### **OEWD System Background**

The San Francisco Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD) is the coordinator of San Francisco's Workforce Development System, and provides direct support for 85 different communitybased organizations funded to serve over 12,000 participants in FY 2022-23. OEWD offers a full range of job and career services through job centers, training programs, and an online jobs portal. There are 26 job centers located throughout the City that connect San Francisco residents to job opportunities, job training, and resources. Some job centers offer career services just for people with special needs, such as veterans, people with disabilities, immigrants or refugees, LGBTQI community members, and people experiencing homelessness. These job centers are called Specialized Job Centers. Toolworks and PRC are Specialized Job Centers that are part of our workforce ecosystem and deliver services to individuals in recovery and individuals diagnosed with Substance Use Disorder (SUDs).

#### Toolworks

Toolworks is a non-profit organization dedicated to providing the tools and resources that promote independence, equality and personal satisfaction for individuals with disabilities. Toolworks serves as the OEWD Disability Coordinator which synchronizes outreach and employer engagement for our workforce programming specifically for individuals experiencing disabilities. They also provide job search and placement assistance to persons with disabilities, inclusive of individuals in recovery and individuals diagnosed with SUDs. Other workforce services Toolworks provides includes Bakeworks (culinary) and workforce recyclability training (waste-sorting not funded by OEWD) programs. Additionally, Toolworks provides wraparound services such as workforce barrier removal and career counseling.

## PRC

PRC provides services to individuals with HIV/AIDS, SUDs, and individuals in recovery or experiencing mental health issues. Their services include emergency financial assistance for short-term security; legal representation for access to basic income and healthcare benefits; and residential treatment, supportive housing, and employment training for longer-term social rehabilitation. PRC partners with OEWD to provide direct employment services such as career assessment and navigation, job search, and placement assistance for the aforementioned population. Other workforce services PRC provides include computer literacy programming and Lift Up – peer to peer occupational training – for black San Franciscans (not funded by OEWD).

## Job Training for Individuals Diagnosed with Substance Use Disorder (SUDs)

Toolworks and PRC enrolled over 200 individuals into workforce services in FY 21-22, and placed over 150 of those individuals into jobs.

## Toolworks Workforce Enrollment Costs

The cost per enrollment for Toolworks is approximately \$2,326. Below, please find a table that reflects the estimated cost to provide additional workforce services with Toolworks, provided that Toolworks has the capacity to take on additional enrollments.
