Ordinance amending the Administrative Code and Business and Tax Regulations Code as required by Proposition C, adopted at the November 8, 2022 election, to provide that the Homelessness Oversight Commission ("Commission") appoint all members of the Local Homeless Coordinating Board ("Coordinating Board"): that the Coordinating Board's sole duties are to serve as the governing body required to participate in the federal Continuum of Care program and to advise the Commission on issues relating to the Continuum of Care; that the Shelter Monitoring Committee ("Monitoring Committee") advise the Commission in lieu of the Coordinating Board; that the Our City, Our Home Oversight Committee ("Oversight Committee") advise and make recommendations to the Commission and the Health Commission; and that the Oversight Committee inform the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing's strategic planning process; and make further amendments not required by Proposition C to increase the number of seats on the Coordinating Board from nine to eleven; decrease the number of seats on the Monitoring Committee from twelve to thirteen; align the Coordinating Board's member qualifications with Continuum of Care requirements; prohibit members of the Coordinating Board, the Monitoring Committee, and the Shelter Grievance Advisory Committee ("Grievance

Committee") from serving on other City bodies related to homelessness; provide that the Commission appoint members of the Grievance Committee and the Monitoring Committee; require the Director of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("Department") attend Commission meetings and provide administrative support to the Commission and the Monitoring Committee; remove the Mayor's sole authority to appoint and remove the Director of the Department; require the Department to report to the Commission in lieu of the Coordinating Board for the Mayor's Fund for the Homeless and the Navigation Partnerships Fund; and require that the Grievance Committee and the Monitoring Committee provide reports to the Commission.

3	Ordinance amending the Administrative Code and Business and Tax Regulations Code
4	as required by Proposition C, adopted at the November 8, 2022 election, to provide that

19	and the Shelter Grievance Advisory Committee ("Grievance Committee") from serving
20	on other City bodies related to homelessness; provide that the Commission appoint
21	members of the Grievance Committee and the Monitoring Committee; require the

Asterisks (* * * *) indicate the omission of unchanged Code 7 subsections or parts of tables. 8 Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco: 9 10 Section 1. Background. 11 (a) On November 8, 2022, the voters approved Proposition C, which established the 12 13 Homelessness Oversight Commission ("Commission") to oversee the Department of Homelessness and Supporting Supportive Housing ("Department"). One subsection of 14 Proposition C, codified in Charter Section 4.133(h), requires the City to enact an ordinance to 15 amend various provisions of the Administrative and Business and Tax Regulations Codes to 16 reflect changes to the duties, methods of appointment, and reporting structures of several City 17 18 bodies that advise on issues relating to homelessness. The intent of this ordinance is to comply with the requirement set forth in Charter Section 4.133(h). 19 20 (b) This ordinance also makes changes that are not required by Proposition C. (1) These changes include increasing the number of seats on the Local 21 Homeless Coordinating Board ("Coordinating Board") from nine to eleven, revising the 22 23 gualifications of members of the Coordinating Board to align with federal requirements, and staggering the terms of the members, authorizing the Coordinating Board to create 24 subcommittees; and prohibiting members of the Coordinating Board, Shelter Monitoring 25

1	Committee ("Monitoring Committee"), and Shelter Grievance Advisory Committee ("Grievance
2	Committee") from serving on other City bodies related to homelessness.
3	(2) The ordinance removes the Mayor's sole authority to appoint and remove
4	the Director of the Department to conform to Charter Section 4.102. The ordinance requires
5	the Department to provide administrative support to the Commission and the Monitoring
6	Committee, and requires that the Director of the Department attend meetings of the
7	Commission, rather than meetings of the Coordinating Board. The Department also reports to
8	the Commission, rather than the Coordinating Board, regarding the Mayor's Fund for the
9	Homeless and the Navigation Partnerships Fund.
10	(3) The ordinance also provides for the Commission to appoint all members of
11	the Grievance Committee, other than the seat appointed by the Director of Health, modify the
12	composition of that committee, stagger the terms of the members, and require the committee
13	to report to the Commission at least once a year.
14	(4) The ordinance decreases the number of seats on the Monitoring Committee
15	from thirteen to twelve, provides for the Commission to appoint all members of the Monitoring
16	Committee, staggers the terms of the members, and requires that committee to report to the
17	Commission rather than the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor.
18	
19	Section 2. Regarding the Local Homeless Coordinating Board, the Administrative
20	Code is hereby amended by revising Article XXXI of Chapter 5, Sections 5.31-2 through 5.31-
21	4 <u>5</u> , to read as follows:
22	
23	SEC. 5.31-2. MEMBERSHIP.
24	The Coordinating Board shall be comprised of nine 11 members, appointed by the
25	Homelessness Oversight Commission ("Commission") as follows:

(a)	Seat 1 shall be <u>held by appointed by the Mayor and shall be</u> a homeless or formerly
homeless pe	erson.

