<p>EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</p>	
<p style="text-align: center;">Legislative Objectives</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The proposed ordinance would (1) appropriate \$27,640,247 from the General Fund General Reserve to the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD); (2) de-appropriate \$31,151,450 from the SFPD salaries, mandatory fringe benefits, and public housing patrol overtime for increased overtime in the SFPD FY 2022-23 budget; and (3) release \$7,430,008 from Budget and Finance Committee reserve for SFPD overtime. <p style="text-align: center;">Key Points</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The SFPD FY 2022-23 budget includes approximately \$25.4 million in overtime within the General Fund. Due to staffing shortages and new initiatives, SFPD projects that it will spend \$81 million on General Fund overtime, or exceed its General Fund overtime budget by approximately \$55.6 million. • As of February 17, 2023, SFPD has incurred 445,664 overtime hours in FY 2022-23 within the General Fund, and projects to incur a total of 713,062 hours. By comparison, SFPD incurred 425,486 overtime hours in FY 2021-22. This increase is largely due to backfilling vacancies and absences as well as new or expanded initiatives using overtime, such as the Safe Shopper Program, Tourism Deployment Plan, Gun Violence Reduction, and Tenderloin Triangle Public Safety Plan. <p style="text-align: center;">Fiscal Impact</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The proposed supplemental appropriation of approximately \$27.6 million and re-appropriation of \$1.2 million from public housing patrol overtime would allow SFPD to close a projected deficit of approximately \$28.8 million within the FY 2022-23 salaries and fringe benefits budgets, assuming a \$30 million re-appropriation of salary savings to overtime. Any uses of the General Reserve during the current year (FY 2022-23) will increase the required deposit in the budget year (FY 2023-24) by a like amount. <p style="text-align: center;">Policy Consideration</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • To reduce the supplemental appropriation, SFPD could leave vacant positions unfilled, reduce technology project funding, reassign officers from specialized units, reduce overtime staffing of initiatives, and/or terminate contract funding. <p style="text-align: center;">Recommendations</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Approve the release of reserves and reappropriation of funds. • Approval of the supplemental appropriation is a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors. • Request the Police Department report back on the cost effectiveness of the Safe Shopper, Tourism, Gun Violence Reduction, and Tenderloin Safety overtime programs. • Request the Police Chief and Director of Human Resources to assess what is driving the increase in staff out on leave and modified duty and report back to the Board of Supervisors on administrative actions each is taking to return sworn staff to full-duty and any legislative actions that may assist with those efforts. 	

MANDATE STATEMENT

City Charter Section 9.105 states that amendments to the Annual Appropriations Ordinance, after the Controller certifies the availability of funds, are subject to Board of Supervisors approval by ordinance.

Charter Section 9.113(c) states that, in the event the Mayor or a member of the Board of Supervisors recommends a supplemental appropriation ordinance after the adoption of the budget and prior to the end to the budget year that contains any item rejected by the Mayor or the Board of Supervisors in the original budget appropriation, the supplemental appropriation can only be approved by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Supervisors.

Administrative Code Section 3.17 states that the Airport; Department of Emergency Management; Fire Department; Police Department; Department of Public Health; Public Utilities Commission; Department of Public Works; Recreation and Park Department; and Sheriff must obtain a supplemental appropriation to exceed the overtime budgets in their annual operating funds.

City Administrative Code Section 3.3(j) states that the Budget and Finance Committee of the Board of Supervisors has jurisdiction over the City's budget and may reserve proposed expenditures to be released at a later date subject to Board of Supervisors approval. The practice of the Board of Supervisors is for the Budget and Finance Committee to approve release of funds placed on reserve by the Committee, without further Board of Supervisors approval.

BACKGROUND

The San Francisco Police Department's (SFPD) FY 2022-23 budget includes approximately \$25.4 million in overtime within the General Fund. Of this amount, the Board of Supervisors placed \$7.4 million on Budget and Finance Committee reserve (File 22-0669). Due to staffing shortages, special events, and additional demands of police services (such as the Tenderloin Public Safety Plan and Safe Shopper Initiative), SFPD projects that it will spend \$81 million on General Fund overtime, or exceed its General Fund overtime budget by approximately \$55.6 million. To address this deficit, SFPD is requesting a supplemental appropriation of \$27.6 million from the General Reserve and reappropriation of \$31.2 million from salaries, mandatory fringe benefits, and project-based overtime. Additionally, SFPD is requesting the release of \$7.4 million for overtime from Budget and Finance Committee reserve.

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed ordinance would (1) appropriate \$27,640,247 from the General Fund General Reserve to the SFPD; (2) de-appropriate \$31,151,450 from the SFPD salaries, mandatory fringe benefits, and project-based overtime for increased overtime in the SFPD FY 2022-23 budget; and (3) release \$7,430,008 from Budget and Finance Committee reserve for SFPD overtime.

Staffing Shortages and Backfill

Exhibit 1 below shows a snapshot of the staffing, workload, and response times of the Police Department between 2019 and 2022. As shown below, full-duty¹ staffing has decreased by 16.5 percent and measures of workload have also decreased: 911 calls have decreased by 21.6 percent, self-initiated patrol activities has decreased by 55.7 percent, total violent crimes have decreased by 14.3 percent, and property crimes have decreased by 7.2 percent. We requested data on the proportion of time patrol officers spend on responding to calls and self-initiated activities but the Department was not able to provide it due to ongoing system maintenance as of this writing.

Staffing shortages have resulted in increased response times. Priority A response times have increased from an average of 7.5 minutes in 2020 to 9.1 minutes in September 2022, compared to a target of 8 minutes, and Priority B response times have increased from an average of 20 minutes in 2020 to 33 minutes in September 2022, compared to a target of 20 minutes.²

Due to the Department’s staffing shortage, SFPD’s number of self-initiated patrol activities has decreased. In addition, SFPD has utilized 119,394 hours of officer overtime to backfill vacant positions and absences, as of February 17, 2023, an increase from the 82,002 overtime backfill hours in FY 2021-22. According to Patrick Leung, SFPD Chief Financial Officer, SFPD typically did not use overtime to backfill vacant positions and absences prior to November 2021. Additionally, SFPD is using approximately 114 retirees to backfill vacant positions, as allowed under City Charter Section A8.511(c), which allows retirees to work for up to 960 hours per year while also receiving a pension. However, such workers are not considered sworn officers and are not able

¹ Officers are not considered full-duty if there are on leave or modified duty and therefore not available for field deployment.

