- 1. WHEREAS, on June 7, 2022, Supervisor Walton introduced a proposed Resolution under Board of Supervisors (hereinafter "Board") File No. 220716 to initiate the Landmark designation process for St. James Presbyterian Church (240 Leland Avenue), Assessor's Parcel Block No. 6246, Lot No. 012; and
- 2. WHEREAS, on July 11, 2022, the Board of Supervisors at its Land Use and Transportation Committee meeting voted unanimously to Recommend to the full Board approval of the Resolution to initiate Landmark Designation (Board File No. 220716); and
- 3. WHEREAS, on July 19, 2022, the Board voted unanimously to adopt the Resolution to initiate Landmark Designation, and on July 28, 2022, Resolution No. 337-22 became effective (Board File No. 220716); and
- 4. WHEREAS, Department Staff, who meet the Secretary of Interior's Professional Qualification Standards, prepared the Landmark Designation Fact Sheet for St. James Presbyterian Church (240 Leland Avenue), which

was reviewed for accuracy and conformance with the purposes and standards of Article 10; and

- 5. WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission, at its regular meeting of November 2, 2022, reviewed Department staff's analysis of St. James Presbyterian Church historical significance pursuant to Article 10 as part of the Landmark Designation Executive Summary dated October 26, 2022, and recommended Landmark designation through this Resolution; and
- 6. WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission finds that the nomination of St. James Presbyterian Church as a Landmark is in the form prescribed by the Historic Preservation Commission and contains supporting historic, architectural, and/or cultural documentation; and
- 7. WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission finds that St. James Presbyterian Church is eligible for local designation for its association with events that have made a culturally, historically, and architecturally significant contribution to the broad patterns of San Francisco history and represents the work of an architect of merit; and
- 8. WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission finds that the designation of St. James Presbyterian Church, originally established in 1908 and one of the oldest religious congregations in southeastern San Francisco, is proper for its association with early development of the Visitacion Valley neighborhood; and
- 9. WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission finds that the designation of St. James Presbyterian Church is also proper given its architectural significance as it is a representative example of the work of architect of merit Julia Morgan; and
- 10. WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission finds that St. James Presbyterian Church meets one of the Historic Preservation Commission's four priority areas for designation: property types in underrepresented geographies in the city. There are no other designated landmarks in the Visitacion Valley neighborhood. St. James Presbyterian Church was selected as the first prospective landmark for the neighborhood during an online campaign, co-sponsored by SF Heritage and the Visitacion Valley History Project, to address this lack of representation in the city's landmark program. Within this portion of San Francisco, the closest designated landmarks are Arthur H. Coleman Medical Center (6301 3rd Street, Landmark No. 279) and University Mound Old Ladies Home (350 University Street, Landmark No. 269); and
- 11. WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission finds that St. James Presbyterian Church meet the eligibility requirements of Section 1004 of the Planning Code and warrants consideration for Article 10 landmark designation; and
- 12. WHEREAS, the Historic Preservation Commission finds that the boundaries and the list of character-defining features, as identified in the Landmark Designation Fact Sheet, should be considered for preservation under the proposed landmark designation as they relate to the building's architectural and historical significance and retain historical integrity; and
- 13. WHEREAS, the proposed designation is consistent with the General Plan priority policies pursuant to Planning Code, Section 101.1 and furthers Priority Policy No. 7, which states that landmarks and historic buildings be preserved, and will serve the public necessity, convenience and welfare pursuant to Planning Code, Section



302; and

14. WHEREAS, the Department has determined that landmark designation is not defined as a project under CEQA Guidelines Section 15060(c) and 15378 because it does not result in a physical change in the environment; and,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Historic Preservation Commission hereby recommends to the Board of Supervisors approval of landmark designation of St. James Presbyterian Church (240 Leland Avenue), Assessor's Parcel Block No. 6246, Lot No. 012 consistent with the purposes and standards of Article 10 of the Planning Code.

#### **Property Description**

St. James Presbyterian Church is located on north side of Leland Avenue at junction with Cora Street, between Rutland and Delta streets, in the Visitacion Valley neighborhood (Assessor's Block 6246, Lot 012). The subject property is located at the west end of the commercial portion of Leland Avenue that runs from Bayshore Boulevard to Cora Street. The surrounding block is characterized by one- to three-story, residential buildings interspersed with institutional buildings, such as the Visitacion Valley Branch Library, the Boys & Girls Clubs of San Francisco, and the Visitacion Valley Playground. Residential buildings are generally built to the sidewalk although there are a variety of building setbacks.

St. James Presbyterian Church was established in 1908 with 69 members. The current building, which replaced the congregation's first chapel, was constructed in 1922 based on a design by renowned architect Julia Morgan. The Presbyterian Board of National Missions provided a \$2800 grant towards construction of the new church building that cost approximately \$9500. The new building was dedicated on March 13, 1923.

St. James Presbyterian Church is a two-story, Mission Revival and Arts and Crafts style, wood-frame building clad with smooth stucco and horizontal wood drop-lap siding. The three-part façade composition is expressed as a tall central mass with a front-facing gable roof with bracketed eave overhang flanked by shorter, narrow wings with side-facing gable roofs with open overhanging eaves. The building has a reverse T-shaped footprint with the side elevations setback from the side property lines to allow for windows in the sanctuary. Façade fenestration is limited to arched openings with either contemporary metal security doors or metal security gates and small stained-glass rosette windows at the narrow side wings and a wide window bay that extends full height at center of façade and is flanked by thick, stucco clad, pilasters. Within the window bay there are: a band of three, six-light, wood casement windows with simple wood trim; a large wood-framed opening with a stained-glass window; and a wood-framed arched opening with an arched, stained-glass window. The stained-glass at façade depicts the Parable of the Sower. On the side elevations, the upper floor, where sanctuary is located, is fenestrated by paired casement wood sash below a fixed transom; glazing is stained-glass of an Arts and Crafts-style rectilinear design.

At the interior, the sanctuary of St. James Presbyterian Church is located on the second floor with primary access from stairway at front of building. The Arts and Crafts-style sanctuary is a long open room with carpeted floor, contemporary wood pews, and an open wood paneled ceiling featuring curved bracket and exposed wood trusses with metal bolts and fasteners. Walls are plaster above wood wainscot with window openings framed with wood. At north end of room (opposite the stair landing) is a raised platform; wainscotting in this space is taller with inset painted plaster/wood panels and projecting cornice.

#### **Project Description**

The Historic Preservation Commission is requested to make a recommendation to the Board of Supervisors regarding Landmark designation of the St. James Presbyterian Church, including interior of the sanctuary. The pending Landmark designation was initiated by the Board of Supervisors.

On June 7, 2022, Supervisor Walton introduced a proposed Resolution under Board of Supervisors (hereinafter "Board") File No. 220716 to initiate the Landmark designation of St. James Presbyterian Church. At hearing of the Land Use Committee of the Board on July 11, 2022, the committee voted unanimously to Recommend to the full Board approval of the Resolution to initiate Landmark Designation. On July 19, 2022, the Board voted unanimously to approve the Resolution, and on July 28, 2022, with the Mayor's signature, Resolution No. 337-22 initiating landmark designation of St. James Presbyterian Church became effective.

#### **Compliance With Planning Code**

#### Article 10 of the Planning Code.

The executive summary and analysis under review was prepared by Department preservation staff, who meet the Secretary of the Interior's professional qualifications. The Department has determined that the subject property meets the requirements for eligibility as an individual landmark pursuant to Article 10 of the Planning Code. The justification for its inclusion is explained in detail in the attached Landmark Designation Fact Sheet, and briefly in this Executive Summary.



Significance: St. James Presbyterian Church, 240 Leland Avenue, organized by Presbytery of San Francisco as its first Filipino ministry in late 1980s, was originally established in 1908 and is one of the oldest religious congregations in Visitacion Valley. The current building was constructed in 1922 based on design by renowned architect Julia Morgan. St. James is representative of broad patterns of San Francisco history and is historically significant for its association with early development of the Visitacion Valley neighborhood. St. James Presbyterian Church is also architecturally significant as an example of the work of architect of merit, Julia Morgan.

Underrepresented Landmark Types: The proposed landmark designation meets one of the Historic Preservation Commission's four priority areas for designation: property types in underrepresented geographies in the city. There are no other designated landmarks in the Visitacion Valley neighborhood. St. James Presbyterian Church was selected as the first prospective landmark for the neighborhood during an online campaign, co-sponsored by SF Heritage and the Visitacion Valley History Project, to address this lack of representation in the city's landmark program. Within this portion of San Francisco, the closest designated landmarks are: Arthur H. Coleman Medical Center (6301 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, Landmark No. 279) and University Mound Old Ladies Home (350 University Street, Landmark No. 269).

**Integrity:** St. James Presbyterian Church (240 Leland Avenue), including the interior of the sanctuary, maintains a high level of integrity. See Page 2 of attached Landmark Designation Fact Sheet for further analysis.

Character-Defining Features: Exterior and interior character-defining features of St. James Presbyterian Church (240 Leland Avenue) are identified in the attached Landmark Designation Fact Sheet on Pages 2-3.

**Boundaries of the Landmark:** The proposed Landmark encompasses St. James Presbyterian Church at 240 Leland Avenue, Assessor's Parcel Block No. 6246, Lot No. 012.

#### General Plan.

The Urban Design Element of the San Francisco General Plan contains the following relevant objectives and policies:

#### OBJECTIVE 2

CONSERVATION OF RESOURCES THAT PROVIDE A SENSE OF NATURE, CONTINUITY WITH THE PAST, AND FREEDOM FROM OVERCROWDING.

#### Policy 4

Preserve notable landmarks and areas of historic, architectural or aesthetic value, and promote the preservation of other buildings and features that provide continuity with past development.

Designating significant historic resources as local landmarks will further continuity with the past because the buildings will be preserved for the benefit of future generations.

**Planning Code Section 101.1** – establishes the Eight Priority Policies and requires review of permits for consistency with said policies. On balance, the proposed designation is consistent with the Eight Priority Policies, and furthers Policy Number 7, which states that landmarks and historic buildings be preserved.



#### **Landmark Designation Procedures**

#### **Action by Historic Preservation Commission.**

The Historic Preservation Commission on February 4, 2009, by Resolution No. 001, adopted the National Register Criteria as its methodology for recommending landmark designation of historic resources. Under the National Register Criteria, the quality of significance in American history, architecture, archaeology, engineering, and culture is present in districts, sites, buildings, structures, and objects that possess integrity of location, design, setting, feeling, materials, workmanship, and association, and that are associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history; or that are associated with the lives of persons significant in our past; or that embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction; or properties that have yielded, or may likely yield, information important in prehistory or history.

#### Article 10 of the Planning Code.

Section 1004 of the Planning Code authorizes the landmark designation of an individual structure or other feature or an integrated group of structures and features on a single lot or site, having special character or special historical, architectural or aesthetic interest or value, as a landmark. Section 1004.1 also outlines that landmark designation may be initiated by the Board of Supervisors or the Historic Preservation Commission and the initiation shall include findings in support. Section 1004.2 states that once initiated, the proposed designation is referred to the Historic Preservation Commission for a report and recommendation to the Board of Supervisors to approve, disapprove or modify the proposal.

Pursuant to Section 1004.2 of the Planning Code, if the Historic Preservation Commission approves the designation, a copy of the resolution of approval is transmitted to the Board of Supervisors without referral to the Planning Commission. The Board of Supervisors shall hold a public hearing on the designation and may approve, modify or disapprove the designation.

Section 1004(b) requires that the designating ordinance approved by the Board of Supervisors shall include the location and boundaries of the landmark site, a description of the characteristics of the landmark which justify its designation, and a description of the particular features that should be preserved.

If the Historic Preservation Commission approves the proposed designation recommendation, a copy of the resolution of approval is transmitted to the Board of Supervisors, which holds a public hearing on the designation and may approve, modify or disapprove the designation (Section 1004.3). If the Historic Preservation Commission disapproves the proposed designation, such action shall be final, except upon the filing of a valid appeal to the Board of Supervisors within 30 days (Section 1004.4).



#### **Racial and Social Equity Analysis**

On July 15, 2020, the San Francisco Historic Preservation Commission adopted Resolution No. 1127 centering Preservation Planning on racial and social equity. Understanding the benefits, burdens, and opportunities to advance racial and social equity that proposed Preservation Planning documents provide is part of the Department's Racial and Social Equity Initiative. This is also consistent with the Mayor's Citywide Strategic Initiatives for equity and accountability and with the Office of Racial Equity, which required all Departments to conduct this analysis.

The proposed landmark designation of St. James Presbyterian Church makes no substantive policy changes to the Planning Code or the Planning Department's procedures. The proposed landmark designation produces few, if any, opportunities to advance racial and social equity.

Staff does not foresee any direct or unintended negative consequences from the proposed landmark designation.

#### **Public / Neighborhood Input**

An email in support of the landmark designation was submitted to the Board of Supervisors during the Board review of the initiation to designate St. James Presbyterian Church. This is attached as part of the Board of Supervisors initiation hearing packet.

To date, staff has not received any public comments regarding the landmark designation.

#### **Issues & Other Considerations**

- <u>Interior Character-Defining Features:</u> Inclusion of interior spaces as character-defining is warranted as these spaces, which historically functioned as publicly accessible church sanctuary, are representative of the religious institutional and community use for which the building is significant as well as retaining character-defining features that are characteristic of the work of renowned architect, Julia Morgan.
- **Property owner input:** On October 13, 2022, the Department sent mailed notice to the property owner regarding the landmark designation recommendation hearing scheduled for November 2, 2022.
- Pacific Islander Cultural District: The project site is located in the proposed Pacific Islander Cultural Heritage District, which was introduced by Supervisor Walton on September 27, 2022, and has been referred to the Historic Preservation Commission for recommendation. The proposed Pacific Islander Cultural Heritage District would encompass the area between San Bruno Avenue, Bayshore Boulevard, Geneva Avenue, Moscow Street, Persia Avenue, Mansell Avenue, and Visitacion Valley Avenue. The proposed cultural district would recognize the Visitacion Valley neighborhood as the home to the largest concentrations of Pacific Islanders in San Francisco and as the cultural center of the regional Pacific Islander community. At this time, the proposed Cultural District does not possess any specific land use controls that are specific to this project.



#### **Environmental Review Status**

The proposed landmark designation, which involves amending the Planning Code, is not defined as a project under CEQA Guidelines Sections 15060(c) and 15378 because it would not result in a direct or indirect physical change in the environment

#### **Basis for Recommendation**

The Department **recommends** that the Historic Preservation Commission recommend to the Board of Supervisors landmark designation of St. James Presbyterian Church as the building is individually eligible for its association with the early development of the Visitacion Valley neighborhood and as an excellent example of the work of architect of merit, Julia Morgan.

#### **Statement of Significance Summary**

St. James Presbyterian Church, 240 Leland Avenue, organized by Presbytery of San Francisco as its first Filipino ministry in late 1980s, was originally established in 1908 and is one of the oldest religious congregations in Visitacion Valley. The current building was constructed in 1922 based on design by renowned architect Julia Morgan. St. James is representative of broad patterns of San Francisco history and is historically significant for its association with early development of the Visitacion Valley neighborhood. St. James Presbyterian Church is also architecturally significant as an example of the work of architect of merit, Julia Morgan.

#### **Property Description and History**

St. James Presbyterian Church is located mid-block on north side of Leland Avenue at junction with Cora Street, between Rutland and Delta streets, in the Visitacion Valley neighborhood. The subject property is located at the west end of the commercial portion of Leland Avenue that runs from Bayshore Boulevard to Cora Street. The surrounding block is characterized by one- to three-story, residential buildings interspersed with institutional buildings, such as the Visitacion Valley Branch Library, the Boys & Girls Clubs of San Francisco, and the Visitacion Valley Playground. Residential buildings are generally built to the sidewalk although there are a variety of building setbacks.

The subject building, which occupies most of the underlying 50-foot by 100-foot parcel, is two-stories and H-shaped in plan expressed as a tall center mass extending the length of the building with shallow wings projecting from sides at front and rear of building. The façade extends the full width of the parcel to abut the neighboring residential properties and a low red brick planter extends along front of building at the sidewalk. Clad in smooth stucco, the three-part façade composition is expressed as a tall central mass flanked by shorter, narrow wings. At façade, the tall central mass has a front-facing gable roof with thick, shaped/curved brackets supporting an open eave overhang. On side elevations of the main building massing, the roof is expressed with open eave overhang and simple exposed rafter tails rather than brackets, while the rear elevation has only an open eave overhang. Paired rafter tails occur at regular intervals along eaves on side elevations, denoting the location of laminated beams and trusses at interior. The short, narrow wings to each side of the central mass at façade have sidefacing gable roofs with open overhanging eaves. The exposed east elevation of the east wing is clad with smooth stucco to match the front façade and the overhanging roof edge of the side-facing gable has a shaped, wood bargeboard resting on short, blocky wood brackets; side elevations of these wings have open eave overhangs with simple exposed rafter tails. The undersides of all eave overhangs are painted tongue-and-groove wood matching the interior ceiling.