- (b) Seats 2 through 1194 shall be held by people who appointed by the Mayor. The appointees shall represent relevant organizations, or projects serving one or more of the following homeless subpopulations in San Francisco: as the terms "relevant organizations" and "homeless subpopulations" are used in 42 C.F.R. Section 578.5(b), as it may be amended from time to timefamilies with children; single adults; veterans; the chronically homeless; unaccompanied youth; persons with HIV/AIDS; persons with substance use disorders; the seriously mentally ill; and victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking. For purposes of this subsection (b) regarding Seats 2 through 119, oOneany Board member may represent the interests of more than one relevant organization or homeless subpopulation.
- (c) Seats 5 through 8 shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors. The appointees shall represent one or more of the homeless subpopulations listed in subsection (b) of this Section 5.31-2.

 One Board member may represent the interests of more than one homeless subpopulation.
- (d) Seat 9 shall be appointed by the Controller and shall represents one or more of the homeless subpopulations listed in subsection (b) of this Section 5.31-2. One Board member may represent the interests of more than one homeless subpopulation.
- strive to ensure that the Coordinating Board represents a broad diversity of All of the relevant organizations and homeless subpopulations defined in subsection (b) of this Section 5.31-2 must be represented on the Coordinating Board to the extent that someone is available and willing to represent that subpopulation on the Board. The Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing shall maintain on its website a list of all of the categories of relevant organizations and homeless subpopulations defined by federal law and regulations or used by

1	the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD") in its Continuum of Care
2	Application, and shall provide such list to the Commission before appointment of a new
3	member to a vacant seat. At the time of appointment, the Commission appointing authority shall
4	identify the relevant organization or homeless subpopulation(s) represented by the appointee
5	(d) Members of the Coordinating Board may not serve on any other City body that
6	advises on issues relating to homelessness, including but not limited to the Commission,
7	Shelter Monitoring Committee, and Shelter Grievance Advisory Committee, during their
8	term(s) on the Coordinating Board.
9	
10	SEC. 5.31-3. ORGANIZATION AND TERMS OF OFFICE.
11	(a) Each member of the Coordinating Board shall serve at the pleasure of the
12	Commissionmember's appointing authority for a term of four years., except as qualified in
13	subsections (a)(2) and (a)(4).
14	(1) The term of office for each of the seats on the Coordinating Board appointed by the
15	Commission shall commence on July 1, 2023, at noon.
16	(2) To provide for staggered terms, the members appointed to Seats 2, 4, 6, and 8 shall
17	serve for an initial term of two years starting at noon on July 1, 2023 and ending at noon on July 1,
18	2025; thereafter the term for Seats 2, 4, 6, and 8 shall be a four-year term, with the first such term
19	starting on July 1, 2025 at noon. The members appointed to Seats 1, 3, 5, 7, and 9 shall serve for an
20	initial term of four years starting at noon on July 1, 2023 and ending at noon on July 1, 2027, with the
21	next four-year term starting at that time.
22	(3) If the Commission does not appoint a member to a seat prior to the commencement
23	of the term on July 1, 2023, the member of the Coordinating Board in that respective seat shall remain
24	as a holdover in the seat until the Commission appoints a member to the seat; provided, however, that
25	the holdover member serves at the pleasure of the Commission.

