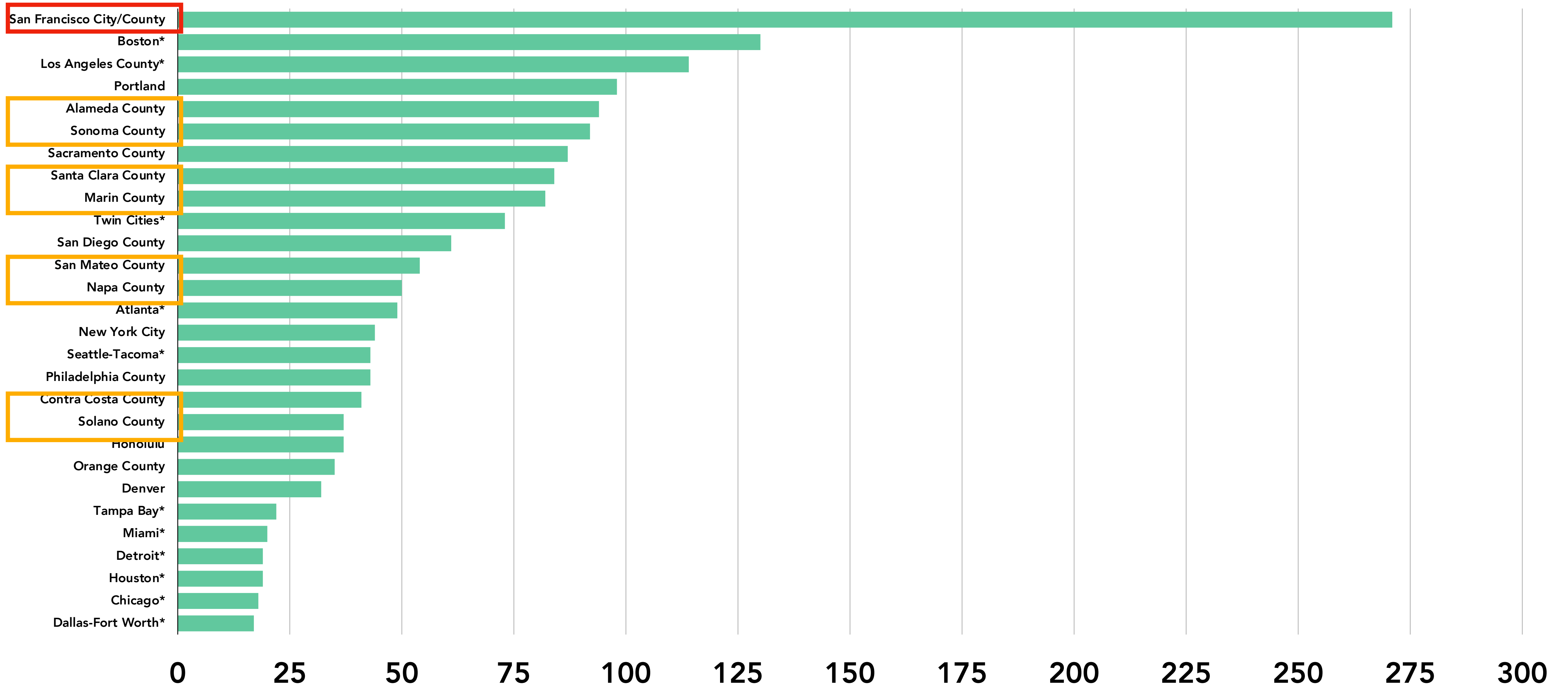

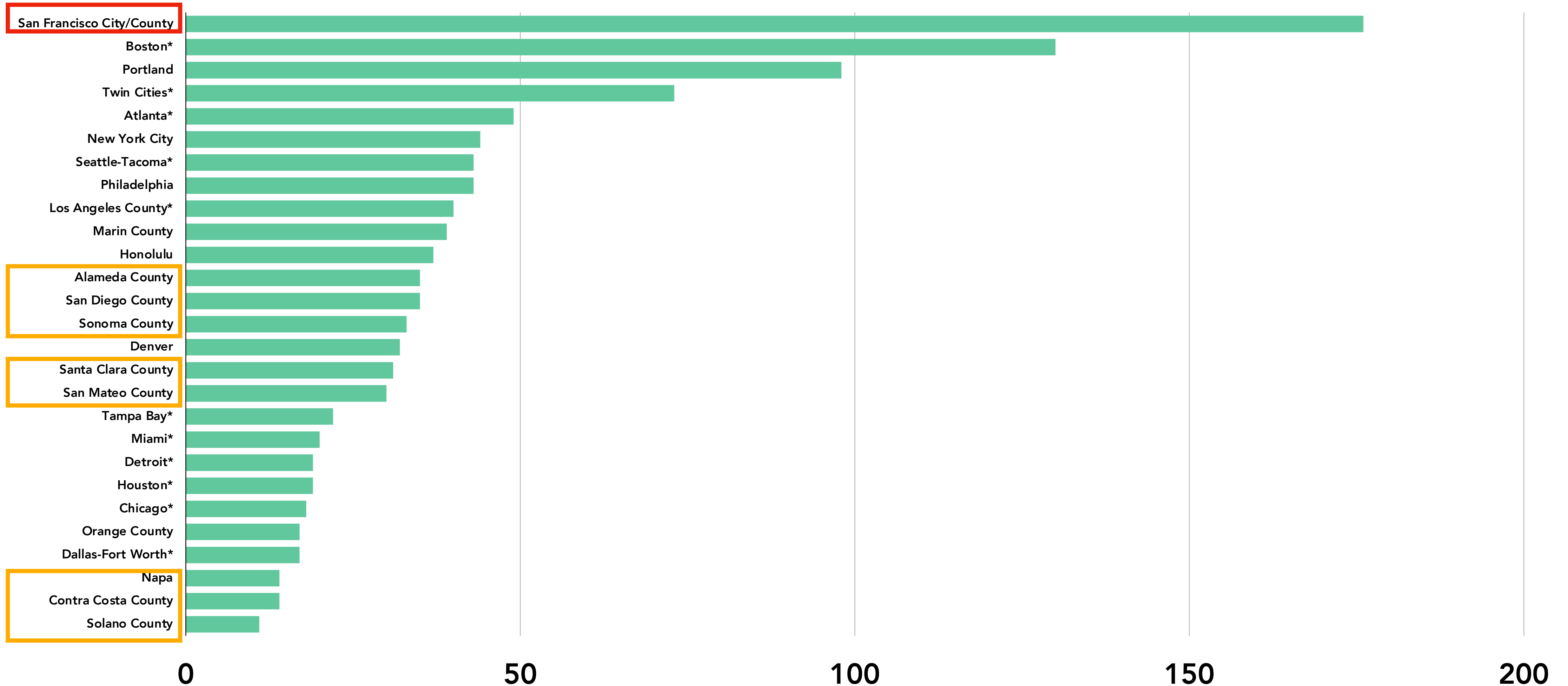
