounts of the Proposed 22 Contracts were Revised by DPH based on Inquiries by the Budget and Legislative Analyst

Based on various inquiries by the Budget and Legislative Analyst, the final amounts of the originally proposed 20 contracts were revised numerous times by DPH. As stated above, the proposed resolution should retroactively, to July 1, 2010, approve 22 contracts between the DPH and 19 organizations. As shown in Table 5 below, the revised total amount for the 22 proposed contracts is \$674,388,406, which is \$116,030,333, or 14.7 percent, less than the original DPH total amount of \$790,418,738, that was originally submitted to the Board of Supervisors for approval.

The contracts that had reductions of more than ten percent include: Asian American Recovery Services, Community Awareness and Treatment Services, Community Vocational Enterprises, Conard House, Regents of the University of California, Richmond Area Multi-Services, San Francisco Study Center, Walden House and Westside Community Mental Health Center. The reductions in total contract amounts were due to (a) reducing the term period for the sole source portion from five years and six months to 18-months, (b) reducing the term period for the close-out portion from five years and six months to six-months or two months, and (c) issuing separate contracts for projects that has specific monitoring and reporting requirements by the funder. As stated above, DPH will request approval from the Board of Supervisors of the Haight Ashbury Free Clinic contract through separate legislation since the Haight Ashbury Free Clinics did not submit the contract documents by the deadline imposed by DPH.

The contracts that had increases of more than ten percent include: Edgewood Center for Children and Families and Instituto Familiar de la Raza. The increases in total contract amounts were due to addback funding as approved by the Board of Supervisors.

The Proposed Resolution Provides No Detail on the Number of Contracts, the Specified Contractors, Length of the Terms, or Amount of the Contracts

The title of the proposed resolution simply requests the Board of Supervisors to approve retroactive contracts with non-profit organizations and the University of California at San Francisco to provide behavioral health services for the period of July 1, 2010 through December 31, 2015. The body of the proposed resolution does not state the actual number of contracts, identify the names of the specific contractors, the length of the term for each contract, the amount of each contract or the total amount of all the contracts.

Instead the proposed resolution simply states that "Whereas the San Francisco Charter Chapter 9.118 requires contracts over \$10 million to be approved by the Board of Supervisors; and Whereas contracts with providers as shown on the list on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. ____, which is hereby declared to be a part of this resolution as if set forth fully herein will exceed \$10 million; now therefore be it Resolved that the Board of Supervisors hereby approves these contracts, as indicated on the aforementioned list; and be it Further Resolved that the Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Director of Public Health and the Purchaser, on behalf of the City and County of San Francisco to execute agreements with these contractors as appropriate". As previously discussed, the list that was on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors included the original 20 contracts with erroneous terms, amounts and totals.

The Budget and Legislative Analyst recommends that the proposed resolution be amended to (a) include the revised contract amounts without the 12 percent contingency amounts, as listed in Table 1 above, totaling \$602,132,504, (b) specify the name of each of the 19 contractors, (c) identify the length of term for each of the 22 contracts and (d) state the total amount of each of the proposed 22 contracts.

As stated above, the proposed 22 contracts are retroactive to July 1, 2010 because of the delays in contract negotiations between DPH and the 19 contractors.

SUMMARY

As stated above, the number of proposed contracts and final amounts of the proposed contracts were revised numerous times by DPH. The proposed 22 contracts between the DPH and 19 organizations totals \$674,388,406, which is \$116,030,333, or 14.7 percent, less than the original DPH total amount of \$790,418,738, that was submitted to the Board of Supervisors for approval. The total amount of \$674,388,406 includes \$602,132,504 for the various behavioral health services under the 22 contracts and \$72,255,902 for a 12 percent contingency. The Budget and Legislative Analyst recommends amending the proposed resolution to (a) state the revised total amount of \$602,132,504 for the proposed 22 contracts without the contingency amounts,

awarded by DPH to the 19 contractors, and (b) identify the name of each contractor, the actual amount to be awarded under each contract and the length of the term of each contract.

During the Budget and Finance Committee meeting on October 22, 2008, the Budget and Finance Committee requested that DPH submit reports to the Board of Supervisors on the use of 12 percent contingencies in DPH service-based contracts. However, DPH has not submitted any such follow-up reports to the Board of Supervisors. Since the Budget and Finance Committee requested that DPH submit reports to the Board of Supervisors on the use of the 12 percent contingencies, the Budget and Legislative Analyst recommends that DPH immediately submit such reports to the Board of Supervisors.