1	(4) Notwithstanding subsection (a)(1), the Commission has discretion to appoint
2	members to seats on the Coordinating Board prior to July 1, 2023, to serve on the Coordinating Board
3	for whatever time remains between such appointment and July 1, 2023, at noon.
4	(5) Members of the Coordinating Board who are seated as of July 1, 2023 prior to the
5	commencement of the term at noon, may be appointed by the Commission for that term provided they
6	meet the qualifications for the seat to which the Commission appoints them.
7	(b) If a vacancy occurs in any seat on the Coordinating Board, the <i>Commission</i>
8	appointing authority for the vacated seat shall appoint a successor to that seat, to complete the
9	remainder of the term of the vacated seat.
10	(c) Members of the Coordinating Board shall receive no compensation.
11	(d) Any member who misses three regular meetings of the Coordinating Board
12	without the express approval of the Coordinating Board at or before each missed meeting
13	shall be deemed to have resigned from the Coordinating Board 10 days after the third
14	unapproved absence. The Coordinating Board shall inform the appointing authority Commission
15	of the resignation.
16	
17	SEC. 5.31-4. DUTIES.
18	The Coordinating Board shall perform the following functions:
19	(a) Serve as the Continuum of Care governing body in accordance with applicable
20	U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD") rules and regulations, including
21	but not limited to 24 CFR Part 578 et seq., as amended. The <i>Coordinating</i> Board shall adopt,
22	and all members shall abide by, a written conflict of interest policy that complies with 24 CFR
23	Part Section 578.95(b), as amended.
24	

1	(b) Advise the <i>Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing on homeless policy</i>
2	and budget allocations. Commission on issues relating to the City's participation in the Continuum of
3	<u>Care program.</u>
4	
5	SEC. 5.31-5. MEETINGS AND PROCEDURES.
6	(a) The Coordinating Board shall hold a meeting not less than once every four
7	month <u>s</u> .
8	(b) The Coordinating Board shall elect officers and shall establish rules or bylaws for
9	its organization and procedures.
10	(c) The Coordinating Board may establish subcommittees to work on issues relating
11	to the City's participation in the Continuum of Care program.
12	
13	Section 3. Regarding the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing, the
14	Administrative Code is hereby amended by revising Article XXV of Chapter 2A, Section
15	2A.410, to read as follows:
16	
17	SEC. 2A.410. DEPARTMENT OF HOMELESSNESS AND SUPPORTIVE HOUSING.
18	(a) Establishment. There is hereby created a Department of Homelessness and
19	Supportive Housing ("Department"). The Mayor shall appoint a Director who shall serve as
20	department head and appointing officer for the Department. The Director shall serve at the
21	pleasure of the Mayor. The Department shall include such officers and employees as are
22	authorized pursuant to the budgetary and fiscal provisions of the Charter.
23	(b) Duties and Functions.
24	(1) Under the supervision and direction of the Director, the Department shall
25	manage and direct all-housing, programs, and services for homeless persons in the City

1	including, but not limited to, street outreach, homelessness prevention and problem solving.
2	coordinated entry, homeless shelters, transitional housing, and permanent supportive
3	housing, as well as certain designated functions set forth in Chapter 20 of this Code.
4	(2) The Director or designee of the Director shall attend meetings of the
5	Homelessness Oversight Commission ("Commission"), established by Charter Section
6	4.133 Local Homeless Coordinating Board, established by Chapter 5, Article XXXI of the
7	Administrative Code, and the Department shall provide administrative and clerical staffing as
8	needed to the Commission and the Local Homeless Coordinating Board and provide the
9	Commission and the Coordinating Board with the information itthey requests in the exercise of
10	its <u>their</u> duties.
11	(3) The Department shall have such other duties and functions as are assigned by
12	the Charter, an ordinance, or the Mayor pursuant to Charter Section 4.132.
13	
14	Section 4. Regarding the Shelter Grievance Advisory Committee, the Administrative
15	Code is hereby amended by revising Article XXXVI of Chapter 5, Sections 5.36-2 through
16	5.36-4, to read as follows:
17	
18	SEC. 5.36-2. MEMBERSHIP.
19	The Grievance Committee shall be comprised of 13 members. Seats 1 through 12
20	shall be appointed by the Homelessness Oversight Commission ("Commission")Local
21	Homeless Coordinating Board, established under Charter Section 4.133 Article XXXI of
22	Chapter 5 of the Administrative Code, and Seat 13 shall be appointed by the Director of
23	Health, as follows:

(a) Seats 1 through 4 shall each be held by a current or previous consumer of City

temporary shelter services in one or more of the following temporary shelter service