Fenestration at façade is limited to arched openings with contemporary metal security doors and metal security gates, and small stained-glass rosette windows at the narrow side wings, and a wide window bay that extends full height of gable-end at center of façade, flanked by thick, stucco-clad, pilasters. Within the window bay is a band of three, six-lite, wood casement windows with simple wood trim, a large wood-framed opening with a stained-glass window, and a wood-framed arched opening with an arched, stained-glass window. The stained-glass in the large second floor and arched window openings depicts the Parable of the Sower, from one of Jesus'



parables that liken his preaching to a man sowing seeds. One of the glass panels contains the name of the Campbell Glass and Paint Co. According to newspaper articles and advertisements from the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup>-century, Campbell Glass, based in Kansas City, Missouri, was a purveyor of fine art and stained-glass.<sup>2</sup> The history passed through the congregation is that these stained-glass windows were "...found in a Nevada ghost town and moved to St. James Presbyterian in 1923, when Julia Morgan designed the present church..."<sup>3</sup>

Narrow passageways extend along the side property lines, exposing the side elevations, which are clad with drop-lap wood siding. All window sash appears to be wood. The upper-level church sanctuary is fenestrated with symmetrically arranged, punched, wood-framed, window openings that consist of a pair of casement sash below a fixed transom. Glazing for the sanctuary windows is stained-glass in muted yellows and browns in an Arts and Crafts style, rectilinear design. Window sash have original hardware. One bay on west elevation of sanctuary features paired wood-paneled doors with stacked glazed lites; a glazed transom extends across opening above the doors. Other fenestration on side elevations consists of wood-frame, four-lite, paired casement sash below a two-lite transom, wood-frame, three-lite, paired casement windows, and several contemporary metal doors. At the rear of both side elevations are pop-outs that extend the upper level to the side property lines; these extensions of the building have flat roofs (the roofs of these additions are tucked under the eaves of the main building mass) and are supported by posts and brackets. At rear pop-out on east elevation, a wood stair leads to a porch that extends from south wall of the upper level. Along upper level of west elevation is a deteriorated wood deck, accessed from door in south wall of side extension and from paired doors in west wall of sanctuary.

The rear elevation is clad in drop-lap wood siding and fenestrated with paired casement sash in variety of lite configurations. At center of upper level are two large windows with paired casement sash below fixed transoms. The eave overhang is open but does not feature bargeboard, rafter tails, or brackets.

The church sanctuary occupies most of upper level. Primary access to sanctuary is via stairs at the front of the building from the arched opening at east entrance on façade. Behind this arched entrance is a small vestibule. Within the vestibule to the west is the stairway up to sanctuary, to the north is a contemporary door leading to the open passageway along east elevation of building, to the east is a blank wall with built-in shelves. The wood stairs to sanctuary are carpeted and stairway has wood paneled wainscot and plaster walls. The ceiling at upper stair landing is open with wood paneling matching the sanctuary and the roof eave overhangs. Both sides of the bracketed wood truss above wall delineating the south end of sanctuary from the stair landing are enclosed with horizontal, tongue-and-groove wood, matching the ceiling.

Sanctuary is a long open room with carpeted floor, contemporary wood pews (existing pews were given to the church in 1972 – several original pews are stored in the smaller chapel at rear of building), and an open beam and truss, wood paneled ceiling featuring exposed wood trusses and curved brackets. Walls are plaster above

wood wainscot with chair rail. The large, symmetrically arranged window openings are framed with wood. At north end of room (opposite the stair landing) is a raised and recessed platform; wainscotting in this space is taller with inset painted plaster/wood panels and projecting cornice. At rear corners of this recessed space are window openings with double-hung wood sash with stained-glass. To either side of this raised space, are plaster walls that enclose small office spaces. In contrast to south wall of the sanctuary, these plaster walls extend all the way up to ceiling rather than terminating at underside of wood truss. At the opposite (south) end of the sanctuary is a large opening to stair landing. To either side of this opening are paneled doors that lead to a small restroom (southwest corner of building) and a small office (southeast corner of the building). Contemporary light fixtures, AV equipment, and electrical conduit are attached to, or extend from, the ceiling trusses. Wood at ceiling, trusses, wainscot (except at raised platform at north end of sanctuary), and framing windows is unpainted (may have been treated with a stain or similar) and has a rich reddish-brown color, characteristic of wood often utilized on building interiors by Julia Morgan. At north end of room, many of the wood features, including ceiling over raised space and wainscotting within same, appear to be painted or stained to match the rest of the wood in the room.

At the north (rear) end of the upper floor are a series of small offices surrounding a smaller chapel/Sunday school room. This smaller chapel is located immediately behind the main sanctuary and is a rectangular room with vaulted wood paneled ceiling with laminated and bracketed center beam. All other office spaces at rear of building have plaster walls and utilitarian, contemporary finishes.

At the lower level of the building is a large assembly space with painted concrete post and beam construction and utilitarian finishes. There is an industrial-style kitchen and restrooms in southwest corner of the lower level. An office is located in southeastern corner, opposite the kitchen, and storage rooms are located at rear of the building. There is no interior stair connecting the two levels of the building. Access to the lower level is via a contemporary door on east elevation, via the side passageway, and pair of contemporary metal doors that lead to vestibule/pass-through at the arched opening at west wing of façade.

#### **Building History**

The current building occupied by St. James Presbyterian Church, which replaced the congregation's first chapel, was constructed in 1922-1923 based on a design by renowned architect Julia Morgan. Construction of the new church building was financed by the congregation with the Presbyterian Board of National Missions providing a \$2800 grant towards the approximately \$9500 cost. The new building was dedicated on March 13, 1923.

The site's history as the location of St. James Presbyterian Church goes back to 1906 when residents of the Visitacion Valley neighborhood organized and constructed a small wood-frame building on the subject property to house a church and Sunday School.<sup>4</sup> A Building Permit for this work was issued in December 1906 to "construct a chapel" to be "24 by 36 by 20 feet tall" at cost of \$900.<sup>5</sup> These local efforts were in response to encouragement by a group from the University Mound Presbyterian Church in the neighboring Portola District.

Two years later, in 1908, St. James Presbyterian Church, with 69 members, was officially recognized by the Presbytery of San Francisco. In that same year, the congregation was issued a Building Permit to erect a 25-foot

by 50-foot building behind the chapel.<sup>6</sup> Most sources, including the 1913 Sanborn map of the neighborhood, describe this one-story building, located at rear of the property, as a "gymnasium." Although some portion of this rear building is still present in the 1950 Sanborn map, where it is identified as a "shed," other historic documentation indicates that this building was removed from the property sometime between 1922, when a permit was issued for an addition of dressing room and showers to the building,<sup>7</sup> and 1938, when the rear of the property appears vacant in an aerial photograph.

According to church records, in 1917, some additions were made to the original chapel building, including a kitchen and rooms for Seminary students visiting on weekends. A Building Permit issued in August 1917 describes the alterations as: "...small addition to present building; addition to be 12 x 25 ft, two stories; includes 2 toilets, kitchen and hallway on lower floor; two rooms on upper floor, concrete foundation...work to be done by men of the church." Prior to construction of the current building in 1922-1923, the congregation's original chapel building was "...moved off the property and around the corner onto Schwerin Street next to the school, where it still serves as a private residence."

Like the population in the surrounding neighborhood, which grew steadily in the decades following the 1906 earthquake and fire, the "...adult congregation and the Sunday School attendance at St. James outgrew the small church building." In 1922, plans were laid for construction of the present building. *Building and Engineering News*, a construction trades journal, noted in their July 15, 1922 edition that architect Julia Morgan had been awarded the design of a "two-story and basement frame church" for St. James Presbyterian Church. A Building Permit for this project, listing "Miss Julia Morgan" as architect, was issued July 14, 1922, for construction of a "church" to be 48-feet by 56-feet and two-stories with concrete foundation, wood-frame construction, and stucco and rustic (wood) wall coverings at exterior with plaster walls at interior. <sup>12</sup>

Morgan's architectural plans, dated July 10, 1922, depict a T-shaped plan with open passages extending along both sides of the building. Primary access to upper floor was via stairway from double-door entrance at east side of front façade while double-doors at west end of façade provided access to the lower floor. A concrete path and wood stair along west elevation served as secondary exit from upper floor. Morgan's floor plans for lower-level depict a kitchen, restrooms, circulation, and office (labeled as "Beginning Room") at south end of building with a large open space, labeled "Sunday School," occupying the remaining floor area. At the upper-level, Morgan's floor plans depict stairway, landing, and "women's coat room" along south end of space, consistent with current configuration, and the rest of the floor area occupied by the sanctuary. At north end of sanctuary, was a center raised platform space flanked by areas for "Pastor" and "Choir." The north wall of the sanctuary and Sunday school marked the rear of the building. Morgan's section drawings depict open wood paneled ceiling, bracketed wood trusses, wood wainscot, and plaster walls within the sanctuary, consistent with many of the existing details of this space.

At exterior, Morgan's architectural plans show stucco clad façade with wood siding at side elevations. Configuration of the façade and details at roof eaves match existing although there have been changes at doors and windows. At the side elevations, fenestration, particularly at sanctuary, was symmetrical with large window openings to provide natural light.

In general, it appears that the original building was constructed to Morgan's plans, although there were slight deviations, most notable at the façade and side elevation windows. Where there are other changes, these have likely occurred as result of more recent alterations, the most substantial of which was an addition at north end of building in the mid-1950s.

At the façade,

... Morgan's plans indicate a rose window [and three arched windows at second floor] on the front of the building. However, oral history is that a church member knew of a deserted church in a ghost town in Nevada, and the window that was installed at St. James was "liberated" from that church by him with the help of other men in the congregation. The stained-glass window depicts Jesus' parable of the sower and was manufactured by the Campbell Paint and Glass Company of Kansas City, Missouri.<sup>13</sup>

This multi-part stained-glass window was installed in place of the windows designed by Morgan, a change that appears to have occurred during the original construction as a historic photograph from the 1920s depicts the stained-glass windows in place. A smaller deviation Morgan's façade drawing is the deletion of a window box or similar feature below the ground floor windows.

At the sanctuary, Morgan's drawings depict a long open room arranged symmetrically with the large opening (shown with a door and sidelights in Morgan's floor plan) from the stair landing centered in the south wall and aligning with the raised platform for pulpit(s) at north end of room. Flanking the raised platform at north end of room were partially enclosed spaces with lower ceiling heights, labeled as "Pastor" and "Choir." In Morgan's plans, the long room is divided into five bays by bracketed wood trusses that span the width of the space (these bays extend from south wall of sanctuary to where the original raised platform and choir/pastor spaces began at north end of building for total of six trusses). Centered between each truss, or bay, at side walls, Morgan's plans show large, wood-framed, shallow arched, openings with multi-light paired casement sash below a multi-lite transom with five bays of windows on east elevation and four bays plus a door opening on west elevation. In contrast to Morgan's drawings, extant fenestration at sanctuary has square openings and stained-glass glazing. Details of existing window sash and trim, particularly at exterior, for majority of these windows, suggests that Morgan's arched openings were not constructed as drawn and that current shape and window sash within these openings are original. Only four of these window openings, on east and west walls extending from front toward rear of the building, are extant. Window openings at rear and lower level of the original building have higher level of alteration, although old window sash may have been reused (or copied) even within relocated window openings.

Morgan's section drawings indicate that the raised platform space at north end of sanctuary was further highlighted by tall, paneled wainscot (panels either plaster or board-and-batten) capped with double chair rail.

At the north wall of this raised and recessed platform, above the tall wainscot, Morgan's plans include a small rosette window. Although the exact appearance of the interior of the sanctuary, particularly the north end of the room, at the time of construction is not known, comparison of Morgan's drawings against the current configuration and details of this portion of the building indicate that there have been alterations. Most notably, it appears that the original length of the room has been reduced by approximately one bay. Although the configuration of spaces at north end of sanctuary are consistent with original drawings – central raised recessed space flanked by enclosed, or partially enclosed, rooms – the existing details and finishes at north end of sanctuary, and the overall depth of this interior space, suggest that this portion of the room has been altered. Many of these alterations may date to the 1950s when an addition that included the smaller chapel and surrounding office was constructed at north end of the building. Unfortunately, no architectural plans for this work have been located so the extent and nature of the alterations cannot be determined. Several historic photographs, provided by Betty Parshall of the Visitacion Valley History Project, from the early 1950s appear to match existing condition of this portion of building, so exact dates and nature of alterations at this portion of the building is unknown.

Another difference from Morgan's plans is at the lower level where the large assembly space does not currently contain the rows of columns/posts that were originally depicted. Morgan's drawings note these columns as having concrete footings supporting bracketed posts. This space, which has been enlarged, has concrete beams spanning the width of the room supported by concrete posts/pilasters at exterior walls. Although Morgan was known for her knowledgeable use of reinforced concrete construction, the original plans, and the notations in building permit of wood-frame construction, suggest that the economical design for St. James did not originally include concrete structural framing. The existing concrete structural members were likely added during a structural upgrade and seismic strengthening of the building, although no documentation has been located to provide a date for this work.

In 1955, a Building Permit was issued to "add 1292 [square feet] of floor space on second floor classroom area and chapel" and to "add 960 [square feet] of floor space on first floor" with space "between floors to allow outside passage to rear of building." Church records indicate that planning for this addition began in 1951, as the "church was thriving and additional space was needed for the crowded Sunday School program." These same records note that

an addition was made at the rear of the church that included a small chapel and four classrooms. The addition did not change the original building except to provide doorways into the addition, and the small chapel replicates Morgan's open beam ceiling nicely. <sup>16</sup>

Although the note regarding the similarities between Morgan's open beam ceiling in sanctuary and the ceiling in the addition is accurate, there do appear to have been other changes made to the original building by the addition. There appears to have been efforts taken to make the changes match the original as much as possible, but there are physical clues. The enlarged building has a consistent roofline (roofing was replaced in 2000) making seams on the side elevations one of the only physical cues indicating where an addition was made. Many of the window sash in the newer portion of the building match those found in original section – this may

indicate that original sash was relocated and reused or that new sash was made to match historic sash. At north end of the sanctuary, where alterations were done with particular care to maintain and/or match original, the principal evidence of alteration is comparison of existing against Morgan's original plans. The other, subtle evidence is in the way in which the plaster walls at north end of sanctuary meet the open beam and truss as compared to the original condition of these features at south wall.

Other documented work to the building has included remodeling kitchen (1961), re-roofing (2000), and installation of a chair-lift at stairway to sanctuary (2014).

### Events: Associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history (National Register Criterion A).

St. James Presbyterian Church, 240 Leland Avenue, was originally established in 1908 and is one of the oldest religious congregations in Visitacion Valley. The original chapel, constructed in 1906, was replaced in 1922 by the current building. In the late 1980s, the Presbytery of San Francisco reorganized the church as its first Filipino ministry. St. James is representative of broad patterns of San Francisco history and is historically significant for its association with early development of the Visitacion Valley neighborhood.

Visitacion Valley lies in the southern quadrant of San Francisco, extending from Bayshore Boulevard to the east, the city boundary to the south, and McLaren Park to the northwest. Today, Visitacion Valley remains a low-density residential area home to a largely Asian American population with commercial corridors on Bayshore Boulevard and Leland Avenue, a shopping center, and some production, distribution, and repair sites.

The following historic context for the settlement and development of the neighborhood is excerpted from various sources, including the Historic Resources Technical Report for the Visitacion Valley Redevelopment Environmental Impact Report, prepared by Carey & Co. Inc. <sup>17</sup> Indented text is from Carey & Co. report.

The neighborhood physically extends beyond San Francisco's southern boundary into Daly City and Brisbane. Before Spanish settlers claimed the land now known as the City of San Francisco, it was home to the Yelamu tribe of the Ohlone Indians. The Yelamu villages of Amuctac and Tubsinte were located in the present day Visitacion Valley neighborhood. This southeastern section of the city was "discovered" by a group of Spanish soldiers and Franciscan friars in 1777 when the party, having become lost in a thick fog, decided to camp overnight and in the morning found themselves in a picturesque valley. The date was July 2, also known in the Catholic Church as the Feast of the Visitacion of the Most Blessed Virgin to her cousin St. Elizabeth. Thus, the Catholic Church claimed the land, named it Visitacion Valley and used the area for agricultural and grazing purposes. In 1834, the Mexican government seized these lands from the Church, and ownership was later granted to favored Californios. <sup>18</sup> Californios were Spanish-speaking inhabitants of New Spain's, and later Mexico's Alta California, the area later annexed by the United States following the Mexican-American War in 1848. Californios included the descendants

of European settlers from Spain and Mexico, as well as Mestizos and local Native Americans who adopted Spanish culture and converted to Catholicism.

The area that would become Visitacion Valley, along with the Bayshore district of Daly City, the city of Brisbane, and San Bruno Mountain, was all part of the Rancho Cañada de Guadalupe, La Visitacion y Rodeo Viejo, land grant that was awarded to Jacob Primer Leese, a trader from Ohio married to a sister of the powerful General Mariano Vallejo. During this period, the valley was undeveloped with occasional use for grazing. In the 1840s, following US annexation, the rancho began to be subdivided for nurseries, dairies, and truck farms. Description of the control of the powerful General Mariano Vallejo.

Some of the earliest inhabitants of Visitacion Valley included Europeans hailing from countries such as France, Germany, Italy and Malta [the neighborhood once had the largest concentration of Maltese outside Malta], who began to cultivate the land with flower gardens, plant nurseries, and farms.<sup>21</sup>

Several of the "earliest landowners in Visitacion Valley were Francois Pioche, whose "French Gardens" nursery specialized in growing roses for sale, and Henry Schwerin, a German whose extensive acreage supported a dairy farm, a nursery specializing in ferns and tulips, and honeybees." <sup>22</sup>

Though the rural character of Visitacion Valley continued well into the twentieth century, there was a gradual shift in land use over the years to accommodate increasing industrial and residential development. ... ["By the 1870s business had come to the Valley – Ralston's silk ribbon factory; several breweries, including Mission Brewery, noted for its steam beer; two quarries; a gas plant; a fertilizer company." <sup>23</sup>]

... The Spring Valley Water Company established its Bayshore pumping station at 31-33 Leland Avenue near the turn of the century; the pumping station regulated the flow of water from the reservoir on the top of the hill to the west near what is now McLaren Park. In 1905, Pacific Gas & Electric built a plant in Visitacion Valley and, with the arrival of Southern Pacific Railway Company's freight station in the early twentieth century, Visitacion Valley became established as a major crossroads in the burgeoning industrial center of the Southern Pacific.<sup>24</sup>

According to a history of Visitacion Valley compiled by the Schlage Lock Company, which was a major employer for the neighborhood and surrounding communities from 1925 to 1999, <sup>25</sup> "by 1905, the 'finest building sites' could be purchased for as little as \$125.00 - \$1.00 down and \$1.00 a week." <sup>26</sup> Charles A. Louis was then the sales agent for the Reis Tract, at that time the largest housing development in the valley. In the years following the 1906 San Francisco earthquake and fire, from which Visitacion Valley emerged relatively unscathed, the area experienced a steady population increase as refugees from the city's center stayed and settled in the community. Also at that time, the Southern Pacific Railway filled a portion of the bay in order to construct a roundhouse and extensive train yards that extended south of the county line. ["The Five, Six and Seven Mile houses offered lodging and recreation." <sup>27</sup>]

Two streetcar lines in operation by 1910 – one running northeast along Bayshore Boulevard from Wilde Street and connecting to Market Street via Third Street, the other running along Geneva Avenue from Bayshore Boulevard to Mission Street – provided further catalysts for the development of the Visitacion Valley community. <sup>28</sup> [Large developments of] single-family houses were first built in the area in the 1930s. <sup>29</sup> These organized rows of modest one-family stucco houses followed a design pattern similar to the residential streets in other newer neighborhoods of San Francisco, such as the Sunset District. <sup>30</sup> Over the next 15 years, Visitacion Valley continued to change as farmland gave way to residential development, roads were paved, and Leland Avenue became the valley's core commercial thoroughfare.

