Resolution authorizing the Department of the Environment to retroactively accept and expend a grant in the amount of \$10,000 from Altamont Education Advisory Board to

[Accept and Expend Grant - Environment Now - \$10,000]

support Environment Now, an environmental stewardship and workforce development

program.

WHEREAS, Based on evaluation of responses to an Altamont Education Advisory
Board request for proposals in the area of Waste Reduction and Environmental Education, the
Department of the Environment was selected to be the recipient of \$10,000.00 in funding to
support Environment Now; and,

WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors has adopted a goal of 75% landfill diversion by 2010 and zero waste by 2020; and

WHEREAS, In order to reach this goal all residents and businesses must participate in the City's Zero Waste programs; and

WHEREAS, Environment Now provides outreach and education services throughout the City to encourage increased participation in recycling and compost programs; and

WHEREAS, Diversion rates in the City's Bayview Hunters Point neighborhood increased by 30% after a 3-month neighborhood outreach and education campaign led by Environment Now; and,

WHEREAS, Environment Now provides Zero Waste information, education and technical support to underserved San Francisco residents; and,

WHEREAS, Environment Now prepares participants for the new green economy by providing Ecoliteracy training; education on the City's environmental policies, programs, and services; soft skills support; and project based on the job training; and,

WHEREAS, Environment Now also provides opportunities for additional training such as through the California Resource Recovery Association Certificate program; and,

WHEREAS, Environment Now coordinates programming with other local workforce development providers; and,

WHEREAS, Funding from this grant will provide curriculum materials, program equipment and support for Environment Now staff; and,

WHEREAS, The length of the grant is from July 1, 2010-June 30, 2011; and,

WHEREAS, No grant funds will be expended until the San Francisco Board of Supervisors has approved acceptance of the funds; and,

WHEREAS, The grant budget does not include indirect costs in order to provide maximum funding for the program activities; and,

WHEREAS, A request for retroactive approval is being sought because the Department of the Environment did not receive the award until August 11, 2010; and

WHEREAS, This grant does not require an ASO amendment; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors authorizes the Director of the Department of the Environment to retroactively accept and expend funding in the amount of \$10,000.00 from the Altamont Education Advisory Board to support Environment Now, an environmental stewardship and workforce development program.

The Department of the Environment for the City and County of San Francisco (SF Environment) respectfully requests \$10,000 from the Altamont Education Advisory Board to increase diversion in San Francisco neighborhoods by supporting Environment Now, an innovative workforce development project focused on developing a new mechanism to create environmental stewards and increase diversity of the grassroots movement. Environment Now participants perform face-to-face community based social marketing activities, including door-to-door outreach, tabling and speaking at events, making presentations. In addition to the on the jobs training component, participants receive extensive environmental, ecoliteracy, leadership and soft skills training. Funding from AEAB will furnish additional materials for the program and support stipends for Environment Now staff who have taken on additional responsibilities of serving as team leaders.

1. Provide a description of applicant and main purpose of current work.

As the municipal department overseeing environmental issues in San Francisco, SF Environment has the mission of improving, enhancing, and preserving the environment, and promoting San Francisco's long-term, well-being. It is responsible for helping San Francisco reach its very ambitious waste diversion, renewable energy, and climate goals, which is does by promoting and/or mandating behavior change. SF Environment categorizes its policy work and programming into the areas of municipal, commercial and residential.

SFE Staff members have extensive experience and experience in waste management and market development and have helped the City win numerous state and national awards, including an award from the National Recycling Coalition for having the best urban recycling program in the country. San Francisco has exceeded the state mandate of diverting 50% of its waste from landfill with a diversion rate of almost 75%. In 2002, the Board of Supervisors unanimously adopted Resolution 279-02 setting a goal of 75% landfill diversion by 2010 and zero waste by 2020 with SF Environment designated to implement this resolution.

Launched in August 2010, SF Environment Now is an innovative program which is creating a new face of the environmental movement; one that includes those from underserved neighborhoods and others who never saw themselves as activists or change agents. The goals SF Environment Now are to prepare participants for a new green economy and achieve city wide behavior change by promoting San Francisco's environmental services, programs and policies. In the 6 months that Environment Now has been in operation, the 40 participants have hit the streets to



promote services and programs that support residents and businesses to live more sustainably. Invariably participants adopt behaviors and make an internal commitment to the environment and with that commitment they begin to speak from the heart about these things that have become so important to them—environmental justice, clean air, green space, a toxic free environment. Environment Now staff are paid by the City through JobsNow, a federally funded stimulus package program which requires that participants be parents and meet certain income requirements. The program has been more successful than anyone could have imagined and senior SF Environment staff have made a firm commitment to ensure the program's vitality if and when stimulus package funding ends. The program is truly changing lives—both inside SF Environment and out on the streets.

