[Fire Code - Fire Apparatus Access Roads]

Ordinance amending the Fire Code, Chapter 5, Section 503.4, to clarify what does not constitute an obstruction of a Fire Apparatus Access Roads.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. Findings.

The Board of Supervisors finds pedestrian safety and reduction of pedestrian fatalities at intersections and other legal crosswalks are important City policy objectives.

In December 2010, the Board of Supervisors adopted the Better Streets Plan. A core principle underlying the Better Streets Plan is that streets that the City must design, build, and operate should strike a balance among all users of streets regardless of physical abilities or mode of travel, with the objective of making streets better and safer resources for all the people who live or work in San Francisco. The construction, design, and operation of streets must serve the paramount public interest in maintaining the livability of the City; taking into account, and striking a balance among, the needs of pedestrians, bicyclists, motorcyclists, and those who travel by private automobile, as well as those who travel by bus, streetcar, or other mass transit; considering also such factors as street trees, storm water management, utilities, as well as vehicular circulation and parking. But in this mix of factors, pedestrian safety must be given a high priority.

The Board of Supervisors finds that installation of pedestrian "bulb outs" at intersections and crosswalks, extended from sidewalks or medians, will enhance pedestrian Supervisors Wiener, Yee BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

safety. A pedestrian "bulb out" exists when the sidewalk or median at the intersection or at another legal crosswalk is extended into the street, thereby reducing the distance pedestrians must travel to cross the street.

The Board of Supervisors further finds that bulb outs will also force traffic to slow down and improve the capacity of vehicle drivers to see pedestrians.

The Board of Supervisors further finds that increasing the number of bulb outs in the City is consistent with the Better Streets Plan.

In adopting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors does not intend to amend the California Fire Code, reduce the powers of the fire code official, or compromise fire safety. This legislation intends only to interpret what constitutes an obstruction of a fire apparatus access road under California Fire Code Section 503.4.

Section 2. The San Francisco Fire Code is hereby amended by amending Section 503.4, to read as follows:

SECTION 503 – FIRE APPARATUS ACCESS ROADS

shall not be obstructed in any manner, including the parking of vehicles. <u>Subject to Health and Safety Code Sections 13104, 13108, 13114, 18941.5, and California Fire Code Sections 104.1, 1.11.2, and 503, the portion of the sidewalk or median, immediately adjoining and extending into a roadway, that has no utility pole, street light, street furniture, fire hydrant, trees, shrubbery, or other structure or natural growth attached thereto and that has a height that does not exceed six inches above the roadway shall not constitute an obstruction of a fire apparatus access road. The minimum widths and clearances established in Section 503.2.1 shall be maintained at all times.</u>

Section 3. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days from the date of passage.

Section 4. In enacting this ordinance, the Board intends to amend only those words, phrases, paragraphs, subsections, sections, articles, numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Fire Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under the official title of the ordinance.

LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Fire Code - Fire Apparatus Access Roads]

Ordinance amending the Fire Code, Chapter 5, Section 503.4, to clarify what does not constitute an obstruction of a Fire Apparatus Access Roads.

Existing Law

Under the California Fire Code, a fire apparatus access road shall not be obstructed in any manner, including the parking of vehicles. The minimum width for a fire apparatus access road is 20 feet with an unobstructed vertical clearance of not less than 13 feet 6 inches.

Amendments to Current Law

This legislation will clarify that an unobstructed sidewalk that does not exceed six inches in height will not constitute a per se obstruction of fire apparatus access road. This legislation does not affect the authority of the fire code official under state law. A department may not act pursuant to this ordinance in contradiction to the determination of the fire code official.



The Board of Supervisors finds and declares that it is in the public interest to officially recognize walking as an important component of our transportation system, and as a key component to creating livable and suitable communities.

Therefore the Board of Supervisors established the Pedestrian Safety Advisory Committee. This Advisory Committee, composed of concerned and informed residents, will provide a source of expertise on issues concerning pedestrian safety, convenience, ambiance, and planning.
