

1	[Supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 28 (Gabriel) - The Gun Violence Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Act]
2	
3	Resolution supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 28, introduced by Assembly
4	Member Jesse Gabriel, the Gun Violence Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Act, which
5	would state the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation to impose a tax on firearms
6	and ammunition sales to fund measures to protect against gun violence.
7	
8	WHEREAS, While California communities are torn apart by the devastating impacts of
9	gun violence, the firearm industry continues to reap record profits; and
10	WHEREAS, California State Assembly Bill No. 28 would impose a modest excise tax
11	on firearms and ammunition sales to fund gun violence prevention programs, including
12	funding for life-saving community-based violence intervention and prevention programs; and
13	WHEREAS, As survivors, families, communities, and taxpayers we all pay the
14	enormous costs associated with gun violence, whether we own a firearm or not; and
15	WHEREAS, Every year, gun violence costs the United States \$557 billion and costs
16	California \$41.9 billion, \$1.1 billion of which is paid by taxpayers; and
17	WHEREAS, Residents of communities impacted by gun violence experience lower
18	property values, fewer business startups, and loss of jobs; and
19	WHEREAS, While Californians bear the burden of tragic and costly gun violence, the
20	gun industry continues to reap historic profits; and
21	WHEREAS, In California, gun sales surged during the COVID-19 pandemic, increasing
22	56% from 2019 to 2020; and
23	WHEREAS, While the surge in gun sales slowed during the second year of the
24	pandemic, sales are still significantly higher than pre-pandemic levels; and
25	

WHEREAS, The number of known firearm owners recorded in California Department of
 Justice records increased by over 20% between January 1, 2020, and January 1, 2022; and
 WHEREAS, California State Assembly Bill No. 28 would allow the state to collect a
 small percentage of the revenue from gun and ammunition sales and direct money to vitally
 important programs focused on violence prevention, healing, and recovery; and
 WHEREAS, California State Assembly Bill No. 28 would establish the Gun Violence
 Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Fund, supported by a modest surtax on firearm industry

8 profits, to make long-term investments in a variety of important initiatives; and

9 WHEREAS, The Fund would support programs that prevent gun violence, protect and
10 heal survivors, improve implementation and coordination of gun violence prevention activities,
11 solve more murders and shootings, and promote justice and equal access to safety for all

12 Californians; and

13 WHEREAS, One of the programs that will be supported by California State Assembly

14 Bill No. 28 is the California Violence Intervention and Prevention (CalVIP) grant program,

15 which fund cities and community-based organizations that provide violence intervention and

16 prevention services to the communities hardest-hit by gun violence; and

WHEREAS, Life-saving programs such as CalVIP need sustained, long-term funding
streams to continue their work from year to year; and

WHEREAS, 43,000 Americans lose their lives to gun violence annually—an average of
more than 116 per day; and

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 28, as introduced, Gabriel. Firearms: gun violence protection tax.

Existing law imposes various taxes, including taxes on the privilege of engaging in certain activities. The Fee Collection Procedures Law, the violation of which is a crime, provides procedures for the collection of certain fees and surcharges.

This bill would state the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation that would enact a tax to fund measures to protect against gun violence on firearms and ammunition.