Finally, since such follow-up reports have not been submitted, the use of 12 percent contingencies in existing DPH service-based contracts is unknown and it is unknown how much of the 12 percent contingencies in the proposed contracts is actually warranted. Therefore, the Budget and Legislative Analyst considers the inclusion of a 12 percent contingency in each of the proposed 22 contracts, totaling \$72,255,902 (see Table 1 above), to be a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Amend the proposed resolution to (a) state the revised total amount of \$602,132,504 for the proposed 22 contracts without the 12 percent contingency amount, awarded by DPH to the 19 contractors, and (b) identify the name of each contractor, the actual amount to be awarded under each contract and the length of the term of each contract.
- 2. Since the Budget and Finance Committee requested that DPH submit reports to the Board of Supervisors on the use of the 12 percent contingencies, DPH should immediately submit such reports to the Board of Supervisors.
- 3. Approve the proposed resolution, as amended, retroactively to July 1, 2010, for a total not-to-exceed amount of \$602,132,504 (\$674,388,406 less the 12 percent contingency of \$72,255,902).
- 4. Since prior use of the 12 percent contingencies in existing DPH service-based contracts is unknown, the approval of the 12 percent contingency in each of the proposed 22 contracts, totaling \$72,255,902, is a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.

CBHS Request for Proposal (RFP) details

1. Personal Assisted Employment Services (PAES) Counseling and Pre-Vocational Services for Welfare-To-Work Indigent Individuals with Behavioral Health Issues (RFP 02-2007)

On January 8, 2007, Department of Public Health (DPH) issued an RFP to provide behavioral health counseling and pre-vocational services in the Human Services Agency's (HSA) Personal Assisted Employment Services (PAES), which is the county's welfare-to-work program for adults without dependent children. Behavioral health counseling and pre-vocational services in the HSA PAES includes (a) conducting behavioral health assessment and treatment, (b) conducting prevocational assessment and training, (c) conducting outreach services, (d) providing an internship training program, (e) providing consultation and training to vocational staff and employment specialists, and (f) collaborating with DPH and the Department of Human Services (DHS) management to conduct ongoing assessment.

On February 15, 2007, DPH received four proposals, which is detailed in Table 1 below. As shown in Table 1 below, DPH requests to award the contract to the Richmond Area Multi-Services, which is the subject of the proposed resolution.

2. School-based Mental Health Partnership for SFUSD Emotional Disturbance Special Education Students: Promoting Developmental Assets and School Engagement (RFP 05-2008)

On February 15, 2008, DPH issued an RFP to provide behavioral health services to special education students with an emotional disturbance (from preschool through 12th grade) at designated San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) sites. Since the needs of this population tend to be multiple, serious and varied, such behavioral health services will be guided by conducting one or more of the five core components: (a) team-based interventions (multi-disciplinary, team-based planning using teachers, parents and other school staff as active intervention agents); (b) comprehensive assessment of students' developmental assets and concerns; (c) specific interventions that are success for the students; (d) ongoing monitoring of interventions using systematic data; and (e) linking intervention strategies and supports from school and home.

On March 14, 2008, DPH received six proposals, which is detailed in Table 2 below. As shown in Table 2 below, DPH requests to award contracts to all six nonprofit agencies. The contracts with Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, Edgewood Center for Children & Families, Instituto Familiar de la Raza, Richmond Area Multi-Services and Westside Community Services are the subject of the proposed resolution. The contract with Oakes Children's Center does not require approval from the Board of Supervisors because the contract will not exceed \$10,000,000 or a term of 10 years.

3. Outpatient Opioid Replacement Treatment Services RFP (RFP 06-2008)

On March 13, 2008, DPH issued an RFP to provide various outpatient Opioid treatment services through 10 program areas which include (a) Methadone Maintenance Treatment (General Fund and Medi-Cal funding), (b) In-Jail Treatment, (c) Post Release (Jail-Out) Services, (d) Courtesy Dosing, (e) Perinatal Drug treatment (General Fund and Medi-Cal funding), (g) HIV Testing Services, (h) Homeless Women Services, (i) Community Site Office-Based Opioid Treatment, (j) Centralized Opiate Program Evaluation, and (k) Methadone Vans.

