Update on MPX Response as of October 31, 2022

UPDATES SINCE 10.17.22

SFDPH ended public health emergency declaration

The San Francisco Department of Public Health (SFDPH) has ended the public health emergency declaration. MPX cases have slowed to less than one case per day and more than 27,000 San Franciscans are now vaccinated against the virus. The overwhelming community support and advocacy for critical resources such as vaccines from the federal government, coupled with early and strong action, drove San Francisco's successful public health response and enabled the city to reach this milestone.

The SF public health emergency declaration on MPX, the first of its kind in the nation, served its purpose to reflect the immediate urgency of the MPX threat to the health of those most affected in the gay, bisexual and trans communities. It also gave public health officials tools, such as collection of critical data, needed to respond effectively. While much has been accomplished in the nearly three months of the emergency declaration, it is important to note that MPX is still circulating in communities and remains a public health concern. San Franciscans should continue to do their part by getting vaccinated against MPX if they are eligible and, critically, completing the two-dose Jynneos series; maximum protection against the virus occurs only after the vaccine series is completed.

MPX vaccine availability at community events

Since the onset of MPX, SFDPH has persistently advocated for and secured more vaccines. The vaccines, which includes first and second doses of Jynneos, were available at various pop-up vaccination sites, neighborhood vaccine clinics, community based events and events at health system providers. Since October 6, SFDPH provided MPX vaccine at the following community events:

- Pan Dulce Wednesday at Beaux Nightclub on October 19
- Bearrison Street Fair on October 15
- SF Pride at El Rio on October 7 and October 14
- SoMa Second Saturdays on October 8

VACCINATIONS

According to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, Jynneos vaccine is indicated for prevention of smallpox and MPX disease in adults. However, since no vaccine is 100 percent effective, it is important for individuals to reduce their risk of potential exposures to MPX both before and after being vaccinated. The goal is for everyone who wants a vaccine to receive a vaccine. For more information on MPX vaccines in San Francisco, please visit https://sf.gov/information/mpx-vaccine.

Vaccine sites and administration

There are various clinics and healthcare providers in SF that are now administering vaccines for MPX, including UCSF, Kaiser, Sutter, and SFDPH. The walk-in clinic at ZSFG continues to be open weekdays from 8am-4pm. Medical providers Kaiser, UCSF, and Sutter will be providing doses via appointments. Kaiser and UCSF will serve patients and non-patients. DPH is working with local community-based organizations to provide vaccine to those that may not have access to the walk-in clinic or healthcare providers.

As of October 31, 34,660 first doses and 14,844 second doses totaling 49, 595 doses were administered in San Francisco. To date, SFDPH has received 67,690 doses total.

Availability for 2nd doses

In alignment with other Bay Area counties, SF vaccine sites are now providing the second dose of the Jynneos vaccine to people who are at least 28 days from receiving their first dose. All healthcare providers will continue to administer first doses and make a percentage of vaccines dedicated for first doses.

First and second doses of MPX vaccine are available by appointment at healthcare providers and clinics throughout the city, including Kaiser Permanente and UCSF. Medical providers Kaiser and UCSF will be providing doses via appointments and will serve both non-patients and patients.

The clinic at ZSFG continues to serve first doses and second dose walk ins. SFDPH is working with local community-based organizations, such as SF AIDS Foundation, Unidos En Salud, and Rafiki to provide the vaccine to those who may not have access to the walk-in clinic or a healthcare provider.

Equity for Vaccine Access

SFDPH will continue to focus our resources and efforts on reaching communities who are inequitably impacted by MPX, especially BIPOC and Latinx communities. As part of these efforts, we are implementing a multi-prong community strategy for vaccinating communities that are highly impacted by MPX and may have barriers to healthcare. We will continue to seek out opportunities to leverage additional resources from state and federal partners to reduce disparities around MPX in BIPOC communities.

The San Francisco Department of Public Health has a multi-prong community strategy for vaccinating those communities that are highly impacted by MPX and may have barriers to healthcare. This strategy includes:

- **Pop up vaccination sites** having current COVID-19 community pop up sites administer MPX vaccine in high impacted communities.
- **Roving vax teams** leveraging existing roving COVID-19 vaccination teams to distribute the vaccine to unhoused populations, including street, SRO and shelter populations.
- **Mobile vaccine teams** deploy teams to high impacted communities with hard-to-reach populations for one-day events to provide access to vaccine.
- **SFDPH and MPX vaccine clinic at ZSFG** worked with the below community-based organizations to set up "VIP" vaccine access for BIPOC individuals daily Monday through Friday.

Intradermal dosing

SFDPH clinics have moved to an alternative technique of giving doses. The technique, known as "intradermal," injects the vaccine between the top layers of skin. Giving intradermal vaccinations is a safe and effective way to manage limited vaccine supplies so that more people can be vaccinated and is approved by federal and state regulators.

The intradermal technique uses less vaccine with each dose and makes as strong a response as the subcutaneous technique of injecting below the skin. SFDPH has instructed vaccination providers to use the intradermal method on adults effective August 22, 2022. People can now request to receive the intradermal injection on the back below the shoulder blade, or on the upper arm.

DATA

SFDPH updates <u>data on MPX cases</u> daily Monday through Friday no later than 5pm at: https://sf.gov/information/monkeypox-cases.

At 5pm on October 26, SFDPH reported total number of cases in San Francisco residents to 833. These include both probable cases, as well as cases that are confirmed as MPX through the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. SFDPH posts MPX case demographic data on the website each Friday by 5pm. SFDPH also updates the MPX case count page to include the 7-day rolling average to show the trend in new cases. Beginning October 3, SFDPH provides data on sexual orientation for those who have received the Jynneos vaccine at <u>SFDPH sites only</u>. This is in addition to the demographic information previously released for those who have received the Jynneos vaccine, including age, race and gender. Pursuant to Administrative Code Section 21.43

The following quarterly report has been prepared for the Board of Supervisors (Board) in accordance with Section 21.43 of the Administrative Code.

In Ordinance No. 176-22, the Board delegated to the General Manager of the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) authority to execute certain contracts with terms in excess of 10 years or requiring expenditures of \$10,000,000 or having anticipated revenue of one million dollars or more subject to specified limitations through June 30, 2025.