² Priority A calls involve a present or imminent danger to life, major property damage, and or a suspect(s) of a crime that may be in the area and might be reasonably apprehended, a major crime scene that must be protected, a juvenile missing or involved in a sexual abuse or assault, or an elderly person or “at risk” missing person. Examples include shootings, multi-car pile-ups, suicide attempts, fights involving weapons, or in-progress burglaries. Priority B calls involve a potential for damage to property, a suspect who may be in the area, and a crime that has just occurred. Examples include burglaries without a perpetrator on-scene or verbal fights.

to carry out many of the Department's needs, such as sector patrols, but may assist with investigations or community ambassador functions.

Contributing Factors to High Overtime

In addition to backfilling vacancies and absences, SFPD has undertaken new or expanded initiatives using overtime, such as the Safe Shopper Program, Tourism Deployment Plan, and Tenderloin Triangle Public Safety Plan. As of February 17, 2023, SFPD has incurred a total of 445,664 hours in FY 2022-23 within the General Fund. By comparison, SFPD incurred 425,486 total hours of overtime in FY 2021-22. Of the 445,664 overtime hours to date, 340,023 hours, or 76 percent, fall within the category of "extended work week." This includes the backfilling of vacant positions, special event staffing, and any other use of overtime that is not associated with an arrest, investigation, court, or academy training. A comparison of overtime hours in FY 2021-22 and FY 2022-23 in key contributing areas are shown in Exhibit 2 below.

At an average overtime rate of \$113.52 per hour, SFPD's FY 2022-23 budget initially projected a total of approximately 223,348 overtime hours. SFPD now projects a total of approximately 713,062 overtime hours.

³ Hospital Watch refers to Police maintaining custody of people who need medical treatment, typically after they are arrested but before they are booked into the jail system.

Two-Thirds Vote Required

The Board of Supervisors reduced the Mayor's proposed FY 2022-23 General Fund budget for Police overtime by \$1,461,940. The proposed ordinance requires approval of two-thirds of the Board of Supervisors per City Charter Section 9.113(c), which states that supplemental appropriations related to items that were rejected by the Mayor or the Board of Supervisors during the development of the annual appropriation ordinance requires approval of two-thirds of the Board of Supervisors.

FISCAL IMPACT

The proposed ordinance would appropriate \$27,640,247 from the General Fund General Reserves to SFPD. Within the SFPD FY 2022-23 budget, \$31,151,450 would be de-appropriated from permanent salaries, mandatory fringe benefits, and public housing patrol overtime for increased General Fund overtime. The proposed ordinance would also release \$7,430,008 for overtime from Budget and Finance Committee reserve.

Proposed Appropriation

The proposed supplemental appropriation of approximately \$27.6 million and re-appropriation of \$1.2 million from public housing patrol overtime would allow SFPD to close a projected deficit of approximately \$28.8 million within the FY 2022-23 salaries and mandatory fringe benefits budgets, as shown in Exhibit 3 below. The \$28.8 million figure assumes the re-appropriation of salary savings into overtime.

Within the personnel budget, the proposed ordinance would de-appropriate approximately \$30 million from permanent salaries and mandatory fringe benefits to fund overtime, as well as release approximately \$7.4 million appropriated for overtime from Budget and Finance Committee reserve.

General Reserve

Administrative Code Section 10.60 requires the City to budget a General Reserve of at least 3.0 percent of General Fund revenues to address revenue weakness, excess spending, or other needs not anticipated during the annual budget process. The balance requirement is reduced to 1.5

⁴ The salaries budget includes permanent salaries, temporary salaries, premium pay, one-time pay, overtime, and holiday pay.

percent of General Fund revenues if the City withdraws from the Rainy Day Reserve and then increases 0.25 percent per year until the 3.0 percent balance requirement is fully restored. The General Reserve balance in FY 2022-23 is required to be 1.75 percent of budgeted regular General Fund revenues and 2.00 percent of budgeted General Fund Revenues in FY 2023-24.

According to Controller's Office FY 2022-23 Six-Month Budget Status Report, the FY 2021-22 ending balance of the General Reserve was \$43.8 million, and the FY 2022-23 approved budget includes a \$64.4 million deposit, resulting in a projected year-end balance of \$108.2 million. In FY 2023-24, the required deposit is projected to be \$18.5 million, resulting in a \$126.7 million balance at the end of FY 2023-24.

Any uses of the reserve during the current year (FY 2022-23) will increase the required deposit in the budget year (FY 2023-24) by a like amount.

POLICY CONSIDERATION

Options for Reducing Supplemental Appropriation

The Budget and Legislative Analyst reviewed the SFPD FY 2022-23 budget to identify options for funding overtime with less funding from the General Reserve. Within the General Fund, approximately 82 percent of SFPD's budgeted expenditures are within personnel costs. Opportunities to reduce non-personnel expenditures and materials and supplies spending are limited, as the Department is not projecting surpluses in these areas and may need to reduce contract expenditures to remain within budget.

Strategies that would reduce overtime costs include not filling vacant positions, reassigning officers in specialized units, and simply reducing the amount of overtime hours.

Vacant Positions

The Department has 110 vacant civilian positions and, based on current recruitment timelines, estimates that the cost to fill them in FY 2022-23 is \$1.9 million. In addition, the Department has a planned police academy in June 2023 that will cost approximately \$55,000 in FY 2022-23. Not filling these positions would reduce service levels assumed in the approved FY 2022-23 budget.

Technology Projects

The Police Department has General Fund funding for three technology projects: (1) Human Resource Management Replacement (HRMS Replacement), (2) National Incident-Based Reporting System, a new crime data system, and (3) a recruit database tool from Salesforce. All three projects have minimal spending as of this writing. Funding in these projects could be repurposed to reduce the proposed supplemental appropriation. As shown below in Exhibit 4, \$5.9 million of funding is available. Funding for these projects may not be needed in FY 2022-23, but will be needed in subsequent fiscal years.

Reassign Officers from Specialized Teams

The Budget and Legislative Analyst reviewed eight select units that had been identified for potential reductions in the May 2021 Public Safety Budget Priority Report: (1) Homeless Outreach Team; (2) Healthy Streets Operation Center (HSOC); (3) School Resource Officers; (4) Honda Unit; (5) Marine Unit; (6) Mounted Unit; (7) Bomb Squad; and (8) Traffic Unit. The number of officers between these eight units decreased from approximately 150 in March 2021 to 73 in March 2023, a 51 percent reduction. This leaves little opportunity for further reductions in these units. Reassignment of 10 to 20 officers from these units to fill other vacancies for three months (April – June) would reduce overtime costs by approximately \$590,304 to \$1,180,608, as shown in Exhibit 5 below.