2	transitional h	nousing, or alternative shelter services (including, by way of example but not

4	(b)	Seats 5 through 8 shall each be held by persons who represent organizations or
5	projects pro	viding one or more of the following shelter services in the City: family shelters,
6	youth shelte	rs, single adult shelters, navigation centers, transitional housing, or alternative
7	shelter servi	ces (including, by way of example but not limitation, tiny houses, safe sleeping
8	sites, or reci	reational vehicle (RV) sites).
9	(c)	Seats 9 and 10 shall be held by a persons who represents an organizations or
10	project s pro	viding shelter client advocate services in the City.
11	(d)	Seat 104 shall be held by a person serving as arbitrator of shelter grievances
12	under the SI	nelter Grievance Policy, as described in Article XVIII of Chapter 20 of the
13	Administrativ	ve Code.
14	(e)	Seats 11 and 12 shall be held by any City resident with a demonstrated
15	commitment	to temporary shelter services.
16	(f)	Seat 13 shall be held by an employee of the Department of Public Health.
17	<u>(g)</u>	Members of the Grievance Committee may not serve on any other City body that
18	<u>advises on i</u>	ssues relating to homelessness, including but not limited to the Commission,
19	Shelter Mon	itoring Committee, and Local Homeless Coordinating Board, during their term(s)
20	on the Griev	ance Committee.
21	<u>(h)</u>	Continuing Membership on the Grievance Committee.
22		(1) Members of the Grievance Committee seated as of the effective date of the

ordinance in Board File No. shall by operation of law remain members of the

Grievance Committee for one year from the effective date of said ordinance. New terms for

members of the Grievance Committee shall commence on that date, and the Commission

1	shall make appointments to the Grievance Committee for those terms in accordance with
2	subsection (h)(2). Members of the Grievance Committee seated as of that date shall be
3	eligible for reappointment to the Grievance Committee by the Commission, in accordance with
4	this Section 5.36-2.
5	(2) To provide for staggered terms, the members appointed by the Commission
6	to Seats 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, and 12 shall serve for an initial term of two years; thereafter the term
7	for Seats 2, 4, 6, 8, 10, and 12 shall be a four-year term. The members appointed by the
8	Commission to Seats 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, 11, and 13 shall serve for an initial term of four years.
9	
10	SEC. 5.36-3. ORGANIZATION AND TERMS OF OFFICE.
11	(a) Each member in Seats 1 through 12 shall serve at the pleasure of the member's
12	appointing authority for a term of four years, except as qualified in subsection (h)(2) of Section
13	<u>5.36-2</u> .
14	* * * *
15	
16	SEC. 5.36-4. DUTIES.
17	The Grievance Committee shall perform the following functions:
18	(a) Advise the Department on the Shelter Grievance Policy, as described in Article
19	XVIII of Chapter 20 of the Administrative Code, including the Department's administration of
20	the policy and its regulations promulgated under the policy, and recommend any appropriate
21	changes to the Department.
22	(b) Receive and review reports relating to the Shelter Grievance Policy, including
23	but not limited to, reports sent to the Department under Administrative Code Section 20.18-8.
24	
25	

1	(c) Receive complaints regarding arbitrators as provided in Section 20.18-9 of the
2	Administrative Code and recommend to the Department any appropriate action in response to
3	such complaints.
4	(d) Provide an annual written report to the Commission by March 1 of each year
5	regarding the activities of the Grievance Committee during the previous calendar year, and,
6	upon the Commission's request, provide more frequent report(s).
7	
8	Section 35. Regarding the Shelter Monitoring Committee, the Administrative Code is
9	hereby amended by revising Article XII of Chapter 20, Sections 20.300, 20.303, and 20.304,
10	through 20.307, and 20.312, to read as follows:
11	
12	SEC. 20.300. FINDINGS.
13	The Board of Supervisors finds and declares the following:
14	(a) The City and County of San Francisco funds shelters and resource centers that
15	serve homeless people; and
16	(b) There is a significant public interest in determining that the homeless shelters
17	that the City funds are safe and sanitary, that the shelters' policies and procedures are fair
18	and meet the needs of the clients accessing shelter services; that operators receiving City
19	funds are complying with their contractual obligations to the City, and that shelter clients
20	benefit from the expenditure of public funds; and
21	(c) The Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, the <u>Homelessness Oversight Commission</u>
22	("Commission"), established by Charter Section 4.133 Local Homeless Coordinating Board, any
23	future advisory body created by the City and County of San Francisco, and the public, among

others, need to be able to access accurate and comprehensive information regarding shelters.