Ordinance No. 176-22 also required the SFPUC to report quarterly to the Board "the duration, product purchased, and cost of contracts entered".

To meet state regulatory requirements, secure the best possible prices and terms, keep electricity rates affordable and competitive, and manage procurement risk, the SFPUC engaged in procurement efforts through competitive bidding processes for energy and energy-related products. These bidding processes were under an expedited time frame consistent with commercial and regulatory deadlines to fulfill the City's goals for a carbon-free future, energy independence, equity in access to 100% renewable energy supply; ensure stable and affordable rates; meet regulatory obligations; and contribute to the reliability of the state's energy grid and resource supply.

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I. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Behavioral Health Commission (BHC) of San Francisco submits this Annual Report for the fiscal year ending June 2022 in accordance with the California Welfare and Institutions Code, Section 5604.2. The Commission met 11 times during this period with robust attendance on the part of the membership. Commission meetings consisted of salient topic presentations, discussions, and public participation.

The themes for FY 2021-22 included supportive housing, the grievance process, BHC recruitment and training of new commission members and staff. We hosted eight educational presentations that included speakers from the Office of Homeless and Supportive Housing, the California Local Behavioral Health Boards/Commissions, Behavioral Health Services (BHS), and various mental health service providers. A detailed list is included in Section V, BHC Accomplishments.

In addition, the commission submitted reports from three program reviews/site visits. The site visits were conducted virtually and required additional planning and coordination due to COVID-19 mandates. In spite of this drawback, we learned a great deal about the organizations, their staffs and clients, and the services they provided. We are looking forward to returning to face-to-face visits in the future.

in preparing the annual CA Behavioral Health Planning Council Data Notebook, the BHC staff met with the BHS to review <u>performance outcome data</u> for the City and County of San Francisco and to report on the county's delivery of behavioral health services. The electronic report was submitted to the Planning Council and the BHS director.

The behavioral health needs in the county continued to increase despite innovative programs (e.g., transgender support, vocational training). The BHC recommended the establishment of culturally affirming and evidence-based practices for all services; strengthening the integration of substance use and mental health treatment to ensure that both disorders are treated effectively; and increasing the number of therapists, psychologists and psychiatrists working in the departments of Public Health and Behavioral Health Services.

Too many of our citizens in San Francisco continue to face enormous challenges in trying to address issues related to mental health wellness and substance use and their intersections with homelessness. With the additional challenges of coping with COVID-19 safety measures, the commission did not reach all its goals, such as in implementing the five program reviews or resolutions that we had planned for the year. However, in FY 2022-23, as we continue to advocate on behalf of adults and families in San Francisco experiencing severe mental illness, we expect to identify and execute five program reviews and resolutions.

We will draw on the following community priority issues as our focus for the program reviews and resolutions and discuss them in more detail at the annual BHC retreat. These issues include:

- Mental health challenges and substance use in all educational settings.
- Continuation of transgender training and support.
- Access to same day services for prescription medications.
- Treatment on demand.
- Better access for elderly and isolated seniors, and those with disabilities struggling with mental health challenges in San Francisco.
- Encouraging BHS and HSH (Homelessness and Supportive Housing) to have more open interactions with the various communities around the services they provide to the citizens of San Francisco.
- The new (SF.GOV) website that replaces the current site and more guidance on how to use the new website. This will help BHS to better inform the public on significant new BHS services such as the Street Crisis Response Team (SCRT).

- Review and evaluate the community's Behavioral Health needs, services, facilities, and special problems.
- Review County agreements entered into pursuant to Section 5650.
- Advise the Commission of Supervisors and the Director of Behavioral Health Services (BHS)
 as to any aspect of the local Behavioral Health system.
- Review and approve the procedures used to ensure citizen and professional involvement at all stages of the planning process.
- Submit an Annual Report to the Mayor and Supervisors on the needs and performance of the Behavioral Health system.
- Review and make recommendations on applicants for the appointment of the director of Behavioral Health services prior to the vote of the governing body. The Commission shall be included in the selection process prior to the vote of the governing body.
- Review and comment of the County's/City's performance outcome data and communicate its findings to the California Behavioral Health Planning Council.
- Assess the impact of the realignment of services from the State to the County on services delivered to clients and on the local community.

The Behavioral Health Commission of San Francisco represents and ensures the inclusion of the diverse voices of local consumers, citizens, and stakeholders in advising how behavioral health services are administered and provided.

IV. LETTER FROM THE CO-CHAIRS

FY 2021-2022 was an important year for the San Francisco BHC in several ways. There were several significant challenges as well as initiatives during the year. Probably the most significant was the continuation of Covid-19. Though there was a new vaccine delivered in 2021, the hope that came with it was short lived due to the emergence of new strains and infection surges. Consequently, the City of San Francisco only recently reached a mandate for staff to be in their offices 3 days per week. When the City returns to five day a week office attendance is unknown. The pandemic also resulted in fewer Site Visits than the BHC would have preferred. The commission plans to schedule substantially more visits in FY 2022–2023.

This year also saw a short transition from an interim Director of Behavioral Health Services (BHS), Marlo Simmons, to a permanent Director, Dr. Hillary Kunins. Also notable were the monthly reports from the Director of BHS about the state of the department and its services, including several new initiatives and services that have started. The director also helped to arrange several presentations for the BHC that commissioners requested, the most significant being a presentation of the BHS "Grievance Process" which generated many questions and has placed the BHC & BHS on a path for finding better alternatives to dealing with a grievance.

This year also saw the Mayor's Declaration of Emergency for the Tenderloin. Though it only lasted a few months, it facilitated the hiring of about 200 BHS staffers that were desperately needed. There was also a sizable funding increase due to Prop C/ Our City Our Home (OCOH) and Mental Health SF (MHSF) of more than a hundred million dollars. The commissioners have tried to stay abreast of the changes these funds are bringing.