The neighborhood history compiled on the Visitacion Valley History Project website notes that:

Sunnydale was erected for World War II defense workers, and Joseph Eichler's 1960s plan for luxury housing in two high-rises evolved into Section 8 housing at Geneva Towers, imploded in 1998. Churches include the Catholic Church of the Visitacion, replacing the six-acre estate of Peter Burnett, California's first governor, and subsequently the San Francisco Auto Camp; St. James Presbyterian, remodeled by Julia Morgan, the Hearst Castle architect, in 1923; and Valley Baptist on Raymond, erected in 1919. Both the Visitacion Valley Community Center, spearheaded by Florence Friedman, and the John King Senior Center continue to meet a variety of neighborhood needs.<sup>31</sup>

Like many of the city's western and southern neighborhoods, outward migration of displaced San Franciscans following the 1906 earthquake and fires spurred the development of valley institutions and small businesses. Historian Woody LaBounty notes that in the aftermath of San Francisco's oldest neighborhoods, neighborhoods like Visitacion Valley flourished with

Leland Avenue developing as the robust commercial spine of the neighborhood with the Bayshore Hotel building, small groceries, produce markets, butcher shops, and dry goods stores occupying vernacular structures...<sup>32</sup>

Institutions quickly followed with the Catholic Church of the Visitacion founded in 1907 and St. James Presbyterian Church in 1908 (congregation began a Sunday School in 1906). In this way, St. James Presbyterian Church is part of the foundation of the neighborhood.

Historically, the Visitacion Valley neighborhood has had a working-class population. Initially this population was mostly French and German immigrants involved in agriculture. Irish, Spanish, and Italian immigrants come to the neighborhood to work in nearby factories, as well as for the Southern Pacific Railroad. With World War II, and construction of the nearby Hunters Point Naval Shipyard, there was an influx of African Americans who worked in the shipyards and lived in Sunnydale housing, which had been constructed as barracks to house workers. The African American population in the neighborhood increased further following WWII due to displacement from the Fillmore District and Western Addition as a result of activities of the Redevelopment Agency. Since the late 1980s, Chinese American and Filipino population of the neighborhood has increased. In a pictorial history of the neighborhood compiled in 2005, the population was described as being 50 percent of Asian and Pacific Islander heritage with the "Valley's rich ethnic diversity further reflected in the ethnic congregations who worship here." 33

The Filipino Historic Context Statement notes that "establishment of a Filipino community in San Francisco is part of a larger pattern of Filipino immigration that began as early as the 1900s and continued in successive waves throughout the twentieth century." The South of Market (SoMa) neighborhood has long been home to the largest concentrations of Filipinos in San Francisco, recognized as the cultural center of regional Filipino community. This community, by the mid-1970s, was

concentrated in the city's 6<sup>th</sup> District, which [at that time] encompassed the South of Market and Inner Mission neighborhoods. Filipinos also accounted for five percent of the population in Districts 7, 8 and 9, which [at that time] included parts of the Mission, Bernal Heights and Excelsior neighborhoods, as well as the city's southwestern quadrant adjacent to Daly City.<sup>35</sup>

Filipinos in America also discusses San Francisco's Filipino community in the years following World War II, noting:

The GI Bill brought all U.S. military veterans access to higher education, well-paying civil service jobs and low-interest home loans. Filipinos began to buy homes in the Richmond and Sunset districts on the west side, despite white-only racial covenants. Others moved from the SOMA southward into the Mission,

Bernal Heights, Excelsior/Outer Mission, Crocker Amazon, and Visitacion Valley neighborhoods and Daly City (of course).<sup>36</sup>

In 2008, Visitacion Valley was home to approximately 14,000 residents. The demographics have shifted from the valley's early European settlers. [In 2008] the population was comprised of 59 percent Asian American residents and the other 41 percent is made up of nearly equal percentages of Hispanics, Whites, and African Americans.<sup>37</sup>

Over the years, St. James has sponsored Scout and other youth groups, summer Bible camps, daycare, and numerous other supportive services. The congregation has also shared their building with other groups and religious organizations. Services for a Hispanic congregation currently meet in the building and a Samoan congregation held services in the building at some point (possible 1970s or 1980s).

St. James, organized by members of the community, has always reflected the neighborhood's residents. In its early decades, like the surrounding neighborhood, the congregation at St. James was mostly white. Beginning with WWII, which brought African American workers to surrounding shipyards and to the Sunnydale housing complex, through the 1970s, which saw increased African American population as well as Filipinos and Pacific Islanders, the neighborhood and congregation has diversified. In the 1970s, a church flyer, advertising the congregation, noted that the "church stands in most racially integrated area in the world" and "has people of many racial and religious backgrounds taking part in its services and social activities." <sup>38</sup>

A history of St. James, compiled in 2011,

As the demographics of Visitacion Valley changed, older members moved away or died, and their children did not stay in San Francisco. By the 1980's the congregation had shrunk and the remaining members were unable to fully support expenses. There were, however, several active Filipino members, and after much discussion the Presbytery elected to name St. James as a mission church to the large Filipino community in the neighborhood with the Presbytery providing financial support, and in 1990 a Filipino pastor was ordained. Currently (2011) the congregation is nearly 100% Filipino and has about 80 active congregants. 39

In 2019, the congregation had dwindled even further, and a decision was made not to hire a new pastor following retirement of the sitting pastor. The church was closed for nearly two years (part of this closure overlapped with COVID-19 pandemic) prior to partial re-opening in late 2021 with a part-time pastor. The small congregation remains majority Filipino.

## Architecture/Design: Embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values (National Register Criterion C).

St. James Presbyterian Church is architecturally significant as an excellent example of the work of renowned architect of merit Julia Morgan. The first woman to attend and receive a degree from the prestigious Ecole des Beaux-Arts in Paris, Morgan was also the first woman to receive a degree in civil engineering at University of California, Berkeley (1894) and to be licensed to practice architecture in California (1904). Adept at designing in variety of architectural styles and scales, Morgan is recognized as one of the leading proponents of First Bay Tradition, an architectural style unique to the Bay Area. After opening her own practice in 1904, Morgan "ran one of the most successful firms in California during the first half of the twentieth century," <sup>40</sup> receiving nearly 800 commissions. Morgan's first biographer describes the architect's success as "based on empathetic imagination, fundamental understanding of the precepts of design, and profound respect for landscape, light, and materials." <sup>41</sup> An "outstanding and prolific woman architect whose success is unsurpassed by other women in architecture of her time," <sup>42</sup> Julia Morgan was posthumously awarded the American Institute of Architects (AIA) highest award, the AIA Gold Medal, in 2014, the first woman to receive this award, and a number of her buildings have been listed on local and national registers for their architectural significance.

## Julia Morgan (1872-1957)

Julia Morgan was born in San Francisco, the second of five children of Charles Bill and Eliza Parmelee Morgan, and grew up in Oakland. Morgan maintained her residence in Oakland, principally at her family home, through the 1920s when moved her office and residence to San Francisco.

Morgan graduated with honors from the University of California, Berkeley with a degree in civil engineering in 1894. She was the first woman to earn a degree in this program at Berkeley and was often the only woman in her math, science, and engineering classes. Although Morgan had already developed an interest in architecture, which was supported by her immediate family and by her mother's cousin, Pierre Le Brun, an architect in New York, Berkeley did not yet have an architecture program when she attended. During her time at Berkeley, which coincided with substantial growth in women's involvement and enrollment in the student body, Morgan established ties with women's groups, such as the YWCA, the Association of Collegiate Alumnae (became American Association of University Women), and Kappa Alpha Theta sorority, that would fuel her client base throughout her career. She also entered a mentorship with one of her instructors, Bernard Maybeck, who would remain a friend and mentor throughout Morgan's career. Maybeck further supported her interest in architecture, providing a position in his office following her graduation and encouraging her to pursue architectural studies at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris, then considered the most prestigious art and architectural school in the world.

With familial funding and professional support from Maybeck in the form of letters of recommendation and introduction, as well as tutoring on the arduous entrance examinations for the renowned school, Morgan went to Paris in 1896. During her time in Paris, Morgan also found a mentor and tutor in her professor, Bernard

Chaussemiche, for whom she worked as a drafter. <sup>43</sup> The Ecole, which had never allowed a woman to study architecture, opened its entry process to female applicants in 1897. After three attempts on the examination, Morgan gained entrance to the prestigious program, the first woman to do so in the school's history, and became the first woman to earn the school's certificate in architecture. <sup>44</sup> Morgan earned this certificate in three years, although the typical duration for completion of such studies was five years. <sup>45</sup> Following graduation from the Ecole, Morgan collaborated with Chaussemiche on design and construction of a "grand salon" for a residence in Fontainebleau. <sup>46</sup>

Morgan returned to California in 1903 where she initially worked for John Galen Howard who was supervising the UC Berkeley Master Plan. Under Howard, she worked on several buildings for the UC Berkeley campus, providing decorative elements for the Hearst Mining Building, preliminary design proposal for Sather Gate, and primary designs for the Hearst Greek Theater. Although remaining in Howard's office may have been appealing given the amount of work that the UC Berkeley project would generate and the number of connections with significant patrons – although they had met previously in Paris, Morgan worked with Phoebe Apperson Hearst for the first time while in Howard's office – Morgan was intent on establishing an independent practice. This desire may have been triggered as much by a deep independent streak as by the awareness that her work with any firm would be valued, or undervalued, in the same way Howard once described her to a colleague, saying that Morgan was "an excellent draftsman whom I have to pay almost nothing, as it is a woman."

In 1904, Morgan passed the state certification test, becoming the first woman licensed to practice architecture in California, and opened an office in San Francisco. Independent commissions for the Mills College bell tower, known as El Campanile, along with houses in Berkeley, Grass Valley, Oakland, and San Francisco maintained the new practice. <sup>49</sup> Morgan's work on the bell tower was particularly important as it marked her first design in reinforced concrete, providing her with unique experience in the design and construction of a building type that would become increasingly sought after for its earthquake-resistance. The bell tower commission, along with design of a new library, also established Mills College as a long-term client, with Morgan eventually designing several buildings on the campus.

As was the case for Bay Area-based architects, business at Morgan's practice spiked following the 1906 earthquake and fires that destroyed whole swathes of the city's buildings and left thousands homeless. Although her San Francisco office, including her business records, drawings, and personal files, was destroyed in the fires,

and misplaced attempts at creating firebreaks, that swept through San Francisco following the earthquake, Morgan was operational only one week later, relocating her office to a "temporary workshop in the yard" of her family's Oakland home. <sup>50</sup> The lack of structural damage to her buildings at Mills College – the bell tower and library – helped establish her design credentials in the reconstruction period as did her first major commission to rebuild the Fairmont Hotel where Morgan noted that her work "has all been structural." <sup>51</sup> In addition to large commissions such as rebuilding the damaged Fairmont and Merchant's Exchange Building, (along with Ira Hoover who was her junior partner from 1907-1909, the only period in her practice where she employed a partner), numerous commissions were for modest residences to re-house the thousands made homeless by the destruction in 1906. Residential design and construction of single-family homes would always constitute a significant portion of Morgan's architectural practice even as larger, both in scope and renumeration, commissions were received. Morgan has been described as having had a "…knack of planning a house that suited her clients exactly" by starting her "…planning with interior requirements and preferences" with the result being "…convenient houses." <sup>52</sup>

No matter the commission, Morgan was thoroughly involved, working closely with clients to ensure that each design met their unique requirements (unlike some of her contemporaries, Morgan focused on resolving interior plans before moving to the exterior design), choosing and inspecting materials carefully, and monitoring construction to ensure that every detail was built to her specifications. Historian Elinor Richey notes in her biographical sketch on Morgan that

...[Morgan] kept a captious eye on construction work.... Nothing but first-rate work gained her approval. Far more than most architects, she knew the mechanics of construction and could interrupt a workman, saying, "Do it this way, friend." ... She would order faulty work ripped out... Likewise, all materials she used were carefully selected and, on delivery, meticulously examined. 53

With the exception of two years when Morgan employed Ira Hoover as a junior partner, Morgan maintained a solo practice from 1904 to 1947/early 1950s. From 1907 on Morgan's office was located in the Merchant's Exchange Building in downtown San Francisco. For many of those years, the office consisted of

four sections: a large drafting room for the engineers, draftsmen, and draftswomen (in which Julia kept her own drafting table at eh back); a small office for the secretary and office manager; Julia's own tiny private office, and the library, which was available to all her staff.<sup>54</sup>

Morgan always employed women in her office but made sure that the staff of between 5 and 15, depending on the number of commissions at any given time, was never only women, noting that she did not want to be seen as a "woman's" practice. All staff, regardless of gender, were paid fairly and generously with Morgan frequently sharing profits, although profit margins may have been somewhat slim given the frequency with which Morgan

accepted reduced fees on projects for various non-profit institutions. Morgan had high expectations of her staff, expecting long hours of exacting work. Despite this, her office was popular with young architects of both sexes due to the "expert training they got under her perfectionist eye." Historian Victoria Kastner notes in *Julia Morgan: An Intimate Biography of the Trailblazing Architect* that Morgan's work, and that of her office, "emphasized the central goals of the Ecole's curriculum: developing excellent drawing skills; becoming knowledgeable about historic architectural precedents; and learning how to creatively combine traditional motifs in order to arrive at a new design." Historian Elinor Richey reiterates this description, noting further that Morgan was

...not merely turning out volume and satisfying clients; she was innovating design. Her residences partook of an original excellence that made her, along with Maybeck, leader of a new kind of domestic architecture that had become ubiquitous along the Northern California coast. These were simple shingle-surfaced houses with gable roofs and deep eaves which fitted into the landscape with an indigenous air. Characteristically, structural elements were integrated with design, both inside and out. ... The output of half a dozen or so architects was later branded The Bay Area Shingle Style, precursors of the distinctive San Francisco Bay Region Style. <sup>58</sup>

Morgan's affiliation with the Hearst family, specifically with Phoebe Apperson Hearst and her son the newspaper tycoon, William Randolph Hearst Sr., is a throughline for her entire career, spanning three generations, and resulting in buildings that are among her most well-known and famous. Although Morgan's long and fruitful collaboration with William Randolph Hearst, from whom she received her most famous commission – La Cuestra Encantada or "Hearst Castle" in San Simeon, her association with Hearst's mother, Phoebe Apperson Hearst, was nearly as far-reaching. It was Phoebe that began Morgan's affiliation with the Hearst family, with a commission to remodel and complete Phoebe's Hacienda del Pozo de Verona in Pleasanton, California, and an introduction to her son, William. It was also Phoebe Hearst that encouraged affiliations between Morgan and several women's groups, including the Young Women's Christian Association's (YWCA's), which was in the beginning stages of an extensive West Coast building campaign. These affiliations would be amongst the most important in Morgan's career.

Morgan would become William Randolph Hearsts principal architect, designing the Los Angeles Examiner Building (1914-15), multiple buildings at Hearst's northern California estate, Wyntoon, and the grand estate, known as Hearst Castle. Morgan's design for the estate included all of the buildings, roadways, indoor and outdoor swimming pools, and other elements of the grounds. Morgan acted as far more than a designer for this project and oversaw every element of the project's implementation from 1919 to 1947. Morgan's first biographer, Sara Holmes Boutelle noted that Morgan enjoyed working with clients, be they families, women's groups, or business tycoons, noting that her

...collaboration with William Randolph Hearst over a quarter of a century reveals an uncommonly bonded architect-client relationship focused on building. Indeed, many clients were close friends ... calling on Morgan for more than one commission. <sup>59</sup>

Besides Hearst Castle, Morgan also worked on projects for Hearst's other properties including Jolon, Wyntoon, Babicora, the "Hopi" residence at the Grand Canyon, the Phoebe Apperson Hearst Memorial Gymnasium at Berkeley, the Los Angeles Examiner Building, several of his Beverly Hills residences, and Marion Davies' beach house in Santa Monica.<sup>60</sup>

While Phoebe Apperson Hearst's influence assisted in establishing Morgan's connection with the YWCA and other women's groups, Morgan already had other associations with the YWCA organization, including two close friends and sorority sisters. These connections, no less than Morgan's own talent and architectural qualifications, came together so that by late 1912, Morgan was the "de facto architect in charge of the YWCA's West Coast endeavors." Over two decades Morgan would ultimately design more than 30 projects for the YWCA. 62 The largest of these projects was for a permanent conference camp, known as Asilomar at Pacific Grove, California. Morgan was announced as the supervising architect for this project in 1913 and "...would eventually design over a dozen buildings at the site over the ensuing twelve years, making it one of the largest Arts and Crafts-style compounds in the country." 63 At Asilomar Morgan "designed nearly everything: its stone entrance pillars, its social and dining halls; its chapel and its eight-hundred-seat auditorium; and even its lodges and employee residences..."64 While Asilomar is resolutely Arts and Crafts-style, most of Morgan's other YWCA projects reflect various period revival styles popular in the first half of the 20th century, particularly Spanish Colonial and Mission Revival. With her Beaux-Arts training and experience utilizing the newly available inexpensive reinforced concrete, Morgan was adept at designing in these styles. 65 Several of the most notable of these YWCA projects include: Oakland YWCA (Renaissance Revival, 1913), Hollywood Studio Club (Spanish Colonial Revival, 1926), San Francisco Chinatown YWCA and Residence (Renaissance Revival, 1932 – SF Landmark No. 122), Honolulu, Hawaii YWCA (Spanish and Renaissance Revival, 1926).