Prioritizing limited resources

All Homeless & Permanently Housed Per-Capita



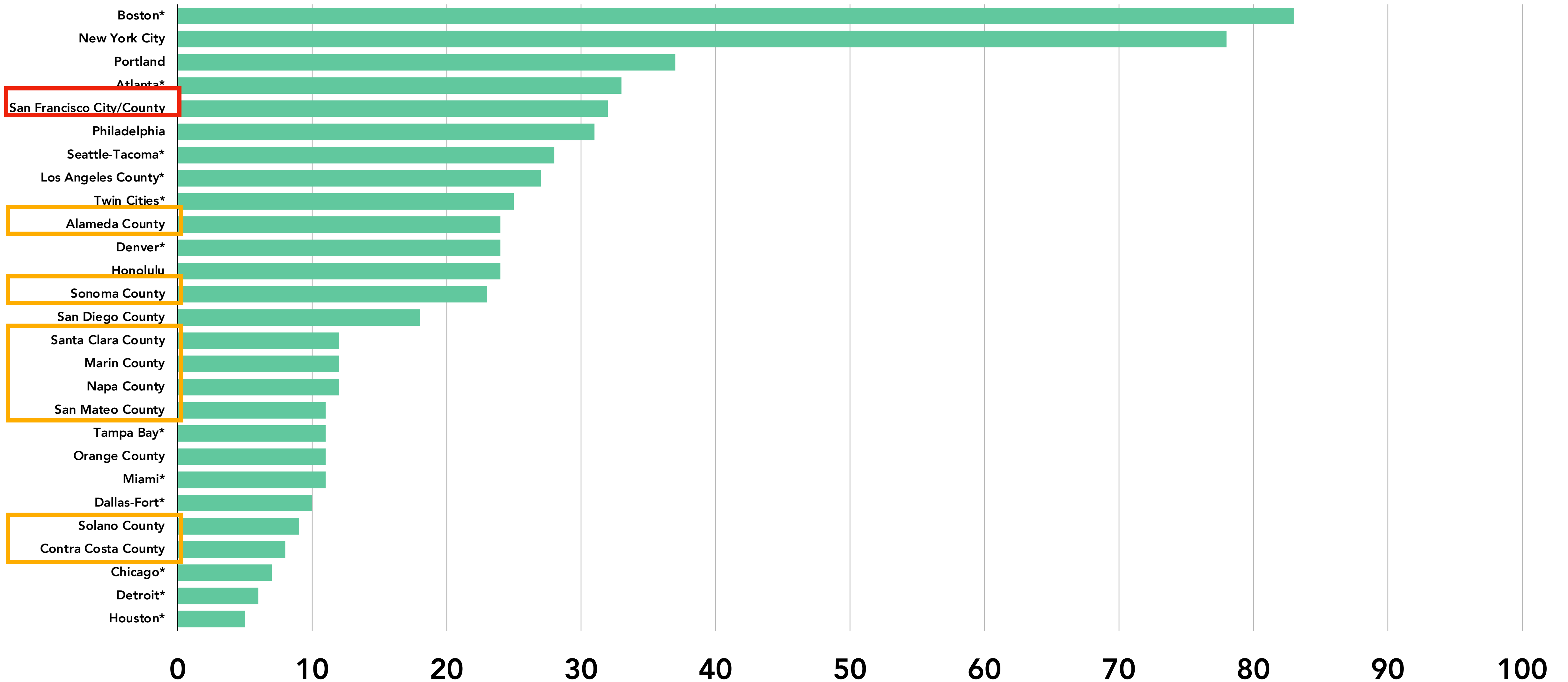

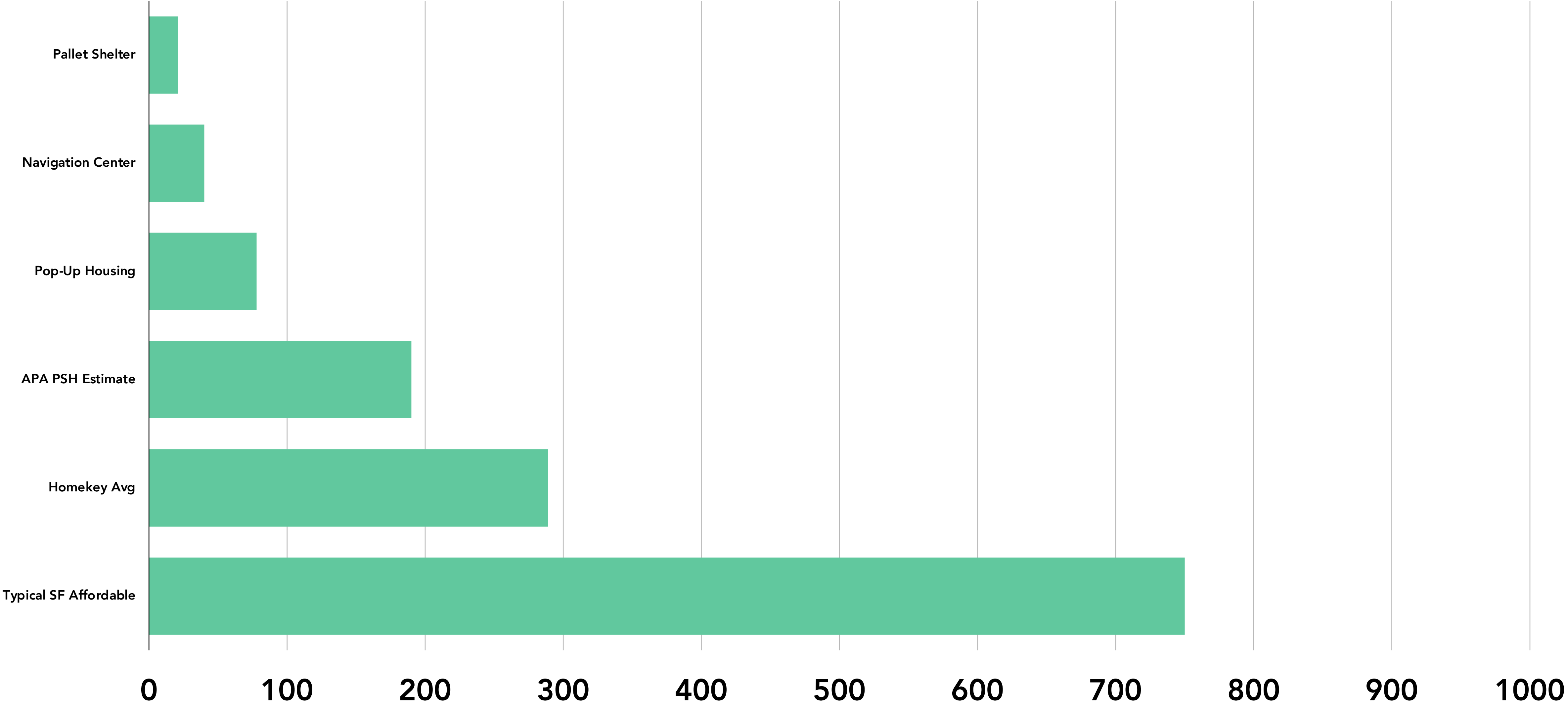