Though it took many, many months the BHC finally developed and passed new Commission Bylaws in May 2022. Part of the problem was the number of vacancies on the 17-member commission. Several members served beyond their official appointment schedules, some served their time commitments and then resigned but many seats were, and continue to be, vacant. It was frequently impossible for the commissioners to vote on matters, and this resulted in many "discussion only" commission and committee meetings. At this time, 5 of the 17 commission seats remain vacant, including the seat reserved for the SF Board of Supervisors (BOS). It's been over a year since a BOS member has attended a BHC meeting.

In FY 2022-2023, the commission will continue to focus on several issues begun in prior years, such as how to better deal with "grievances," making citizens more aware of the innovative services offered by BHS such as SCRT (Street Crisis Response Team), and the importance of BHS and HSH departments needing to have more open interactions with the public. The many BHS clients whose behavioral health is affected by numerous reported and documented housing problems need culturally responsive resources and supportive services.

The commission's work, like the BHS department's, is more like a process of recovery and not a race. Improvement in the behavioral health of the citizens of San Francisco is incremental but should always be moving forward. With more funding and staffing and training, these improvements can be better met in 2023.

VI. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES HIGHLIGHTS

Annual Update on the MHSA 3-Year Draft Report and Budget, Tracy Helton, MPA, MHSA Program Manager/Acting Deputy Director, JEDI, July 20, 2022. The presenter answered all the questions that the commissioners and the public submitted prior to the meeting.

VII. BEHAVIORAL HEALTH NEEDS AND RECOMMENDATIONS - HIGHLIGHTS

The BHC Commissioners identified the following needs and recommended:

- Strengthen behavioral health services and supportive housing for people who are homeless.
- Make the **grievance process** more transparent and user friendly.
- Increase Behavioral Health Services' funding and pay higher wages to the employees of the service providers.
- Promote the implementation of a Comprehensive Continuum of Care system within BHS, in which care evolves with the patient over time. A comprehensive array of services can offer optimal support during gaps in care when the patient's health may be most vulnerable.
- Establish **culturally affirming and evidence-based practices** for all services. The BHC works to assure that DPH-funded behavioral health providers are providing effective, equitable,

- and high-quality care and services that are responsive to clients with diverse cultural health beliefs and practices, preferred languages, health literacy, and other communication needs.
- Provide regular board training for new BHC commissioners so they are more effective.
 Regular ethics training is required per GOV 53234 53235.2. New and veteran commissioners also gain a better understanding of the duties of California's mental/behavioral health boards/commissions through in-person and online training offered through CALBHB/C (https://www.calbhbc.org/training.html).
- Strengthen the **integration of substance use and mental health treatment** to ensure both conditions are treated effectively. For instance, the Collaborative Care Model has emerged as a major evidence-based approach in integrating physical and behavioral health services. The primary care physician, behavioral health care manager and psychiatrist work as a team to provide care and monitor patient progress (California Health Care Foundation, https://www.chcf.org/).
- Increase the number of therapists, psychologists and psychiatrists in BHS to decrease wait time, increase ability to serve all in need, and offer enhanced therapeutic services, including co-occurring disorder and trauma-informed services that are culturally affirming, and transitional aged youth (TAY) appropriate services.
- Provide staff wellness and supportive services for the individual behavioral health service personnel.

VIII. SAMPLE BHC RESOLUTION

3.4 RESOLUTION: (MHB 02-2019) The Mental Health Board urges the City and County of San Francisco to develop a system of oversight and accountability for buildings providing permanent supportive housing to people with behavioral health challenges.

WHEREAS, permanent supportive housing residences provide behavioral health services and case management to vulnerable populations, and;

WHEREAS, the people residing in these buildings have behavioral health issues, are very low income and rarely have other housing options, and;

WHEREAS, permanent housing buildings require that building owners have contracts with property management services to collect rents and oversee building maintenance and repairs, and;

WHEREAS, it is contractually necessary for property management services and City and County of San Francisco funded case management and behavioral health services provided in these buildings to maintain a separation of duties, and:

WHEREAS, it has been reported that supportive service staff are violating 1996 Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (**HIPAA**), that protects the privacy of their clients, and;

WHEREAS, some of these residences are in varying states of neglect and disrepair with incidents of mold, structural damage, missing or broken fixtures and appliances, vermin infestation, and outdated and potentially hazardous plumbing, electrical, and mechanical systems with rusty pipes and brown water, and;

WHEREAS, after seeking resolution with case management, some residents have escalated their concerns through designated channels and still fear retaliation for voicing their concerns around building conditions and property management practices, and;

WHEREAS, males significantly outnumber females in the majority of the permanent housing residences and many female residents have expressed feeling unsafe, and site incidents of severe bullying incidents and direct threats to harm, and;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that, even with separate responsibilities and legal requirements between case management services and property management, it is essential that this mutual exclusivity not result in unsafe or unnecessarily stressful conditions for residents, and;

FURTHER RESOLVED, that residents of permanent supportive housing need an entity, agency, or City department where their grievances can be heard and addressed, and;

THEREFORE, **BE IT RESOLVED** that The Behavioral Health Commission (BHC) formerly known as The Mental Health Board (MHB) urges the City and County of San Francisco to develop a system of oversight and accountability for buildings providing permanent supportive housing to people with behavioral health challenges.

Board of Supervisors,

In pursuant to the Administrative Code sec. 19B.6(a), DHR has completed the annual Surveillance Technology Policy review. At the time of completion, there are no identified changes to our existing policy.

The City and County of San Francisco values the privacy and protection of San Francisco residents' civil rights and civil liberties. As required by San Francisco Administrative Code, Section 19B, the Surveillance Technology Policy aims to ensure the responsible use of Department's Security Camera System itself as well as any associated data, and the protection of City and County of San Francisco residents' civil rights and liberties.

PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The Surveillance Technology Policy ("Policy") defines the manner in which the Security Camera System (fixed or mobile) will be used to support department operations.

This Policy applies to all department personnel that use, plan to use, or plan to secure Security Camera Systems, including employees, contractors, and volunteers. Employees, consultants, volunteers, and vendors while working on behalf of the City with the Department are required to comply with this Policy.

POLICY STATEMENT

City departments using this policy will limit their use of Security Camera to the following authorized use cases and requirements listed in this Policy.

