9	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:				
10	Section 1. The San Francisco Business and Tax Regulations Code is hereby amended				
11	by amending Section 906.3-1, to read as follows:				
12	SEC. 906.3-1. CENTRAL MARKET STREET AND TENDERLOIN AREA CITIZEN'S				
13	ADVISORY COMMITTEE.				
14	(a) There shall be a Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area Citizen's				
15	Advisory Committee.				
16	(b) The Citizen's Advisory Committee shall be an advisory body whose				
17	purpose is to make recommendations to the Mayor, Board of Supervisors and City				
18	Administrator on policies and programs that mitigate the effects of development, bolster				
19	economic development, local employment, and community sustainability and seek to stabilize				
20	and protect existing tenants, community based organizations and small businesses in and				
21	around the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area.				
22	(c) Duties of the Citizen's Advisory Committee may include:				
23	(1) Advise the City Administrator of community issues in order to				
24	better align the Community Benefit Agreements called for under the Central Market Street and				
25	Tenderloin Area Payroll Expense Tax Exclusion with the community needs.				

1	(2) Make recommendations to the City Administrator about terms and
2	conditions in the Community Benefit Agreements called for under the Central Market Street
3	and Tenderloin Area Payroll Expense Tax Exclusion.
4	(3) Provide a report every six months to the Board of Supervisors
5	regarding the implementation and execution of the Community Benefit Agreements called for
6	under the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area Payroll Expense Tax Exclusion.
7	(4) Make recommendations to the Board of Supervisors and the Offic
8	of Economic and Workforce Development on policies, initiatives, and programs that bolster
9	economic development, local employment, and community sustainability and seek to stabilize
10	and protect existing tenants, community based organizations and small businesses in and
11	around the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area.
12	(5) Advise the Mayor, Board of Supervisors and City Administrator on
13	the creation of a community development fund that may support workforce development,
14	community infrastructure and programs to mitigate potential displacement of small
15	businesses, community based organizations and tenants.
16	(6) Help facilitate partnerships between persons claiming the Central
17	Market Street and Tenderloin Area Payroll Expense Tax Exclusion and community
18	organizations, local schools and small businesses.
19	(7) Hold public hearings regarding Community Benefit Agreements
20	within four weeks from the time the parties to any such Agreements reach a consensus on the
21	terms to be included therein and prior to the execution of any Community Benefit Agreement
22	by the City Administrator. The City Administrator may, at his or her sole discretion, extend
23	this time in order to combine hearings and utilize staff time more efficiently.
24	(8) The City Administrator shall convene the Citizen's Advisory

Committee no less than four times yearly.

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1	(d)	The C	Citizen's Advisory Committee shall be composed of eleven		
2	members:				
3		(1)	One member representing low-income families who lives with his		
4	or her family in the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area or Adjacent Area;				
5		(2)	Two members who have expertise in job creation and or workforce		
6	development, including one member who represents labor;				
7		(3)	One member who is a senior or disabled resident of the Central		
8	Market Street and Tenderloin Area or Adjacent Area;				
9		(4)	One member who has expertise in affordable housing or tenant		
10	protection and anti-displacement policies and strategies, and has familiarity with the Central				
11	Market Street and Tenderloin Area;				
12		(5)	One member who represents a community-based organization or		
13	provides direct services to the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area or Adjacent Area;				
14		(6)	One member who has small business expertise and familiarity with		
15	the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area;				
16		(7)	One member with expertise on homelessness, transitional age		
17	youth, or supportive housing and familiarity with the Central Market Street and Tenderloin				
18	Area or the Adjacent Area;				
19		(8)	One member with expertise in commercial real estate and leasing		
20	within the Central Market Street and Tenderloin Area; and				
21		(9)	Two members who are residents of the Central Market Street and		
22	Tenderloin Area or Adjacent Area.				
23	(e)	The F	Rules Committee of the Board of Supervisors shall nominate each		
24	Citizen's Advisory Committee member.				

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- 1 (f) The appointment of each nominee shall be confirmed by the full Board of 2 Supervisors.
 - (g) For purposes of this Section, "Adjacent Area" shall mean the area in District 6, bounded on the southern side by 13th Street and Townsend Street.
 - (h) The members of the Citizen's Advisory Committee shall be appointed for a term of four years; provided, however, that members first appointed shall, by lot at the first meetingprior to February 1, 2012, classify their terms so that threefive shall serve for a term of two years and foursix shall serve for a term of four years. At the initial meeting of the Citizen's Advisory Committee and yearly thereafter, the Citizen's Advisory Committee members shall select such officer or officers as deemed necessary by the Citizen's Advisory Committee. The Citizen's Advisory Committee shall promulgate such rules and regulations as are necessary for the conduct of its business under this Section. In the event a vacancy occurs, a successor shall be appointed to fill the vacancy consistent with the process and requirements to appoint the previous appointee. When a vacancy occurs for a reason other than the expiration of a term of office, the appointee to fill such vacancy shall hold office for the unexpired term of his or her predecessor. Any appointee who misses four meetings within a twelve-month period, without the approval of the Citizen's Advisory Committee, shall be deemed to have resigned.
 - (i) The Citizen's Advisory Committee shall comply with all applicable public records and meetings laws and shall be subject to the Conflict of Interest provisions of the City's Charter and Administrative Code. Specifically, during the twelve months prior to and during a member's tenure on the Citizen's Advisory Committee, no member of the Citizen's Advisory Committee may receive any gift, income or have any investment in any entity that foreseeably may be subject to or be the beneficiary of any Community Benefit Agreement reviewed by the Citizen's Advisory Committee. For purposes of this Section, "income," "gift" and "investment" shall have the same meanings as defined in the Political Reform Act of 1974

1	under California Government Code Section 81000 et seq. The initial meeting of the Citizen's					
2	Advisory Committee shall be called within 30 days from the day the Board of Supervisors					
3	confirms its initial appointments. The City Administrator shall provide administrative support					
4	to the Citizen's Advisory Committee.					
5	(j) The provisions of this ordinance and the operation of the Citizen's					
6	Advisory Committee shall expire upon expiration of the Central Market Street and Tenderloin					
7	Area Payroll Expense Tax Exclusion under Section 906.3 of this Article.
