[Accept and Expend Grant - Zero Waste Database, City of Palo Alto - \$5,000]

Resolution authorizing the Department of Environment to accept and expend a grant in the amount of \$5,000 from the City of Palo Alto to assist in the creation of a web-based application that enables the public to easily find accurate information about nearby recycling, reuse, and disposal options.

WHEREAS, Environmental agencies have realized that a core component of recycling and toxics reduction programs is the availability of accurate information about recycling, reuse and proper disposal options for residents and businesses; and

WHEREAS, A number of online tools exist that serve this function, including SF Environment's EcoFinder, StopWaste.Org's Recycling Wizard (Alameda County, CA), and Oregon Metro's "Find a Recycler" tool (Portland region, OR); and

WHEREAS, Similar tools exist on the national level such as Earth911.com that do not always reflect the specifics of recycling and disposal programs at the local level; and

WHEREAS, As these and other agencies look to upgrade their outreach tools to reflect the trends of Web 2.0, such as interactive information sharing, interoperability, and user-centered design, it is clear that a growing need exists in the public sector for a low-cost feature-rich online platform for maintaining recycling services information that can be easily deployed and promoted to maximize program outreach efforts; and

WHEREAS, One of the primary benefits of such a system is increased access to more accurate data for members of the public who may not define themselves through geographic boundaries that have limited the scope of previous recycling services databases; and

WHEREAS, This application will empower environmental agencies to easily maintain, update, publish, and openly share data about recycling, reuse and disposal services; and

WHEREAS, Working with other entities to create the application will result in a better tool than would be possible by the individual efforts and resources of those agencies; and

WHEREAS, This application will be a centralized web service with various mechanisms (modules, widgets, data feeds, mobile app, etc.) for integration with participating agencies' websites; and

WHEREAS, Developing this application as a flexible, centralized web service will enable easy integration with other web services and data platforms, as well as the development of future application features and improvements; and

WHEREAS, Open source, publicly licensed, well documented software is strongly preferred; and

WHEREAS, This application will serve as a model for "Government 2.0" efforts to deliver government services more broadly and efficiently while increasing transparency; and

WHEREAS, By collaborating on the development of such a platform, agencies and organizations will lower development costs; and

WHEREAS, The counties of Alameda and Contra Costa and the City of Palo Alto and the City of San Jose are partnering with the City and County of San Francisco on the creation of this tool; and

WHEREAS, Serving as the lead in the creation of this tool ensures that the City and County of San Francisco maintains a reputation of being a leader in the environmental field, particularly in the area of Zero Waste; and

WHEREAS, The length of the project is from June 1, 2011 to June 30, 2012; and WHEREAS, The grant budget includes provision for indirect costs of \$455.00; and WHEREAS, This grant does not require an ASO amendment; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors authorizes the Director of the Department of the Environment to accept and expend funding in the amount of \$5,000.00

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## REGIONAL ONLINE RECYCLING DATABASE PROJECT

Updated 10/20/2010

#### INTRODUCTION

Many environmental agencies recognize that a core component of recycling and toxics reduction programs is the availability of accurate information about recycling, reuse and proper disposal options for residents and businesses. A number of online tools exist that serve this function, yet these tools are quickly becoming technologically outdated and are maintained separately by different agencies for public use. Similar tools also exist on the national level such as Earth911.com, but these tools do not always reflect the specifics of recycling and disposal collection programs at the local level, and often contain inaccurate information.

As part of recent updates to their websites and data systems, StopWaste.Org, San Francisco Department of the Environment (SF Environment), and the City of Palo Alto Zero Waste Program simultaneously began investigating the development of new online searchable recycling database tools. Due to similar goals and timelines, StopWaste.Org, SF Environment and Palo Alto Zero Waste decided to partner in the creation of a new software platform for managing and sharing their recycling information. This presented itself as the beginnings of a regional partnership.