24

SEC. 20.303. PURPOSE.

The purpose of the Committee is to provide the Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, the <u>CommissionLocal Homeless Coordinating Board</u>, the public, and any other appropriate agency with accurate, comprehensive information about the conditions in and operations of shelters covered by this Article <u>XII</u>, as well as City policies in place that affect operations of shelters or their impact on shelter clients.

SEC. 20.304. POWERS AND DUTIES.

The Committee shall have all of the powers and duties necessary to carry out the functions of the Committee as follows:

11 * * *

(b) Reports. The Committee shall prepare and submit quarterly reports that shall include but not be limited to information on the following: safety in the shelter, cleanliness in the shelter, disability access to and within the shelter, family life in the shelter, a review of policies and procedures in place at the shelter, and any information received regarding the treatment and personal experiences of shelter residents. In order to enable the Committee to prepare reports required under this subsection (b), City departments that contract for services at a shelter that is under review must respond within 15 days to any reasonable request for information submitted by the Committee relative to the shelter or to City policies that affect shelter clients. The reports shall also include recommended action steps for the shelter and for the City department that contracts for services at the shelter. City departments and the reports referenced in this subsection shall not identify shelter residents or disclose any confidential information concerning shelter residents consistent with state and federal law. The Committee may issue emergency reports at any time it deems necessary. The reports shall be provided to: 1) the Mayor, 2) the Board of Supervisors, 3) the Commission Local

Homeless Coordinating Board, 4) the appropriate Ceity department responsible to take action, 5) the Ceity department that contracts for services at the shelter, 6) the shelter under review, and 7) the public. These reports shall be public documents. Any Ceity department identified in the report as responsible to take action recommended in the report shall, within 30 days of issuance of the report, provide to the Board of Supervisors a departmental report setting forth how the department intends to respond to the Committee's recommendations.

SEC. 20.305. MEMBERSHIP AND ORGANIZATION.

(a) The membership of the Committee shall reflect the diversity of the homeless people that access shelter in the City. The Committee shall consist of 123 members, appointed by the Homelessness Oversight Commission ("Commission") as follows:

Seat 1 shall be held by a person who is homeless or formerly homeless, and who is living or has lived with the person's homeless child under the age of 18, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

Seat 2 shall be held by a person who is homeless or has been homeless within the three years prior to being appointed to the Committee, and who has a disability, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

Seats 3 and 4 shall be held by a persons with experience providing direct services to homeless people through a community setting, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

Seat <u>5</u>4 shall be held by a person nominated by one or more community agencies that provide behavioral health, housing placement, or other services to homeless people, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

Seat <u>65</u> shall be held by a person who is homeless or formerly homeless, and who has been nominated by one or more nonprofit agencies that provide advocacy or organizing services for homeless people, appointed by the Board of Supervisors.

1	Seats 76 and 8 shall be held by a-persons nominated by one or more nonprofit
2	agencies that provide advocacy or organizing services for homeless people, appointed by the
3	Board of Supervisors.
4	Seat 7 shall be held by a person nominated by one or more nonprofit agencies that
5	provide advocacy or organizing services for homeless people, appointed by the Local
6	Homeless Coordinating Board.
7	Seats 9 and 108 shall be held by a-persons who are homeless or formerly
8	homeless, and who has have experience providing direct services to homeless people through
9	a community setting, appointed by the Local Homeless Coordinating Board.
10	Seat 9 shall be held by a person with experience providing direct services to

Each needs assessment shall be transmitted to the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to inform the Department's strategic planning process.
- (e) In conjunction with each needs assessment report, at least 60 days before issuing the report, the Committee shall provide a draft of the report to each City department discussed in the report, and allow the department 30 days to provide a written response to the Committee. The Committee shall include any such responses that it timely receives from departments in the report.
- (f) For purposes of this Section 5.41-2, the term "Homeless" has the same meaning as in Business and Tax Regulations Code Section 2810(h)(1).

