
#### SFUSD Central Administrative Expenditures and Staffing Analysis



- SFUSD invests more than some districts in certain areas (i.e. instructional supervision) and less than other districts in other areas (i.e. plant operations and general administration)
- 2. SFUSD is reviewing these areas to better understand the ways these expenditures support services at the school or not.
- 3. SFUSD spends more per pupil than other districts (thanks to the SF taxpayers!).
- 4. While we spend more on the central office than comparable districts, there are more schools in SFUSD, more staff at those sites, and more required programs that need central support and oversight.