Environment Now lead a 3-month outreach campaign in the City's Bayview Hunters Point (BVHP) neighborhood, an area with notoriously low diversion rates. Campaign methods included door-to-door outreach, phone banking, tabling and monitoring at events and presenting to community based organizations. BVHP diversion rates increased by 30%. While it continues residential outreach on waste diversion, Environment Now is also engaged in a Zero Wsate Commercial campaign and is working with businesses to provide service upgrades, audits, and training. Its work in City apartment buildings has gone well above and beyond what anyone expected—so far composting facilities have been installed in 100 complexes. In addition to the Green Apartments Campaign and BVHP Zero Waste, Environment Now is engaged in 12 other discrete outreach projects, including used oil recycling, green cleaning, reducing idling at schools, energy efficiency and other toxics reduction programs. Staff audit waste at large events such as the City's Outlands Festival.

In addition, because all Environment Now staff are parents, many have been asked by teachers to come into their children's school to present. This supports the SF Environment School Education program and has made a tremendous difference in those schools. Ultimately, Environment Now staff are becoming knowledge experts who serve the City's different cultures and languages and support all SF Environment programs including:

- An innovative Toxics Reduction Division that sets the standard for municipal toxics programs nationwide and cut the City's use of pesticides by 90% and coordinates the City's Green Business Program.
- The City's primary Environmental Education Program that provides education tools promoting conservation awareness, waste prevention, recycling and composting to 250 schools in the City. It collaborates with the



local school district, as well as private schools to provide a range of teacher trainings, field trips, in-school assemblies as well as operational support.

- One of the most respected Green Building Programs in the country that guided the City's adoption of LEED
 Silver as the standard for municipal construction. Its many prestigious green projects include the CA
 Academy of Science.
- ♦ A Clean Air Program that promotes alternative fuel vehicles and the use of mass transit.
- An Energy Program responsible for significantly reducing the City's energy needs by implementing energy
 efficiency projects and developing renewable energy projects.
- One of the only municipal Environmental Justice programs in the country, which addresses environmental and energy concerns in neighborhoods that bear a disproportionate burden of environmental pollution.
- An Urban Forest Program that coordinates the work of several City departments and community based organizations working to maintain a healthy tree coverage.

2. Describe the issues/problems to be addressed by this project.

There are two predominate issues—the first is that Environment Now participants receive a definite and unchanging hourly rate from stimulus package funds—hourly rates are administered by the City's Human Services Agency and cannot be changed. So while several have risen to the leadership level, they receive no reward. In addition, there is no funding for vital curriculum materials.

Another pressing issues is in relation to City-wide diversion. While overall diversion rates are high, in the residential sector diversion rates continue to lag. With the new recycling ordinance it is imperative that SFEnvironment make in-roads to this residential population. In addition, a large percentage of SF residents are renters—many have never received any waste diversion tools or information from the local waste hauler—especially if the landlord pays for garbage. In conjunction with these issues, SF Environment has seen a real need for staff with the ability to reach audiences that have not heard the Zero Waste message before, particularly underserved communities and neighborhoods and those whose first language is not English. Finally, SF Environment continues to



be a somewhat faceless entity and if it is to achieve its goals, it is necessary to become known as a group providing a relevant message.

3. Identify the project goals and objectives.

The overarching goals of SF EnvironmentNow! are

- To prepare participants for the new green economy
- ♦ To Promote SF Environment programs and services
- To achieve behavior change in those who work, live and play in San Francisco
- To enlist a wider range of the population in environmental work

Objectives to meet these goals:

- Achieve/Promote behavior change in those who work, live and play in San Francisco
 - o Each one teach one style of outreach
 - Communicating from the heart on environmental issues
 - o Increased rates of recycling in targeted neighborhoods
- Prepare participants for the new green economy
 - Intensive Ecoliteracy training
 - o Training on City's environmental policies, programs and services
 - Field trips
 - Project based Soft skills training and support
 - On-the-job training
 - o Participate in additional training such as the CRRA Certificate program
- Promote SF Environment programs and services
 - Tabling at events
 - Phone banking
 - o Door-to-door outreach to residents and businesses in targeted neighborhoods
 - o Presenting to community groups and at various events



- o Promoting the SF Environment newsletter
- O Data collection on environmental issues (such as idling at schools, green bin participant)
- Monitoring waste reduction at events and regular venues

4. Population Served

The target audience for the project includes the 800,000 residents of San Francisco, as well a larger regional, national and international audience who look to the City for models of innovative programs. Environment Now participants generally are low-income and low wage workers that have been laid off—many represent populations that are often referred to as "underserved".

5. Describe the methods that will be used for assessing success.

Diversion rates will be closely monitored in all neighborhoods where Environment Now is campaigning. In addition, Environment Now participants will evaluate the program and measure their success as a result of participating. Finally, managers will evaluate participants across a range of metrics, from leadership abilities to improvement in communication skills.