Reduce Overtime Hours for Remainder of Fiscal Year

Between April and June, SFPD projects total overtime expenditures of approximately \$20,367,182. Overtime expenditures already incurred must be paid under federal law. At an average rate of \$113.52 per hour, this amounts to approximately 179,415 hours of overtime. If the Board of Supervisors were to reduce the amount of the supplemental appropriation, SFPD would be required to reduce overtime hours to keep expenditures within budget. Overtime projections in scenarios up to a 30 percent reduction are shown in Exhibit 6 below.

SFPD may achieve savings by reducing staffing levels for various policing priorities, such as the Safe Shopper Program, Tourism Deployment Plan, or Tenderloin Triangle Public Safety Plan. These are new initiatives that surge Police staffing within specific areas of the City but it is not clear what impact they are having on crime and street conditions. In addition, overtime for gun violence reduction has expanded beyond historical levels. The Board of Supervisors should request the Police Department report back on the cost effectiveness of these new programs.

Contracts

We also reviewed SFPD contracts for potential savings. Most are related to core law enforcement functions, such as uniforms, weapons, body worn cameras, technology spending to improve crime data reporting and analysis, investigation services, and collaborative reform.

SFPD provides \$1,076,122 to SF SAFE, an organization that provides community-based crime prevention education and outreach. Terminating funding to that organization for the final quarter of the year would provide \$269,031 in savings.

Reducing Police Department Overtime in Subsequent Fiscal Years

Actual General Fund expenditures on Police overtime have increased from \$25.7 million in FY 2019-20 to \$47.1 million in FY 2021-22 and, if the proposed ordinance is approved, a projected \$81 million in FY 2022-23. Although the proposed re-appropriation of salary savings does not impact the Department's planned academy schedule, the Department has not met its hiring goals in the past two years and training new police officers takes approximately 11 months. Increased staffing should eventually reduce the need for overtime, but unless the Department reduces its current service levels, other strategies are needed to reduce overtime in the coming fiscal years.

Assess Reasons for Reduction in Full Duty Staff

As of February 20, 2023, the Department's General Fund sworn staffing included 241 positions not available for "full duty" – that is, on leave or modified duty. These non-full duty positions included: 131 sworn staff on leave, including: 117 on disability leave, 10 on family medical leave, 4 on military leave; and 110 sworn staff on modified duty, including: 64 on temporary modified duty, 7 on permanent modified duty, and 39 under disciplinary review. The number of officers not available for work is 17% higher than historical experience. In May 2021, the Department had 115 General Fund sworn staff on leave and 92 on modified duty and in May 2018 the Department had 115 General Fund staff on leave and 90 on modified duty. The Board of Supervisors could request the Police Chief and Director of Human Resources to assess what is driving the increase in staff out on leave and modified duty and report back to the Board of Supervisors on administrative actions each is taking to return sworn staff to full-duty and any legislative actions that may assist with those efforts.

RECOMMENDATIONS

1. Approve the release of reserves and re-appropriation of funds.
2. Approval of the supplemental appropriation is a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.
3. Request the Police Department report back on the cost effectiveness of Safe Shopper, Tourism, Gun Violence Reduction, and Tenderloin Safety overtime programs.

4. Request the Police Chief and Director of Human Resources to assess what is driving the increase in staff out on leave and modified duty and report back to the Board of Supervisors on administrative actions each is taking to return sworn staff to full-duty and any legislative actions that may assist with those efforts.

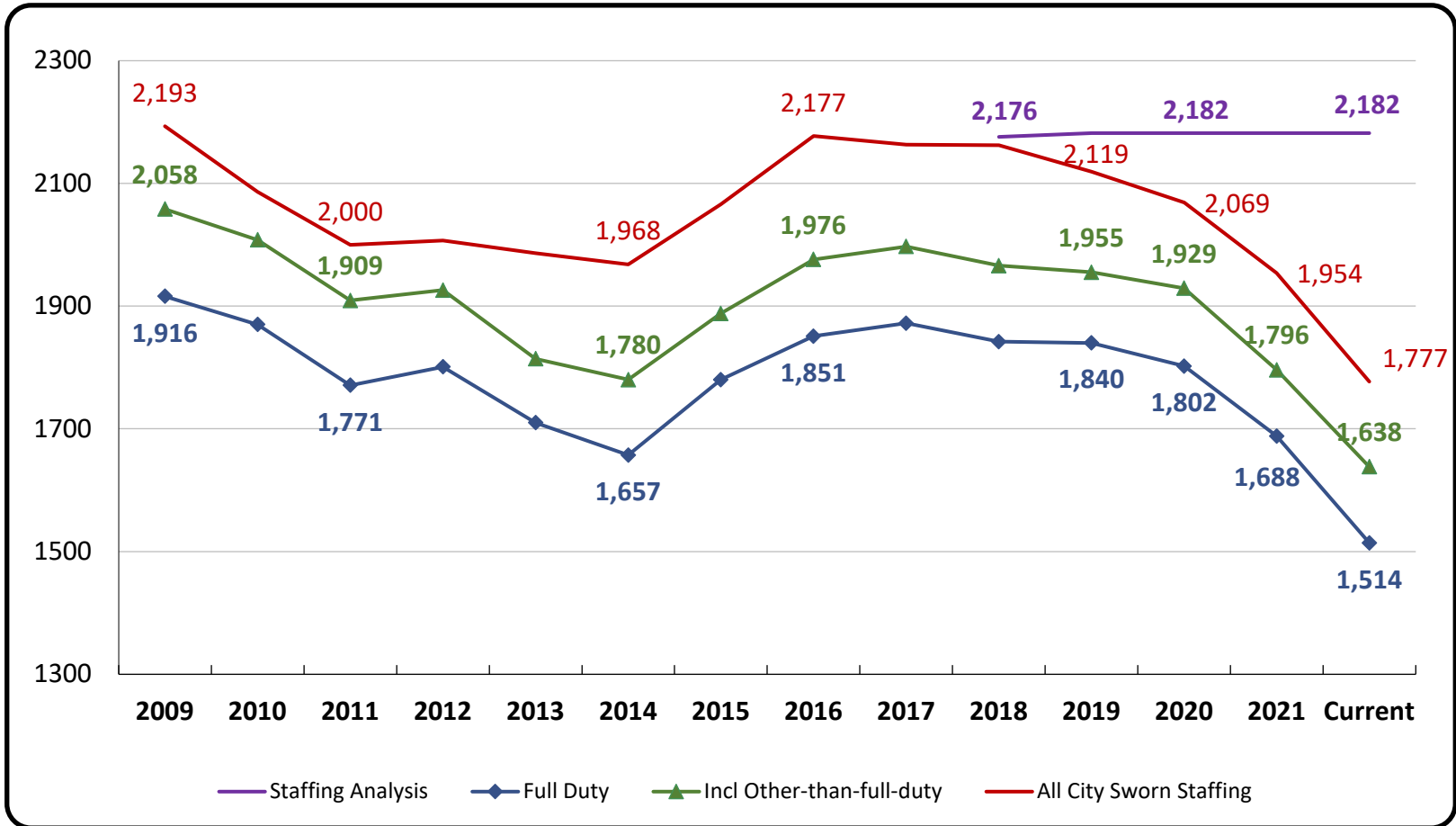

Vacancy budget savings are offset by the growing need of overtime to address operational staffing shortages