Though her various connections via sorority sisters and officers of women's groups throughout the West Coast, Morgan also designed important buildings for many Bay Area women's clubs, including Berkeley Women's Club (now Berkeley City Club) (Renaissance Revival, 1929 – listed on National, California, and local registers), Saratoga Foothills Women's Club (First Bay Tradition, 1915 – listed on National and California registers), Sausalito Women's Club (First Bay Tradition, 1918). Over the course of her career, Morgan designed nearly one hundred buildings across California and the nation for women's organizations. Her commissions included social and civic clubs for women; academic, residential, and recreational buildings; primary schools; orphanages; hospitals, sanitariums, and nursing residences. <sup>66</sup> Architectural historian Karen McNeill has noted of these building programs that

California women were not alone in their building programs, but the built environment they created stands out for one singular reason: the architect Julia Morgan. ... She was an icon of the New Woman: a highly educated, independent, and single woman successfully pursuing a traditionally masculine career. ... And while Morgan was not the only woman who designed buildings for women's organizations...she likely designed more buildings for women's organizations than any other architect in the country. Her oeuvre thus provides the most expansive body of architecture designed of, by, and for women, resulting in a rich source base for exploring feminism from a spatial perspective.<sup>67</sup>

Morgan worked in many architectural styles with buildings in a variety of scales, but her projects are often characterized by her "...use of the California vernacular with distinctive elements...characteristic of the Arts and Crafts movement, including exposed support beams, horizontal lines that blended with the landscape and extensive use of shingles, California Redwood, and earth tones." Many of her design for churches are evocative of these characteristics even though most of her "ecclesiastical designs [were] for small-scale neighborhood buildings." During this period,

[p]opulation shifts to the outer edges of cities created a demand for new small churches, such as the Ocean Avenue Presbyterian in San Francisco, High Street Presbyterian and the United Presbyterian in Oakland, and the Thousand Oaks Baptist in Berkeley.<sup>70</sup>

Like these other neighborhood church projects, St. James Presbyterian Church also fits this description. Although commissions from the Hearst family were Morgan's "most lucrative" she also "accepted projects from clients of modest income." <sup>71</sup>

Although it does not match in scale or design quality some of Morgan's better known and celebrated churches or institutional assembly spaces, the sanctuary at St. James Presbyterian Church is reminiscent of Morgan's designs for St. John's Presbyterian Church (Berkeley, 1910), Phoebe Apperson Hearst Social Hall (Asilomar, 1913), Merrill Hall (Asilomar, 1928), Grace Dodge Chapel (Asilomar, 1915), and Ocean Avenue Presbyterian Church (1923). Of this list, only the last, Ocean Avenue Presbyterian Church, is of a similar scale to St. James', although all share distinctive interior characteristics, including open ceiling with wood beams and trusses with exposed metalwork and large wood-frame windows. In all these designs, even when economy of design and construction was paramount, such as for St. James Presbyterian Church where the building was constructed for approximately \$9500 (about \$160,000 in 2022 dollars), Morgan celebrated the visual quality of California Redwood with exposed structural members, designed to draw the eye to an alter or similar point of focus, and utilized natural light via large wood-framed windows to best advantage on construction sites with complicated topography or narrow city lots. St. James Presbyterian Church, while a modest example of Morgan's ecclesiastical designs, is important within her body of work and within the history of the Visitacion Valley neighborhood and San Francisco as an

example that evokes both the design quality of said work and the equity within the body of her work. St. James Presbyterian Church is and was a neighborhood church with a design by an architect that placed equal value in the economical design of this simple church as with other, larger projects in her office.


















Detail from 1950 Sanborn Map






Detail from 1915 Sanborn Map









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## LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Planning Code - Landmark Designation - St. James Presbyterian Church]

Ordinance amending the Planning Code to designate St. James Presbyterian Church, at 240 Leland Avenue, Assessor's Parcel Block No. 6246, Lot No. 012, as a Landmark consistent with the standards set forth in Article 10 of the Planning Code; affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act; and making public necessity, convenience, and welfare findings under Planning Code, Section 302, and findings of consistency with the General Plan and the eight priority policies of Planning Code, Section 101.1.

## **Existing Law**

Under Article 10, Section 1004 of the Planning Code, the Board of Supervisors may, by ordinance, designate an individual structure that has special character or special historical, architectural or aesthetic interest or value as a City landmark. Unless prohibited by state law, once a structure has been named a landmark, any construction, alteration, removal or demolition for which a City permit is required necessitates a Certificate of Appropriateness from the Historic Preservation Commission. (Planning Code § 1006; Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, § 4.135.) Thus, landmark designation generally affords a high degree of protection to historic and architectural structures of merit in the City. There are currently more than 300 individual landmarks in the City under Article 10, in addition to structures and districts in the downtown area that are protected under Article 11. (See App. A to Article 10.)

### Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance amends the Planning Code to add a new historic landmark to the list of individual landmarks under Article 10: St. James Presbyterian Church, at 240 Leland Avenue, Assessor's Parcel Block No. 6246, Lot No. 012. The ordinance finds that St. James Presbyterian is eligible for local designation as it is associated with events that have made a culturally, historically, and architecturally significant contribution to the broad patterns of San Francisco history and represents the work of an architect of merit. Specifically, designation of St. James Presbyterian Church, originally established in 1908 and one of the oldest religious congregations in southeastern San Francisco, is proper for its association with early development of the Visitacion Valley neighborhood and because as it is architecturally significant as an example of the work of architect of merit, Julia Morgan.

As required by Section 1004, the ordinance lists the particular features that shall be preserved, or replaced in-kind as determined necessary.

Enclosed please find the quarterly report on MOHCD's 100% Affordable Housing Projects, as required by City Ordinance and as part of OEWD's Executive Directive 17-02, covering Q2 and Q3 CY-22, the period from April 1 – September 30, 2022.

### **Highlights and Key Milestones**

Significant strides have been made during the last two quarters in entitlement, permitting and construction of a growing number of affordable housing developments. Of the active pipeline totaling 4,031 units of 100% affordable housing, MOHCD started construction on more than 780 units and completed 384 units in Q2 and Q3. As of this update, there are 1,464 total units in construction and 2,183 currently in pre-development (pre-entitlement or permitting).

We celebrated the completion and grand opening of projects at 681 Florida (130 units) and 1064 Mission (256 units). Additionally, with the award of low-income housing tax credits (LIHTCs) and California Housing Accelerator (CHA) Funds, six projects totaling 696 units that had been delayed were able to close construction financing in the past two quarters:

- Treasure Island C3.1 (Q2 CHA) District 6
- 180 Jones (Q2 CHA) District 5
- 78 Haight (Q2 9% LIHTC) District 5
- Shirley Chisholm Village Educator Housing (Q3 9% LIHTC) District 4
- 600 7<sup>th</sup> Street (Q3 4% LIHTC) District 6
- Potrero Hope SF Block B (Q3 CHA) District 10

Exciting progress is being made in the First Cohort (5 sites) of the MOHCD Multi-Site project. Concept and Schematic designs, Community engagement, and preliminary Planning and Site permit applications are progressing on schedule.

### Challenges

Challenges in the permitting and approvals process continue but have also been largely mitigated with remote work using Electronic Plan Review (EPR) where feasible. The most significant challenges currently include rising construction and permanent debt loan interest, as well as volatility in materials cost and availability. Project bidding is also seeing unanticipated high levels of escalation.

While progress has been made in municipal power application, design and delivery with an agreement negotiated between PUC and PG&E, this work remains extremely complex, requiring significant coordination and facilitation by all partners. Changes to the process continue to create unpredictable schedules and extraordinary costs, which are not anticipated within project budgets or schedules. Critical projects that are facing these challenges are 2340 San Jose (Balboa Park Upper Yard) and 4840 Mission Street, both currently under construction but with no clear path to permanent power energization to guarantee on-time completion.

Overall, MOHCD is pleased to report that despite the unprecedented events of this current time, affordable housing production, at all stages of development, continues to move forward with the collaboration and commitment of our staff, City and private partners.



File No. 220286, an *Ordinance Requiring HSH to Acquire At Least 20 Transitional Housing Units in the Haight*, was introduced by Supervisor Dean Preston on March 22, 2022, passed by the Full Board on June 14, 2022, returned unsigned by the Mayor on June 24, 2022, and became effective on July 24, 2022.

The ordinance amended Sections 41H.1 through 41H.8 of the San Francisco Administrative Code to require that the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH):

- 1. By March 31, 2023, purchase or lease for a minimum of ten years 20 additional units in the Haight Ashbury neighborhood for use as transitional housing for Transitional Aged Youth (TAY).
  - The neighborhood is defined as: Oak St. (north) to Baker St. (east) to Frederick St. and northern border of Buena Vista (south) to Stanyan St. (west).
  - TAY is defined as homeless youth between the ages of 18 and 29.
- 2. Submit a written report to the Board within 120 days of the effective date (November 21, 2022) describing progress as relates to the ordinance, including:
  - Status of the acquisition,
  - Steps taken and anticipated to be completed to acquire the units and provide services there, and
  - Expected timeline to complete acquisition and start offering services.

This Progress Report satisfies the second requirement noted above.

<u>Steps taken and anticipated to be taken to complete the acquisition and provide TAY services at the acquired transitional housing units:</u>

The Division of Real Estate provided a list of properties that were available on the market as of May 3, 2022. The properties were largely ground floor commercial and small apartment buildings and not meeting the requirements of the statute for 20 dwelling units as set forth by the ordinance.

On November 16, 2022, Division of Real Estate provided a list of properties that were available in the Haight-Ashbury market. Of the 6 properties available for lease and the 5 properties available for purchase in the area, none of the properties met the requirements of the statute for 20 dwelling units as set forth by the ordinance.

A dwelling unit is defined by the San Francisco Planning Code in SEC. 790.88 as including full cooking facilities and a full bathroom. There are very few buildings with 20 dwelling units in the area defined in 440 Turk Street

the statute, as the Haight-Ashbury area largely has smaller apartment buildings and buildings with 2-3 "flats" with multiple bedrooms within units that could be shared and with shared amenities.

Expected timeline to complete the acquisition and the provision of TAY Services at the transitional housing units:

To date, the Division of Real Estate and HSH have been unable to identify a suitable site or sites that meet the outlined requirements of the legislation. Additionally, Our City Our Home (Prop C) TAY acquisition funds cannot be used for transitional housing, only Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) in which tenants sign a lease, secure tenancy rights, and do not have time limits to their stay.

HSH is continuing to move forward efforts to improve and expand both Transitional Housing and Permanent Supportive Housing opportunities for TAY, including scattered site and voucher opportunities that provide flexibility for households to use in private market rentals in the geographic area of their choice.

#### Transitional Housing

HSH currently operates a TAY Transitional Housing portfolio of 152 units across six sites, including a 15-bed TAY Transitional Housing program located at 1020 Haight Street.

HSH plans to re-procure current TAY Transitional Housing agreements to enhance the current service model, make programmatic changes to meet the needs of young adults, and prioritize subpopulations of youth that are most in need of Transitional Housing resources. The re-procurement of Transitional Housing programs is anticipated to take place in 2024 when the majority of current agreements end.

#### Supportive Housing

Since July 1, 2020, HSH has identified 206 new site-based and scattered site Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) units dedicated to TAY. Of these, 77 units are in recently acquired properties in District 11 and District 9, 79 are units recently opened in MOHCD pipeline projects and 50 are scattered site PSH through the Flexible Housing Subsidy Pool (FHSP) program that will be provided through a new agreement with Unity Care Group.

Additionally, HSH is working with the San Francisco Housing Authority to distribute federally funded Emergency Housing Vouchers (EHVs). As of November 2022, 181 EHVs have been allocated to TAY households that were currently experiencing homelessness, at risk of homelessness or had recently experienced homelessness. EHVs are similar to a Section 8 Voucher and once awarded to a household can be used to subsidize apartments on the private market in any neighborhood in the City and County of San Francisco or they can be ported to other cities.

HSH also provides 398 dedicated Rapid Rehousing (RRH) subsidies for TAY as part of our existing RRH portfolio. RRH, FHSP and EHVs support households to have the option to explore private market apartments in different neighborhoods, including the Haight. In 2025, HSH will open another 30 units of dedicated TAY PSH at the MOHCD affordable housing project at 730 Stanyan Street in the Haight-Ashbury neighborhood.



Given that one-time Our City, Our Home acquisition funds for adults and families are largely depleted, and with the State's Project Homekey program entering its anticipated final phase, which will include less money than the previous two phases, HSH is winding down its emergency acquisition strategy which includes the City's direct acquisition of properties. HSH anticipates purchasing one or two more TAY supportive housing properties with the remaining one-time Our City, Our Home funds. In May 2022, HSH released RFI 100-B to assist the City in identifying suitable properties for the possible acquisition of Permanent Supportive Housing sites for TAY. This RFI closed on September 30, 2022 and will inform the City's final emergency acquisition phase focused on TAY. There were no submissions received under RFI 100-B in the Haight-Ashbury neighborhood or the defined area under this Ordinance. If there are sites that are determined to be feasible following the due diligence process, HSH will work with the District Supervisor to conduct a community engagement process prior to seeking Board of Supervisors authorization and approval to acquire the property for use as TAY PSH.

There was a total budget of approximately \$96.7 million in one-time Our City, Our Home acquisition funds for TAY PSH. As of October 2022, the estimated balance is approximately \$93.7 million including estimated Homekey grant funds received for 5630 Mission and 3061 16<sup>th</sup> Street. It is anticipated the majority of this bucket will be used in fiscal years FY2022-23 and FY2023-24 to support the acquisition of properties for TAY PSH. Noting that Our City, Our Home revenue weakness may impact available funds.





When we chatted in late August, I informed you of the underground storage tank that we encountered in front of the Zen center (NW corner of Page & Laguna). The tank required contracting and onboarding of a specialize contractor to remove it. Since then, we've coordinated soil testing to determine if any of the materials leaked over the decades it remained in place. We're currently in discussions with the San Francisco Bay Regional Water Quality Control Board and Public Works' Site Assessment and Remediation (SAR) to determine how to best proceed.

As far as the materials on Page Street go, since we have yet to determine a re-start date for construction at that corner, we've asked our contractor to begin removing some of the materials to free up street parking. This should begin later this week.

I'm in the middle of an apartment search, and I'm finding it very difficult to sort through the listings out there. I'd like to propose some common sense legislation requiring landlords in the city to disclose simple information in their listings and **be held accountable for misinformation**.

**Pricing is all over the place** - some units list pricing but don't include water, garbage, parking, or HOA fees. I feel like this could easily be regulated to make things easier. It's like airbnb where they list the base cost, but the full price changes once you click "book". Lets standardize this so everyone is playing by the same rules.

On both Zillow and Craigslist, I have to email every listing to ask about parking cost, laundry cost, unit size, floorplan, etc. Adding this info costs the landlords nothing except a little more due diligence and helps renters tremendously.

Renting and finding an apartment is too difficult and it becomes increasingly difficult when

information is wrong, intentionally misleading, or purposefully withheld.

Please let me know who I should reach out to to further this initiative.

Building on Sand without a Protective Sea Wall:

San Francisco authorities should pay attention to the effects of subsidence, caused by water currents carving out the land below the surface, we are witnessing in Florida where authorities relied on sand burns to protect their beaches and ocean side properties. They built on sandy beaches without a proper seawall. The last hurricane washed the protective sand away and the undercurrents took out the foundations from below.

Our California coast may experience the same damage if our authorities do not plan for subsidence when they approve building dense development near the ocean before a protective wall is constructed to protect those structures.

The combination of weight of the buildings, which you will get with height, and the action of undercurrents digging out the soil under the foundations of the buildings make building on the sand in a seismically active area where sand is known to be precarious, particularly dangerous. San Francisco officials should not ignore the mishaps in Florida.

We need that \$8 million dollar sea wall we heard so much to protect whatever is built near the ocean and secure the foundation of sewer plant. The current light weight single and two story buildings along the shore may be able to sustain some of the damage that is to come for a while, but, it makes no scenes to approval denser and heavier developments without first building a sea wall. At some point the insurance companies will pull out and that will be followed by the investors.

Therefore we implore you to not approve any dense developments or expand the use of the land near the Pacific Ocean until a seawall or some other protective solution is established. The safest way to use the land near the ocean is to continue with its current use while the design and engineering are completed for a sea wall in the area that will be protected. The ocean will take what it wants of the rest of the coast.

We have already witnessed the effects of some land sinking in San Francisco there is no reason to believe that we will be immune from further sinkage in the future, but we can take steps to plan for it.

Specifically, the Planning Department refuses to analyze what the state calls "governmental constraints", and refuses to come up with a backup plan if existing processes will produce <7500 homes per year (which is likely, since that's double the existing rate).

