2	Resolution urging the City and County of San Francisco to give preference to certified
3	organic food vendors and to urge the federal government to label and test genetically
4	engineered foods, as well as to assign liability to the commercial developers of

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7	WHEREAS, Consumers of any food product have the right to complete confidence and
8	thorough knowledge of any ingredient in their food or other products; and
9	WHEREAS, Genetically engineered foods have not been adequately tested by any
10	federal agency for long-term impacts on human health or the environment; and
11 12	WHEREAS, Genetically Engineered Life Forms or Genetically Modified
13	Organisms" (GMO) and equivalent terms, shall refer to organisms and their genetic makeup in
14	which genetic material or inherited genetic material has been directly altered through
15	recombinant DNA technology, genetic modification, genetic manipulation, or gene splicing.
16	The term shall not refer to traditional breeding where the organism's genes are manipulated
17	indirectly.
18	WHEREAS, The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) suggests only that companies
19	engineering foods state that genetically engineered foods are safe, but requires no further
20	testing; and
21	WHEREAS, Competent scientific researchers have suggested that genetically
22	engineered foods, seed, and other products could pose risks to the environment, including
23	damaged soil ecology, harmful effects to wildlife, increased use of farm chemicals, and other

1	WHEREAS, Scientists and other researchers have indicated that genetically
2	engineered crops may harm beneficial insect species, such as Monarch butterflies, as well as
3	threatened and endangered insect species; and
4	WHEREAS, Genetically engineered materials could have serious impacts on levels of
5	toxins in food, antibiotic resistance, cancer, immuno-suppression, and allergic reactions, and
6	may be particularly threatening to children and the elderly; and
7	WHEREAS, In the event of a serious health impact and an ensuing lawsuit, the federal
8	government has not yet assigned liability to the commercial developers of genetically
9	engineered foods; and
10	WHEREAS, Genetically engineered foods are growing in prevalence in the United
11	States and around the world, without sufficient regulation or research; and
12	WHEREAS, Many community organizations, representing farmers and sustainable
13	agriculture interests, as well as consumers, environmentalists and others, have argued for a
14	moratorium on genetically engineered foods, and some countries have effectively—if not
15	officially—instituted a moratorium, including France, Italy, Denmark, Greece, and
16	Luxembourg; and
17	WHEREAS, The European Commission has agreed on terms to guarantee the labeling
18	of genetically engineered foods; and
19	WHEREAS, The City of Berkeley's Unified School District's Food Policy, adopted in
20	August of 1999, establishes a goal of serving organic foods to the maximum extent possible in
21	Berkeley's schools; and
22	WHEREAS, The City of Berkeley's Board of Education and the Berkeley City Council
23	have approved resolutions to urge the federal government to ban the growing, disseminating,
24	and marketing of products that contain genetically engineered organisms until they have been
25	proven safe for human consumption and for the environment; now, therefore be it; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Commission on the Environment unanimously adopted
a resolution in July 2000 (No. 012-00-COE) urging the city and county of San Francisco to
give preference to certified organic food vendors and to urge the federal government to label
and test genetically engineered (genetically engineered) foods, as well as to assign liability to
the commercial developers of genetically engineered technology; now, therefore be it
RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby requests the Mayor to write a letter
to the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), and
United Stated Department of Agriculture (USDA) stating that all genetically engineered foods
should be labeled clearly, that all genetically engineered material should be thoroughly
researched and regulated, that liability should be assigned to the commercial developers of
genetically engineered foods, and that, until these materials are proven safe, that the FDA,
the EPA, and the USDA should establish a moratorium on these products; and, be it
FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Mayor to request that
all City departments and agencies, including those in City Hall, give preference to certified
organic food vendors during any and all contract negotiations; and, be it
FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Mayor to require that,
by January of 2012, special events held by City departments and City agencies, including
those in City Hall, give preference to caterers that avoid genetically engineered ingredients
and use certified organic foods; and, be it
FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Mayor to urge the
San Francisco Unified School District to serve certified organic lunches; and, be it
FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Mayor to request that
the Department of Consumer Assurance provide educational materials about genetically
engineered foods to grocers and where possible to the general public in San Francisco.