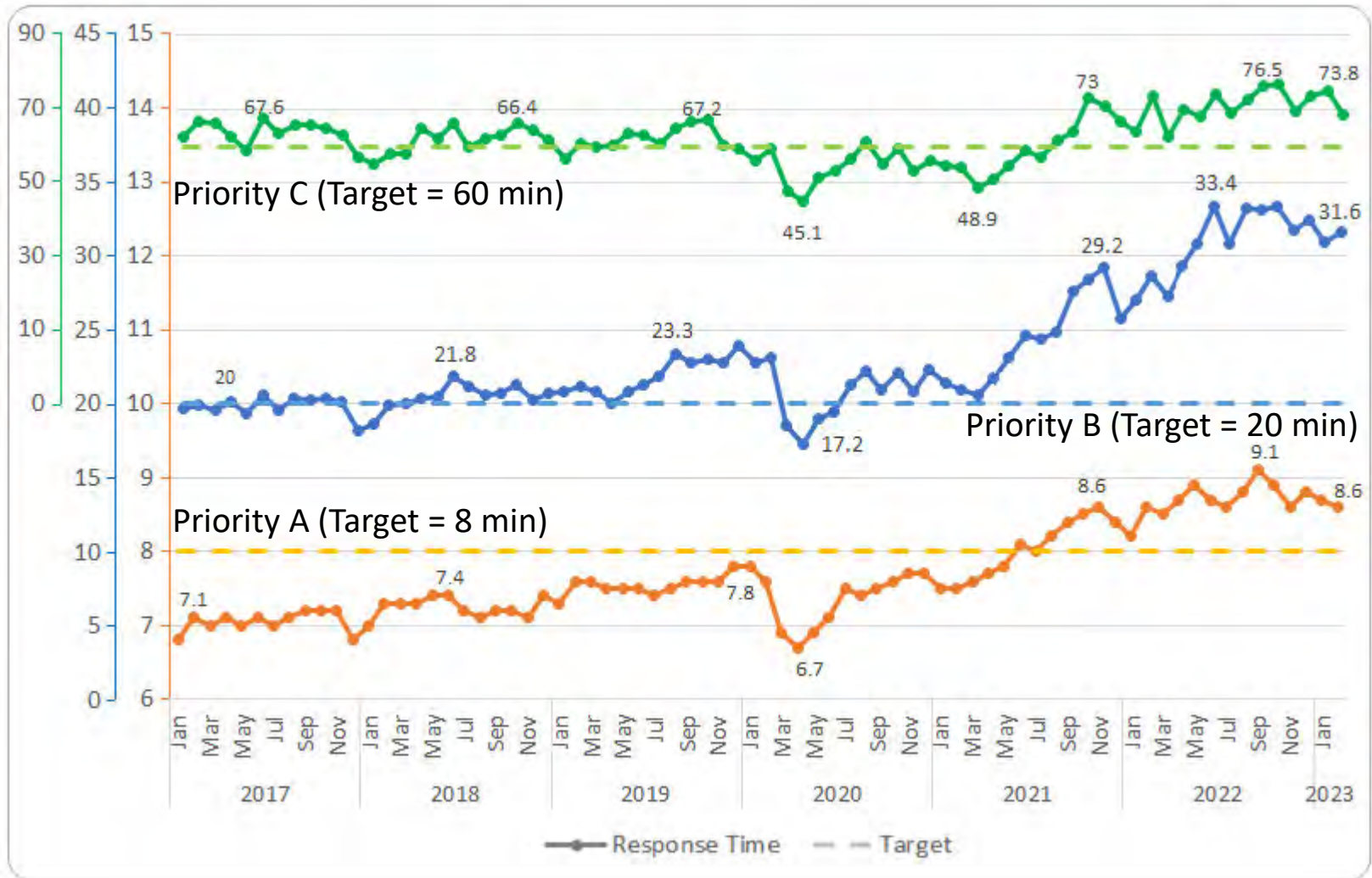

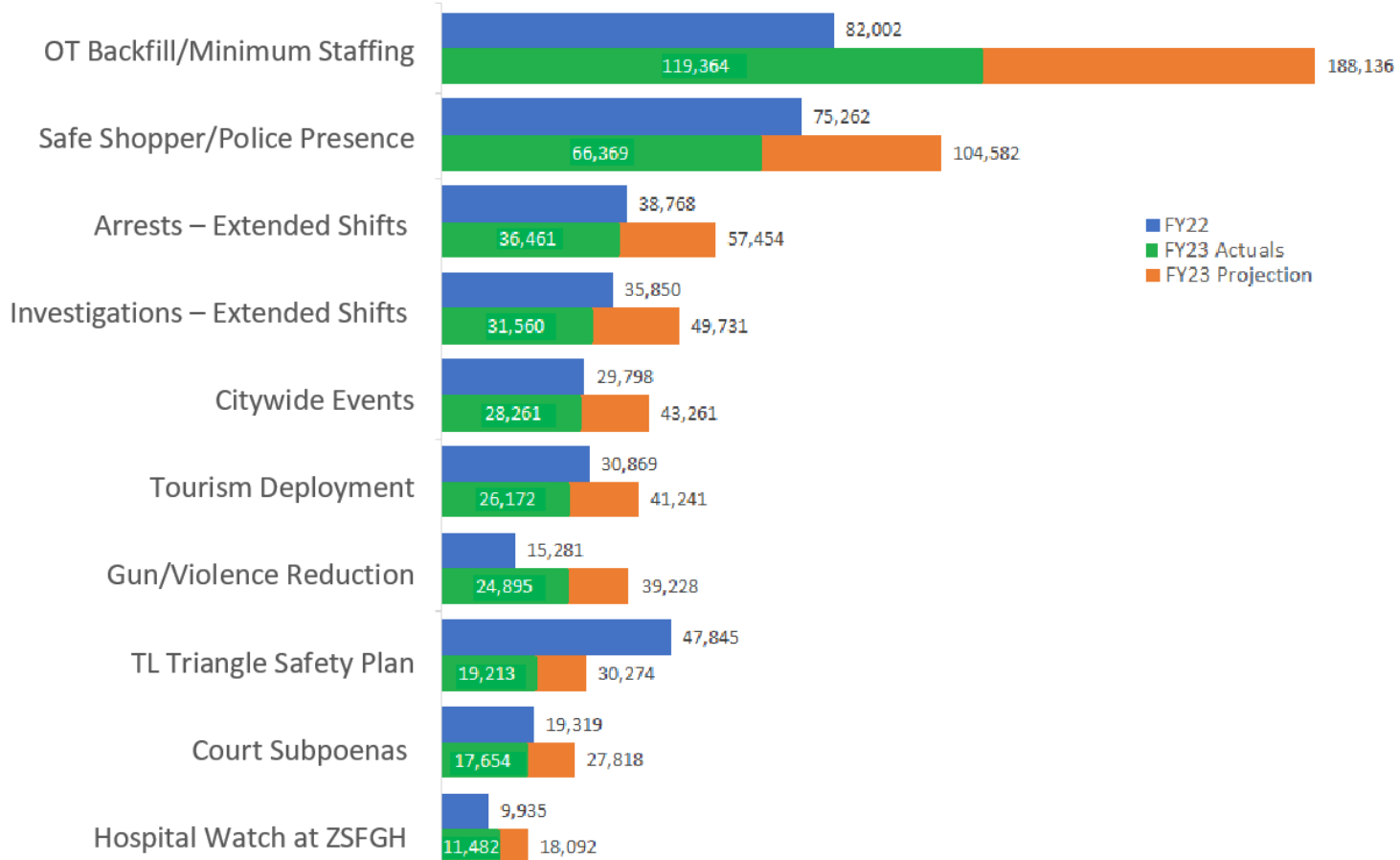

Ensuring San Francisco has clean and safe streets is a top priority as the City begins to regain its momentum and change the narrative that it's an unsafe place to live, visit, and work. We applaud the City's focus on this issue over the past year, and this supplemental will ensure the police have the funding necessary to continue to meet current levels of service. Most importantly, this will prevent mandated service cuts in addition to a hiring freeze.


The city cannot afford to lose officers if it wants to properly curtail drug dealing and illegal use of narcotics, and reduce gun violence, homicides, and violent crimes. Sworn staffing levels have fallen precipitously in the last three years and San Francisco is now 331 officers lower than in 2019 and 541 officers below the staffing analysis recommended level.

As the number of officer's declines, the need for overtime increases to provide the same level of service. However, expanded overtime has reaped immediate benefits, including the ability to respond to over 34,000 additional calls for service.

My name is Aditya Bhumbra and I live/work in District 5. I'm an organizer with DSA SF.

At a time when many working class residents and San Francisco city workers are facing potential eviction, hunger, a lack of jobs offering living wages, and countless other crises that could be addressed by local government, it is unsurprising but disappointing to see the mayor and many supervisors fighting to spend more money on policing.

Just last year, the Board of Supervisors approved an amendment to the Police Officers Association's memorandum of understanding (i.e., contract) to include longevity bonuses, pay raises, and sign-on bonuses. In addition to the fact that the city voluntarily opened up the SFPD contract for negotiation, the SFPD was the only agency that received all three of these concessions from the city. Teachers, sanitation workers, firefighters, bus drivers, and other essential workers were denied such consideration.

The Mayor and Board of Supervisors also approved a massive SFPD's \$713 million budget for 2023, which it is on track to overspend.

SFPD doesn't have a budget problem, they have an accountability problem.

Compared to similar jurisdictions around the country, SFPD already spends more per capita on policing, and has a higher police officer to resident ratio than similar cities. This latest move continues an ongoing trend of increased police spending, despite data from the SF police department itself showing that crime has decreased compared to previous years. Meanwhile, the SFPD is taking longer and longer to respond to calls, including serious calls about violent crime.

Supervisor Matt Dorsey's recent call for increased signing bonuses for new officers continues this unfair and unjustified use of public funds. Just last year, the Board of Supervisors approved an amendment to the Police Officers Association's memorandum of understanding to include longevity bonuses, pay raises, and sign-on bonuses. The SFPD was the only agency that received all three of these concessions from the city. Teachers, sanitation workers, firefighters, bus drivers, etc. were denied such consideration.

