As mothers who have kids suffering from addiction in San Francisco, we are urging you to Vote No on extending the lease for the Tenderloin Center.

While the City has tried to justify the TLC and "wellness hubs" as low barrier access to services that "saves lives," the outcomes are debatable. The Tenderloin Center is far less effective than the city's other overdose prevention programs, accounting for just 5% of overdose reversals. It has brought major unintended consequences, including magnifying the open drug scene which in turn exacerbates the addiction crisis.


Even if you ignore these factors, there is no possible justification for the TLC—or any such "wellness hub"—when there are so many higher priority gaps in treatment, and clearly not enough budget to fund them all. We have been alarmed to discover how many groups have testified to the gaps during the recent **Board of Supervisor hearings** (Public Safety Conditions at the Psychiatric Emergency Services Unit at San Francisco General Hospital 7/28/22, Treatment On Demand 10/27/22).

Do we really have the budget for: Market-rate pay for frontline workers? Security staff for the Psychiatric Emergency Services Unit at SF General? Dual diagnosis programs? Step down housing? Trauma-responsive low-barrier programs? Language, age and culturally appropriate programs? Until the City has budgeted for all these critical needs and clarified the risk mitigation for the "unintended consequences" of "wellness hubs," it would be morally outrageous and legally risky to fund them.

In summary, here are our top 3 reasons to Vote No on extending the TLC contract:

3 Reasons to Vote NO on Extending the TLC Contract

 While the main justification for the TLC is to reverse ODs, the site has reversed just 5% of overdoses to date. (It's unclear if these are incremental or would have been reversed by EMS or the community. It's also unclear if people try riskier drugs in the TLC, because it's "safe" and then they are more likely to OD than they would otherwise.) In contrast, the City's effort to engage the community in reversing overdoses has been extremely effective, far less expensive and easier to scale. (Data source: Tenderloin Emergency Initiative)



As someone from the Treatment on Demand Committee testified during a recent BOS hearing, "we need to assess our programs and make sure we are not making the problem worse." Indeed, instead of reducing open drug scenes, by all appearances the TLC has magnified them.

 The capacity of the TLC is far too small to support all users; this in turn justifies people congregating next door in UN Plaza to use there, which in turn draws in dealers, and creates a party scene so outrageous that it's been the subject of international media attention.
- b.

 The party scene around the TLC draws more people in; kids of our members including teenagers buy drugs outside the TLC freely. One teen said, "Anything you want, you can buy in the Tenderloin." The City's ambiguity about illicit drug use makes it unrealistic for the police to

monitor and manage.

- 3. Compared to the the mission-critical treatment needs as expressed in BOS hearings recently, the TLC and "well-ness hubs" are at best a luxury; examples:
 - a. Treatment gaps in criminal justice referrals are failing our most vulnerable people; this lack of treatment after (or instead of) incarceration runs completely counter to San Francisco's aspiration to provide "equitable" treatment for marginalized communities. Here are some of the issues mentioned by the offices of Criminal Justice and Public Defender at recent BOS hearings.
 - There are only two clinicians while there are 850 clients at present needing to be placed
 - ii.Paperwork is complex and slows the process down 2-6 months before a client gets placed into treatment

iii.

Too few appropriate facilities creates more risk of failure ("appropriate" includes language, culture, age, dual diagnosis)

iv.

Gaps between treatment create high failure risk (e.g., discharge \rightarrow residential treatment; residential treatment \rightarrow step down)

 Working conditions at the Psychiatric Emergency Services Unit at SF General are stressful and dangerous.

> High acuity conditions (volatile patients) and low security presence create stressful and dangerous conditions; security guards per patient ratio is only 1:19 (compared to 1:4 at UCSF)

 Hiring experienced staff is difficult due to below-market pay and difficult working conditions

iii.

The staff shortage requires nurses to work overtime and do ancillary work; nurses have made over 50 complaints in a few months about risks including violent and suicidal patients

 Staff shortages at the City's BAART clinic is preventing users from entering this normally low-barrier treatment modality

i.

Mayor Breed one year ago said the City would have around the clock hours at BAART

ii.Since then, BAART intake still has not expanded its hours (6am-10am, M-F)

iii.