[Administrative, Business and Tax Regulations Codes - Homelessness Oversight Commission and Related City Bodies]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code and Business and Tax Regulations Code as required by Proposition C, adopted at the November 8, 2022 election, to provide that the Homelessness Oversight Commission ("Commission") appoint all members of the Local Homeless Coordinating Board ("Coordinating Board"); that the Coordinating Board's sole duties are to serve as the governing body required to participate in the federal Continuum of Care program and to advise the Commission on issues relating to the Continuum of Care; that the Shelter Monitoring Committee ("Monitoring Committee") advise the Commission in lieu of the Coordinating Board; that the Our City, Our Home Oversight Committee ("Oversight Committee") advise and make recommendations to the Commission and the Health Commission; and that the Oversight Committee inform the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing's strategic planning process; and make further amendments not required by Proposition C to increase the number of seats on the Coordinating Board from nine to eleven; decrease the number of seats on the Monitoring Committee from twelve to thirteen; align the Coordinating Board's member qualifications with Continuum of Care requirements; prohibit members of the Coordinating Board, the Monitoring Committee, and the Shelter Grievance Advisory Committee ("Grievance Committee") from serving on other City bodies related to homelessness; provide that the Commission appoint members of the Grievance Committee and the Monitoring Committee; require the Director of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("Department") attend Commission meetings and provide administrative support to the Commission and the Monitoring Committee; remove the Mayor's sole authority to appoint and remove the Director of the Department; require the Department to report to the Commission in lieu of the Coordinating Board for the Mayor's Fund for the Homeless and the Navigation Partnerships Fund; and require that the Grievance Committee and the Monitoring Committee provide reports to the Commission.

Existing Law

Currently, the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, and the Controller appoint all members of the Local Homeless Coordinating Board ("Coordinating Board"), which currently consists of nine members. In addition to serving as the governing body of the federal Continuum of Care program, pursuant to 24 C.F.R. Part 578, the Coordinating Board advises the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("Department") on homeless policy and budget allocations.

The Director of the Department is currently appointed by the Mayor and serves at the pleasure of the Mayor. The Director or the Director's designee attends meeting of the Coordinating Board. The Shelter Grievance Advisory Committee ("Grievance Committee") is currently appointed by the Coordinating Board. And, the Our City, Our Home Oversight Committee makes recommendations to the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors.

The Shelter Monitoring Committee ("Monitoring Committee") currently issues reports to the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, the Coordinating Board, appropriate City departments, the relevant shelter, and the public. The committee also currently consists of 13 members appointed by the Board of Supervisors, the Mayor, and the Coordinating Board. The Department of Public Health provides administrative support and staffing for the Monitoring Committee and the chair of the committee attends meetings of the Coordinating Board.

Amendments to Current Law

On November 8, 2022, the voters approved Proposition C, which established the Homelessness Oversight Commission ("Commission") to oversee the Department. One subsection of Proposition C, codified in Charter Section 4.133(h), requires the City to enact an ordinance to amend various provisions of the Administrative and Business and Tax Regulations Codes to reflect changes to the duties, methods of appointment, and reporting structures of several City bodies that advise on issues relating to homelessness. The intent of this ordinance is to comply with the requirement set forth in Charter Section 4.133(h).

This ordinance would also make changes that are not required by Proposition C. These changes include increasing the number of seats on the Coordinating Board from nine to eleven, revising the qualifications of members of the Coordinating Board to align with federal requirements, and staggering the terms of the members. The ordinance would also authorize the Coordinating Board to create subcommittees, and require the board to advise the Commission on the federal Continuum of Care. The ordinance would also prohibit members of the Coordinating Board, Monitoring Committee, and Grievance Committee from serving on other City bodies related to homelessness.

Because the Commission has all power and duties listed in Charter Section 4.102, including nomination and removal of a department head, the ordinance would remove the Mayor's sole authority to appoint and remove the Director of the Department. The ordinance would also require the Department to provide administrative support to the Commission and the Monitoring Committee, and require that the Director of the Department attend meetings of the Commission, rather than meetings of the Coordinating Board. The Department would also report to the Commission, rather than the Coordinating Board, regarding the Mayor's Fund for the Homeless and the Navigation Partnerships Fund.

The ordinance would also provide for the Commission to appoint all members of the Grievance Committee, other than the seat appointed by the Director of Health, modify the

composition of that committee, stagger the terms of the members, and require the committee to report to the Commission at least once a year.