All of this paints a clear picture: this is a blatant display of SFPD exceptionalism which does nothing to solve the root causes of San Francisco's tattered social fabric.

The city is in crisis. Crucial functions that boost the city's wellness continue to be severely underfunded. Even well-tenured teachers in San Francisco typically make less than \$80,000

annually, putting them below the poverty line and below the earnings of a starting police officer. City College of San Francisco is similarly facing a budget crisis, with many educators being laid off and many others being forced to part time roles as classes are canceled. Many public health workers were supposed to be hired to support linkages to housing and medical treatment in the Tenderloin, but plans have repeatedly fallen through with little accountability. Muni faces a \$215 million deficit as federal pandemic funding runs out, and could potentially cut service by 25%.

As a country, we already know that our community's safety is dependent not on increased policing, but funding of our social pillars, such as health, education, and safer streets. Under capitalism, we live in an atomized society where the capitalists hoard all the wealth while the working class fights for scraps. This inequality creates the conditions of desperation that lead to crime. When a person's needs: food, water, housing, healthcare, transportation, education, are not met, they have every right (even a duty) to break the rules of a society that denies them to all. Punishment of individuals does nothing to end the conditions that lead to crime, nor is it intended to. Police exist to protect property and maintain a hierarchical order through the threat of violence. Our criminal "justice" system regularly breaks families apart, puts them in debt due to fees and penalties, and reinforces desperate situations that lead to more crime. Restorative justice is transformative when we look to build better people instead of punishing them. The solution: solidarity and socialism. Creating a society where we work together to meet our collective needs will always be more effective than an order rooted in violence.

In the face of this injustice, we ask every San Francisco resident: when we give the Police Officer's Association and SFPD priority and political weight over our teachers, public health workers, and public transportation, what does this say about our values?

We call upon the Board of Supervisors to reject these proposed SFPD giveaways, and reinvest the money into repairing our torn and tattered social fabric.

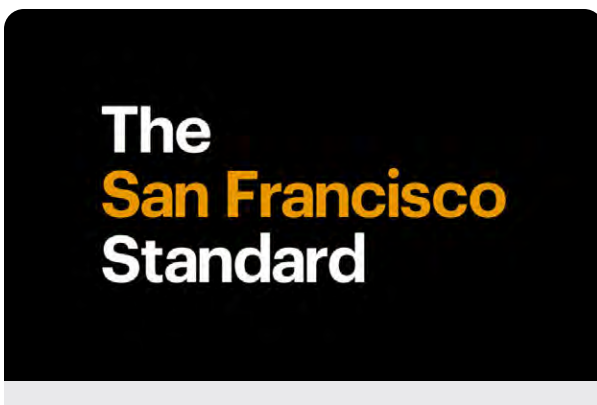



The \$27 million budget supplemental will help fund overtime and extended work hours by our police officers, and coverage of public safety ambassadors to serve our neighborhoods through the end of this fiscal year which ends in June.