Even with these limited intake hours, **BAART** has canceled several intake appointments of people in our community (and how many others?), leaving treatment seekers on the street, due to staffing shortages

iv.

Meanwhile, the DPH had a hiring surge in April and still didn't staff these BAART intake positions

As Governor Newsom said in vetoing SB57, the risks posed by SCSs can outweigh the benefits. Not once has the City listed the "unintended consequences" and risk mitigation from these sites. We do not believe the City has the resources to manage these risks especially when other cities including Vancouver, Calgary and Harlem have already shown they attract more dealers and users, affecting the city's resources and community. Instead of funding "supervised consumption," let's use this moment to create a visionary new model that unambiguously uplifts people suffering from addiction.

Thank you for all your office's attention to the needs of our district and investing in the Tenderloin Linkage Center. We have become aware that there is no plan to open a new center before the existing center closes and no plans for continuity of care. As Tenderloin organizations and organizations serving Tenderloin residents, we are deeply concerned with ensuring that those currently being served by the Tenderloin Linkage Center do not face interruptions in care. The closure is imminent, and the Department of Public Health has announced that three new hubs will be opening. We would like your administrations to switch gears and ensure that the city opens a hub in the Tenderloin at an existing or new site, has an opening date for a new hub in the Tenderloin, and a plan for continuity of equivalent level services for clients currently being served.

We believe the closure can be coordinated in a way that does not unnecessarily harm our constituents and neighbors by abruptly shutting down life-saving services with no replacement(s) or outreach plan to inform folks of location(s) for new services. In particular, we want to avoid a scenario where shutting down the Tenderloin Center puts people in heightened danger of fatal overdoses and other fatal health risks. Currently, over 400 people visit the center daily and have access to showers, bathrooms, referrals to service, and respite off the street. We also want to make sure that every current client of the Tenderloin center has reasonable notice about both the closure and the location, services, and hours of where they will be able to go.

Under no circumstances can we safely and responsibly shut down the Tenderloin Center without a replacement. As Tenderloin organizations, we are prepared to help make that happen. Please respond to this letter in writing with an opening date for a new Tenderloin hub and plans to work with the Tenderloin community to craft a plan that outlines continuity of services.

- Drug overdose deaths were not reduced over the last 6 month period as compared to last year;

**Bill Whitfield** Shorenstein Realty The grave public safety issues caused by the Tenderloin Center in Mid Market, namely blatant open-air drug use and dealing, have been profoundly detrimental to the surrounding community since its opening. Drug dealers and other predators have flocked to the area (for several blocks out) to prey on Tenderloin Center clients; where family, friends, employees, shoppers

and quests of the local community now fear to tread.

Even if the Center were meeting its goals, we would still be advocating for its closure at the current location. Unfortunately, there has been no decrease in open air drug use in the area. There has in fact been a significant increase. And the last 6 months of overdose death data released by the San Francisco Medical Examiner's office show an 'increase' in the number of overdose deaths in 2022 compared to 2021 (see table below), demonstrating that the Tenderloin Center has failed its primary mission to decrease overdose

deaths.

Please discontinue this pilot program this December as promised.

Dear Mayor Breed,

Thank you for all your office's attention to the needs of our district and investing in the Tenderloin Linkage Center. We have become aware that there is no plan to open a new center before the existing center closes and no plans for continuity of care. As Tenderloin organizations and organizations serving Tenderloin residents, we are deeply concerned with ensuring that those currently being served by the Tenderloin Linkage Center do not face interruptions in care. The closure is imminent, and DPH has announced that three new hubs will be opening. We would like your administrations to switch gears and ensure that the city opens a hub in the Tenderloin at an existing or new site, has an opening date for a new hub in the Tenderloin, and a plan for continuity of equivalent level services for clients currently being served.

We believe the closure can be coordinated in a way that does not unnecessarily harm our constituents and neighbors by abruptly shutting down life-saving services with no replacement(s) or outreach plan to inform folks of location(s) for new services. In particular we want to avoid a scenario where shutting down the Tenderloin Center puts people in heightened danger of fatal overdoses and other fatal health risks. Currently over 400 people visit the center daily and have access to showers, bathrooms, referrals to service and respite off the street. We also want to make sure that every current client of the TL center has reasonable notice about both the closure and the location, services and hours of where they will be able to go.

