# SFHSA Services in District 11's OMI/Lakeview Communities

Response to Inquiry from Supervisor Safai

May 17, 2023



#### Methodology

This report provides information about our major programs and services across our agency.

**Program information**: As a county welfare department, most of our services are Federal and State entitlement programs, such as Medi-Cal and CalFresh. These programs are person-based, not neighborhood-based—and available to anyone who meets Federal and State eligibility criteria. While we do not have client level data readily available by neighborhood, we include unduplicated counts of clients on benefits living in the 94112 and 94132 zip codes. We also provide programmatic highlights and community partners, by neighborhood, and demographic profile of clients by program.

**Funding information**: Budget data represents an estimate based on the proportion of program clients that live in these neighborhoods. We are not able to allocate program funding by neighborhood or population but instead draw down Federal and State revenue based on enrolled clients who meet strict State and Federal eligibility criteria




### **Key Highlights**


- Based on participation in the programs included in this report, we estimate over \$107M of our agency's annual budget supports District 11 residents living in the 94112 and 94132 zip codes. This is about 12% of our total budget for these programs.
  - Additional Federal and State funds that are outside of SFHSA's budget provide an estimated
     \$59M for In-Home Supportive Services caregiver wages and \$32M in CalFresh's flexible food funds for District 11 residents.
- District 11 highlights include but are not limited to:
  - Over 42,000 people are supported by SFHSA-administered public benefit programs (Medi-Cal, CalFresh, CalWORKs, and CAAP).
  - Close to 4,000 residents receive meals, groceries, and food vouchers through programs we've developed in close partnership with community organizations since the pandemic.
  - We facilitate homecare for more than 3,000 seniors, adults, and children with disabilities in District 11 through the In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) program.
  - o The racial/ethnic profile of District 11 residents participating in our programs generally aligns with those living in poverty in these neighborhoods.

# Department of Benefits and Family Support (BFS): Public Benefit Programs

Data as of December 2022

- Over 42,000 residents in 94112 and 94132 receive one or more public benefits through BFS.
- Clients in these two zip codes represent 17% of all public benefit clients in San Francisco.
- As a proportion of our overall budget for BFS services, this represents about \$34.3M annually.
- We serve about 41% of 94112 residents and 26% of 94132 residents.
- By comparison, we serve about 30% of all San Franciscans citywide through these programs.

### BFS: Workforce Development - JobsNOW!

Data from FY 21-22

- Our Workforce Development services assess job readiness and offer a variety of educational, training, and job placement opportunities based on an individual's circumstances.
- A hallmark within our workforce services is the JobsNOW! Program: JobsNOW!
  places people looking for jobs with open positions in part by providing temporary
  wage subsidies that help jobseekers get a "foot in the door" and employers fill
  positions and save money
- About 11% of clients in our JobsNOW! program live in the 94112 and 94132 areas.
- Using this program as a proxy for our broader Workforce Development portfolio, District 11 clients represent about \$7.8M in our annual funding.

### BFS Public Benefits Programmatic Highlights

- CalFresh benefits: Federal and State funds for CalFresh benefits which are outside of SFHSA's budget provide an estimated \$32M in flexible food dollars for residents in 94112 and 94132 each year.
- **Outreach**: SFHSA conducts outreach for benefits and job training programs at community events
  - Coming soon: thanks to a recent competitive grant award, a new SFHSA "Mobile Office" will bring outreach staff to more community events in District 11 in 2024
- **SF Diaper Bank**: Free diapers for low-income families with young children distributed in partnership with community-based organizations
  - About 20% of participating kids live in District 11
  - Through our partnerships with Help a Mother Out and the OMI Family Resource Center (94112), we've distributed 800 packs of diapers so far this year



### Citywide Food Access Team (CFAT)

Data from FY 21-22 and FY 22-23

- Residents of 94112 and 94132
   communities represent about 15%
   of our clients in our community based food programs. The table to

- Enrollment in CFAT programs by D11 residents represents approximately \$4.6M of our funding for these resources.

### **CFAT Programmatic Highlights**

- **EatSF**: Free produce vouchers that help address food inflation and offer flexible redemption options
  - Can redeem at six markets in D11
  - 13% of participating households live in D11 zip codes
- Family Meal Pack: On demand restaurant meal-ordering for low-income families with young children attending select preschool/childcare centers
  - 15% of participating households live in D11 zip codes
- Pop-up Food Pantries: Contactless options for supplemental food
  - OMI/Lakeview site at Minnie & Lovie Ward Rec Center serves 1,100 households with about 4,100 grocery bags per month
- Culturally-relevant Groceries: trusted neighborhood locations, focus on client choice
  - Currently distributed out of three D11 sites with two more coming soon, including IT Bookman Community Center in July 2023



# Department of Disability and Aging Services (DAS): In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS)

Data as of December 2022

- Residents of 94112 and 94132 neighborhoods represent about 12% of our clients receiving homecare help through the In-Home Supportive Services (IHSS) program.
- As a proportion of our budget for these services, this represents about \$46M. This
  includes county costs to administer the program and also a portion of the wages and
  benefits paid to IHSS caregivers.
- Factoring in additional Federal and State funds\* for caregiver compensation that are outside of SFHSA's budget, the estimated IHSS funding for D11 residents is closer to \$105M annually.

### **DAS: Community Partnerships**

- About 12% of seniors and adults with disabilities served through our community partnerships live in D11 neighborhoods. The programmatic areas with greatest participation are nutrition supports and community centers.
- As a proportion of our budget for the Office of Community Partnerships that manages these services, this represents about \$14.7M.

### **DAS Programmatic Highlights**

Building capacity for service expansion at anchor organizations in OMI

- More than 500 seniors and adults with disabilities participate in activities at the OMI Senior Center. This includes the award-winning Senior Choir program.
- Over 400 people participate in programs at IT Bookman. Staff from our Office of Community Partnerships closely collaborated with IT Bookman to build their experience to apply/qualify as a provider in our Communal Dining program. They are now funded at \$300,000 annually for a dinner service.

Connecting people to resources throughout the city

- DAS Benefits and Resource Hub provides information and referrals for aging and disability resources to more than 1,000 D11 residents each year
- The Aging & Disability Resource Center located at the OMI Senior Center provides in-person help in a community setting to 1,200 people annually.



### Public Benefits Recipients Across Four Main Programs (Medi-Cal, CalFresh, CalWORKs & CAAP)






94112 & 94132 Zip Codes over FY 21-22 and FY 22-23








### BFS: Client Enrollment in Public Benefits from 2013 to 2022 (Medi-Cal, CalFresh, CalWORKs, CAAP)






### In-Home Supportive Services Client Enrollment from 2013 to 2022