Please take action to hold Planning accountable:

- Direct Planning to update our Housing Element as the state has requested, including an analysis of "governmental constraints" and a backup plan
- Make permitting shorter, clearer, and more efficient—SF is the slowest place to get entitlements and permits, and much of this is due to policies that the Board can change.
- Find funding sources for affordable housing, including City funds (so we aren't completely reliant on developers)

# Summary

- REP- SF organizations have written community development plans for decades that are focused on racial, social and economic equity.
  - » This is the first time these community plans have been compiled into a Citywide People's Plan for Equity in Land Use.
- These community plans must serve as the foundation for all San Francisco land use plans and housing policies, especially the Housing Element which aspires to center racial and social equity.
- Association of Bay Area Governments have assigned a mandate that San Francisco must ratify a set of housing policies in its 2023-2031 Housing Element that will result in 82,069 new housing units with 46,598 (57%) of those being affordable to households that have low to moderate incomes.
- The current Housing Element's
  reliance on market rate housing will
  result in the City falling short of its
  overall production mandates, and
  even more deficient in its affordable
  housing production. SF is already
  suffering from lack of new affordable
  housing for at least the past eight
  years. Focusing resources and
  strategies on affordable housing is the
  only way to overcome this deficit.
- This Citywide People's Plan says to prioritize building the affordable housing first:
  - » Expand the types of sites that are eligible for 100% affordable housing development and building acquisitions throughout the entire City;
  - » Fund affordable housing development differently, leveraging all levels of government as outlined in the Action Plan;



- » Expand development capacity at San Francisco's community-based affordable housing development organizations and at the City;
- Aggressively purchase sites to be land banked in all areas of the city (purchased by San Francisco, community-based affordable housing developers and held for future affordable housing development as development funds become available).
  - » Low-income, American Indian, Black and other Communities of Color must be the ones who lead the prioritization of sites to be purchased for affordable housing development.
  - » Low-income, American Indian, Black and other Communities of Color residents must be the ones who define what "affordable" means for meeting the equity needs of each community.
- Efforts to "streamline" market rate housing approvals must retain community input:

- » The participation and expertise of our Cultural Districts and American Indian, Black, and other Communities of Color and low-income communities in development and land use decisions is crucial.
- » We can retain community input and significantly reduce the entitlement process so projects move expeditiously and predictably from application to a final decision.
- Demolitions must be closely regulated to protect tenants, otherwise developers will continue to abuse and displace tenants at rates that exceed the harms done during Redevelopment.
- Achieving these affordable housing goals, and securing the resources needed to achieve these goals must be the priority of San Francisco's housing policies in order to build a city that is truly based on racial, social and economic equity.

#### Land Acknowledgement

This Citywide People's Plan for Equity in Land Use is an offering from generations of people who have struggled in the city called San Francisco. As we bring this compilation of community plans together, to advise city planners and policymakers how to approach the next eight years of housing policies to truly centering racial, social and economic equity, we give thanks to and acknowledge that we are on the unceded ancestral homeland of the Ramaytush Ohlone who are the original inhabitants of the San Francisco Peninsula.

As the original inhabitants of this land and in accordance with their traditions, the Ramaytush Ohlone have never ceded, lost nor forgotten their responsibilities as the caretakers of this place, as well as for all peoples who reside in their traditional territory. As Guests, we recognize that we benefit from living and working on their traditional homeland. We wish to pay our respects by acknowledging the Ancestors and Relatives of the Ramaytush community and by affirming their sovereign rights as First People.

We also acknowledge the contradiction that western systems of land ownership impose on these unceded lands. This western, colonialist system grants land owners monopolistic control over the use of land. There are volumes of City laws that embellish those rights, and the State of California's laws further enrich the rights of owners, title holders, to profit from the land. Increasingly, these State and local laws diminish the rights of citizens to intervene for their own livelihoods, and move our settler constitutional democracy farther and farther away from any meaningful consideration for the Ramaytush Ohlone who have never ceded this land.



## How To Center Racial and Social Equity in City Planning

All organizations in the Race & Equity in all Planning Coalition (REP-SF) are committed to ensuring a future for San Francisco with diverse communities, stable, affordable housing and equitable access to resources and opportunities. This "Citywide People's Plan for Equity in Land Use" is REP-SF's collective vision for a racially, socially and economically equitable San Francisco.

Through community-based initiatives, often in partnership with City agencies, several of REP-SF's member organizations have created a rich collage of land use and housing plans that cover a significant part of the City. These plans are rooted in community, in people, in identity and culture, in principles of inclusive and

holistic planning, and in racial, social and economic equity.

REP-SF has assembled these housing and land use plans into this comprehensive document – the "Citywide People's Plan for Equity in Land Use" which has undergone extensive review and collaborative creation.

REP-SF believes that the analyses and recommendations presented in this People's Plan must be the starting point for any land use plan for San Francisco that is truly grounded in racial and social equity.

As San Francisco's Department of City Planning stated in its "<u>Draft Racial and</u> <u>Social Equity Impact Analysis</u>": "This is the



first San Francisco Housing Element that will center racial and social equity." The Housing Element is the collection of San Francisco's housing policies, as mandated by the State of California. These housing policies become a component of the City's General Plan. References to the "current" Housing Element are to the 2014 - 22 cycle. References to the "new" Housing Element are to the 2023 - 2031 cycle which is nearing the end of its approval process as we publish this "Citywide People's Plan" in November, 2022.

REP-SF believes that the analyses and recommendations presented in this People's Plan must be the starting point for any land use plan for San Francisco that is truly grounded in racial and social equity.

REP-SF is publishing this "Citywide People's Plan" as a reflection of the expertise and experience of our communities that provides a genuine path for the City to meet its racial and social equity goals for its housing policies. Both Planning's approach in drafting the Housing Element and the policies put forward in the draft did not center racial and social equity. Drafts of the Housing Element were instead grounded in a profit-driven, market-based strategy for building condos across San Francisco. Then Planning invited communities to provide comments on their market-based plan through questions and working groups that Planning directed. Planning's approach was unfortunately antithetical to equitable outcomes because it started with a profit-driven, market-based premise, entirely framed by the ideologies of Planning staff rather than starting from community plans and letting low-income and Communities of Color lead this process and frame the discussions.

As stated in the Mission District's Plan, "MAP2020," which is one of the community plans that was drawn on to form the basis of this "Citywide People's Plan":

"In the traditional Planning model used by many cities, including San Francisco, the city is the expert, convener, agenda setter and arbitrator. The city retains control and the community's role is to advocate. This model may work in some situations, but does not work well where there is a significant power imbalance or history of distrust between city and community. The groups that tend to participate in the decision-making process have the most power and resources, and are the most comfortable working with authority."

The Reclaiming Our Space (ROSe) book from the South of Market Community Action Network (SOMCAN) is another of the community plans that combine to form this "Citywide People's Plan. The ROSe book states a similar caution about Planning's standard approach:

"The process of planning in San Francisco and the United States. however, is from the top down and not the bottom up, oftentimes having negative effects on low income and working class neighborhoods and communities of color. For SOMCAN, community planning or people-centered planning is a process wherein a system of knowledge of the neighborhood or community is gathered and created from the bottom up, from the actual people who live and work in these communities, especially the most vulnerable people."

The ROSe book further describes what an Equity in Land Use approach would look like.

"The experts of community and people-centered planning are the people who live or have lived in the neighborhood - the children that go to the schools in these districts, the parents who have multiple jobs, the people with disabilities, the seniors fighting to maintain their residence, and the new immigrants and lowincome families struggling to make ends meet. This lens is very different

from the gaze of city planners who view land as different zones for profit by billion dollar companies and developers."

REP-SF acknowledges and appreciates the lengthy process that San Francisco's Department of City Planning led to gather community input into its Housing Element, but this lengthy process was not approached in a way that was centered and focused on racial and social equity. For a planning process to be truly centered on racial and social equity, it must start with the voices, needs, and aspirations of those whose voices are typically not prioritized in planning or land use processes or decisions, with the intention of providing for their needs first.

It is in this spirit, therefore, that REP-SF presents this "Citywide People's Plan for Equity in Land Use" to be used as the new reference point for San Francisco's housing and land use policies and strategies for the next eight years and beyond.

Community planning or people-centered planning is a process wherein a system of knowledge of the neighborhood or community is gathered and created from the bottom up, from the actual people who live and work in these communities, especially the most vulnerable people.



#### Background and Assessment

At the direction of the State of California, the City and County of San Francisco periodically updates the Housing Element of its General Plan. The Housing Element establishes San Francisco's housing policies based on estimates of regional job growth. The job growth is calculated and administered by the State's Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG). The distribution of these regional housing needs among the various jurisdictions of the Bay Area is called the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA). The Housing Element currently nearing final approval would guide the housing policies from 2023 to 2031.

Market-rate developers, regardless of the scale or size of their developments, are only interested in those with high-incomes, not middle or low-income.

The State of California and ABAG have assigned a mandate that San Francisco must ratify a set of housing policies in this Housing Element that will result in 82,069 new housing units from 2023-

2031. Of those, 46,598 of those are to be affordable to households that have low to moderate incomes. A majority, 57%, of all units should, therefore, be affordable for households with low to moderate incomes.

For the new Housing Element cycle, San Francisco's Planning Department started by producing a document called the "Housing Affordability Strategies (HAS)." The HAS shows how upzoning various parts of the City could allow development of roughly 150,000 new units to meet the goals of Plan Bay Area 2050, and meet the Housing Element/RHNA mandates along the way. Despite its name, Planning's Housing Affordability Strategies is largely a market-based housing production plan that assumes three insufficient strategies for affordable housing. 1) Building more market-based housing supply will lower housing prices. 2) Market-based housing developers will provide roughly 20% of "below market rate" units in their developments. 3) Affordable housing developers will continue building and purchasing 100% affordable housing at relatively the same rate as they have in recent years.

Planning primarily used profit and market-based premises as their starting point. But market-rate housing is funded by profit-motivated capital which is only interested in investing in markets with increasing rather than decreasing prices. Increasing housing inventory will never result in a drop in prices- new market-rate units will not be built in a declining market.

Together, these strategies incorporated into the Housing Element, add up to provide roughly 70% market rate and 30% affordable housing--which would not meet the RHNA mandate that requires a split of 43% market rate and 57% affordable.

People of color are more likely than those who identify as White to be living below poverty level in San Francisco. And as the Housing Element reports in Table 13 of its "Needs Assessment", the household

incomes of those identifying as "White/ Non-Latino" are far higher than the incomes of households that identify as American Indian, Black, Latino, and Asian. Despite a clear trend that market rate housing continues to increase in cost which results in decreasing opportunities for Communities of Color, this new Housing Element continues to hope that profit-driven developers will deliver racial and social equity for American Indian, Black, and other Communities of Color.

The principle underlying this entire
Housing Element is that building more
profit-driven, market rate housing
supply is an essential strategy for meeting
the Housing Element's racial and social
equity goals. Not only are market-rate
housing developers' business plans



developed around profitability instead of racial and social equity and economic inclusion, but there is increasingly an international market that has developed to distract the housing "market" from providing housing for people, but rather, as housing and gentrification experts recently laid out, tends toward greater commodification and financialization.

With each upzoning, and with each "density bonus" conferred to a developer, the value of San Francisco real estate increases. These are the factors that drive the price of real estate and the price of housing for the market. As we've seen through the major recession of 2008 -2013 and the COVID downturn, even with declining demand, prices of SF real estate have continued to climb because they reflect the value of the City's underlying infrastructure. With the increasing global financialization and commodification of housing, translating this value into prices is an exercise that reveals an increasing dissociation of housing prices from what everyday people who are seeking housing can actually afford.

Under these faulty premises, Planning continued with its work on the Housing Element, and convened Working Groups to gather community input into their market-based plan. Planning's framing for these Working Group meetings was to use a divisive and trickle-down housing approach. During these Working Group meetings, they asked questions such as, "If we were to focus anti-displacement

on certain high-risk communities, which ones, how would we define the target? (Geography, BIPOC, Black and American-Indian, Low-Income)." This type of question pitted communities against each other.

# Planning primarily used profit and market-based premises as their starting point.

Planning staff introduced another Working Group session as focusing on "Potential strategies to support the private sector to produce small multifamily for middleincome households." As noted above, the private, profit-driven sector is not motivated to develop housing that's affordable for middle-income households. Market-rate developers, regardless of the scale or size of their developments, are only interested in those with highincomes, not middle or low-income. Along these same ideological lines, one of the "key ideas" that Planning promoted during these workshops was to "Advance the social and economic diversity of San Francisco by increasing housing **production** including permanently affordable housing" (emphasis in the original).

Rather than starting with affordable housing, Planning started with the idea that we need to increase market-rate housing production, with some



much smaller amount (roughly 30%) of "permanently affordable housing" mixed in. Relying on market-rate housing production to advance diversity or affordability is trickle-down economics, hoping that taking care of the needs of the richest people will eventually lead to circulation of this largess, so resources trickle-down to meet the needs of everyone else. Of course it never works this way, so those most in need leave San Francisco if they can, and if they can't, more and more San Francisco residents end up on the streets without a home.

REP-SF strongly believes that because the City's approach to the Housing Element started with asking questions that were centered on the market instead of

equity, Planning has, therefore, come to conclusions and recommendations that will cause significant and irreparable harm to San Francisco's low-income, American Indian, Black and other Communities of Color.

Relying on market-rate housing production to advance diversity or affordability is trickle-down economics.

#### SF's Housing Element is a Repeat of Redevelopment

San Francisco Planning Department's Goals, Objectives, Policies and Actions as currently described in the Housing Element are an aggregation of government actions that support speculative, profit-driven development and displacement. While there are a significant number of equity strategies and tools outlined in the document, we are gravely concerned they will be largely ineffective against the vastly more comprehensive central strategies of the plan based in stimulating market-rate housing.

REP-SF is greatly concerned that the net effect of the Housing Element's policies will have significant similarities to the harms inflicted on <u>several Communities</u> <u>of Color</u> such as the Fillmore/ Western Addition, South of Market/ Yerba Buena Center, and Bayview/ Hunters Point during the days of "Urban Renewal" which was also called "Redevelopment."

Looking back at the documents from the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency, there is a quotation from "The Feasibility of Redevelopment In The South Of Market Area" published by the SF Redevelopment Agency on June 1, 1952:

"The South of Market area is best suited for light industry but it cannot completely fulfill this use until the dead hand of blight is removed. This,



redevelopment can do, by removing the old, decayed slum dwellings and inferior structures; by assembling the small inadequate and inefficient lots into parcels of usable size; by improving internal circulation in the large blocks which typify the area; and by stimulating redevelopment by private means within the area."

The reference to "small inadequate and inefficient lots" seems eerily similar to how SF's current Planning Department describes the less densely developed neighborhoods of San Francisco in the Housing Element proposed for 2023 - 2031. Planning wants private, market-rate developers to combine lots through this Housing Element like how in Redevelopment they strove to create "parcels of usable size."

REP-SF is greatly concerned that the net effect of the Housing Element will be harms on several Communities of Color similar to those during Urban Renewal.

This 1952 Redevelopment report further defines what were considered "small inadequate and inefficient lots" as being 25 feet wide by 75 to 90 feet deep. Today's lots in the western and

northern parts of the city that are being targeted for upzoning in this Housing Element, such as the Richmond and the Sunset, are pretty much the same size as the "small and inadequate lots" described by Redevelopment in 1952. The neighborhoods that Planning's new Housing Element is now targeting for upzoning and larger scale development are primarily developed with lots that are 25 feet wide by 75 to 100 feet deep. Although the SOMA Redevelopment Plan was describing that these small lots were "small" and "inefficient" for redevelopment as industrial uses, Planning today is confronting the same physical constraints as it attempts to force densely developed residential parts of the City into a much larger and more intense scale of residential development. Figure 1 shows the areas of the City where Planning proposes to increase zoning capacity for greater density of housing. This is excerpted from the Draft Environmental Impact Report published by the San Francisco Planning Department for the 2023-2031 Housing Element.

In order to accomplish what Planning is recommending in its Housing Element, developers will need to purchase a few, or several, adjacent lots, then demolish the existing housing and foundational community supporting businesses, leaving an irreparably broken community fabric. These strategies are gravely concerning because of the similarities between Planning's approach in this Housing Element, that enables and

incentivizes a for-profit developer to buy up existing housing and bulldoze it in order to build a large, new, expensive condo building, and the actions taken by the City's Redevelopment Agency several decades ago.

One major difference is that it's not the government entity (the Redevelopment Agency) buying the properties and bulldozing the residences. Instead, the government entity (SF Planning Department) is proposing to enable and incentivize market rate developers to do what the Redevelopment Agency did which is to purchase existing residences, then bulldoze them to clear the way for larger, denser market rate housing.

As we dug further into the previously referenced Redevelopment Agency report about SOMA, we found the following

assessment of the conditions at that time:

"The character of the area makes the assembly of property difficult, as owners of residential property, enjoying an income despite blighted conditions, are not prone to dispose of their holdings without the payment of a high premium by the industrial buyer."

These quotes from the 1950's seem eerily similar to how Planning views the western and northern parts of San Francisco in this new Housing Element. Planning sees existing structures such as two to four story buildings in the Richmond District, for example, as "inadequate and inefficient lots" that should eventually be assembled "into parcels of usable size." What they do not see is that these buildings are more densely populated



than it would seem.

Figure 2 shows all the multifamily housing that has been placed in service during the current Housing Element, based on data provide by the San Francisco Planning Department. This map shows that with the current zoning, developers for the past eight years have found it feasible to develop new multi-unit housing in every part of the City. All of this new development has been adding significant density to the western neighborhoods.

As in the Redevelopment's A-1 phase where residents of the Western Addition were displaced into adjacent low-income neighborhoods, the rezoning of the eastern neighborhoods in the 2000's saw thousands of working-class and lower-income residents of color displaced into overcrowding conditions and to other

low-income neighborhoods, in this case into the western and northern parts of the city such as the Richmond District. Multiple households often live in a single unit, and structures that look from the outside like single family homes are often renovated with additional Accessory Dwelling Units. They are full of families and people with low incomes, displaced from other neighborhoods. Instead of using the infamous bulldozers that were the emblematic tool of "Redevelopment," Planning describes throughout the Housing Element how it recommends various government actions that will add up to have the same effect as the bulldozers by "stimulating redevelopment by private means within the area."

The Redevelopment A-2 phase saw the displaced residents of the A-1 phase who managed to stay in the City by moving



into overcrowding conditions, ultimately completely uprooted and forced these residents from San Francisco. With the current pressures on Black, Filipino, and Latinx communities that are precariously down to 5.7%, 4.07% and 15.6% respectively, it is anticipated that if Planning continues to view upzoning as a next phase solution in already dense urban neighborhoods, and we will see these populations erased from San Francisco during the period of the next Housing Element. Please see Figures 3 through 5 that show where the Black, Filipino and Latinx populations changed from 2010 to 2020 based on data from the US Census

In Section 1C of the Action Plan, outlined in this "Citywide People's Plan" below, there is a detailed process for addressing demolitions in order to prevent massive displacement of low-income and Communities of Color like what happened during Redevelopment. If the City fails

to adopt such a process for demolitions, the impacts of this new Housing Element could be even more devastating and widespread than during Redevelopment.

