[Supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 28 (Gabriel) - The Gun Violence Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Act]

Resolution supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 28, introduced by Assembly Member Jesse Gabriel, the Gun Violence Prevention, Healing, and Recovery Act, which would state the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation to impose a tax on firearms and ammunition sales to fund measures to protect against gun violence.

WHEREAS, While California communities are torn apart by the devastating impacts of gun violence, the firearm industry continues to reap record profits; and

WHEREAS, California State Assembly Bill No. 28 would impose a modest excise tax on firearms and ammunition sales to fund gun violence prevention programs, including funding for life-saving community-based violence intervention and prevention programs; and

WHEREAS, As survivors, families, communities, and taxpayers we all pay the enormous costs associated with gun violence, whether we own a firearm or not; and

WHEREAS, Every year, gun violence costs the United States \$557 billion and costs California \$41.9 billion, \$1.1 billion of which is paid by taxpayers; and