Authorized Use(s):

- 1. Live monitoring.
- 2. Recording of video and images.
- 3. Reviewing camera footage in the event of an incident.
- 4. Providing video footage/images to law enforcement or other authorized persons following an incident or upon request.

Prohibited use cases include any uses not stated in the Authorized Use Case section.

Departments may use information collected from security cameras only for legally authorized purposes, and may not use that information to unlawfully discriminate against people based on race, ethnicity, political opinions, religious or philosophical beliefs, trade union membership, gender, gender identity, disability status, sexual orientation or activity, or genetic and/or biometric data. Additionally, departments may not use automated systems to scan footage and identify individuals based on any of the categories listed in the preceding sentence.

POLICY REQUIREMENTS

This Policy defines the responsible data management processes and legally enforceable safeguards required by the Department to ensure transparency, oversight, and accountability measures. Department use of surveillance technology and information collected, retained, processed or shared by surveillance technology must be consistent with this Policy; must comply with all City, State, and Federal laws and regulations; and must protect all state and federal Constitutional guarantees.

Specifications: The software and/or firmware used to operate security cameras must be kept up-to-date and maintained.

Data
Collection:

Department shall only collect data required to execute the authorized use case. All data collected by the surveillance technology, including PII, shall be classified according to the City's <u>Data Classification Standard</u>.

The surveillance technology collects some or all of the following data types:

Notification:

Departments shall notify the public of intended surveillance technology operation at the site of operations through signage in readily viewable public areas in accordance to Section 19.5 of the Administrative Code. Department notifications shall identify the type of technology being used and the purpose for such collection.

Access:

Prior to accessing or using data, authorized individuals receive training in system access and operation, and instruction regarding authorized and prohibited uses.

Access to live views and recorded footage is restricted to specific trained personnel. Recorded footage is accessed only in response to an incident.

Details on department staff and specific access are available in Appendix A.

Data Security:

Department shall secure PII against unauthorized or unlawful processing or disclosure; unwarranted access, manipulation or misuse; and accidental loss, destruction, or damage. Surveillance technology data collected and retained by the Department shall be protected by the safeguards appropriate for its classification level(s) as defined by the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) security framework 800-53, or equivalent requirements from other major cybersecurity framework selected by the department.

Departments shall, at minimum, apply the following safeguards to protect surveillance technology information from unauthorized access and control, including misuse:

- Encryption: Data retained by the Department will be encrypted. Raw data may be retained by the Department only for the authorized use case of sharing with law enforcement or the public.
- Storage: Any use of a third-party service provider must meet City's cyber security requirements.
- Audits: A data access log will be maintained by the Department for all Security Camera data that is processed and utilized. This log will include but is not limited to the following: date/time data was originally obtained/collected, reasons/intended use for data, department requesting data, date/time of access of raw data, outcome of data processing, as well as date processed data was delivered to users.

Data Sharing:

For internal and externally shared data, shared data shall not be accessed, used, or processed by the recipient in a manner incompatible with the authorized use cases stated in this Policy. Department will endeavor to ensure that other agencies or departments that may receive data collected by their own Security Camera Systems will act in conformity with this Surveillance Technology Policy.

Department shall ensure proper administrative, technical, and physical safeguards are in place before sharing data with other CCSF departments, outside government entities, and third-party providers or vendors.

Each department that believes another agency or department receives or may receive data collected from its use of Security Cameras should consult with its assigned Deputy City Attorney regarding their response.

Before sharing data with any recipients, the Department will use the following procedure to ensure appropriate data protections are in place:

- X Confirm the purpose of the data sharing aligns with the department's mission.
- X Consider alternative methods other than sharing data that can accomplish the same purpose.
- X Redact names, scrub faces, and ensure all PII is removed in accordance with the department's data policies.
- Review of all existing safeguards to ensure shared data does not increase the risk of potential civil rights and liberties impacts on residents.
- Evaluation of what data can be permissibly shared with members of the X public should a request be made in accordance with the San Francisco's Sunshine Ordinance.
- X Ensure data will be shared in a cost-efficient manner and exported in a clean, machine-readable format.

Department will comply with the California Public Records Act, the San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance, the requirements of the federal and State Constitutions, and federal and State civil procedure laws and rules.

The Department may share Security Camera footage with the following entities:

A. Internal Data Sharing:

In the event of an incident, Security Camera images may be live-streamed or shared by alternative methods to the following agencies:

- Within the operating Department
- Police
- City Attorney
- District Attorney
- Sheriff
- On request following an incident.

Data sharing occurs at the following frequency:

As needed.

B. External Data Sharing:

- Other local law enforcement agencies

Data sharing occurs at the following frequency:

As needed.

Data Retention:

Department may store and retain raw PII data only as long as necessary to accomplish a lawful and authorized purpose. Department data retention standards should align with how the department prepares its financial records and should be consistent with any relevant Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) or California Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES) sections.

The Department's data retention period and justification are as follows:

- Security Camera data will be stored for a minimum of one (1) year to be available to authorized staff for operational necessity and ready reference, subject to technical limitations.
 - If data is associated with an incident, it may be kept for longer than the standard retention period.
- Justification: This retention period conforms with the available server system storage space and allows for ample time for security staff to review footage related to security incidents and/or external requests for records.

Data may be stored in the following location:

- X Local storage (e.g., local server, storage area network (SAN), network-attached storage (NAS), backup tapes, etc.)
- X Department of Technology Data Center
- X Software as a Service Product
- X Cloud Storage Provider

Data Disposal: Upon completion of the data retention period, Department shall dispose of data in the following manner:

 Automatic overwrite of all existing files when standard data retention period ends. This may take the form of a delete/reformat, wipe, overwrite of existing data, or degaussing.

Training:

To reduce the possibility that surveillance technology or its associated data will be misused or used contrary to its authorized use, all individuals requiring access must receive training on data security policies and procedures.

- Annual cybersecurity training (COIT Policy Link)

COMPLIANCE

Department shall oversee and enforce compliance with this Policy according to the respective memorandum of understanding of employees and their respective labor union agreement.

If a Department is alleged to have violated the Ordinance under San Francisco Administrative Code Chapter 19B, Department shall post a notice on the Department's website that generally describes any corrective measure taken to address such allegation.