The ordinance would decrease the number of seats on the Monitoring Committee from thirteen to twelve, provide for the Commission to appoint all members of the Monitoring Committee, and stagger the terms of the members. The ordinance would also require that committee to report to the Commission rather than the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor.

WHEREAS, San Francisco Administrative Code Section SEC. 20.302 establishes the Shelter Monitoring Committee, giving it the mandate to "document its findings, submit reports consistent with [Article XII] to the Mayor, the Board of Supervisors, the Local Homeless Coordinating Board, the public, and any other entity, as appropriate. Subject to the fiscal and budgetary provisions of the Charter, the Department of Public Health shall assign two full-time employees to staff the Shelter Monitoring Committee. The Committee shall, among other things, receive and document complaints made to the Committee regarding shelters"; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing—despite the fact that it holds most of the contracts between the City and shelters, and in practice works in close cooperation with shelters to manage expenses and ensure their smooth operation, sharing many common interests with shelter managers—was tasked with drafting the very ordinance required by Proposition C that is supposed to assist the Homelessness Oversight Commission in overseeing said department, and included a clause stating that it will provide administrative support to the Shelter Monitoring Committee (replacing the Department of Public Health); and

WHEREAS, the Shelter Monitoring Committee—whose purpose is to provide the public and appropriate agencies with accurate, comprehensive information about the conditions in and operations of shelters, as well as City policies in place that affect operations of shelters or their impact on shelter clients—did not have the opportunity to provide input into the drafting of said ordinance; and

WHEREAS, Article II, Section 5 of the bylaws of the Shelter Monitoring Committee states that Committee Members shall *not* conduct site visits at a site where their agency holds a contract with said site, to avoid the potential conflict of interest this would entail and to be in a position to objectively assess and to offer serious, constructive criticism of shelters; and

WHEREAS, moving administration of the Shelter Monitoring Committee from the Department of Public Health to the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing would make said Committee *less* effective, insofar as the staff of the Shelter Monitoring Committee, who interact with unhoused clients regularly and frequently, would be less able to gain their confidence and, as front-line staff of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing, less likely to be seen by clients as impartial; and

WHEREAS, leaving out the clause that moves administration of the Shelter Monitoring Committee from the Department of Public Health to the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing will in no way impede the implementation of Proposition C; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That Shelter Monitoring Committee requests and recommends that what is not broken not be "fixed"; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the staff of Shelter Monitoring Committee not be moved under the administration of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing, but instead remain, independent and impartial, under the administration of the Department of Public Health, where they have resided for almost two decades and are in an excellent position to assist the Members of the Shelter Monitoring Committee to provide accurate, comprehensive information about the conditions in and operations of shelters covered by Article XII of the San Francisco Administrative Code, without having to consider whether senior HSH staff may look askance at the findings of said Committee when or if these could be seen as critical of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing or entail significant efforts on their part to resolve.

Board of Supervisors Rules of Order 2.21 establishes certain criteria that must be included in legislation creating and establishing, or reauthorizing, new bodies (boards/commissions/task forces/advisory bodies) and requires the Clerk of the Board to advise the Board on certain matters. In order to fulfill these requirements, the following is provided.

Administrative, Business and Tax Regulations Codes - Homelessness Oversight Commission and Related City Bodies

On November 8, 2022, the voters approved Proposition C, which established the Homelessness Oversight Commission to oversee the Department. One subsection of Proposition C, codified in Charter Section 4.133(h), requires the City to enact an ordinance to amend various provisions of the Administrative and Business and Tax Regulations Codes to reflect changes to the duties, methods of appointment, and reporting structures of several City bodies that advise on issues relating to homelessness. The intent of this Proposed Ordinance is to comply with the requirements set forth in Charter Section 4.133(h).

Does a current body address the same or similar subject matter?

Yes. Proposition C, passed by the voters on November 8, 2022, change the duties and composition of the Local Homeless Coordinating Board (LHCB).



Language requiring the body to meet at least once every four months

Charter Section 5.31-5(a), entitled "Meetings and Procedures," states "The Coordinating Board shall hold a meeting not less than once every month."