SF Planning is proposing to enable and incentivize market rate developers to do what the Redevelopment Agency did which is to purchase existing residences, then bulldoze them to clear the way for larger, denser market rate housing.



## A Comprehensive Plan for Affordable Housing

For several decades, Planning's approach has been to devise ways of incentivizing and enabling for-profit, market-based development, while leaving affordable housing strategies to the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development (MOHCD). This approach has left the affordable housing community without any kind of land use or significant long term resource plan, and communities are left without a holistic approach to planning resilient, diverse communities.

This has left San Francisco's affordable housing developers to work on a transactional basis, identifying and negotiating for development prospects one at a time without a comprehensive land use and community engagement strategy that is coordinated between Planning and MOHCD. Since Planning is the lead city agency tasked with writing the city's housing policies in response to the State's requirement for a periodic Housing Element, the result is the same market-based approach that Planning always defaults to.

In order for the Housing Element to be approached in a way that truly centers racial and social equity, REP-SF believes that the fundamental question that the Housing Element should have started with was, how can we meet the State's mandated development goals in a way

that puts community expertise and racial, social and economic equity first? And how can we work together as a city, coordinating between city departments, to create a land use and resource plan that puts affordable housing and the needs of low-income and Communities of Color first?

The City's approach has left the affordable housing community without any kind of land use or significant long term resource plan.

Starting with a different question would have led to a much different set of actions and strategies which would have truly centered racial and social equity in land use. REP-SF member organizations have already engaged communities around questions that lead to planning for racial and social equity.

As stated in SOMCAN's ROSe report:

"As SOMA has the highest rate of development than any other neighborhood in San Francisco, it's important to ask who are these developments for? HighThe Housing Element should start by asking, how can we meet the State goals in a way that puts community expertise, and racial, social and economic equity first? And how can we work together as a city, coordinating between city departments, to create a land use and resource plan that puts affordable housing and the needs of low-income and Communities of Color first?

priced market-rate residential and commercial development gentrify and displace working class and immigrant communities in SOMA and across the city. Communities in SOMA must reclaim space and land for working people." These considerations are essential for communities throughout San Francisco.

We also know that there are structural issues with the way affordable housing is funded. In 2020, the California State Auditor released a detailed report about the funding and administrative barriers to affordable housing development across the State. This CA State Auditor's assessment concludes "The State Must Overhaul Its Approach to Affordable Housing Development to Help Relieve Millions of Californians' Burdensome Housing Costs." This report is vital because it details how "the State does not currently have a sound, wellcoordinated strategy or plan for how to most effectively use its financial resources to support affordable housing." Without

a plan for how to mobilize its financial resources effectively, the State squanders opportunities to partner effectively with local governments, like the City of San Francisco. This, in turn, leads Planners in San Francisco to rely on misguided, market-based strategies for addressing affordable housing needs. The State Auditor's report says:

"The State plays a critical role in supporting affordable housing development and the Legislature has declared that private investment alone cannot achieve the needed amount of housing construction at costs that are affordable to people of all income levels- including households earning 80 percent or less of their area's median income (lower-income households)."

Although these structural impediments hinder affordable housing development, the organizations in REP-SF continue to advocate for greater and more effective resources for affordable housing, and some REP-SF organizations (Chinatown

Community Development CCDC, Tenderloin Neighborhood Development TNDC, Mission Economic Development Agency MEDA) successfully develop significant amounts of new affordable housing through new construction and by purchasing and rehabilitating existing rental housing.

For decades, community plans have emphasized the need for affordable housing. This is from the Chinatown Plan of 1985:

"Study after study has documented the need for new housing to meet the needs of Chinatown's lowincome residents. Development of new market rate housing does not meet their needs and hastens displacement. It is low-income housing that Chinatown needs."

With this emphasis on low-income residents, the Chinatown Plan didn't seek to stop housing development. In fact, it's apparent that at that time, forprofit developers were so focused on building commercial and offices that the Chinatown Plan has detailed requirements for these commercial developers to build new housing to meet the needs of Chinatown's residents. Likewise, the Mission Area Plan

(MAP2020) says very clearly,

"The objective of this Plan is neither to freeze the neighborhood in time nor to prevent newcomers from moving in but rather to ensure that as change happens those currently living there and their children have the voice, to stay and not be forcibly displaced. It's about preserving the ability for the neighborhood to house all incomes and not lose the affordable rental stock, business and the richness and diversity of the neighborhood along with it."

The most important feature of all the Plans that are attached is the emphasis on people - on the needs and experiences of people, and the assertion that people live in communities, in neighborhoods, and that we need to plan for both people and neighborhoods, especially around the economic and social needs of those with low-incomes and those who are without shelter.

#### Compilation of Community-Based Plans

All of the community plans that REP-SF organizations have already put in place can be found in the folder that's linked from here. These community plans speak to the aspirations and self-determination, and broad engagement and expertise, of various communities across San Francisco in housing, development, land use, and holistic urban planning.

Many of these community plans have been supported by the City through funding and/or support from City staff. These are significant contributions of resources, yet, when the City initiates major land use policies such as the Housing Element, it doesn't start with these community plans, or make reference to them at all. Bringing all of

these community plans together for the first time shows clearly the breadth of community participation and community expertise in land use and housing issues. This "Citywide People's Plan" also demonstrates the long term commitment of resources by organizations throughout San Francisco to educate and engage communities, to cultivate and support community expertise, in land use, and strategies for empowering historically vulnerable and marginalized communities to build collective power and selfdetermination through engagement in land use and housing decisions and policies.

There are other community plans that are either in process (e.g. CHHESS reports from other Cultural Districts; updates to the SOMA Youth and Family Special Use District) by REP-SF organizations, or are noteworthy for their focus on equitable strategies and outcomes although not led

by community organizations (e.g. Sunset Forward). Plans will be added to the folder as they are completed. This "Citywide People's Plan" will also be updated from time to time as conditions and strategies change.

These community plans speak to the aspirations and self-determination, and broad engagement and expertise, of various communities across San Francisco in housing, development, land use, and holistic urban planning.



#### **Action Plan**

This Action Plan represents the collective expertise and experience of REP-SF's citywide membership, and the breadth of constituencies and communities united in putting forth bold and innovative solutions that center racial and social equity. Creating this Action Plan engaged the entire REP-SF Coalition through a rigorous, inclusive, and intentional process; including multiple working sessions, revisions by dozens of REP-SF members, and REP-SF's leadership development program, "Planning to the People: Land Use and Equity Training 2022," in which 20 new community members - ranging geographically, ethnically, and generationally - became engaged REP-SF leaders and directly shaped this "Citywide People's Plan".

This Action Plan, and the entirety of the Citywide People's Plan, is a testament to the expertise and commitment of REP-SF's membership in advancing a proactive, ambitious agenda to create new systems that will ensure an equitable San Francisco, for our communities now and for generations to come.

#### 1. Land Use

This section outlines strategies for identifying affordable housing sites, rezoning for density that facilitates and prioritizes development of affordable

housing, and purchasing sites for preservation and new construction of affordable housing. Currently, the Housing Element uses the framework of "high resource areas" as a rationale for focusing greater intensity and density of development in the Western and Northern neighborhoods of the City, and along certain prioritized transit corridors, but the Housing Element does not prioritize affordability, nor does it present a plan for meeting the RHNA goals for affordable housing. The set of strategies detailed below seeks to refocus the City's land use policies and strategies toward meeting the affordable housing mandates.

Although "high resource areas", per California's Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and

Tax Credit Allocation Committee (TCAC), are intended as areas where 100% affordable housing dollars should be focused, the Housing Element intends to build between 70% and 80% market rate housing in these areas. Despite the RHNA mandates being weighted heavily toward below market rate housing with 57% of the housing targeted to low to moderate income households, the Housing Element as drafted will only yield between 20% and 30% of the housing being affordable to low to moderate income households. Therefore, the intensity and density of development that Planning has proposed for the Western and Northern areas of the City must be reimagined as areas for intensive affordable housing development. There are three significant barriers to this re-visioning towards affordable housing that must be overcome.

First, the City needs to work in coordination at the Local, Regional and State levels to make new capital funding sources available for building affordable housing that are efficient and allow for reasonable per-unit development costs on sites where affordable housing developers can build as few as 10 units. This is not currently feasible because of constraints that come along with typical affordable housing funding sources. Not only are current funding sources for affordable housing not flexible enough to support smaller scale developments that fit practically within San Francisco's urban fabric, but the scale of funding sources is not available. REP-SF and the Council of Community Housing Organizations (CCHO) estimate that San Francisco will need approximately \$4 Billion per year for the eight year duration of the Housing Element in order to meet the affordable housing mandates. A plan for funding



affordable housing is in Section 2 of this action plan.

The City needs to work in coordination at the Local, Regional and State levels to make new capital funding sources available for building affordable housing.

The second barrier that must be overcome is securing sufficient land. A crucial strategy for securing land is to land bank as many sites as possible that are eligible for affordable housing under this new financing vision. This is the only way that this Housing Element will succeed in meeting its production mandates and its equity goals- by ensuring that we have the resources and land use strategies that prioritize development of affordable housing throughout the entirety of San Francisco. A plan for acquiring land for affordable housing is in Section 1 of this action plan.

A key strategy that is not emphasized enough throughout Planning's Housing Element, but is a core strategy in community plans is the acquisition and rehabilitation of existing apartment buildings and Single Room Occupancy (SRO) buildings. San Francisco's Community Opportunity to Purchase Act

(COPA) provides "qualified nonprofits" with negotiating priority to purchase these buildings, but the biggest impediment to bringing this program to scale has been a lack of funding. There are strategies to expand this strategy in the Action Plan below.

We appreciate the understanding that Priority Equity Geographies should be excluded from some of the increased market-rate housing upzoning and streamlining prescribed, and allow community-led processes for mitigating market-rate projects. This equity lens should be expanded to include additional areas where harms can be expected from these provisions, such as the high displacement risk areas identified in the Urban Displacement Project's California Estimated Displacement Risk Model and Cultural District areas. Similarly, these Cultural Districts are appropriately identified as needing special resourcing including funding to grow community businesses and the opportunity to give input on all housing projects. These areas should be clearly given relief from the upzoning and streamlining elements in the plan, rather than the partial mitigation policies that seem to be prescribed such as consultation in zoning changes and market-rate housing streamlining in exchange for unspecified stabilization benefits.

These are some of the major, new concepts that REP-SF recommends. The following list of Land Use related Action

Items provides further detail addressing a comprehensive set of strategies for Equity in Land Use.

#### 1A. A Real Plan for Meeting Affordable Housing Mandates

The City must develop and acquire/rehabilitate a total of 56,000 affordable housing units, approximately 46,000 from this current cycle plus approximately 10,000 deficit from last cycle. To break this down, this would mean nearly **5,100 new affordable units** in every one of San Francisco's eleven Supervisorial Districts by the year 2031.

MAP2020 (attached) already has established an affordable housing production goal of 1,700-2,400 affordable

units specifically for the Mission. This goal needs to be updated regularly to reflect additional needs since MAP2020 was published, the number of units actually completed, and units lost through demolition and conversion.

The Housing Element as drafted will only yield between 20% and 30% of the housing being affordable to low to moderate income households.

In order to meet these goals, communities working with the City must identify affordable housing development



sites in all 11 districts including publicly owned lands, and make sure that the total number of affordable units these sites will yield matches or exceeds the RHNA mandates. REP-SF encourages a community-based process to identify priority areas and priority sites.

- I. Work with low-income, American Indian, Black and other Communities of Color to identify and prioritize opportunity sites for affordable housing.
- II. Communities and nonprofit developers to work collaboratively with the City to design and implement an aggressive site acquisition and land banking strategy in order to secure and hold as many of the development sites as possible.
- III. Include sites throughout the Western and Northern areas of the City, where sites are typically small, and often less expensive than in more intensely zoned and developed parts of the city, through new funding models described in Section 2.
- IV. While targeting affordable housing for development in the Western and Northern areas, the City must not exclude ongoing significant investment in new affordable housing opportunities in the Eastern and Southern areas of the City (Priority Equity Geographies). There should be an overall increase in the amount of resources available for affordable housing, and an equitable distribution

- of those resources throughout the City.
- V. Include sites owned by religious institutions which have streamlined rezoning for affordable housing per prior ballot initiative.

A crucial strategy for securing land is to land bank as many sites as possible that are eligible for affordable housing.

- VI. Restrict development on publicly owned lands for 100% affordable housing, locally owned small businesses, and nonprofit organizations, especially community-based organizations. Adopting a framework of 100% affordable development on publicly owned land would create a major pool of land resources to maximize and lower the cost of affordable development.
- VII. The term "affordable" must be defined by low-income, American Indian, Black and other Communities of Color in terms that meaningfully promote community stability and uphold a right to housing. Potential standards may include, but are not limited to:
  - patterns of displacement: reparations for historical harms, affordability based on displaced house-

- holds' ability to return to their communities in SF;
- housing our essential workforce to sustainably live in the city they serve;
- ensuring that affordability is accessible to the youth coming up in the city, to people with disabilities, and to the elders that struggle to affordably age in place on limited fixed incomes, and based on the needs of current residents struggling to remain in their communities.
- going beyond the limiting standards set by federal, state, and local programs that nominally subsidize rents without achieving true affordability.
- reviewing the standard of affordability that households should pay 30% of their income toward their housing expenses. There is a proposal that payment standards be

set with a "residual income" measure. While this would generally result in reinforcement of the 30% standard, those with extremely low-incomes, and those in permanent supportive housing, would likely have their payment standard lowered to more appropriately reflect their ability to pay relative to other living expenses.

- VIII. Increase the percentage of units in 100% affordable buildings that are dedicated to households with extremely low and zero incomes, and ensure that appropriate levels of resources and funding are committed for additional intensive staffing required to ensure success.
  - A. Households with extremely low and zero incomes include: families in shelters, families crowded into SRO's, people currently living on the street, and others living in



overcrowded and unpermitted situations.

There needs to be 5,100 new affordable units in every one of San Francisco's eleven Supervisorial Districts by the year 2031.


### 1B. Public Input & City Processes

The City must establish a new project approval and entitlement process for market rate housing developments that retains public input and process, but has clear time frames for each part of the

process, so project reviews and approvals can take far less time than they do today while retaining democratic, public participation in the process.

- I. Our Cultural Districts and American Indian, Black, and other Communities of Color and low-income communities must retain the right to participate in development and land use decisions.
- II. Develop an entitlement review process that retains public input and participation while significantly shortening project approvals. This can be achieved by committing to statutory time frames for each step of the entitlement process so projects move expeditiously from application to a final decision. One example to work from is the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure in New York





City where the first step of the process takes only 60 days, but engages the public in a public meeting before the neighborhood-based Community Board along with the developer. Meetings are in the community, in the evening to ensure broad participation. The project cannot move forward until the Community Board finalizes recommendations based on the community input. These recommendations are submitted from the Community Board to Planning staff. This entire process must be completed within 60 days.

Although New York's process is citywide and comprehensive in its management of the entire entitlement process, we have a similar process here in San Francisco for how the "Community Board" part of the review process could be managed. San Francisco's Bernal Heights neighborhood has had a similar process in place for

decades through the <u>Northwest Bernal</u> <u>Heights Design Review Board</u>.

This is a <u>resource</u> describing the history of Community Boards in New York City, how they function, what their budget is, etc. This is another <u>resource that</u> recommends updates and changes to NYC's Community Boards.

The City must identify affordable housing development sites in all 11 districts including publicly owned lands.

III. Similar to the analyses required in New York, incorporate an equity analysis into the new approval process.

A. At a minimum, require developers to provide a demographics

report about the neighborhood surrounding their proposed development, along with detailed information about what the developer is proposing to build. REP-SF recommends looking to New York City's Equitable Development Data Explorer as a model.

The term "affordable" must be defined by low-income, American Indian, Black and other Communities of Color in terms that meaningfully promote community stability and uphold a right to housing.

B. REP-SF recommends reviving the Healthy Development Measurement Tool that Planning developed jointly with the Department of Public Health during the Eastern Neighborhoods rezoning in the 2000's. This HDMT provided critically important data about communities, and enabled evaluation of proposed developments and whether they furthered the building of healthy, holistic communities.

IV. Planning notices should be in clear,

plain language, translated into all of the City's official languages with a 3-dimensional drawing and clear description of what project is being proposed for the site. Currently, Planning notices that are posted at development sites are a jumble of code references, without any clear, plain language description of what the developer is proposing to demolish and/ or build.

#### 1C. Demolitions

Planning's new Housing Element recommends demolition of existing housing in a number of its strategies. Even without these new policies that encourage demolition, our communities have suffered massive displacement from demolitions as evidenced by the Housing Balance reports. Without the following recommendations, the Housing Element will continue to be tantamount to an Urban Renewal or Redevelopment strategy as described above. REP-SF strongly recommends the following new policy be included in the Housing Element and pursued on a priority basis:

I. A Conditional Use Permit will be required for every residential demolition and "tantamount to demolition." The Planning Department has recommended that there only be a public hearing if the residences are tenant-occupied, but current experience in our communities tells us that tenant advocates often need to

- force public hearings in order to reveal that tenants have either been forced to leave, or are still living at a property that a developer represents to Planning as being "vacant.
- II. If there are any rent controlled units existing at the property, every one of those rent controlled units must be replaced in the new development one for one.
  - For clarity, "rent controlled units" include the following pre-1979 structures: multiple but separate residential structures on a single property; single family homes with ADUs; single family homes with multiple, separate leases.
- II. These "replacement rent controlled units" are additional to any BMR units that the developer is required to provide.
- III. If the units proposed to be demolished or are proposed for extensive rehab that is "tantamount to demolition" are occupied, the developer must pay for temporary relocation for all occupants to other rental housing within San Francisco for the duration of the development. The developer will be responsible for finding this temporary housing, and will also be responsible for paying the difference between the tenant's current rent and the rent in the temporary rental unit for the

- entire duration of the temporary relocation.
- IV. The developer will pay all expenses for the tenant to relocate to the temporary housing, then will also pay all expenses for the tenant to relocate back to the newly constructed project.
- V. The developer will have these same obligations to all occupants at the property, including tenants and subtenants, and anyone living at the premises whether on a lease or not.
- VI. Once the development is completed, and the tenants return into their newly constructed, rent-controlled units, their initial rent will be the same as the rent had been prior to their temporary relocation, with the appropriate annual Rent Board increases applied.
- VII. If there has been a buy-out, or no-fault eviction at the property, including by Ellis Act or Owner-Move-In, the request for demolition will be denied.

