Dear Mayor London Breed and Members of the Board of Supervisors:

We, the undersigned, San Francisco small business owners are appealing to you to please work collaboratively with us to address the devastating financial impacts of the City hosting APEC on small businesses in and around the Moscone/Yerba Buena area, and other locations impacted by security fencing for the heads of States and CEO's of billion-dollar companies.

City leadership had branded APEC as having great potential for the small businesses of the host district and the City at large. We were told in numerous meetings, conference calls and interviews that attendees will be exploring our beloved neighborhoods, patronizing our restaurants, and injecting much-needed revenue into the recovering SOMA business sector.

Some small business owners expressed our concerns to the City promptly upon learning about the installation of a U.S. Secret Service perimeter. We expressed our deep fears that the perimeter would cut us off from our main arteries of revenue. Additionally, we warned that the businesses within the perimeter would be completely dependent on an APEC attendee population that would have the majority of their catering needs provided within the Moscone Convention Center.

All of the evidence pointed to it being a week of great financial loss for small business owners.

Despite the uncertainty and daunting risks, many owners within and around the perimeter, and throughout the city kept our doors open, stocked our kitchens and scheduled our staff at the onset of APEC. We did this, in part, to make our contribution in keeping San Francisco a vibrant host for the conference.

Unfortunately, by Thursday, November 9, the day that construction of the perimeter commenced, we saw the first signs that APEC was indeed "epic" for only segments of the City. It was the opposite for small business owners in and around SOMA, and our employees. Multiple small business operators within the perimeter experienced:

- 40-50% drops in revenue from November 9-12.
- That initial drop ballooned to 70-90% in lost revenue, by Monday, November 13 the time the fence was fully erected but not yet sealed with bagcheck entry points
- That 70-90% loss rate held steady for small businesses within the perimeter through Saturday, November 19

Many small businesses surrounding the perimeter and throughout the city also experienced substantial revenue loss due to their regular customers avoiding the congestion and delays related to APEC.

Needless to say, small business owners have suffered substantial harm from the City's hosting of APEC. Many owners are now trying to navigate staying open after operating, for some, as long as 10 days with minimal revenue. We are fighting to avoid having our supplier accounts

frozen due to inability to pay, to cover even a small portion of our rent, and most importantly, to issue checks to our valued staff that are not returned due to insufficient funds.

Our hope and belief in City leadership has been challenged, but is not lost. We believe that our Mayor and Board of Supervisors will respond to the gravity of this moment with the same urgency they afforded to hosting foreign dignitaries and CEO's. Thankfully, City actions to protect small business interests are already at play. This past month, the SF Board of Supervisors unanimously passed a proposal by Supervisor Chan to reserve \$10 million in APEC-raised funds to support members of the community that were negatively impacted by the event.

Our requests:

- The Mayor's Office and OEWD to immediately tap the reserved \$10 million in APEC-raised funds for equitable distribution to small businesses, workers and cultural institutions to recover lost income during the week of APEC
- The Board of Supervisors conduct a thorough review and public hearing on the millions of dollars the City spent on hosting APEC, including the events that were held at the Exploratorium and Legion of Honor
- The Board of Supervisors conduct an audit and public hearing on the promised \$58
 million in financial returns to the City, detailing who benefited economically and the
 returns by districts

We hope the City undertakes these requests with the same enthusiasm and due diligence to support our communities and small businesses who are the heart of the City.

- ▶ 3.5 Million Fund for Small Business Resilience
- Dedicated to Small Business and Non Profits within the APEC Security Zone
 - ▶ South of Market to Harrison, 2nd to 5th Streets
- ▶ Focused on small business that meet the criteria of SF Small Business.
 - ▶ Below \$8M in gross revenue
 - ▶ Under 100 employees
- Estimated 200 small business and non profits
- Small business committee created to determine final formula
- ▶ Applications will be reviewed, vetted and audited by YBCBD who will not be a recipient of funding beyond distributing funds on behalf of City.





Option A

- Distribution based upon a formula calculated using:
 - ► Variance in November 2023 gross revenue in comparison to Oct and Sept 2023
 - ▶ Use reported sales tax data
 - Weighted for businesses that were open during APEC(ex Tier for open full event, Open 5 Days, 3 Days...
 - ► Weighted by number of employees (ex 5-20 staff tier, 20-50 tier...)
 - ▶ Weighted for business revenue(example under 2 million, 2-4, 4-8 gross revenue)
 - Weighted heavier for business located within pedestrian perimeter vs vehicle perimeter

Option B

▶ Equal to 2.5x of November 2023 rent.



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
