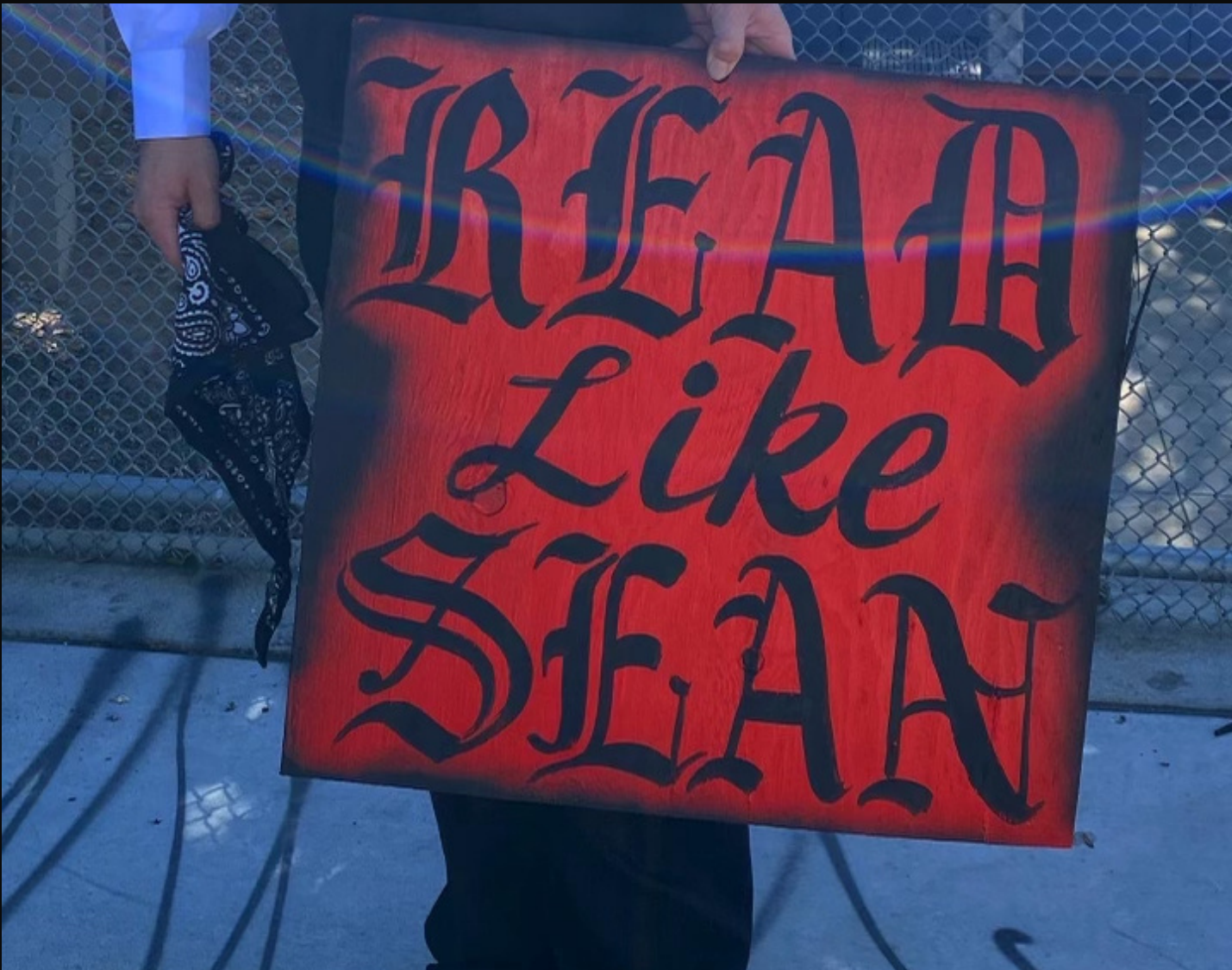
# COMMUNITY INSTALLATIONS