It is of utmost importance to me that the SFPD continues that level of service to keep us safe by having the ability to investigate and curtail blazon open drug dealings and illegal use of narcotics that are seen by children and families on our streets every day. We also need our police officers to help us reduce gun violence, homicides, and violent crimes.

By supporting the police funding supplemental, SFPD Community Ambassadors, civilian retired sworn members will also be able to continue to provide foot beat patrol presence in places like Chinatown, Sunset, West Portal, Union Square, Fillmore, Castro and Fisherman's Wharf.

Importantly, I am opposed to any police hiring freeze. The SFPD that already faces an unprecedented shortage of officers, 541 below the staffing analysis recommended level. We cannot afford any pause on this funding because it will exacerbate all the challenges we face.

The bottom line is we need more police officers in order to meet our basic needs in San Francisco. And the staffing shortages must be backfilled with this funding so that Mayor Breed's priority initiatives like San Francisco's tourism deployments, Tenderloin operations, and violence reduction work which I wholeheartedly support will continue to serve residents and visitors.

As the level of Anti Asian hate continues, we need more officers on duty to help to protect our Asian citizens against the blatant racist attacks, some with deadly outcomes.

If our City is going to make any meaningful comeback, the safety and cleanliness of our

City are the top priorities. I believe we are all in agreement with this. Now is not the time to oppose each other. Let us act as one, united City on this.

I hope you will join me in supporting this urgent and critical funding without further delays and amendments. Thank you for your consideration.

Touted as a so-called cosmopolitan city, Seoul [consumes the most dog meat of any city in South Korea](#). There are countless dog farms and dog slaughterhouses in the vicinity of Seoul. Korean web searches of Seoul turn up hundreds of [dog meat restaurants](#) and so-called “[Health Centers](#)” that commonly serve soup made of dog meat as phony elixirs (also known as dog soju).

Dogs suffer their entire lives in filthy, feces-encrusted wire cages in dire misery only to be slaughtered in the most horrific of ways—tortured by electrocution, hammer strikes to their head, hanging, being beaten to death, having their throats slit, being burned alive with a blowtorch or thrown into a vat of boiling water while still alive. In many places in Seoul, dogs are killed in full view of other caged dogs who tremble with terror. In addition, beloved pets are often stolen and sold to these slaughterhouses, where they meet the same horrific fate. Puppies who die of disease are tossed away like trash, often left in front of cages to rot while their mothers watch and cry out in despair.

Please urge Seoul Mayor Oh Se-Hoon to shut down all Seoul-supplying dog farms, slaughterhouses, markets, dog meat restaurants, and truckers transporting dogs to their inevitable fates. We appreciate the opportunity to share our support of Mayor London Breed's \$27 million budget supplemental to fund police overtime and public safety ambassadors through the end of the fiscal year.

Ensuring San Francisco has clean and safe streets is a top priority as the City begins to regain its momentum and change the narrative that it's an unsafe place to live, visit, and work. We applaud the City's focus on this issue over the past year, and this supplemental will ensure the police have the funding necessary to continue to meet current levels of service. Most importantly, this will prevent mandated service cuts in addition to a hiring freeze.

The City cannot afford to lose officers if it wants to properly curtail drug dealing and illegal use of narcotics, and reduce gun violence, homicides, and violent crimes. Sworn staffing levels have fallen precipitously in the last three years and San Francisco is now 331 officers lower than in 2019 and 541 officers below the staffing analysis recommended level.

As the number of officers declines, the need for overtime increases in order to provide the

same level of service. However, expanded overtime has reaped immediate benefits, including the ability to respond to over 34,000 additional calls for service.

Meanwhile, the SFPD is taking longer and longer to respond to calls, including serious calls about violent crime. My partner and I have been dealing with a violent person who has moved onto our street, who attacked someone with a chain one night. SFPD did not respond that night, or to other calls about this person. At this point, it feels useless to even contact SFPD.

All of this paints a clear picture: this is a blatant display of SFPD exceptionalism which does nothing to solve the root causes of San Francisco's tattered social fabric.

The city is in crisis. Crucial functions that boost the city's wellness continue to be severely underfunded. Even well-tenured teachers in San Francisco typically make less than \$80,000

annually, putting them below the poverty line and below the earnings of a starting police officer. City College of San Francisco is similarly facing a budget crisis, with many educators being laid off and many others being forced to part time roles as classes are canceled. CCSF students had to attempt to learn in rooms as cold as 42 degrees on the CCSF campus this winter. Many public health workers were supposed to be hired to support linkages to housing and medical treatment in the Tenderloin, but plans have repeatedly fallen through with little accountability, which has worsened conditions on the streets. Muni faces a \$215 million deficit as federal pandemic funding runs out, and could potentially cut service by 25%. At a time when many working class residents and San Francisco city workers are facing potential eviction, hunger, a lack of jobs offering living wages, and countless other crises that could be addressed by local government, it is unsurprising but disappointing to see the mayor and many supervisors fighting to spend more money on policing.

Just last year, the Board of Supervisors approved an amendment to the Police Officers Association's memorandum of understanding (i.e., contract) to include longevity bonuses, pay raises, and sign-on bonuses. In addition to the fact that the city voluntarily opened up the SFPD contract for negotiation, the SFPD was the only agency that received all three of these concessions from the city. Teachers, sanitation workers, firefighters, bus drivers, and other essential workers were denied such consideration.

The Mayor and Board of Supervisors also approved a massive SFPD's \$713 million budget for 2023, which it is on track to overspend.

SFPD doesn't have a budget problem, they have an accountability problem.

Compared to similar jurisdictions around the country, SFPD already spends more per capita on policing, and has a higher police officer to resident ratio than similar cities. This latest move continues an ongoing trend of increased police spending, despite data from the SF police department itself showing that crime has decreased compared to previous years. Meanwhile, the SFPD is taking longer and longer to respond to calls, including serious calls about violent crime.

Supervisor Matt Dorsey's recent call for increased signing bonuses for new officers continues this unfair and unjustified use of public funds. Just last year, the Board of Supervisors approved an amendment to the Police Officers Association's memorandum of understanding to include longevity bonuses, pay raises, and sign-on bonuses. The SFPD was the only agency that received all three of these concessions from the city. Teachers, sanitation workers, firefighters, bus drivers, etc. were denied such consideration.

All of this paints a clear picture: this is a blatant display of SFPD exceptionalism which does nothing to solve the root causes of San Francisco's tattered social fabric.

