
Readiness- School Safety Plan

- Schools have individual safety plans and security measures that includes evidence-based prevention measures.
- Preparation is key to readiness
  - Regular audits
  - Safety drills
  - Timely family notifications

## School Culture and Climate

- Relationship building among students and with trusted adults
- Coordinated Care Teams at school sites
- Wellness centers at all high schools and 6 middle schools.
  - Six additional MS wellness centers will be launched next school year
- Say Something Anonymous Reporting System with Sandy Hook Promise
  - Launched in all high schools
  - Complete training and implementation at all schools which serve 6th 12th graders (K-8, MS & HS) by SY 23-24




## Data on Student Conflicts (on or off SFUSD campus)

SFUSD and DCYF's CBOs reported that between March 2022- April 2023, there were approximately 100 student conflicts either on or off school campuses Citywide.

The majority of these incidents involved youth; however, 11 conflicts also involved adults (including family members).


Since March 2022, 31 of these youth conflicts involved guns.



## **Our Multidisciplinary Team: Partners and Roles**

#### **Community Based Organization Partners**

- Builds relationships in various neighborhoods, and works with the community directly to prevent youth violence
- Provides alternative de-escalation to law enforcement
- Knowledgeable of best practices for T-10s
- Fosters a culture of safety on campus
- Provides programming, support services & resources to high-risk students

#### **Juvenile Probation Department**

- Provides information on the status of detained youth
- Regularly supports coordination efforts around release, relocation, and service connections

#### **UCSF** Wraparound Project

- Works with victims at hospital bedside
- Provides programming, support services and resources to high-risk students

- DPH SFPD
- REC HSA

#### SFUSD Administrators and Site Staff

- Determines high-risk students in need of targeted interventions
- Documents and tracks incidents.

 Provides violence prevention coordination expertise, provides coordination training and helps track this pilot

#### Department of Children, Youth & Their Families

- Organizes city funded supports
- Facilitates connection between school sites and supports for de-escalation and violence prevention



## School Violence Interrupter's role includes:

- School Mediations
- Conflict Resolutions
- One-on-One and group sessions
- Support during school meetings, expulsion hearings, re-entry planning
- Student and guardian check-ins
- Safety planning and training with school staff
- Reporting out at Citywide weekly coordination meetings
- Participation in Citywide trainings and capacity building

20 School Violence Interrupters

Citywide Coordination Implementation Strategies

- I. School Violence Interrupter Hiring & SFUSD Infrastructure
  - Increased Violence Interrupters from 8 to 20 staff
  - Increased services from 8 to 17 schools
  - Staff to support intervention and coordination, data tracking, and monitoring.
  - Student Success Fund Rapid Response (begins FY 23-24);
    BJA STOP Grant Funds (FY 23-26)

#### 2. City Coordination & Policy Development

- Citywide Youth Violence Coordination Team to develop data and information sharing policies and protocols
- City Department Partners: JPD, SFPD, DPH, PDR, DA, REC, SFPD, HSA, MOHCD, and HRC

#### 3. Training & Capacity Building

 Increase joint trainings with SFUSD, CBOs, VI's and City Department staff, including REC and MTA

#### 4. Public Awareness and Social Media

- Co-sponsor with SFUSD a Public Service Awareness Campaign; Assemblies and Rallies both on and off campus
- Launch a Social Media Monitoring Taskforce
- Partner with HRC and Mayor's Office on the City's Love and Joy Campaign and Citywide Summer Violence Prevention Planning
