10	Section 1. The San Francisco Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding
11	Chapter 79A, to read as follows:
12	<u>CHAPTER 79A</u>
13	ADDITIONAL PREAPPROVAL NOTICE FOR CERTAIN CITY PROJECTS
14	SEC. 79A.1. Findings.
15	1. On June 2, 1998, the San Francisco voters adopted Proposition I, the Citizens' Right-to-
16	Know Act of 1998. Proposition I was codified as Chapter 79 of the San Francisco Administrative
17	Code.
18	2. Chapter 79 establishes minimum notice requirements prior to the Approval of a City Project
19	by any city officer, department, board or commission. This Chapter 79A expands upon those notice
20	requirements.
21	3. In order to make a fully informed decision on projects requiring public notice under this
22	Chapter, the Board should have information about the nature and extent of the notice provided to the
23	public by the sponsoring officer, department, board or commission prior to the Board's action on a
24	proposed City Project.
25	SEC. 79A.2. Scope.

1	The notice requirements of this Chapter 79A shall apply to any City Project that is within the
2	scope of Chapter 79. The exemptions of Section 79.3 and the requirements applicable to a change in
3 .	the project set forth in Section 79.4 shall apply.
4	SEC. 79A.3. Definitions.
5	The definitions of "Approve or Approval" and "City Project" shall be as set forth in Section
6	<u>79.2.</u>
7	"Proposed Project" shall mean any project within the scope of Chapter 79 and this Chapter
8	where a City department, board, commission, or official makes any decision to potentially fund directly
9	or administer the project through the use of federal, state, or other funding sources.
10	SEC. 79A.4. Signposting Requirements.
11	The signposting requirements of Section 79.5 shall apply, except that the sign shall be posted at
12	least thirty (30) days prior to consideration of Approval of a City Project.
13	SEC. 79A.5. Website Notice.
14	Each city officer, department, board or commission shall post on its official website and
15	maintain an updated list of all Proposed Projects. At a minimum, the list shall contain a description
16	and the property address of each Proposed Project. The officer, department, board or commission shall

LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Administrative Code – Additional Preapproval Notice for Certain City Projects]

Ordinance adding Chapter 79A to the San Francisco Administrative Code to expand upon the minimum notice requirements prior to approval of a City Project that are mandated by the Citizens' Right to Know Act of 1998.

Existing Law

In June 1998, the voters adopted Proposition I, which is known as the Citizens' Right-to-Know Act of 1998. Proposition I is codified as Chapter 79 of the San Francisco Administrative Code. It establishes minimum public notice requirements for certain projects that are being funded directly by the City or administered by the City through the use of federal, state or other funding sources.

Amendments to Current Law

The proposed ordinance adds Chapter 79A to the Administrative Code. Chapter 79A expands upon the minimum notice requirements for projects that are within the scope of Chapter 79.

Background Information

Under the current notice provisions for City-funded projects, neighborhood notice comes too late in the process to enable the public to provide meaningful input to the City decisionmakers. Expanding upon the notice that Chapter 79 currently requires and requiring it earlier in the process will address this problem.