## 1D. Affordable Housing: Acquisition, Preservation, and Enforcement

Achieving these historically ambitious levels of affordable housing production will require investment in capacities and strategies that have never been made before. Nonprofit, community-based affordable housing developers need to increase their staffing. The Mayor's Office of Housing will be managing projects and funding sources on a huge, new scale which will require additional staffing. Even the Planning Department will have to create a new permit review and expediting team that focuses on affordable housing developments. In addition, we need to be creative about how we approach existing buildings and other creative ways to create new affordable housing that go beyond just thinking about starting new construction from scratch

I. Invest in additional project management capacity throughout the network of San Francisco, community-

- based affordable housing developers, and at the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development.
- II. Invest in a permit review team at the Planning Department that has expertise in affordable housing developments.
- III. Tenants at Plaza East demand that Plaza East remain 100% affordable.

Without the following recommendations, the Housing Element will continue to be tantamount to Urban Renewal.



- A. The 270 market rate housing units that the City has included in the sites inventory for new market rate units must be removed.
- IV. REP-SF strongly urges adaptive re-use of unused commercial office buildings as affordable housing, beginning with an analysis of the unrealized potential in vacant commercial office buildings to yield affordable housing.
  - A. This strategy should include a plan for statewide advocacy for funding since this is not an opportunity that is entirely unique to San Francisco, and will require resources beyond what our City can provide.
- V. Need to support low-income homeowners to develop deed-restricted, affordable units added to their homes, and to create a program for nonprofit developers to provide project management and technical assistance to these low-income homeowners.
- VI. Update the <u>Small Sites/Housing</u>
  <u>Preservation Program</u> based on recommendations from CCHO and the SF Anti-Displacement Coalition, and significantly increase investment in this program as an anti-displacement strategy.
  - A. Deployment of the Small Sites
    Program should take full advantage
    of the Community Opportunity
    to Purchase Act (COPA) that
    provides Qualified Nonprofits with

- negotiating priority, and must be equitably distributed to address needs throughout the City.
- VII. Invest in staffing to strictly enforce the Short Term Rental and Intermediate
  Length Occupancy programs and provide a public registry of these units in order to limit, as much as possible, any conversions of housing to these corporate and commercial uses.

Achieving these historically ambitious levels of affordable housing production will require investment in capacities and strategies that have never been made before.

- VIII. Enforce the vacant homes tax, and encourage owners to make these homes available, or explore purchasing them with eminent domain if necessary.
- IX. Move forward with innovative recommendations of affordable and social housing models from the Housing Stability Fund Oversight Board (HSFOB).
  - A. This includes investment in new models of "social housing" which

- voters approved, and which the HSFOB has been working to define.
- X. Use eminent domain to purchase unused single story commercial buildings to be re-built for 100% affordable housing and community serving businesses.
  - A. Especially for supportive housing for those who are currently homeless.
- XI. Purchase tourist hotels to be renovated and converted to studio housing units.
- XII. Purchase residential buildings with high vacancy for affordable housing stock. Use eminent domain if necessary in cases where vacancy is the result of units being held off the market.
- XIII. Reclaim former SRO buildings that were converted to 'tech dorms' or high end 'student housing' and are empty or no longer viable.
- XIV. Support Community Equity and Ownership in Housing Development
  - A. Commit to a meaningful expansion of community ownership through preservation housing acquisition which opens up opportunities for community control of land and housing, meaningful tenant protections and strong tenant participation.
  - B. Support nonprofit affordable housing developers including

- community land trusts, tenant associations, housing cooperatives, community development corporations, etc.
- C. Support collective and limited equity types including homeownership, housing cooperatives, co-housing, etc.
- D. Expand support for the Community Opportunity to Purchase Act (COPA) to purchase existing apartment buildings through the Small Sites Program and to purchase new sites for 100% affordable housing development.

Project reviews and approvals can take far less time than they do today while retaining democratic, public participation in the process.

#### 1E. State-Level Advocacy

Two California State bills, SB828 and SB35 both passed in 2017, but their impacts are just now being understood broadly throughout California. SB828 is the bill that was supposed to fix the system for establishing the Regional Housing Needs Allocations (RHNA) across the State that was widely seen as being problematic. The result of SB828's new methodology for calculating RHNA was an explosion



of housing production goals across
California. The companion measure,
SB35 effectively allows developers who
propose to build a project targeted at
income levels for which a jurisdiction is
under-producing, to bypass any public
hearings or public input process. Since
the housing production goals caused by
SB828 are so extraordinarily high for every
jurisdiction and at every income level,
within the next couple of years, now that
new RHNA goals are set, SB35 will kick in
and every development proposal will be
able to bypass public hearings and public
review.

As if this situation wasn't bad enough, SB828 turns the RHNA housing production goals into mandates, and instead of providing resources from the State to local jurisdictions to help support the affordable housing mandates, SB828 instead threatens to withhold transportation and affordable housing subsidies.

Withholding state funding for transportation and affordable housing as a bludgeon to force jurisdictions to reckon with obscenely inflated housing production "mandates" is not just bizarre public policy, but is disempowering to communities, especially those that have been advocating for racial, social and economic equity and housing justice while suffering from the impacts of market-rate housing for decades. Mandates for building housing should respond primarily to the needs of communities that are most vulnerable to displacement and suffering most from the high cost of housing.

Along with these mandates should

come significant new resources for affordable housing, and efficiencies at the State level like those recommended by the State Auditor in their 2020 report, not the withholding of funding that could actually be used to provide the affordable housing that our communities desperately need. Both SB828 and SB35 must be significantly reformed either through amending legislation or through Statewide initiative

The result of SB828's new methodology for calculating RHNA was an explosion of housing production goals across California. Now that these new RHNA goals are set, SB35 will kick in and every development proposal will be able to bypass public hearings and public review.

Recent passage of AB2011 in 2022 has caused significant concern, because it will incentivize and "streamline" market rate housing in areas of the City that have already been severely impacted by decades of escalating market rate housing development. Many of these areas have seen significant displacement

of low-income, American Indian, Black and other Communities of Color as a result of the concentration of market rate development. AB2011, unless amended, and unless local controls are put in place, will cause significant, further displacement of these vulnerable communities, and drive up land costs in these neighborhoods contributing to the cycle of gentrification Further, AB2011 overrides existing neighborhood controls such as project conditions for approval intended to keep these communities stable, pushing market rate housing in many cases right back into the most vulnerable communities and away from upscale areas where building will be less profitable. Amendments to AB2011 are needed to protect small businesses from displacement by identifying buildings that have active small businesses currently or within the past 5 years as not being eligible for streamlining.

- I. Work with SF's two Assemblymembers to pass follow up legislation that amends AB2011 to mitigate the displacement and further harm it is poised to inflict on low-income communities and Communities of Color throughout San Francisco.
  - A. Advocate for new legislation that amends AB2011 to prevent the displacement of community serving businesses and working class jobs, ensure equity outcomes and neighborhood protection, and keep streamlined market-rate housing out of communities where it is

certain to have harmful impacts.

- II. Advocate for Ellis Act Eviction reform legislation at the State level to end the practice of LLCs purchasing buildings and using the Ellis Act or threat of the Ellis Act to clear the building to create speculative units.
- III. Advocate to repeal State Costa

  Hawkins legislation to avoid rent being increased when a unit is vacated.

Many areas targeted by AB2011 have seen significant displacement of low-income, American Indian, Black and other Communities of Color as a result of the concentration of market rate development.

- IV. Reform State Senate Bills SB35
  (The Housing Accountability and
  Affordability Act) and SB828 (Fixing
  RHNA Making Housing Assignments
  More Equitable)
  - A. Need to retain community input into development. As it stands, these two State Senate bills will combine to streamline all housing due to the fact that SF will not be

able to meet its RHNA mandates in any of the four income categories.

#### 1F. Holistic Communities

We don't just live in housing, we live in communities. Any set of policies for housing must include strategies for building whole, healthy communities. This has always been true, but the scale of the State RHNA mandates have the potential to change our built, urban environment faster than San Francisco has changed in any of our lifetimes. It is imperative that we meet this challenge by planning for communities that holistically support racial, social and economic equity.

- I. Any housing plan has to provide for other critical elements that make up a holistic, healthy, vibrant, diverse community.
  - A. Parks and open spaces that are accessible and allow for a range of community uses. So much of San Francisco's housing is small units, in buildings with little to no open space, so available, accessible open space is critical.
  - B. Locally owned businesses (including "production, distribution and repair" businesses) that provide affordable, culturally and linguistically responsive goods and services are also critical. These spaces, currently being rapidly replaced by market-rate housing, provide jobs and economic opportunities for residents, make residents feel welcome-like they are part of a

- whole community, and provide the goods and services that residents need at prices they can afford.
- C. Public transit improvements that are focused on linking neighborhoods to each other rather than being so focused on downtown. Increasing transit to hospitals, SF State University, and the various City College campuses. Increasing late night transit service between neighborhoods.
  - These transit improvements
     must be prioritized based on the
     increased benefits they provide
     to underserved Communities of
     Color.

# 2. Funding

Strategies for sufficiently funding affordable housing should take into consideration that existing funding mechanisms severely constrain San Francisco's ability to creatively develop affordable housing utilizing a number of

diverse affordable housing strategies. Simplifying the funding structures for affordable housing (refer to the State Auditor's report from 2020) will result in much faster implementation, and much lower per unit costs. This partial list below demonstrates the need for active and consistent advocacy, leadership, and coordination across public agencies and legislative bodies.

# We don't just live in housing, we live in communities.

For this Housing Element cycle, in order to achieve the affordable housing mandates, to support existing tenants to remain in stable, affordable, dignified housing, San Francisco will need at least \$4 Billion in annual capital subsidies from Local, Regional and State sources, especially sources of funding that do not currently exist.



San Francisco will need at least \$4 Billion in annual capital subsidies from Local, Regional and State sources, especially sources of funding that do not currently exist.

While this seems like an enormous sum, it's important to contextualize such a large amount. San Francisco's municipal budget is larger than \$12B, and California's \$235B budget maintains the 5th largest economy in the world. In addition to a re-prioritization of resources from these two large government entities, there is tremendous wealth in major San Francisco and Bay Area-based corporations that must be taxed. As of the end of September 2022, Alphabet had more than \$116B; Meta had more than \$40B; Apple had more than \$48B; Cisco had nearly \$20B in "cash on hand." This is just the cash on deposit and short term assets that can be liquidated immediately. And these are just a few of the corporations hoarding hundreds of billions of dollars that could be mobilized to guarantee stable, affordable, dignified housing for all, throughout the State of California.

It might be strategic to approach this significant funding expansion in phases.

For instance, if in the first year, there was \$1B to \$2B available, this could go a long way toward land banking development sites, and purchasing existing apartment buildings and SRO's. There could be increases in funding in future years to move the pipeline of new construction and rehabilitation forward, now that these critical properties are secured, while continuing to purchase additional sites to be land banked for the ongoing pipeline of development. In order to ramp up to bringing 46,000 new affordable units on line in eight years, it will take a massive increase in capacity to manage these projects, and a thorough plan for securing sites and moving each of those developments through the pipeline.

### 2A. Local

- I. Expedite implementation of the SF Municipal Bank to make construction term and permanent funding available for 100% affordable housing development and Acquisition/Rehabilitation projects. Municipal financing could be provided at far lower costs to projects, and therefore, provide a much greater efficiency of resources than the commercial sources of funding the City currently relies on.
- II. Require greater transparency through the City's budget and reporting process so there is full annual disclosure of every dollar that is restricted for affordable housing,



and its particular use restrictions; and every dollar that is unrestricted, and therefore, eligible to be spent on affordable housing. In terms of reporting, there should be an annual report of how much money was spent on affordable housing in the prior year and what that money was spent on.

- III. Conduct an updated Residential
  Affordable Housing Nexus Analysis
  and, if there is a demonstrated
  increased need for affordable housing,
  increase the Inclusionary Affordable
  Housing Fee.
- IV. Augment and allocate general obligation bonds, certificates of participation, housing trust fund,

general fund support, and allocate portion of city reserves, for critical affordability needs:

- A. Extremely Low-Income: Expand the Local Operating Subsidy Program, Senior Operating Subsidy, and create a Disability Operating Subsidy to cover more affordable housing and supportive housing options
  - 1. Including the Small Sites/Housing Preservation Program tenants for LOSP, SOS and DOS support.
  - 2. Create and expand options for tenants to have portable LOSP, SOS and DOS rental assistance.
  - These rental subsidies must be accompanied by significant funding for building repairs,

- especially for Small Sites Program buildings for the long term, so major capital repairs and replacements are not a financial burden borne by tenants.
- B. Explore progressive tax revenue measures, such as gross receipts tax, transfer tax, jobs-housing linkage fees, etc. and move these forward as each becomes viable.

## 2B. Regional

I. Regional Bond for affordable housing through Bay Area Housing Finance Agency that must be coordinated effectively with both the State and City of San Francisco funding sources for affordable housing.

### 2C. State

- I. Partner with the State for new dedication of State resources
  - A. Refer to the <u>CA Auditor's report</u> that calls for real coordination of resources between State funding agencies, and between the State and Local jurisdictions, and more efficient use of capital subsidies.
  - B. Support further and ongoing investment in the <u>Community Antidisplacement and Preservation</u>

    <u>Program</u> and use of this program in San Francisco.
  - C. Foreclosure Intervention Housing Preservation Program (FIHPP)
  - D. State bonds and state general fund support

- E. Annual statewide allocations into the local Housing Accelerator Fund in order to finance land banking and 100% affordable housing development
- F. Need to identify a constant, reliable, major source of capital funding to be added to the equity raised through the Low Income Housing Tax Credit program. If developing affordable housing costs roughly \$900,000 per unit, and roughly 20% of those costs are financed and 80% are subsidized, this translates to \$720,000 per unit times 56,000 units which equals \$40,320,000,000 (\$40.32B). If we commit just to meeting the 46,000 units, this equals \$33.12B in subsidies over 8 years (\$4.14B per year).
  - 1. This will require a partnership between the State and the City to prioritize subsidies for affordable housing at the scale necessary to achieve these goals- and to simplify the way funding sources are layered for each individual project.
  - 2. By identifying new, major, sustained sources of capital funding, it will expand the range of eligible sites that can be developed as affordable housing because nonprofit affordable housing developers won't have the massive fixed costs associated with LIHTCs that need to be spread out over 90+ units.
  - 3. Simplifying the funding layering

and coordinating affordable housing objectives and priorities between the State and City would speed up the development process, and bring more affordable housing units online faster.

### 2D. Federal

- I. Federal
  - A. Advocate for expansion of public/ social housing funding
  - B. Advocate for expansion of section 8 rental and homeownership subsidies

# 3. Capacity

Funding affordable housing and purchasing sites is not enough to meet the affordable housing goals. The City must increase communities' capacities to build and manage the new projects.

- I. Support expansion of nonprofit project management capacity, especially focused on areas of the city that haven't seen much affordable housing development.
  - A. Build capacity of American Indian, Black and other Communities of Color to lead on affordable housing development, especially in the



- Western and Northern areas of the City where the Housing Element proposes that most of the new development occur, and where there currently is no community-based affordable housing developer.
- II. Support augmentation of the project management team at the Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development to manage all the new funding for affordable housing, and to keep the high volume of new projects moving along expeditiously.
- III. Invest in a new permit review team at the Planning Department that focuses on reviewing and entitling 100% affordable housing.
- IV. Support new systems of property management and asset management for efficiencies and low cost/ per unit for expanded portfolios that include mid and smaller size buildings.

- V. Commit to a broad education and outreach program that is culturally and linguistically accessible, about affordable housing especially to parts of the city that haven't seen much affordable housing development.
  - A. Allow developers to do community outreach when they are responding to a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA).
- VI. Support the creation and expansion of culturally and linguistically competent neighborhood based organizations to acquire and manage residential properties
- VII. Support neighborhood efforts to create and implement community plans and strategies that address affordable housing needs.






Figure 2: Map of Multi-Family Buildings Placed in Service during the 2014 - 2022 Housing Element cycle. Data source: SF Planning Department



<u>Figure 4: Estimated Change in Number of Filipino</u> <u>Residents By Neighborhood (2015 - 2020). Data Source: US Census</u>






Figure 5: Change in Percent of Hispanic/Latino Residents As

President Walton and members of the Board,

I am Lori Yamauchi, a 41 year resident of San Francisco. I serve on the board of the Japantown Task Force, whose mission is to preserve and develop San Francisco's Japantown.

As one of three remaining Japantowns in the country, San Francisco's Japantown is a community that has been eviscerated by government policy, through the WW II incarceration and the City's Redevelopment program.

Japantown Task Force has been engaged in discussions with the Planning Department about the Housing Element over the past two years. Japantown has long enjoyed a collaborative relationship with the Planning staff, since it became San Francisco's first cultural district in 2013. The Task Force greatly appreciates that the 2022 Housing Element is focused on racial and social equity, with attention to communities of color harmed by governmental actions.

The Task Force affirms the need for more housing, particularly affordable housing, in Japantown. We appreciate that Japantown has been designated in the Housing Element as an Area of Vulnerability and therefore a Priority Equity Geography. At the same time, Japantown is located along Geary Boulevard, a transit corridor, where the Housing Element is promoting

more housing and is located in a Well Resourced Neighborhood.

Given its past collaboration with Planning staff, Japantown Task Force was surprised when it discovered in the April Draft EIR for the Housing Element that the Planning staff was evaluating potential rezoning to increase the height limit from 50' to 240', a nearly fivefold increase, and removal of housing density limits on the superblocks between Laguna and Fillmore, where the Peace Plaza, malls and theater are located. We were assured that the height limit increases are a hypothetical and not a legislative proposal, and any changes in zoning in a Priority Equity Geography like Japantown will not occur unless requested through community-led processes. However, we were concerned about the signals to property owners that the Housing Element maps send about potential height increases and the inflationary pressures on property value.