Language indicating members serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority

Page 3, line 11, Section 5.31-3(a), entitled "Organization and Terms of Office," states "Each member of the Coordinating Board shall serve at the pleasure of the Commission."

Language establishing attendance requirements

Page 4, line 5, Section 5.31-3(d), entitled "Organization and Terms of Office," states "Any member who misses three regular meetings of the Coordinating Board without the express approval of the Coordinating Board at or before each missed meeting shall be deemed to have resigned from the Coordinating Board 10 days after the third unapproved absence."

Number of seats and qualifications

Page 2, line 10, Section 5.31-2, entitled "Membership," states "The Coordinating Board shall be comprised of nine members, appointed by the Homelessness Oversight Commission (previously Four members are appointed by the Mayor, four by the Board of Supervisors, and one by the Controller).

- Seat 1 shall be held by a homeless or formerly homeless person.
- Seats 2-9 shall be held by person who represents organizations or projects serving one or more of the following homeless subpopulations in San Francisco: families with children; single adults; veterans; the chronically homeless; unaccompanied youth; persons with HIV/AIDS; persons with substance use disorders; the seriously mentally ill; and victims of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking.
- Term limits (i.e., commencement date? staggered terms?)

Page 3, line 11, Section 5.31-3(a), entitled "Organization and Terms of Office," states "Each member of the Coordinating Board shall serve at the pleasure of the Commission for a term of four years, except as qualified in subsection (a)(2) and (a)(4). The ordinance does not specify how many successive terms a member may serve.

Administering department

The Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (DHSH) would provide administrative support to the Coordinating Board.



Reporting requirements

The Coordinating Board would serve as the Continuum of Care governing body in accordance with applicable U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("HUD") rules and regulations. The Board would advise the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing on homeless policy and budget allocations.

On a semi-annual basis, the Coordinating Board provides a written report to the Board of Supervisors consisting of the following information: updates on the implementation of the Continuum of Care Plan and the Ten-Year Plan, the status of the integration and coordination of the Ten-Year Plan with the Continuum of Care Plan, the status of McKinney funding, a report from the Shelter Monitoring Committee and any other policy issues of which the Local Board wishes to inform the Board of Supervisors.

Sunset date

These bodies are established by voter initiative; therefore, a sunset date is not appropriate since it will exist as long as the code authority enacted.

221008 Limiting Teleconferencing and Remote Public Comment at Meetings of the Board of Supervisors and its Committees

Motion discontinuing remote participation by members of the Board of Supervisors ("Board") at meetings of the Board and its committees for reasons related to COVID-19; and discontinuing remote public comment by members of the public at meetings of the Board and its committees, except as legally required to enable people with disabilities to participate in such meetings.

230125 Administrative, Business and Tax Regulations Codes - Homelessness Oversight Commission and Related City Bodies

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code and Business and Tax Regulations Code as

required by Proposition C, adopted at the November 8, 2022 election, to provide that the Homelessness Oversight Commission ("Commission") appoint all members of the Local Homeless Coordinating Board ("Coordinating Board"); that the Coordinating Board's sole duties are to serve as the governing body required to participate in the federal Continuum of Care program and to advise the Commission on issues relating to the Continuum of Care; that the Shelter Monitoring Committee ("Monitoring Committee") advise the Commission in lieu of the Coordinating Board; that the Our City, Our Home Oversight Committee ("Oversight Committee") advise and make recommendations to the Commission and the Health Commission; and that the Oversight Committee inform the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing's strategic planning process; and make further amendments not required by Proposition C to increase the number of seats on the Coordinating Board from nine to eleven; decrease the number of seats on the Monitoring Committee from twelve to thirteen; align the Coordinating Board's member qualifications with Continuum of Care requirements; prohibit members of the Coordinating Board, the Monitoring Committee, and the Shelter Grievance Advisory Committee ("Grievance Committee") from serving on other City bodies related to homelessness; provide that the Commission appoint members of the Grievance Committee and the Monitoring Committee; require the Director of the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("Department") attend Commission meetings and provide administrative support to the Commission and the Monitoring Committee; remove the Mayor's sole authority to appoint and remove the Director of the Department; require the Department to report to the Commission in lieu of the Coordinating Board for the Mayor's Fund for the Homeless and the Navigation Partnerships Fund; and require that the Grievance Committee and the Monitoring Committee provide reports to the Commission.