The city is in crisis. Crucial functions that boost the city's wellness continue to be severely

underfunded. Even well-tenured teachers in San Francisco typically make less than \$80,000 annually, putting them below the poverty line and below the earnings of a starting police officer. City College of San Francisco is similarly facing a budget crisis, with many educators being laid off and many others being forced to part time roles as classes are canceled. Many public health workers were supposed to be hired to support linkages to housing and medical treatment in the Tenderloin, but plans have repeatedly fallen through with little accountability. Muni faces a \$215 million deficit as federal pandemic funding runs out, and could potentially cut service by 25%.

As a country, we already know that our community's safety is dependent not on increased policing, but funding of our social pillars, such as health, education, and safer streets. Under capitalism, we live in an atomized society where the capitalists hoard all the wealth while the working class fights for scraps. This inequality creates the conditions of desperation that lead to crime. When a person's needs: food, water, housing, healthcare, transportation, education, are not met, they have every right (even a duty) to break the rules of a society that denies them to all. Punishment of individuals does nothing to end the conditions that lead to crime, nor is it intended to. Police exist to protect property and maintain a hierarchical order through the threat of violence. Our criminal "justice" system regularly breaks families apart, puts them in debt due to fees and penalties, and reinforces desperate situations that lead to more crime. Restorative justice is transformative when we look to build better people instead of punishing them. The solution: solidarity and socialism. Creating a society where we work together to meet our collective needs will always be more effective than an order rooted in violence.

In the face of this injustice, we ask every San Francisco resident: when we give the Police Officer's Association and SFPD priority and political weight over our teachers, public health workers, and public transportation, what does this say about our values?

We call upon the Board of Supervisors to reject these proposed SFPD giveaways, and reinvest the money into repairing our torn and tattered social fabric.

Dear San Francisco Board of Supervisors,

Approve the Mayor's \$27 million budget supplemental to fund police overtime, public safety ambassadors and additional staffing at the District Attorney's Office to focus on drug dealing.

Efforts to combat illegal activity affecting residents, business owners, visitors, CBD field crews (and all front-line street workers both public and private) need more support from law enforcement!

Community Ambassadors and the City's Healthy Streets Operations Center (HSOC) are not sufficient (nor are they authorized) to address illegal activity.

The Mid Market area is highly complex and requires extra policing. It is the heart of the downtown core surrounded by Civic Center, the Tenderloin, SoMa and Union Square. With its convenient access to freeways, regional transit lines, residential density and visitor foot traffic – criminals want to do business here.

Mid Market is home to thousands of residents. Many live in newly constructed residential buildings; others live in the District's 30+ single room occupancy hotels, or in numerous other affordable housing units. What's more, there are 27 social services agencies within our District alone (**see attached map**) treating at-risk individuals; many of whom are battling drug addiction amidst our City's Fentanyl crisis. Currently, these individuals step out their door onto streets filled with drug dealers, open-air drug use and other predatory behaviors only law enforcement can address.

The business community, which has worked tirelessly to survive the pandemic, suffers rampant retail theft and a loss of customers and employees due to unsafe conditions inside and outside their place of business. Retail theft also fuels illegal street vending. The selling of stolen goods generates cash that supports drug sales. Only authorized law enforcement may address these issues.

We must put an end to unsafe conditions in Mid Market by all means possible. Just combating the selling of illicit drugs in the area would stem the flow of many of the problems Mid Market and surrounding areas face. With efforts like the Mayor's proposed \$27M additional funding for more SFPD resources and staffing to prosecute drug crimes, we can start to imagine a much brighter and better future.

Dear Supervisor Chan,

We are writing today from the Executive Board of the SF Council of District Merchants Associations on behalf of the members of the SFCDMA. We urge you and your committee to forward item 230158 (SFPD Budget Supplemental) to the full SF Board of Supervisors with a recommendation. SFCDMA has, for 75 years, advocated for small businesses in San Francisco's diverse and vibrant commercial corridors. Unfortunately, worsening quality of life issues, violence and crime are having a serious negative impact on the ability of our members to conduct business profitably and safely. We feel it is our duty to speak out in favor of this immediate action that will help address our concerns.

The \$27 million budget supplemental will provide urgently needed funding for officer overtime and an expansion of the SFPD public safety ambassador program. As SFPD staffing issues have worsened, we have seen increasingly slower response times to calls for service; leaving merchants and their employees vulnerable to theft, violence and the trauma of seeing the needs of addicts and unhoused individuals go un-addressed. At the same time, our members report promising results from the fledgling SFPD ambassador program. It is our understanding that the ambassador program cannot be expanded to neighborhoods like the Mission District, which is suffering terribly, without funding provided by the budget supplemental. The impact of brazen shoplifting, graffiti, abject homelessness, serious mental illness, open-air drug dealing and drug use on our neighborhood commercial corridors cannot be overstated.

We recognize that SFPD is not and shouldn't be, the only City agency charged with addressing these critical issues. However, the fact remains that when our members call 911 in an emergency, SFPD is usually the first agency dispatched and we are not being served adequately. We are not in favor of expanding SFPD's budget interminably; We expect and demand results. Efforts to bolster recruitment and contribute to stronger community relations must be successful to meet our long-term needs. In the meantime, we have urgent concerns that require immediate action.

We sincerely hope that you and your committee will demonstrate your concern for our members' safety and livelihoods by recommending the budget supplemental to the full BOS.

My name is Norma Palacios with the Drug Policy Alliance, and I am writing to express my organization's opposition to appropriating \$27,640,247 of General Fund General Reserves to the San Francisco Police Department.

Communities across San Francisco are still being impacted by the overdose crisis and although the overdose rate in 2022 is much lower as compared to 2021, the infiltration of fentanyl into the drug supply has made the overdose crisis more lethal and dangerous.

Given the disproportionate impact of this public crisis on our communities of color, it's critical that San Francisco prioritizes investment towards evidenced based strategies, such as making naloxone widely available and ensuring that every community, Black, brown and indigenous know how to use it and access this life saving medication. San Francisco has demonstrated openness to supporting the operation of overdose prevention programs, now it's the time to fund the infrastructure that could make these programs possible in the near future.

For decades, our response to drug use has been to fund enforcement first approaches and this has only contributed to the loss of preventable life of our neighbors, family members and friends. Everyone deserves to feel safe in their own communities and the reality is that the safest places around the world don't have more police. Instead, they invest in research-backed solutions, like crisis response programs operated independently from police and led by people with lived experience.

A comprehensive public safety plan must look at the root causes that has led to the destabilization of our communities, open air markets and open-air drug use did not happen overnight, these conditions are the result of massive community disinvestment.

Taking funds away from the resources that communities in San Francisco need like permanent supportive housing, linkages to voluntary treatment, and meaningful employment to pay for police budget mismanagement is unacceptable.