Department is subject to enforcement procedures, as outlined in San Francisco Administrative Code Section 19B.8.

DEFINITIONS

Personally Identifiable Information:

Information that can be used to distinguish or trace an individual's identity, either alone or when combined with other personal or identifying information that is linked or linkable to a specific individual.

AUTHORIZATION

Section 19B.4 of the City's Administrative Code states, "It is the policy of the Board of Supervisors that it will approve a Surveillance Technology Policy ordinance only if it determines that the benefits the Surveillance Technology ordinance authorizes outweigh its costs, that the Surveillance Technology Policy ordinance will safeguard civil liberties and civil rights, and that the uses and deployments of the Surveillance Technology under the ordinance will not be based upon discriminatory or viewpoint-based factors or have a disparate impact on any community or Protected Class."

Appendix A: Department Specific Responses – Department of Human Resources

1. A description of the product, including vendor and general location of technology.

DHR's security cameras are non-zoom, fixed surveillance cameras connected to an OpenEye video recording system. The equipment was purchased more than ten years ago, and DHR was unable to locate purchase details.

2. The specific categories and titles of individuals who are authorized by the Department to access or use the collected information

Video may only be accessed by DHR's 1042 IS Engineer, and only at the request of (a) the Human Resources Director; (b) the DHR Managing Deputy Director; or (c) the Department Personnel Officer.

3. What procedures will be put in place by which members of the public can register complaints or concerns, or submit questions about the deployment or use of a specific Surveillance Technology, and how the Department will ensure each question and complaint is responded to in a timely manner.

Members of the public can register complaints/concerns or submit questions via calls or emails at 311.org. DHR's Director of Finance and Administration will work with the 311 Team to ensure that responses meet or exceed 311's standards.

4. Specific details on where data will be stored (local, DT, SaaS, Cloud Storage) including name of vendor and retention period.

Data is only available to the IS Engineer, and is only accessible within the DHR Network. 

SFPUC also contracts camera-related services from the Citywide Technology Marketplace Contracts developed by SFOCA. Xtech, a vendor in the Marketplace, has been our Marketplace supplier.

Response

Camera footage has been useful in resolving incidents related to safety and security. SFPUC maintains an internal security incident log to capture crime and law enforcement incidents such as assault, theft, threats, trespassing, and vandalism. For reference, in 2021, there were 184 incidents and in 2020, there were 247 incidents. Camera footage is routinely used to investigate these incidents.

For example, footage from cameras was useful in the following incidents: On 3/25/2022, there was a trespasser who breached our SFPUC headquarters. SF Sheriff personnel utilitized our security cameras to identify the suspect. Additionally, on 5/31/2022, SFPUC noted a broken security gate at the SFPUC Tesla Water Treatment Facility in Tracy, California. Security camera footage identified that a vendor's chemical tanker leaving the facility was responsible for the damage. We are using the footage to aid in a formal claim against the company to recover costs for the gate's repair.

While the footage is imperative to the SFPUC's security and operations, the procurement process for the technology could be improved. SFPUC is continually repairing and replacing broken cameras. The current process of using the SFOCA Technology Marketplace to contract repair and replacement services is lengthy. Therefore, SFPUC is working on an SFPUC-wide Master As-Needed Construction Contract to streamline the procurement of SFPUC camera repairs.

Drones are flown within the confines of SFPUC property and not over residential zones. SFPUC property includes Southeast and Oceanside Treatment Plant located within San Francisco and the Peninsula, Alameda and Hetch Hetchy Watersheds.

As noted in the Business Justification Section of our Policy, SFPUC continues to find that using drones offers significant time and financial savings; it is much more cost effective to capture data aerially versus on the ground.

Additionally, using drones to document construction progress at capital projects, such as the Southeast Treatment Project Biosolids Sewer System Improvement Project, keeps staff out of safety-compromising situations.

Drones also improve data quality as locations (such as large watersheds or construction sites) can be difficult to canvas/access on the ground. The drone footage can even provide video and stills of areas that cannot be reached at street level.

Dear SFMTA Board of Directors,

My name is Marc Paulsen, and I am the current holder of taxi medallion 365. I am 80 years old and a native San Franciscan. I actively drove a taxi in San Francisco for forty-two years from 1970 until June of 2012, when I was diagnosed at the age of seventy with atrial

fibrillation. Aside from my heart condition, I also suffer from other medical conditions, such as lower back problems and swelling in my legs when sitting.

Regarding the matter of drug testing: Can you please advise me why the SFMTA is continuing to impose its unconstitutional policy of requiring retired and disabled medallion holders, who are no longer operating motor vehicles for hire and no longer in "Safety Sensitive Positions", to submit to annual drug and alcohol testing as a condition of renewing their A-Cards?

As you may know, the current "San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency Taxi Driver Drug and Alcohol Testing Policy" as written, is perfectly legal, but only as it applies to taxi drivers who are actively engaged in the operation of motor vehicles for hire. It does not in any way apply to those individuals who are no longer actively involved in the taxi industry as drivers. In fact, as I understand it, such drug testing policy is only Constitutionally permissible when there is a valid public interest to be protected by it. In the case of retired and disabled medallion holders, who are no longer driving and will never drive again, there is no such public interest to be protected because such individuals are no longer in a position to present any risk to public safety should they be physically or mentally impaired by the use of alcohol or drugs. Therefore, as such, current agency policy implementation, which fails to distinguish the difference between those who are in "Safety Sensitive Positions" and those who are not, seems to be in clear violation of the Fourth Amendment of the United States Constitution because it requires an unreasonable search of those individuals who are no longer actively driving taxis and no longer a risk to public safety.

That having been said, the stated purpose of the "Taxi Driver Drug and Alcohol Testing Policy" is to assure driver fitness for duty, and to protect the public from the risks posed by the use of alcohol and prohibited drugs. Hence, it is directed only at those individuals who are in "Safety Sensitive Positions" and cannot be directed at others who are not in such positions, otherwise it becomes an unreasonable search and thus a violation of the Fourth Amendment. Also, please note that California Public Utilities code 53075.5 section three paragraph i states, "Drivers shall test negative for each of the controlled substances specified in Part 40 (commencing with Section 40.1) of Title 49 of the Code of Federal Regulations, before employment. Drivers shall test negative for these controlled substances and for alcohol as a condition of permit renewal." Hence, it makes no reference to retired and disabled medallion holders, only to drivers.

