### HER HOUSE

**Date Range**: 4/2021 - 3/2023 (23 months)

Capacity: 10 women, 4 children

**Participants Served: 40** 

**Successful Exits:** 19 participants (58%)

### BILLIE HOLIDAY CENTER

**Date Range**: 12/2021 - 3/2023 (16 months)

**Capacity:** 30 participants **Participants Served:** 606

**Successful Exits:** 321 participants (55%)

### POSITIVE DIRECTIONS TRP ACADEMY

**Date Range**: 8/2021 - 3/2023 (20 months)

**Capacity:** 65 participants **Participants Served:** 208

**Successful Exits:** 59 participants (40%)

### MINNA PROJECT

**Date Range**: 5/2022 - 3/2023 (10 months)

**Capacity:** 75 participants **Participants Served:** 139

**Successful Exits:** 63 participants (90%)










# Housing Needs of Justice Involved Adults in San Francisco


# Objective and Methodology

### **Research Objective:**

 Gain an understanding of the housing needs of justice involved adults in San Francisco

### **Research Method: Mixed Methods**

- Qualitative
  - 12 focus groups 22 hours, 87 participants
- Quantitative
  - Survey 284 respondents



# Key Takeaways

## HOUSING INSTABILITY & THE JUSTICE SYSTEM

Unstably housed includes those residing in emergency shelters, transitional housing, staying with family and friends, treatment programs or places not meant for habitation. HNJIA survey respondents reported:



76%
Were unstably housed prior to their most recent incarceration



47%
Did not know where they were going to live upon




96% Were unstably housed upon release



73%
Were unstably housed at the time of the HNJIA survey

# Recommendations

- 1. SHARED GOAL TO ADDRESS HOUSING NEEDS
- 2. EXPAND THE FRAMEWORK: MOVING BEYOND HOUSING FIRST AND HARM REDUCTION
- 3. BUILD A RECOVERY SYSTEM OF CARE
- 4. FUND A STABILIZATION CENTER
- 5. INCREASE FINANCIAL LITERACY
- BOLSTER TRANSITIONAL HOUSING