Because of growing interest from other local agencies, we are seeking further stakeholder input and partners to create the best tool possible, make that tool available for other agencies, share information, and maximize program outreach efforts. SF Environment will act as project lead in collaboration with StopWaste.Org (Alameda County), and the City of Palo Alto (Santa Clara County) to develop a next-generation recycling services database application in fiscal and programmatic collaboration with interested and committed city/county agencies and other organizations in the Bay Area. The City of San Jose and Santa Clara County are among those that have expressed a strong interest in participating as key partners.

#### **PROJECT GOALS**

This project seeks to achieve a number of goals stemming from both the development of a new software platform and the regional collaboration of Bay Area recycling agencies:

- Create a regional database of local recycling, reuse and disposal services information with a unified interface that better serves the public across traditional municipal boundaries.
- Empower environmental agencies to easily maintain this type of data.
- Develop this application as a centralized web service with various mechanisms (search modules, mobile app, etc.) for integration with participating agencies' websites that replicate and enhance the current functionality found on those sites.
- Embrace "Open Data" philosophy requiring that data is freely and easily available to everyone via a data feed.

 Release the code as "Open Source," publicly licensed software to allow other agencies around the country to utilize.

To achieve these goals, we have decided to build a new, centralized platform rather than use any of the existing tools. A number of compelling technology considerations that led to this decision:

- Compliance with modern web standards and ADA standards
- Implementation of required new features such as:
  - o user management
  - widgets for integration into agency websites
- Creation of an Open Data feed for sharing recycling information as broadly as possible
- Release of software as a quality Open Source product
- Most efficient and cost-effective to build new platform than hack existing tools

This project is not an attempt to change data management protocols within participating municipalities. At its heart, this is a software project intended to bring our recycling outreach into the modern web era and make our data management responsibilities more efficient. Most importantly, our goal is to provide a platform that allows the general public to "do the right thing" as easily as possible without getting lost in a maze of confusing menus and categories.

#### WHERE ARE WE NOW?

On August 1, SF Environment issued an RFP for vendors to develop this platform that was drafted by the project partners. After a full review of a number of firms, the review panel (consisting of representatives from SF Environment, StopWaste.Org and Palo Alto Zero Waste) selected Common Knowledge (<a href="www.CommonKnow.com">www.CommonKnow.com</a>) as the vendor. Work has not yet started on this project, and the rough timeline we are looking at is as follows:

#### 2010

mid-November - project start meeting, development begins November/December - discussions with BayROC about project involvement

#### 2011

mid-December/early January - solicit feedback on functional requirements Feb/March - discussion of taxonomy & material categories April - testing/initial feedback on draft tool June - project launch

### **HOW TO GET INVOLVED**

We are looking for the following input to guide the development of this project:

1) Direct project development input: Stakeholders would provide input and feedback on the development of the tool. As the project scope and timline is finalized with the contractor, points for stakeholders to provide feedback and testing of the tool will be scheduled into the process. Potential points of input may include: functional

requirements, categorization (names and grouping of materials), search functionality, testing, reporting features, etc.

2) Project governance/stewardship: Stakeholders would provide input and guidance on the long term vision of how agencies work together on this project as a regional partnership. Questions that we need to address include: How is this tool updated, maintained and evaluated? Is development of an MOU or fee for use required? How do we prioritize additional features or updates? Is there a role for a third party organization, such as BayROC, to serve as a mediating forum or for promoting this tool?

This input can be provided in two different ways:

1) Join the Steering Committee comprised of financial sponsors (StopWaste, Palo Alto, SF Environment). All county agencies are contributing ~\$25-30k. This will be the core body driving the development process and making final decisions.

OR

2) Join the Stakeholder Group established to solicit input and feedback from all agencies and organizations that have a vested interest in this project. Participation in the Stakeholder Group will not require a financial contribution. However, if an agency that is not part of the Steering Committee would like to use the new software platform for managing and sharing their data, we are considering charging a nominal "subscription" fee to cover maintenance costs, hosting fees, etc.
