- 1. This funding supports the Department's Neighborhood Courts programs. Neighborhood Courts are community based courts that handle low level crimes defferred from the Courts, that allow for community to have a say in harm done to their community. Current grantees are Pre-Trial Diversion and Community Boards. Both are awarded a three year grant. Additional funds are provided from the MY Dispute Resolution fund below.
- 2. Victim Services this funding allocation provides funding for the Department's LGBTQ Community Advocacy Services. CUAV is the current grantee and has been awarded a new three year grant.
- 3. Make it Right this funding allocation provides funding for young adult and transitional age adults, 18-24, assisting them with services to support them in not reoffending. Funds are work ordered from DCYF Children's Fund. Current grantee is Community Works.
- 4. Community Court Dispute Resolution This fund provides small community investment grants for neighborhood beautification, neighborhood enrichment, security projects or crime safety projects. This fund is supported by fees from the Neighborhood Courts assessments.
- 5. This funding supports the Department's Neighborhood Courts program as describe in line 1.
- 6. This funding is State funding from California Office of Emergency Services. It provides community based advocacy services for victims of crime that allows for direct referrals from our Victim Services Division. Current CBO's funded are CYC, UCSF, Huckleberry Youth Programs and Soul Champ.