Under no circumstances can we safely and responsibly shut down the center without a replacement. As Tenderloin organizations, we are prepared to help make that happen. Please respond to this letter in writing with an opening date for a new Tenderloin hub and plans to work with the Tenderloin community to craft a plan that outlines continuity of services.

# BREAKING NEWS-Coalition Urges City Government to Prevent Loss of Tenderloin Center Services, Save Lives

## \*\*\*Media Advisory\*\*\*

The Safer Inside coalition calls on the City to ensure that vital lifesaving health and hygiene services continue to be provided for Tenderloin residents, even as the Tenderloin Center closes.

SAN FRANCISCO, November 3, 2022–The Safer Inside Coalition is holding a press conference on Thursday, November 4, at 9:00 AM on the steps of City Hall, calling on the City of San Francisco to ensure there is no loss of services when the Tenderloin Center closes. The Coalition and speakers at the press conference are urging the City to continue services, regardless of the Center's closure in December.

Although the San Francisco Department of Public Health committed to opening "wellness hubs" during a recent <u>Board of Supervisors hearing</u> and in their <u>Overdose Prevention Plan</u>, community members are demanding more immediate action to ensure that there is continuity of services as the Tenderloin Center closes. They assert that the closure can be coordinated in a way that

does not unnecessarily harm people using the services by abruptly shutting down life-saving services with no replacement(s) or outreach plan to inform community members of location(s) for new services. There are serious concerns about shutting down the Tenderloin Center and putting people in heightened danger of fatal overdoses and other fatal health risks especially when the Tenderloin Center has reversed 280 overdoses. Currently, over 400 people visit the center daily and have access to showers, bathrooms, referrals to services and respite off the street. Fifty organizations have signed a <u>letter</u> demanding that the Mayor's Office "ensure that the city opens a hub in the Tenderloin at an existing or new site, has an opening date for a new hub in the Tenderloin, and a plan for continuity of equivalent level services for clients currently being served." The letter also requests that every current client of the Tenderloin Center has reasonable notice about both the closure and information about location(s), services and hours of where they will be able to go to replace the existing services.

The press conference will be in advance of the Board of Supervisors Government Audit and Oversight Committee meeting, during which the Supervisors will discuss and vote on a <u>resolution</u>, introduced by Supervisor Dean Preston, urging the City to ensure a continuity of services.

#### The Gubbio Project:

"The TL Center has been a vital life line to the people that we serve. Since it opened, day after day, our staff have referred our guests to the array of centralized services at the TL Center. People love the harm reduction model and appreciate being able to be seen by providers who allow people who are using drugs to access the space without judgment. We've heard directly about the success of this program in the form of multiple individuals securing housing, finding treatment options, connecting directly to City staff and departments in person, securing shelter referral and finding access to much needed hygiene services. Before the TL Center closes, we ask that these services be set up and transitioned to wellness hubs as quickly as possible so that there is no gap in support and wellness for our neighbors." #### GLIDE:

"We are grateful to Supervisor Dean Preston for championing this urgent resolution," said GLIDE's Senior Policy Manager, Wesley Saver. "At the same time, we are deeply concerned that San Francisco lacks adequate resources to meet an undeniable need. It is critical that the City maintain and expand access to low-threshold, dignified, life-saving community health services before the December closure of the Tenderloin Center. This is a matter of survival, and we must urgently invest in an evidence-based continuum of care to prevent overdose deaths and widening disparities in health outcomes. Providers, such as those at the Tenderloin Center, are serving some of the most vulnerable members of our communities, and we will continue to

call for the resources needed to address the ongoing overdose crisis and achieve health equity."

#### HealthRIGHT 360:

"We strongly believe that before the Tenderloin Center is closed, there needs to be a replacement in place," said CEO of HealthRIGHT 360 Vitka Eisen. "We worry for people that rely on the Tenderloin Center, closing a place that provides over 400 people a day with dignity and community health services, will cause pain and suffering to a group of people who already experience a significant amount of trauma - placing them at risk of a fatal overdose."

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<u>Safer Inside</u> is a coalition of community-based organizations, researchers, people who use drugs, public health experts, frontline workers, activists, and community members who are invested in ending fatal overdose in the Bay Area.
