

1 2	[Supporting Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 4 (Bryan and Becker) - Restoring the Right to Vote for Incarcerated People]
2	Resolution supporting Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 4, authored by
4	Assembly Member Isaac Bryan and Senator Josh Becker, to restore the right to vote for
5	incarcerated people in the California State Constitution.
6	
7	WHEREAS, The California Constitution authorizes a person to vote if the person is a
8	United States citizen, at least 18 years of age, and a resident of the state but this right does
9	not extend to a person currently incarcerated and serving a state or federal prison term; and
10	WHEREAS, California has a long history of redistricting voting rights based on race
11	and until 1962, California refused to ratify the 14th Amendment, which granted equal
12	protection of the law after the Civil War, and the 15th Amendment, which prohibits voting
13	restrictions based on race; and
14	WHEREAS, Disenfranchising people in prison was written into California's first
15	constitution and the prohibition arose alongside the legacy of Jim Crow when laws were
16	designed to neutralize the political participation of Black, Brown, and Indigenous communities;
17	and
18	WHEREAS, In recent years, California has made significant and historic reforms that
19	have expanded voting rights and voter access with the goal of achieving a more
20	representative democracy, but to this day, California citizens serving a prison term are denied
21	the right to vote; and
22	WHEREAS, The prohibition of the right to vote for incarcerated people
23	disproportionately disenfranchises Black, Brown, Poor and Indigenous people and veterans;

WHEREAS, Black people make up 6 percent of California's population but account for
 approximately 30 percent of the state's prison population, and in 2020, 50,000 Black people
 and over 77,000 Latino people in California were prohibited from voting because of their
 contact with the criminal legal system; and

5 WHEREAS, California currently has nearly 7,000 veterans who are denied their voting 6 rights because they are incarcerated and many of those veterans return to civilian life with 7 visible and invisible trauma, and face a likelihood of becoming unhoused and arrested that is 8 significantly higher than the general public; and

9 WHEREAS, Incarcerated Californians in the Los Angeles County Jails already have the 10 right to vote as the LA County Registrar-Recorder conducts elections regularly with mobile

voting booths and California should ensure that all incarcerated people have meaningful

12 access to exercising this right; and

WHEREAS, According to the Brennan Center for Justice, voting helps support reentryit gives people a voice and reduces recidivism; and

WHEREAS, When people feel that they are valued members of their community, and that their needs and concerns are addressed, they are less likely to re-engage in criminal activity and they are also more likely to volunteer in the community and positively participate in local government; and

WHEREAS, Voting creates an opportunity for people in prison to think about their
communities positively as they prepare to reenter society and allows people in prison to vote
and participate in our democratic process to promote accountability and rehabilitation; and
WHEREAS, Many other modern democracies such as Canada, Israel, France,
Denmark, Japan, Germany, Czech Republic, Kenya, Netherlands, Poland, Peru, Romania,
Sweden, and Zimbabwe allow the right to vote for incarcerated people, and the United States
is behind on this; and

1 WHEREAS, In the United States, Vermont, Maine, Washington D.C., and Puerto Rico 2 have restored the right to vote for people in prison; and 3 WHEREAS, Assembly Constitution Amendment No. 4 (ACA 4), introduced by 4 Assembly Member Isaac Bryan and Senator Josh Becker, will give the opportunity for 5 California voters to decide whether to restore voting rights to people completing their prison 6 sentence and allow; and 7 WHEREAS, If passed, ACA 4 will remove the prohibition against people in prison 8 voting that exists in the state constitution and the companion bill, Assembly Bill No. 1595, 9 would remove mention of this prohibition throughout the California Code; and 10 WHEREAS, In a statewide poll, over 60 percent of participants said that voting rights 11 should be restored for people completing their prison sentence; now, therefore, be it 12 RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors supports Assembly 13 Constitutional Amendment No. 4, and urges its passage in the California State Legislature; 14 and, be it 15 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors directs the Clerk 16 to submit a copy of this Resolution to the Speaker of the State Assembly, Assembly Member 17 Isaac Bryan, Senator Josh Becker, and the members of San Francisco's legislative 18 delegation, Senator Scott Wiener, Assembly Members Matt Haney and Phil Ting. 19 20 21 22 23 24 25

Assembly Constitutional Amendment No. 4—A resolution to propose to the people of the State of California an amendment to the Constitution of the State, by amending Sections 2 and 4 of Article II thereof, relating to elections.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACA 4, as introduced, Bryan. Elections: eligibility to vote.

The California Constitution authorizes a person to vote if the person is a United States citizen, at least 18 years of age, and a resident of the state. The California Constitution requires the Legislature to provide for the disqualification of electors while serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony.

This measure would repeal that requirement regarding the disqualification of electors incarcerated for felony convictions, thereby authorizing an otherwise qualified elector serving a state or federal prison term for the conviction of a felony to vote.

1 Resolved by the Assembly, the Senate concurring, That the 2 Legislature of the State of California at its 2023-24 Regular 3 Session commencing on the fifth day of December 2022, two-thirds of the membership of each house concurring, hereby proposes to 4 the people of the State of California that the Constitution of the 5 State be amended as follows: 6 7 First—That Section 2 of Article II thereof is amended to read: 8 SEC. 2. (a) A United States citizen who is at least 18 years of 9 age and *a* resident in this State may vote. (b) An elector disqualified from voting while serving a state or 10 federal prison term, as described in Section 4, shall have their right 11 to vote restored upon the completion of their prison term. 12 13 Second—That Section 4 of Article II thereof is amended to read: SEC. 4.