Dear Mayor Breed,

I strongly urge you to direct San Francisco's Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC) to aggressively increase the city's investment in water recycling today.

This summer, a large and harmful algal bloom spread across the Bay, leaving unimaginable numbers of dead fish in its wake. We're still learning about this particular bloom, but what we do know is that San Francisco's sewage effluent contributes to excessive levels of nutrients in San Francisco Bay that make the Bay fertile territory for the spread of harmful algae blooms.

Water recycling and other wastewater management technologies can help by reducing the volume of polluted discharges into the Bay. In addition, by producing potable supplies, water recycling will reduce San Francisco's reliance on water diverted from the Tuolumne River, increasing the city's resilience to climate change effects on water supply.

Other cities have learned the lessons of California's unpredictable climate and are quickly adopting water recycling to reduce their burden on the ecosystem, while increasing the reliability of their supply. Orange County gets more than 75 percent of its water through its water reuse program. Las Vegas recycles nearly all of its water used indoors. And Los Angeles is on the path to reusing 100 percent of its wastewater by 2035.

But, as San Francisco's draft Urban Water Management Plan recently revealed, the city currently has no plans to make recycled water widely available in the next 25 years. Instead, the city is pursuing multiple expensive and misguided lawsuits so that it can continue to rely, almost exclusively, on the Tuolumne River—one of the state's most overtapped rivers—for the next several decades. San Francisco and large agribusiness water districts divert four out of every five gallons of water that flow in the Tuolumne River during a typical year.

This overuse has caused the river's once mighty Chinook Salmon populations to crash. Meanwhile, low freshwater flows contribute to deteriorating water quality—including harmful algae blooms—in the Delta and San Francisco Bay.

I agree with Supervisor Aaron Peskin that "it is time for San Francisco and our sister cities in the nine Bay Area counties to start looking at what kinds of infrastructure investments will need to be made as this becomes, sadly, the new normal." It's unacceptable for the city with the nation's greenest reputation to shirk its responsibilities to conserve California's precious and unpredictable water supply.

I support increasing river flows to protect San Francisco Bay's fisheries, water quality, and recreation. The city should do its part to protect the Bay and its rivers—water recycling is a common-sense way to limit the city's water use, increase the reliability of its supply, and protect the Bay from harmful wastewater treatment plant effluent.

To Supervisors, Mayor Breed, Office of Housing and Community Development, Department of Public Health Behavioral Health Services and SF Behavioral Health Commission:

We are neighbors of Grove House (GH), which is operated by Baker Places/Positive Resource Center (PRC). We are concerned that Baker Places/PRC is receiving significant taxpayer funds to provide subpar services to program participants, while also being a constant source of stress and trauma for GH neighbors. Providing a "home-like" environment for individuals in crisis, as Baker Places/PRC claims they are doing, shouldn't be done at the cost of the safety and well-being of neighbors, program participants, and staff.

Grove House has been closed for 19 months. It should remain closed and should be sold in order to recoup funds that Baker Places/PRC has misused.

We request an investigation into:

- 1. the purchase of the GH property
- 2. program operations and finances
- 3. program outcome metrics
- 4. utilization of emergency services (police, fire, and medical)
- 5. participant demographics, including whether sexual offenders or individuals with violent backgrounds have been program residents. (GH is located less than 500 feet from both New Traditions Elementary and NOPA Montessori Preschool, which should require them to adhere to Megan's Law. GH Management has not answered the Q of whether they accept sex offenders or individuals who may pose a risk to neighboring families.)
- 6. what individuals and agencies are responsible for referring individuals to GH for admission. (Did Lisa Pratt refer individuals to GH in her position as the City's "Director of Jail Health Services" while she was also receiving a salary from Baker Places/PRC?)

BACKGROUND

1) 2020 GROVE HOUSE PURCHASE VIA MAYOR'S OFFICE OF HOUSING

GH was purchased above market value with no notice to neighbors or opportunity for public comment. GH did not meet any parameters for the program it was funded through. The Mayor's Office Small Sites Program per unit cap was \$375k for the purchase of 5-10 unit properties. The price funded for GH was \$3.94M for a single unit. (Formerly 2 units, GH was illegally converted by Baker Places to single family.) GH has three bedrooms and accommodates nine beds. SF taxpayers paid \$1.3M per bedroom or \$438k per bed for GH. The purchase locks in this \$4M single family residence as below-market housing for 75 years.

From 1977 until 2020, GH was rented by Baker Places/PRC (GH Management). Despite decades to negotiate purchasing at a reasonable price, that didn't happen. When the owner notified Management that the property was being put up for sale, Baker Places sought funding through the City to purchase off-market. This was

accomplished in Jan 2020. The Mayor's Office of Housing allocated \$3.94M to acquire the property. GH was purchased for \$2.45M (the balance for renovations). Market rate should have been \$750k-\$1.25M less than what was paid.

If Baker Places/PRC was financially accountable to anyone, this purchase never would have been approved. It is a waste of taxpayer funds. And throwing money at a poorly run program to keep it open—just to be able to say the number of beds hasn't decreased, as DPH and MOHCD did here—makes zero sense; it's also the perfect way to encourage an underperforming organization to continue in their ways.

2) NEGLIGENCE TOWARDS NEIGHBORS

GH has been a problem for our neighborhood for a long time. Baker Places/PRC has refused to incorporate measures to insure the safety and privacy of neighbors and has been unaccountable for issues related to both staff and residents' behavior. Program participants and staff smoke constantly in front of GH and neighboring homes. An adjacent property has been lit on fire by cigarette butts more than once. GH residents staring into neighbors' windows or garages is commonplace. An unsupervised GH resident opened and entered the front door of a neighbor's home and walked up a flight of stairs where they were met by the homeowner. Incidents involving yelling, violence, indecent activity, damage to property, and trespassing have frequently occurred. Police and ambulances are regularly at GH at all hours. Drug and alcohol paraphernalia are often found in adjacent backyards. Neighbors have witnessed residents being kicked out of the program who are put out on the street in front of GH (with trash bags holding their possessions) and who stand there screaming for hours until police are called.

