3	Resolution urging the Mayor's Office and Department of Public Health to ensure no gap
4	in services for the hundreds of people served daily by the Tenderloin Center.
5	
6	WHEREAS, The Tenderloin Center, formerly known as the Linkage Center and located
7	at 1170 Market Street, was launched in January 2022, pursuant to an emergency declaration
8	by Mayor London Breed and her administration (the Administration), and was a landmark part
9	of the Tenderloin Initiative; and
10	WHEREAS, Despite the expiration of the Mayor's declaration in March 2022, the
11	Tenderloin Center has continued operating and has already served over 104,230 guests,
12	serving up to 441 guests a day; and
13	WHEREAS, The Tenderloin Center offers a plethora of services, including meals,
14	restrooms, showers, laundry, overdose prevention services, enrollment in treatment and state
15	benefits, wound care, HIV/STI/COVID-19 testing, housing/shelter assessment, employment
16	services, and other activities and services; and
17	WHEREAS, Although some of these services, such as some harm reduction services,
18	have been offered by various providers for many years and continue being offered today,
19	other services offered at the Tenderloin Center, such as overdose prevention, showers, and
20	linkage to housing/benefits, are either unavailable in other locations or not as easily
21	accessible for the population served by the Tenderloin Center; and
22	WHEREAS, Overdose prevention services are a key part of the Tenderloin Center: at
23	least 249 overdoses have been reversed and thousands of doses of Naloxone distributed by
24	staff at the Tenderloin Center, undoubtedly saving many lives; and
25	

1	WHEREAS, The most recent report by the Medical Examiner's Office shows that San
2	Francisco's overdose deaths remain at crisis levels, and 451 people have died from overdose
3	as of the end of September 2022; and
4	WHEREAS, The Mayor has announced her plan to close the Tenderloin Center in
5	December of 2022; and
6	WHEREAS, As of the writing of this Resolution, the Administration has yet to announce
7	any plan to ensure no gap in services for the hundreds of people served daily by the
8	Tenderloin Center;
9	WHEREAS, The Department of Public Health (DPH) prepared and recently released its
10	Overdose Prevention Plan, which includes plans to invest further into harm reduction services
11	treatment, and create "Wellness Hubs" that will offer overdose prevention services, but has
12	offered no public information regarding the locations and precise timing for these
13	commitments; and
14	WHEREAS, Shutting down the Tenderloin Center without an operational replacement
15	nearby to offer services to the hundreds of people who utilize the center every day would
16	create an untenable situation in the Tenderloin, Civic Center, and surrounding neighborhoods
17	and
18	WHEREAS, Leaving the Tenderloin and Civic Center without an operational site
19	nearby to offer overdose prevention services would place the people who currently rely on
20	those services at higher risk of overdosing; now, therefore, be it
21	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Administration to commit to
22	ensuring that there is no gap in services from the closure of the Tenderloin Center; and, be it
23	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board urges the Administration to commit to ensure
24	that a replacement site and services are opened by the anticipated date of closure for the
25	Tenderloin Center; and, be it

1	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board urges the Administration to commit to ensure
2	that any replacements are reasonably situated to serve at minimum the people currently
3	served by the Tenderloin Center; and, be it
4	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board urges the Administration to immediately
5	publicly release its plan for ensuring that the people who utilize the Tenderloin Center will be
6	offered comparable services elsewhere upon closure of the Tenderloin Center; and, be it
7	FURTHER RESOLVED, That, in the event that no suitable replacements near the
8	Tenderloin Center can be mobilized or opened by the date of the Tenderloin Center's planned
9	closure, the Board of Supervisors urges the Administration to commit to extending operations
10	for the Tenderloin Center until such time as those replacement services become available to
11	ensure that the hundreds of people who are currently served by the Tenderloin Center are not
12	left without sufficient access to the resources currently offered there.

# Tenderloin Center (TLC) Background

- DEM launched the TLC on January 18, 2022, as part of the Tenderloin Emergency Initiative, in partnership with DPH, HSH, HSA, and DPW. DPH took over the site on July 1, 2022.
- The TLC is one strategy in a multipronged plan to immediately stabilize the neighborhood, with the goals of:
  - Reducing overdose deaths
  - Increasing connections to health and human services
- The TLC serves approximately 400 people a day, 7-days a week at 1170 Market St. in UN Plaza.



# Tenderloin Center Services & Impact

**January 18 – October 27, 2022:** 

- 1,040 individuals placed into shelter and 211 individuals placed into permanent housing
- 637 completed enrollments into CalFresh, Medi-Cal, and CAAP
- 8,529 showers and 3,248 loads of laundry provided
- Over 25,000 onsite behavioral health, physical health, social service and housing support activities provided
- 313 individuals connected with behavioral health services
- 272 overdoses reversed






# Efforts at TLC have aligned with Overdose Prevention Plan

# Four-point comprehensive plan

- 1. Increase availability and accessibility of the continuum of substance use services
- 2. Strengthen community engagement and support for people at high risk for overdose
- 3. Implement a "whole City" approach to overdose prevention
- 4. Track overdose trends and related drug use metrics to measure success and inform program development and change

# ...and the services are part of the larger, multipronged effort to reduce overdoses and public drug use

# Progress made under Mental Health SF:

- Opening more than 250 new behavioral health residential care and treatment beds
  - Includes a drug sobering center (SoMa RISE), now open 24/7
- Expanded hours at the Behavioral Health Access Center (BHAC), the Office-based Buprenorphine Induction Clinic (OBIC) and BAART Market Street Clinic
- Established the Street Crisis Response Teams and the Street Overdose Response Team (SORT)
- Launched an Office of Coordinated Care within Behavioral Health Services
- Medications for addiction treatment and links to contingency management are offered to patients at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital
- Behavioral Health Services Pharmacy delivers buprenorphine to many high-risk housing locations and areas without retail pharmacy access



# Implementation of the Overdose Prevention Plan

# • <u>In 1-2 years:</u>

- Establish at least 2 Wellness Hubs that co-locate needed services and improve the health of people who use drugs
- Open 70 additional residential step-down beds
- Open 40 new beds for dual diagnosis transitional care for women in the Bayview
- Increase the number of people receiving MAT by 20%
- Increase the number of programs offering contingency management from three to five
- Establish drop-in space with low-barrier therapy for people experiencing homelessness
- Increase citywide naloxone distribution from 47,000 kits to 75,000 kits annually
- Have naloxone available in 50% of supportive housing facilities

# Wellness Hubs

- Neighborhood-based programs tailored to meet and improve the health of people who use drugs, with a specific focus on preventing overdose deaths.
- Services will include overdose prevention, access to treatment, and linkage to shelter and benefits.
- Goal is to open at least two wellness hubs within the next year in neighborhoods that are disproportionally affected by overdoses and public drug use, with the Tenderloin among the priority neighborhoods.
- Any new proposed site will include community engagement, including required Prop I notifications

- Tenderloin Center
  - Explore options for extension of services
  - Develop TLC Service Transition and Post-Closure transition plans
- Implementation of SF Overdose Prevention Plan