Meanwhile, the SFPD is taking longer and longer to respond to calls, including serious calls about violent crime.

Supervisor Matt Dorsey's recent call for increased signing bonuses for new officers continues this unfair and unjustified use of public funds. Just last year, the Board of Supervisors approved an amendment to the Police Officers Association's memorandum of understanding to include longevity bonuses, pay raises, and sign-on bonuses. The SFPD was the only agency that received all three of these concessions from the city. Teachers, sanitation workers, firefighters, bus drivers, etc. were denied such consideration.

All of this paints a clear picture: this is a blatant display of SFPD exceptionalism which does nothing to solve the root causes of San Francisco's tattered social fabric.

The city is in crisis. Crucial functions that boost the city's wellness continue to be severely underfunded. Even well-tenured teachers in San Francisco typically make less than \$80,000 annually, putting them below the poverty line and below the earnings of a starting police officer. City College of San Francisco is similarly facing a budget crisis, with many educators being laid off and many others being forced to part time roles as classes are canceled. Many public health workers were supposed to be hired to support linkages to housing and medical treatment in the Tenderloin, but plans have repeatedly fallen through with little accountability. Muni faces a \$215 million deficit as federal pandemic funding runs out, and could potentially cut service by 25%.

As a country, we already know that our community's safety is dependent not on increased policing, but funding of our social pillars, such as health, education, and safer streets. Under capitalism, we live in an atomized society where the capitalists hoard all the wealth while the working class fights for scraps. This inequality creates the conditions of desperation that lead to crime. When a person's needs: food, water, housing, healthcare, transportation, education, are not met, they have every right (even a duty) to break the rules of a society that denies them to all. Punishment of individuals does nothing to end the conditions that lead to crime, nor is it intended to. Police exist to protect property and maintain a hierarchical order through the threat of violence. Our criminal "justice" system regularly breaks families apart, puts them in debt due to fees and penalties, and reinforces desperate situations that lead to more crime. Restorative justice is transformative when we look to build better people instead of punishing them. The solution: solidarity and socialism. Creating a society where we work together to meet our collective needs will always be more effective than an order rooted in violence.

In the face of this injustice, we ask every San Francisco resident: when we give the Police Officer's Association and SFPD priority and political weight over our teachers, public health workers, and public transportation, what does this say about our values?

We call upon the Board of Supervisors to reject these proposed SFPD giveaways, and reinvest the money into repairing our torn and tattered social fabric.



This latest move continues an ongoing trend of increased police spending, despite data from the SF police department itself showing that crime has decreased compared to previous years. Meanwhile, the SFPD is taking longer and longer to respond to calls, including serious calls about violent crime.

Supervisor Matt Dorsey's recent call for increased signing bonuses for new officers continues this unfair and unjustified use of public funds. Just last year, the Board of Supervisors approved an amendment to the Police Officers Association's memorandum of understanding to include longevity bonuses, pay raises, and sign-on bonuses. The SFPD was the only agency that received all three of these concessions from the city. Teachers, sanitation workers, firefighters, bus drivers, etc. were denied such consideration.

All of this paints a clear picture: this is a blatant display of SFPD exceptionalism which does nothing to solve the root causes of San Francisco's tattered social fabric.

The city is in crisis. Crucial functions that boost the city's wellness continue to be severely underfunded. Even well-tenured teachers in San Francisco typically make less than \$80,000 annually, putting them below the poverty line and below the earnings of a starting police officer. City College of San Francisco is similarly facing a budget crisis, with many educators being laid off and many others being forced to part time roles as classes are canceled. Many public health workers were supposed to be hired to support linkages to housing and medical treatment in the Tenderloin, but plans have repeatedly fallen through with little accountability. Muni faces a \$215 million deficit as federal pandemic funding runs out, and could potentially cut service by 25%.

As a country, we already know that our community's safety is dependent not on increased policing, but funding of our social pillars, such as health, education, and safer streets. Under capitalism, we live in an atomized society where the capitalists hoard all the wealth while the working class fights for scraps. This inequality creates the conditions of desperation that lead to crime. When a person's needs: food, water, housing, healthcare, transportation, education, are not met, they have every right (even a duty) to break the rules of a society that denies them to all. Punishment of individuals does nothing to end the conditions that lead to crime, nor is it intended to. Police exist to protect property and maintain a hierarchical order through the threat of violence. Our criminal "justice" system regularly breaks families apart, puts them in debt due to fees and penalties, and reinforces desperate situations that lead to more crime. Restorative justice is transformative when we look to build better people instead of punishing them. The solution: solidarity and socialism. Creating a society where we work together to meet our collective needs will always be more effective than an order rooted in violence.

In the face of this injustice, we ask every San Francisco resident: when we give the Police Officer's Association and SFPD priority and political weight over our teachers, public health workers, and public transportation, what does this say about our values?

We call upon the Board of Supervisors to reject these proposed SFPD giveaways, and reinvest the money into repairing our torn and tattered social fabric.

Dear Budget and Appropriations Committee Members:

Today, you will vote on whether to take \$27MM from the general fund to pay San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) officers for overtime they claimed they have already worked. The SFPD has justified its request by consistently pointing to “severe staffing shortages.” This self-assessment is based on experts SFPD pays to say it needs more officers but has been rightfully challenged by experts not paid by the SFPD.¹ The public, this Committee—and indeed the entire Board of Supervisors—should be skeptical of devoting more resources to a Department that is paid more but works fewer hours,² receives generous annual pay raises, and last year received a \$50MM budget increase last fiscal year.

For 100 years, the San Francisco Public Defender’s Office has provided dedicated and passionate legal representation to people who are charged with a crime and unable to afford an attorney. Our mission is to protect and defend the rights of our clients and community through effective, vigorous, compassionate, and creative legal advocacy. The Integrity Unit exists to fight police misconduct and police overreach that has long been directed to Public Defender clients and communities of color.

lie under oath⁷— rather than wasting taxpayer dollars on unnecessary police overtime that doesn't even treat the symptoms, this Committee should invest in evidenced-based solutions that address the underlying causes of crime: a lack of housing, jobs, infrastructure, and healthcare. This Committee is well positioned to properly interrogate the need for additional funding, a role that is made even more crucial because this Department seeks regularly to avoid public oversight⁸ and outside scrutiny.⁹

Accordingly, I request that this Committee not approve the additional funds and instead require that SFPD use savings from unfilled positions and unused academy classes to fill this gap considering SFPD's claimed challenges in recruiting new members.

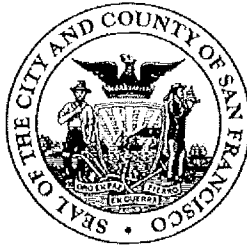