3) NEGLIGENCE TOWARDS PROGRAM PARTICIPANTS: 2021 SUICIDE

In February of 2021, just before closing for renovation, a resident committed suicide off the back stairs of the building. Staff handled this incident especially badly. They went next door and requested entrance to the adjacent property to search the neighbor's yard where they believed the program resident's body had fallen. Unfortunately, a teenager was home alone. Staff did not ask to speak with an adult. Instead, after drawing the child's attention to the body that was visible from inside the neighbor's home, staff realized the body was actually in the GH yard—which they had not checked.

Baker Places/PRC failed completely in their duty of care to everyone involved in this situation.

4) UNDER-QUALIFIED & OVERWORKED STAFF

Grove House staff (who work directly with program participants) are **not required to take drug tests**. A recent conversation with a former GH employee (an experienced mental health worker) included the following quotes:

5) GROVE HOUSE RENOVATION: WASTED OPPORTUNITY

Adjacent neighbors were hopeful that the upcoming renovation could help GH and neighbors co-exist more harmoniously going forward. Beginning in June 2020, they repeatedly requested meetings to discuss issues of concern and collaborate on ideas for solutions (and review the possibility of hazardous materials-contamination due to the decaying lead and asbestos on the building's exterior). GH staff and management ignored these requests.

In the summer of 2021, the property was suddenly vacant: mail was left piling up at the front door; furniture and appliances were dumped on the sidewalk, and a collection of large waste bins was left in front of the property. For months, to insure that the property didn't appear as abandoned as it actually was, neighbors collected the mail that accumulated on the landing (piles that included program-participants' sensitive information) and called 311 multiple times to have abandoned furniture and appliances picked up. During this time, there was a break-in, and thieves used GH to access neighboring properties. GH neighbors closed up the building after the break-in because the property was left with doors wide open.

The stress of dealing with Baker Places/PRC's neglect didn't end when renovation started. Despite an official "site specific work plan" related to the known lead and asbestos, the first thing contractors did was to contaminate a neighboring property with asbestos and lead. After acknowledging responsibility, Management continued to use the same contractor for the additional work of handling hazardous materials in other areas of the building, which then caused additional hazardous-materials' exposure to neighboring properties.

Baker Places/PRC has repeatedly shown negligence in their treatment of program participants, in their stewardship of 2153 Grove, and in response to neighbors' concerns. We are neighbors of Grove House (GH), which is operated by Baker Places/Positive Resource Center (PRC). We are concerned that Baker Places/PRC is receiving significant taxpayer funds to provide subpar services to program participants, while also being a constant source of stress and trauma for GH neighbors. Providing a "home-like" environment for individuals in crisis, as Baker Places/PRC claims they are doing, shouldn't be done at the cost of the safety and well-being of neighbors, program participants, and staff. **Grove House has been closed for 19 months. It should remain closed and should be sold in order to recoup funds that Baker Places/PRC has misused.**

We request an investigation into:

- 1) the purchase of the GH property
- 2) program operations and finances
- 3) program outcome metrics
- 4) utilization of emergency services (police, fire, and medical)
- 5) participant demographics, including whether sexual offenders or individuals with violent backgrounds have been program residents. (GH is located less than 500 feet from both New Traditions Elementary and NOPA Montessori Preschool, which should require them to adhere to Megan's Law. GH Management has not answered the Q of whether they accept sex offenders or individuals who may pose a risk to neighboring families.)
- 6) what individuals and agencies are responsible for referring individuals to GH for admission. (Did Lisa Pratt refer individuals to GH in her position as the City's "Director of Jail Health Services" while she was also receiving a salary from Baker Places/PRC?)

BACKGROUND

1) 2020 GROVE HOUSE PURCHASE VIA MAYOR'S OFFICE OF HOUSING

GH was purchased above market value with no notice to neighbors or opportunity for public comment. GH did not meet any parameters for the program it was funded through. The Mayor's Office Small Sites Program per unit cap was \$375k for the purchase of 5-10 unit properties. The price funded for GH was \$3.94M for a single unit. (Formerly 2 units, GH was illegally converted by Baker Places to single family.) GH has three bedrooms and accommodates nine beds. SF taxpayers paid \$1.3M per bedroom or \$438k per bed for GH. The purchase locks in this \$4M single family residence as below-market housing for 75 years.

From 1977 until 2020, GH was rented by Baker Places/PRC (GH Management). Despite decades to negotiate purchasing at a reasonable price, that didn't happen. When the owner notified Management that the property was being put up for sale, Baker Places sought funding through the City to purchase off-market. This was accomplished in Jan 2020. The Mayor's Office of Housing allocated \$3.94M to acquire the property. GH was purchased for \$2.45M (the balance for renovations). Market rate should have been \$750k-\$1.25M less than what was paid.

If Baker Places/PRC was financially accountable to anyone, this purchase never would have been approved. It is a waste of taxpayer funds. And throwing money at a poorly run program to keep it open—just to be able to say the number of beds hasn't decreased, as DPH and MOHCD did here—makes zero sense; it's also the perfect way to encourage an underperforming organization to continue in their ways.

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Baker Places/PRC failed completely in their duty of care to everyone involved in this situation.

Our area businesses are at their wits end.

As San Francisco faces an economic reckoning with business leaving the City at a fast pace leaving behind a greatly reduced tax base, it is beyond comprehension that businesses who remain invested in SF - putting forth positive efforts to maintain and grow their business, providing jobs, tax revenue and beautification to our communities - are pushed to the back burner time and time again.

One of the many examples of this is the lack of enforcement when it comes to regulating parking which provides availability and accessibility for our business owners and their clients, workers, area residents and students.

Attached please find photographs of a group of three large RV's, a van and four sedans that have been parked on our surrounding block for over two weeks without any enforcement. These vehicles appear to come from other parts of California - Bakersfield, Sacramento. In addition to taking away parking opportunities for our customers and their workers, the high profile of the vehicles blocks sight lines to businesses and provides cover for criminal activity.