On April 11, 2008, DPH received proposals from four non-profit agencies and the Regents of the University of California for the 10 program areas, which is detailed in Table 3 below. As shown in Table 3 below, DPH requests to award contracts to all five agencies for at least one of the program areas. The contracts with Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, Regents of the University of California, and Westside Community Services are the subject of the proposed resolution. The contracts with BAART Community Health Care and Fort Help do not require approval from the Board of Supervisors because the contracts will not exceed \$10,000,000 or a term of 10 years.

4. Substance Abuse Services for Parolees Residing in the City and County of San Francisco RFP (RFP 08-2008)

On March 17, 2008, DPH issued an RFP to provide various substance abuse services for parolees, which include (a) Residential Detoxification Services, (b) Residential Substance Abuse Services, and (c) Outpatient (Non-residential) Detoxification and Substance Abuse Services.

On April 18, 2008, DPH received proposals from five non-profit agencies, which is detailed in Table 4 below. As shown in Table 4 below, DPH requests to award contracts to four non-profit agencies for at least one of the program areas. The contracts with Haight Ashbury Free Clinics and Walden House are the subject of the proposed resolution. The contracts with St. Vincent De Paul and Center on Juvenile and Criminal Justice do not require approval from the Board of Supervisors because the contracts will not exceed \$10,000,000 or a term of 10 years.

5. CalWORKs Counseling for Welfare-to-Work Families with Behavioral Health Issues (RFP 01-2009)

On January 7, 2009, DPH issued an RFP to provide behavioral health counseling services for families with dependent children in the HSA's CalWORKs Counseling Service. The CalWORKs Counseling Service is an Integrated Behavioral Health Outpatient Program that provides services to stabilize CalWORKs clients who have alcohol, drug, and/or mental health problems to reduce and/or eliminate the client's barriers to employment. Such services provided under the RFP includes (a) providing behavioral health assessment and treatment, (b) providing vocational assessment and training, (c) providing outreach services, (d) providing family-focused services, (e) providing consultation services and (f) an operating community jobs program.

On February 6, 2009, DPH received two proposals, which is detailed in Table 5 below. As shown in Table 5 below, DPH requests to award the contract to Westside Community Services, which is the subject of the proposed resolution.

6. Community Programs: Fiscal Intermediary & Professional Consultant Services (RFQ 10-2009)

On May 4, 2009, DPH issued a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to create a list of qualified fiscal intermediary services vendors and/or professional consultants for various short term projects Fiscal Intermediary services and Professional Consultant services under the DPH Community Program. Such

Fiscal Intermediary services and Professional Consultant services include (a) professional research collaboration for both public and private funding sources, (b) professional program planning and development, (c) professional research staff development, (d) program support and technical assistance and (e) fiscal administration.

On June 10, 2009, DPH received proposals from the Regents of the University of California and 14 non-profit agencies and private firms, which is detailed in Table 6. As shown in Table 6, all 15 agencies met the necessary qualifications and service requirements and will remain on the list of qualified fiscal intermediary services vendors and/or professional consultants for two years. DPH can award fiscal intermediary services and/or professional consultant contracts to any of the 15 agencies for up to eight years. As a result of the RFQ, DPH requests to award a contract to Regents of the University of California for research, planning, evaluation, technical assistance, training, primary care, and prevention services, which is the subject of the proposed resolution.

7. Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) RFP (RFP 20-2009)

On June 19, 2009, DPH issued an RFP to develop and implement various projects for the MHSA Workforce Development, Education and Training (WDET) and Prevention and Early Intervention (PEI) programs. The MHSA WDET program funds activities that (a) creates educational programs that address gaps in the mental health profession, (b) grants financial subsidies to encourage enrollment in mental health educational programs, (c) provides skills and education to clients and their families so that they can secure employment, and (d) hires personnel to coordinate these efforts countywide and within the region. The MHSA PEI program funds activities that (a) identify mental illness in its early stages and prevent such illnesses from becoming severe and disabling, and (b) improve timely access to mental health services.