Since registering our concerns with the Planning Commission and staff over the past few months, we were notified today by Planning staff (and heard Director Hillis state to Supervisor Preston) that no rezoning of Japantown will occur unless requested by community led processes, and Japantown has been REMOVED from the increased height limit and density maps.

The Task Force looks forward to engaging our community in working with the City on creating an area plan, building on previous planning processes, to inform the development of community benefits that would mitigate effects of new development with affordable housing.

My name is Laura Gomez, and I have been resident at Plaza East Apartments in the Fillmore since 2011. The redevelopment proposed by our corporate landlord, McCormack Baron Salazar, will tear down 193 affordable units and turn them into a high-rise apartment complex with 270 market rate units, which will not only take away affordable units from those who need them, but also price out the remaining low-income residents of the Fillmore over time. We need to guarantee they restore the 273 affordable units originally at Plaza East, increase the number of below-market-rate units instead of adding market-rate ones, and address our unacceptable safety and habitability issues.

Housing policy that centers developers' power to build what they want, without ensuring they preserve and adequately maintain what they build for low-income tenants, is a recipe for displacement. That's why the People's Plan was created by tenants and housing experts to address racial and social inequality and the decades of displacement faced by people like me. Thank you.

Good evening Supervisors. My name is Maria Zamudio and I am with the Housing Rights Committee of SF and a member of the REP Coalition,

The REP Coalition appreciates the hard work of Planning staff to incorporate many of REP's recommendations into the Housing Element. However, we need your support because some extremely significant issues remain.

One such issue is the inclusion of 272 units of market rate housing at Plaza East into the housing elements unit count. The redevelopment of this community is still in the early stages, tenant input is still being gathered and there is widespread opposition to the inclusion of these market rate units by the residents. To include them in this count is an affront to the cities own planning process and the tenants right to have a say in something that would impact their daily lives for decades. Remove these 272 units from the count, NOW!

The only way to create a Housing Element that truly centers equity is to put deeply affordable housing first. SF has failed to meet its affordable housing goals for the past eight years. We have another chance to make this right so let's do it right and build and prioritize deeply affordable housing. There are 68,000 vacant units in SF, there are 276,400 millionaires and 62 Billionaires in SF, to the question of where the money is coming from, there is more than enough here. Dear President Walton and Members of the San Francisco Board of Supervisors,

We write to you as co-chairs of the Castro LGBTQ Cultural District's Land Use Committee who serve as representatives of the Castro Theatre Community Stakeholders (aka Friends of Castro Theatre). We urge you to vote "No" on the November 15th consent calendar item for extension of the landmark designation update process for the Castro Theatre.

According to the current status of this item, the Historic Preservation Commission must render its decision on the amendment to the landmark designation by December 13<sup>th</sup>, or the status will be automatically approved. During the previous 90-day extension granted to the HPC to review the proposed landmark designation, Planning Department staff conducted the necessary research and provided the Commission with their report (Article 10 Landmark Designation Fact Sheet, 10/05/22). The Commission's agenda includes this item for December 7, thus the December 13th deadline is completely feasible and the extension is not necessary to support the City's process.

Additionally, the delay to the theater's renovations and the ongoing loss of programming under Another Planet's management have already caused irreparable negative cultural impacts on the community and financial losses for legacy businesses. An additional extension will only worsen these negative impacts on the Castro neighborhood and community.

The public has already expressed clear support of extending landmark designation to include the theater's interior. At an August community meeting at the theater, attended by an estimated 800 people who filled the orchestra level and overflowed onto the balcony, audience participation and public questions both demonstrated much more opposition than support for the seat removal plan.

Moreover, Another Planet has already shown they are unwilling to take community opinions and needs seriously. Despite offers of collaboration, support, and compromise from the Friends of the Castro Theatre Coalition — which includes the three queer Cultural Districts, the Castro Merchants, the LGBT Historical Society, SF Heritage, and other organizations — Another Planet has refused to budge on their business plan. Their plan demonstrates they are not prepared to do business in the world's foremost LGBTQ neighborhood operating a cultural institution as valued worldwide as the Castro Theatre. Typically, their venues operate 10-15 nights per month and are otherwise shuttered; in 2019, the Castro Theatre operated 360 out of 365 days. Their leadership does not appear to center LGBTQ representation. Even more concerningly, they have declined repeated suggestions that they seek professional Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion training. A September meeting facilitated

by their lobbyist Alex Tourk showed Another Planet owner Gregg Perloff in his true form: as a bully. When community representatives and local political figures gently, but firmly requested a meaningful compromise, he grew upset and displayed aggressive and dismissive behavior towards community leaders. Mr. Tourk ended the meeting with a promise to get back in touch with community representatives with a compromise proposal; alas, this proposal never came.

Our stakeholders seek to connect theatre sustainability with historic preservation and community interest; Another Planet continues to see these as mutually exclusive. Prioritization of business interests has no due place in the City's review of a historic landmark. The raked floor, aisles, and seating at the Castro Theatre are character-defining features directly tied to community cultural intangibles as outlined in the HPC report. While Another Planet's business model relies on changing this movie palace and temple of LGBTQ culture into a live concert or high end event rental venue, it is historic preservation policies that must guide this decision.

We and other members of the Friends of the Castro Theatre are available to meet with you and answer any questions you may have about the nuances of the landmark designation update. The Castro Theatre is San Francisco Landmark #100, and we recognize its significance not just to the Castro, LGBTQ, and film communities, but to the city as a whole. Our sibling cultural districts and allied vulnerable communities are watching this process closely because of what it will mean for other cultural institutions at risk in other neighborhoods.

Again, we urge you to vote "no" on the November 15th consent calendar item regarding the theater.

Dear Clerk of the Board Angela Calvillo:

I oppose the applicant's request for an exception to the overly saturated number of bars in this technically determined "high crime" neighborhood.

The SFPD report, attached, reads, on P. 3 of 4:

"Applicant premise is located in a "High Crime" area.

Applicant premise is located in a "High Concentration" area."

["High Crime" and "High Concentration" boldface in original report.]

Consequent to the high concentration of bars and the high crime, SFPD approves the application with these two conditions:

- (1) No loitering, and
- (2) "No noise shall be audible at any nearby residence."

In direct contradiction to Condition (2), alcohol permit applicant writes that his business hours shall be "Daily 7 a.m. to 12 a.m.," and, further, his plan "is to make the shared space outside 775 Filbert a place where tourists and locals can come and 'lock their love' as the parkette will feature the words 'I love you' in every language."

While I admire the idea of painting "Love" in many languages on a shared space, what "love" does applicant show his neighbors when not a single one has written a letter favoring a business plan that includes a noisy outdoor space open until midnight?

\* \* \*

In this respect, it is important to note that many neighbors never received notice of the application, and, further, that the lowest edge of the requisite notice on the building is seven feet above the sidewalk, making it almost impossible to read.

\* \* \*

The Board of Supervisors should not approve this application nor the report of the Board's "Public Safety" Subcommittee because the conditions upon which the SFPD approved this, namely, "No noise shall be audible at any nearby resident" is contradicted by the applicant's own business plan.

Applicant's request is an egregious contradiction of the conditions that, "No noise shall be audible at any nearby residence."

### The Proposed Bar is Too Small to Run without a Shared Space

775 Filbert is 290 square feet. Most recently, it was used as a vegan grocery store, a neighborhood serving business. Applicant's stated plan to add square footage with a shared patio (a shared space) makes business sense, but it is not sensible for this location. Furthermore, it contradicts the conditions upon which it was approved.

Explanation of how the license will serve the public convenience or necessity:

First, to my knowledge I am the longest continuously operating African-American business owner in the North Beach neighborhood of San Francisco and opening Chez Brando is critical to my survival! Under my dba EBJ Enterprises, since 1999 I have been serving my community and like many other small business owners the pandemic has pushed me to the brink of closing my doors! I can't do that! I must continue, for myself and for the African-Amercian community at large! The importance of this really hit home just a few days ago. On August 29, 2022 while standing outside of 775 Filbert (Chez Brando) I was approached by a young African-American male! He told me his name, Christian, he then said, "I had been told by my girlfriend that I had to meet you. She said that you are opening this wine bar and I really wanted to meet you." I then invited him inside and we talked for about 30 minutes. I will never forget what he told me. Christian said, "It is so important to me that you open this wine bar. As a young

do it." Christian's dream is to open his own business in the food and beverage industry and seeing someone who looks like him, doing something he wants to do, really helps! Second, A unique opportunity! As I understand it, Chez Brando may be the 1st African-American owned and operated wine bar in all of San Francisco! Also, the Small Business Association asked that I include in this request the following, "San Francisco's Black population is only 5.4% with Black business owners less than 3%. Economic equity may be described as when the resources and available assets associated with the economy of a particular area or a specific region are considered to be balanced and allow citizens to participate in that economy without experiencing any bias based on race, creed, color, religion, or gender, etc. It is the fairness of a wide distribution of access to economic wealth. It means honest inclusion in a local economy in which all can take part, prosper, and reach their full capacity." Third, in addition to myself Chez Brando will provide jobs for at least 2 full-time employees and 1 or more part-time employees! Fourth, as my wine bar is French (featuring French wines, cheeses, and charcuterie) it provides variety, without presenting competition to the Italian, organic and other types of wine bars currently in North Beach! Fifth, the location is off the main thoroughfares and offers my neighbors a place to take a glass of wine or beer closer to home and we will feature a happy hour, something no wine bar in the area offers. I believe locals should be able to come home after a hard day's work and get a nice glass of wine or beer without fear of breaking the bank! Sixth, situated on the corner of Filbert street and Mason street, where the cable car passes and Alcatraz can be seen on clear days, Chez Brando offers tourists a classic "San Francisco environment and view." Additionally, my plan is to make the parkette outside of Chez Brando a place where tourists and locals can come and "lock their love" as the parkette will feature the words, "I love you." in every language! Seventh, a sense of quaintness. My neighbors and I have already had several "PotLuck" events at the parklette and the sense of community is incredible! Eighth, my wine bar also focuses on wine education and we will be helping people to overcome their ``fear of wine knowledge". With a background in chemistry, having done projects at Exxon, Coca-Cola, and the National Science Foundation and collecting French wines for many years I will offer San Francisco a unique experience! Whether it's drawing the actual chemical structures and formulas of wine components to help people better understand what happens when we drink a wine or discussing 2000 years of wine history, Chez Brando will be a place of community learning and sharing as much as a wine bar! Additionally, we will be inviting winemakers, sommeliers, and wine educators to give presentations. Ninth, to help other local businesses! I have already begun working with other businesses in the neighborhood and Bay Area to feature "local products" on the Chez Brando menu!



### Dear Board of Supervisors:

As Founder and President of The Green Cross, I am writing today on behalf of our organization to implore San Francisco to take immediate action to support the cannabis industry and its operators by approving Supervisor Mandelman's ordinance amending the Business and Tax Regulations Code to suspend the imposition of the Cannabis Business Tax through December 31, 2025.

By suspending the gross receipts tax increase on cannabis retail entities through 2025, this will allow cannabis retailers to stay afloat during these challenging times. As things stand right now, cannabis retailers in San Francisco pay their fair share of gross receipt taxes at a rate of 0.1%, which is the same rate as non-cannabis retailers. If this legislation is not passed, in 2023 the gross receipts tax rate for cannabis retailers will increase to 5.0%. No other retailers or types of business in San Francisco pay this high of a tax rate on gross receipts, especially during a time of economic turmoil when many businesses are still recovering from the pandemic, supply chain issues, inflation,

decreases in local tourism, fluctuations in BART ridership, costly COVID-19 safety measures, and vast declines in overall sales. We are also unable to take advantage of tax relief offered to other businesses as a federally illegal business. We are struggling right now and need your support more than ever.

The estimated revenue from this tax increase is \$10 million per year. Given that the San Francisco Controller has estimated that only 33% of cannabis retailers are a part of the legal regulated market, it is highly unlikely that cannabis retailers will generate the kind of revenue needed for this tax increase. This revenue is new and will not create a deficit for the City's Treasury if the tax increase is suspended.

As a nonprofit public benefit corporation in operation since 2004, The Green Cross is an integral part of the San Francisco community. We are one of the first licensed dispensaries in San Francisco and have worked hard to build strong relationships and gain trust with local public officials, constituents, residents, and our members.

Our top priority is to provide members with high-quality cannabis at affordable prices, which has become increasingly challenging with ongoing inflation and supply chain issues. It's also important to The Green Cross to offer our members a comfortable and accessible place to purchase cannabis and cannabis-infused products from professional and courteous staff.

The Green Cross has become known as an exemplar in community and outreach services by offering member consulting and compassionate care services that go above and beyond traditional dispensary services, showing the importance of cannabis not only to our members, but to the community and the local government as well. We strive to continue to offer these vital services moving forward.

A primary goal of The Green Cross is to promote social equity, including improving the social and economic conditions of our neighborhood, while providing living wages to residents of the surrounding area. At our storefront in the Excelsior District, we take pride in providing employment opportunities to talented individuals from diverse backgrounds, including many neighborhood residents. 



The houses in Treasure Island are very old navy houses which were built during the World War 2. So, we are easily suffering from the second smokes migration due to the very old poor ventilation system, thin walls and worn-out windows. I heard many complaints about second-hand smoke issues from my neighbors as well. We are the poorest people in San Francisco, and most residents share their houses with roommates. If they have to have a smoker as a housemate, there's no way to avoid second smokes and the victims are usually women. I reported this issue to the housing office, The Villages At Treasure Island, several times but they didn't resolve the nuisance issue because San Francisco allows indoor smoke, and we don't have smoke-free policy at our housing. I contacted Department of Health in San Francisco to inform our residents' difficulties, However, they weren't helpful to have smoke-free policy at our houses. Therefore, I want the California Tabacco Branch to help us to have a smoke-free policy on the lease at our villages.

For example, we have our own special policy of banning gardening at our back yards on the

lease as our island's soil can be contaminated by the radioactive materials during the war. Like this, our residents want to have smoke-free policy by considering that our houses are very old building, which are not remodeled due to the development plans and our community needs special protection for minors such as women and children.

And Los Angeles is on the path to reusing 100 percent of its wastewater by 2035.

But, as San Francisco's draft Urban Water Management Plan recently revealed, the city currently has no plans to make recycled water widely available in the next 25 years. 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

**Subject:** New Local Behested Payments Rules Now in Effect

Dear Commissioners and Board Members –

This email provides you with information from the Ethics Commission on local behested payment legislation that recently took effect and governs certain activities of City officials and employees.

Behested payments rules exist to help avoid real or perceived conflicts of interest or undue influence in City decision making. Following stakeholder feedback on new behested payment prohibitions enacted last January, and a public legislative process to consider further amendments, changes to the City's laws were adopted in late September. The Ethics Commission supported amending the law with the goal to balance the interests of improved clarity and workability while also retaining core behested payments prohibitions. Changes to the City's behested payments laws took effect on November 6, 2022.

The Ethics Commission has developed summaries of these changes so City employees and officers can familiarize themselves with them. The <u>changes are detailed on the Commission's website</u> and are also summarized in an <u>new Ethics Commission overview document on behested payments</u>.

In short, the City's revised behested payment law:

• prohibits the direct or indirect solicitation of behested payments from sources defined as "interested parties" by elected officials, department heads, members of boards and commissions, and designated employees that file Form 700s;

- narrows the scope of "interested party" and "attempt to influence;"
- shortens the length of time a contractor is an interested party;
- expands the definition of interested party to include lobbyist clients and affiliates of clients;
- creates new exceptions to behested payment rules.

These recently enacted changes also require the Ethics Commission to issue implementing regulations to define and illustrate key aspects of how the City's behested payments rules function. The <u>Commission will be considering draft regulations at its monthly public meetings</u> and new regulations may go into effect in early 2023.

## Dear Supervisors:

Article II, Section II of the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force By-Laws (required by Administrative Code Section 67.30(e)) states:

Attendance. Members of the Task Force shall notify the Task Force Administrator and the SOTF Chair if a member is unable to attend a regular meeting of the Task Force. The Task Force Administrator shall notify any member who misses two consecutive or three regular meetings in any twelve-month period of time. If a third consecutive or fourth subsequent Absence from a regular meeting occurs in that same twelve-months, the Chair or Vice-Chair (acting in the absence of the Chair) of the Task Force shall notify the Board of Supervisors of the member's lack of attendance.

Pursuant to this section, I am writing to inform you that Member Thuan Thao Hill (Seat 10) has missed the following regular meetings of the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force: 8/3/2022, 9/2/2022, 10/5/2022, and 11/2/2022.

Member Hill has explained to the Task Force that his absences are due to a serious medical condition, and he has appropriately communicated that to the Task Force Administrator and the Task Force Chair for each missed meeting. He anticipates returning to his duties on the Task Force in December 2022. However, in the near future, he will need to schedule a subsequent surgery which will require his absence for an additional two months at a minimum.

The full Task Force discussed Member Hill's absences at its meeting on November 2, 2022 and unanimously passed a motion urging your Board to allow Member Hill to retain his seat on the Task Force despite any absences which are due to his extenuating medical circumstances.

Since my appointment by the Ethics Commission as Executive Director in January 2016, it has been my privilege to direct our programs and operations and lead the staff through an important period of organizational capacity-building, transformation, and achievement.

Over the past three decades, voters in California cities and counties have established ethics commissions as non-partisan citizen oversight bodies to impartially shape, administer, and enforce political reforms in local government. Through their direct voter mandate, these agencies have a unique and vital role in promoting governmental accountability and public trust. With political will, focused purpose, sufficient resources, and a strong legal framework, local ethics commissions can lead needed change by developing, advocating for, and enforcing oversight laws and practices that strengthen the effectiveness of government and its responsiveness to the public.

The resolve of this Ethics Commission and its staff to make and sustain progress toward these ends has been well evidenced, and includes essential new staffing resources secured over the past nearly seven years through which the Commission has:

- developed meaningful public disclosure tools cited as "innovative transparency solutions" for other ethics commissions across the country;
