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San Francisco for All A Values-based Platform for the next Mayor

As San Francisco prepares for a new mayor amid ongoing recession and a near-\$400 million projected deficit, dozens of neighborhood organizations from across the city have created the platform below as a 'values guide' for the new mayor's priorities. We represent a diverse array of city residents, community-based non-profits and service providers, united in our commitment that San Francisco works when it works for all San Franciscans. We are united in holding a positive vision for the city's future, based on historic San Francisco values of inclusiveness, compassion, and opportunity. The platform below reflects our vision for a city, and a new mayor, that unites rather than divides city residents and communities.

Goals (short-term & long-term for Interim Mayor)

- We Encourage the Selection of an Interim Mayor Who Values:
 - Accessibility: Interim Mayor should commit to 2 open office days per month and attend one monthly Board of Supervisors meeting.
 - Consensus Building: Be a consensus-builder, halt previous policy of demonizing & dividing communities; facilitate relationship between downtown and community stakeholders.
 - Community Accountable Appointments: Commit to community appointments on commissions and appoint unifying department heads.
 - Equity in the city budget process: Don't have poorest people shoulder reductions nor focus cuts on proportion of general fund expenditures; look at overall funding for departments and impact on vulnerable people.
 - Transparency: in all areas of government including the posting information on proposed budget cuts, policy changes, and legislation on website.

- Policy Issues

o Immigrant rights:

- Immediately implement the amendment to the Sanctuary Ordinance to restore due process for immigrant youth, which was passed by a veto-proof majority of the Board of Supervisors in November 2009.
- Oppose the dangerous ICE/police biometric sharing program known as S-Comm or "Secure Communities".
- End the SFPD Muni saturation program and any other SFPD programs that which have a disproportionate impact on harassing and targeting immigrants.
- Support strict adherence to Sanctuary Ordinance for all county departments.

o Affordable Housing & Fair Land Use

- Development in BVHP must include rebuilding Alice Griffith while having true right to return for all tenants.
- Expand & preserve public housing.
- Implement Teeth to the housing element goals for low-income and below-market rate housing
- Improve Inclusionary zoning requirements to ensure affordable housing stock.
- Protect tenant rights.

o Budget That Prioritizes Our Safety Net

- Mid-year spending reductions should not be made unilaterally by the mayor. If spending reductions to the current-year budget need to be made, the Board of Supervisors and the public should be involved as part of a public process.
- Budget process should be transparent.
- Look for alternative savings that do not endanger health and well-being of San Franciscans.
- Protect most vulnerable San Franciscans in budget process - those that are least able to shoulder burden of deficit should not be required to do so.

o Public Spaces for All

- Halt use of criminal justice system to curb poor people's community presence in and utilization of public spaces.
 - Produce creative non-divisive solutions to public space acrimony.
- Opportunities for San Franciscans to Thrive
 - Great Recession Jobs Program - Continue Community Jobs Program or create new local one.
 - Strengthen local hiring preference.
 - Prioritize public sector jobs over private sector jobs.
 - Focus on creating sustainable economic opportunities that produce long-term economic benefit for SF rather than one-time-only opportunities such as the Olympics or the America's Cup.
 - Economic policies should be geared towards reducing economic inequality and maintaining middle/working class jobs.
- Embrace Public transportation
 - Reduce fares.
 - Restore service.
 - Free transportation for low-income children and youth.
 - Streamline Lifeline Fastpass access.
- Progressive Revenue
 - Support gross receipts reform.
- Health Care for all SF residents.
 - Support good planning that is need-based, includes key stakeholders, and holds big hospitals accountable to serve poor communities.
- Support Public Education
- Public Recreation and Park
 - Halt the privatization of Recreation and Park facilities and programs that decrease access for poor communities and residents.
 - Ensure Recreation and Park programs are accessible to disenfranchised communities.

- Garner creative non-divisive solutions to budgetary problems.

- Policing and Public Safety

- Favor community-based responses to public safety rather than law enforcement strategies like gang injunctions, sit/lie, surveillance cameras, and youth curfews.
- Comprehensive public safety strategies do not rely solely on increased enforcement: addressing root causes of violent crime, community based responses, and service programs that help to prevent crime must be part of a citywide public safety strategy.

- Community Congress

- Embrace recommendations formulated in community congress, summer of 2010.

- Privatization

- Honor and value public service and the important role of the public sector. Stand up against the ongoing privatization of city resources and services.

- Environmental Justice and Climate Action

- Addressing pollution in low-income communities of color.
- Protect and Expand Open and Green space in those neighborhoods without.
- Ensure the rapid roll out and construction of San Francisco's CleanPowerSF program.
- Ensure disenfranchised access to grocery stores and other neighborhood amenities.
- Move quickly to transition the City to much more robust mass transit use.