On July 30, 2009, DPH received 52 proposals from 31 agencies and the Regents of the University of California for seven MHSA WDET and PEI program areas, which is detailed in Table 7 below. As shown in Table 7 below, DPH requests to award contracts to 19 non-profit agencies and the Regents of the University of California for at least one of the seven program areas. The contracts with Bayview Hunters Point Foundation, Central City Hospitality House, Edgewood Center for Children, Family Service Agency, Regents of the University of California (Infant Parent Program), Instituto Familiar de la Raza, Richmond Area Multi-Services, and Seneca Center are the subject of the proposed resolution. The contracts with Bayview YMCA, California Institute of Integral Studies, City College of San Francisco, Harm Reduction Therapy Center, Homeless Children's Network, Huckleberry Youth Programs, Institute on Aging, Jewish Family and Children's Services, Mental Health Association, Native American Health Center, San Francisco State University, and YMCA do not require approval from the Board of Supervisors because the contracts will not exceed \$10,000,000 or a term of 10 years.

8. Child, Youth and Family System of Care and Adult and Older Adult Systems of Care Behavioral Health Services Mega-Request for Proposal (RFP 23-2009)

On July 31, 2009, DPH issued an RFP to provide behavioral health services for (a) children, youth and their families, and (b) adults transitional age youth (TAY) and older adults.

The RFP includes seven modalities under the behavioral health for children, youth and their families component and 19 modalities under the behavioral health services for adults, TAY and older adults component. The seven modalities under the behavioral health for children, youth and their families include (a) Behavioral Health Outpatient Services, Therapeutic Visitation Services, and Substance Abuse Outpatient Services; (b) Community-Based Violence and Trauma Recovery Services; (c) Community-Based Day Treatment; (d) Culturally Appropriate Services Capacity; (e) Residentially-Based Day Treatment Intensive/Day Rehabilitative Services; (f) Substance Abuse Primary Prevention and Secondary Prevention; and (g) Therapeutic Behavioral Services. The 19 modalities under the behavioral health services for adults, TAY and older adults: (a) Behavioral Health Integrated and Full Service Outpatient Services and set aside Behavioral Health Integrated and Full Service Outpatient Services; (b) Older Adult Behavioral Health Integrated and Full Service Outpatient Services; (c) Jail-Based Mental Health Services; (d) Mental Health Board; (e) Mental Health Emergency Crisis Services; (f) Mental Health Residential Services; (g) Mental Health Supportive Housing; (h) Mental Health Vocational Services and Vocational Rehabilitation; (i) Peer and Intern Employment; (j) Peer-Based Wellness and Recovery Centers; (k) Substance Abuse Education and Training; (1) San Francisco Mental Health Patients' Rights Advocacy; (m) Substance Abuse HIV Intervention; (n) Short-Term Intensive Case Management - Hospital Discharge Linkage; (o) Substance Abuse Primary Prevention, Secondary Prevention & Ancillary Services; (p) Substance Abuse Residential Treatment Services (including Perinatal services); (q) Suicide Prevention, Access and Drug Hotline; (r) Supportive Services for Housing; and (s) Transitional Age Youth Housing Service Partnership.

On October 8, 2009, DPH received a total of 212 proposals for the subject 26 modalities, which included (a) 81 proposals from a total of 40 agencies², for the children, youth and their families behavioral health services component and (b) 131 proposals from a total of 56 agencies³ for the adults, TAY and older

10. Early Childhood Mental Health Consultation and Direct Services (RFP 06-2010)

On March 25, 2008, DPH issued an RFP to provide early childhood mental health consultation services to center-based early care and education (ECE) providers, family child care providers, emergency/family/transitional/domestic violence shelters, family resource centers, and family child care networks serving homeless families in San Francisco, which include (a) case consultation, (b) direct psychotherapeutic intervention with children and families, (c) program consultation, (d) therapeutic play groups, (e) referrals for specialized services (e.g., developmental and learning assessments, occupational therapy, help with Individualized Education Plans, psychotherapy), (f) crisis intervention, (g) parent education and support groups, (h) advocacy for families, and (i) training and support for staff and parents.

On April 26, 2010, DPH received 11 proposals, which is detailed in Table 11 below. As shown in Table 11 below, DPH requests to awardh a contract to eight non-profits and the Regents of the University of California. The contracts with Edgewood Center for Children & Families, Family Service Agency, Instituto Familiar de la Raza, Richmond Area Multi-Services and the Regents of the University of California (Infant Parent Program) are the subject of the proposed resolution. The contracts with Children's Council, Hamilton Family Center, Homeless Children's Network, and Jewish Family and Children Services do not require approval from the Board of Supervisors because the contracts will not exceed \$10,000,000 or a term of 10 years.