These (and other) vehicles received no parking tickets while parked on these blocks for weeks at a time, while the business owners, their clients, and workers continue to receive parking tickets for meter and time limit violations. This has not gone unnoticed.

Our request is not to do away with enforcement all together. Throwing policies out the window or applying enforcement unevenly, only enhances chaos and frustration to the detriment of all.

Our request is to turn focus and start taking care of the City's tax generating businesses - both large and small, and its' productive residents who work hard against difficult odds to keep our communities viable. Reasonable parking enforcement policies are one small but important move in the right direction.



There is more and more trash.

This is getting worse every day.

Thank you for all the great questions, Rachel. That's the info we need and the action we need

I've done 311 requests 3 times this past week. The RV that is parked closest to our house (closest to Judah) on the lower great Highway now has a full tent set up in the street blocking additional parking. Right now there is smoke coming from the tent area which is either a grill or makeshift fire, but in either case seems wildly unsafe since it's right by the vegetation along the lower great highway. Again, the public street is not an RV park but is being treated as such. Yesterday all but one RV had trash and garbage strewn everywhere, and all those same vehicles have encampments associated at this point that are up in the grassy area.

One of the people who is down near Lincoln and LGH is particularly problematic. Her name is

Lexi and she is aggressive and threatening. She screams obscenities and threats at the top of her lungs and scares my kids when she's around. She was in the tent encampment that was cleared several weeks ago.

Providing an update because we neighbors are dealing with this on the daily. It's frustrating to see things stay the same or get worse day by day while we wait to figure out how the city agencies can work together to solve this.

From our office's understanding, Taraval Station officers had resumed issuing citations. More than 20 citations have been issued two weeks ago. At the same time, we also learn that MTA has a policy to waive homeless individuals' citations of up to \$1500. (One-time waiver).

Here are some options that MTA lists to prevent RVs from parking there...

- 1. Time limits (1 hours, 2 hours and 4 hours parking)
- 2. Residential parking permits (Neighbors have to pay approximately \$165 annually for a parking permit)
- 3. Parking meters
- 4. No Parking midnight 6am
- 5. No stopping at any time/Red curb

MTA's analysis is most of the burden resulting from these measures would likely fall on local residents. Since there is an one-time waiver program in place..



I've done 311 requests 3 times this past week. The RV that is parked closest to our house (closest to Judah) on the lower great Highway now has a full tent set up in the street blocking additional parking. Right now there is smoke coming from the tent area which is either a grill or makeshift fire, but in either case seems wildly unsafe since it's right by the vegetation along the lower great highway. Again, the public street is not an RV park but is being treated as such. Yesterday all but one RV had trash and garbage strewn everywhere, and all those same vehicles have encampments associated at this point that are up in the grassy area.

One of the people who is down near Lincoln and LGH is particularly problematic. Her name is

Lexi and she is aggressive and threatening. She screams obscenities and threats at the top of her lungs and scares my kids when she's around. She was in the tent encampment that was cleared several weeks ago.

Providing an update because we neighbors are dealing with this on the daily. It's frustrating to see things stay the same or get worse day by day while we wait to figure out how the city agencies can work together to solve this.

From our office's understanding, Taraval Station officers had resumed issuing citations. More than 20 citations have been issued two weeks ago. At the same time, we also learn that MTA has a policy to waive homeless individuals' citations of up to \$1500. (One-time waiver).

Here are some options that MTA lists to prevent RVs from parking there...

- 1. Time limits (1 hours, 2 hours and 4 hours parking)
- 2. Residential parking permits (Neighbors have to pay approximately \$165 annually for a parking permit)
- 3. Parking meters
- 4. No Parking midnight 6am
- 5. No stopping at any time/Red curb

MTA's analysis is most of the burden resulting from these measures would likely fall on local residents. Since there is an one-time waiver program in place..

Here is the latest update I have.



I've done 311 requests 3 times this past week. The RV that is parked closest to our house (closest to Judah) on the lower great Highway now has a full tent set up in the street blocking additional parking. Right now there is smoke coming from the tent area which is either a grill or makeshift fire, but in either case seems wildly unsafe since it's right by the vegetation along the lower great highway. Again, the public street is not an RV park but is being treated as such. Yesterday all but one RV had trash and garbage strewn everywhere, and all those same vehicles have encampments associated at this point that are up in the grassy area. One of the people who is down near Lincoln and LGH is particularly problematic. Her name is Lexi and she is aggressive and threatening. She screams obscenities and threats at the top of her lungs and scares my kids when she's around. She was in the tent encampment that was cleared several weeks ago.

Providing an update because we neighbors are dealing with this on the daily. It's frustrating to see things stay the same or get worse day by day while we wait to figure out how the city agencies can work together to solve this.

From our office's understanding, Taraval Station officers had resumed issuing citations. More than 20 citations have been issued two weeks ago. At the same time, we also learn that MTA has a policy to waive homeless individuals' citations of up to \$1500. (One-time waiver).

Here are some options that MTA lists to prevent RVs from parking there...

- 1. Time limits (1 hours, 2 hours and 4 hours parking)
- 2. Residential parking permits (Neighbors have to pay approximately \$165 annually for a parking permit)
- 3. Parking meters
- 4. No Parking midnight 6am
- 5. No stopping at any time/Red curb

MTA's analysis is most of the burden resulting from these measures would likely fall on local residents. Since there is an one-time waiver program in place..

Supervisor Ronen,

We have had a tent completely blocking the sidewalk across from the safe sleeping site on Shotwell at 26th Street. Numerous calls have been made to the SF police department and complaints have been filed with 311. Pedestrians cannot walk on the sidewalk at all. The tent grew to two over the weekend and they have added additional items, some of which are on our private property.

There is garbage littering the gutter all along Shotwell and 26th Street. On 26th Street there was a man passed out a few feet away from vomit and human feces. These conditions are very disturbing to families that are coming and going to work or taking their children to school.

These encampments continue to be a nuisance and jeopardize the health and safety of the tenants whose windows and doors are a few feet away. Tenants feel unsafe and keep their doors, windows and blinds closed for this reason.

Response and removal of these encampments must move swifter and tenants should not be forced to endure these unsafe situations for prolonged periods of time.

PLEASE help us with removal of these tents.
